Judge Ammons Attending Juvenile Conference

Fisher County Judge Ralph Ammons will attend a 4-day Juvenile Justice Conference in Brownwood, from April 25 to 28.

This conference is expected to expand on the format established at the first Governor's Juvenile Justice Conference held last September, according to Ammons. During Ammons four

day stay in Brownwood, he is scheduled to tour the Texas Youth Council facilities for boys at Gatesville and the girls facilities at Brownwood. Judge Ammons will sit in on lectures, participate in discussions on numerous phases of delinquency hearings and determination, and be briefed on current Fed-

eral and State decisions concerning the juvenile system.

Tuesday, April 25, County Judges from over Texas will participate in a "mock delinquency trial", scheduled to begin at 7 P. M. and last until 9 P. M. On April 26, skilled law enforcement officers and lawyers will present messages on each phase of the disposition of juveniles. This series will begin with the first contact, intake, case history, petition, attorney for the respondent, guardian ad litem, custody pending trial, prosecutors office, lack of services, and trial.

Fisher County Attorney Rudy Hamric is scheduled to attend a portion of the conference with Judge Ammons.

Cottonwood Farming Film Shown In Roby

The Fisher County Young Farmers held their regular monthly meeting Monday night, April 17, at the Agriculture Building in Roby with thirteen members present.

Mr. Jimmie Laurie, Vocational Agriculture instructor and chapter advisor presented a film on "Cottonwood Tree Farming". The film showed experimental plots in the Mississippi Lowlands where they are growing cottonwood trees for use as wood pulp in manufacturing paper. The trees were actually planted on cultivated acreage with approximately 500 trees per acre. The Cottonwood is more practical to grow since it can reach maturity in about 9 to 10 years, whereas it takes a pine tree about 30 years to reach wood pulp state of its growth.

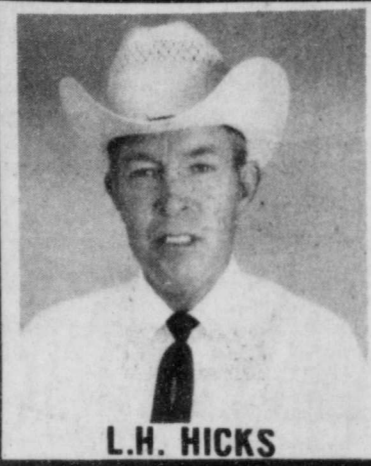

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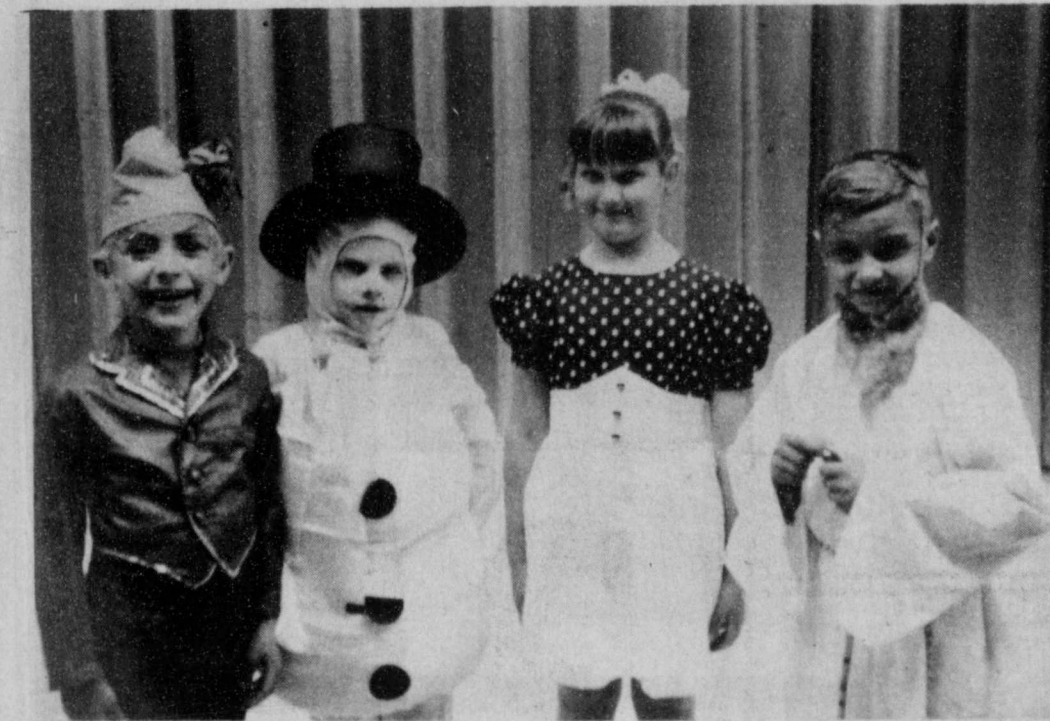

Brush Control: Only a tool, not a cure-all! Many millions of acres in Texas are infested with undesirable woody plants that reduce forage production and make it difficult to handle live stock. Brush control can be a means of improving forage production, improving wildlife habitat and conserving natural resources if brush control is coupled with good resource management practices.

A first step is to inventory your ranch resources and define the problems that need attention. Then decide what your management goals are over a period of time. Changes are brush control will be considered on most Texas ranches.

Eradication of troublesome woody plants may be desirable in some instances, but is not possible without a tremendous expenditure of time and money. Long term brush control coupled with increased forage production is a more realistic goal. Fire, chemical sprays, mechanical and biological methods are all used to control brush. No one method is suitable for the control of all species and acceptable in all situations. Select a method that will accomplish the desired level of brush control at a reasonable cost.

Management of rangeland following brush control practices may be more important than initial brush control measures. Too often operators reason that they must increase stocking rates immediately in order to recover the cost of brush control. Where this practice is followed, we often find that the land is soon in poorer condition than it was prior to controlling the brush.

The moral of the story is to make arrangements for food forage plant management prior to controlling brush. Such an approach allows for increased forage production and an increase in the life of a brush control practice. It allows for forage plants to compete with undesirable woody plants. It all boils down to the fact that when you invest money in brush control you cannot afford the luxury of poor grassland management.

Brush control is only one of the many tools used in good rangeland management. Take the time to draw up a long range management plan that will accomplish your long term goals.

Common broomweed (*Xanthocephalum dracunculoides*) in some years can become a serious problem on Texas rangelands. Broomweed germinates with winter rains, forms a small rosette of leaves, and grows very slowly for some time. Rapid growth begins around mid-April, and by mid-May the plants are 8-12 inches tall. Growth in height is fairly well completed by about June 15. On the average, broomweed reaches a mature height of about 18 inches, but may double that in exceptionally good years.

Results of research studies on the control of broomweed provide some very useful information. The application of 1/2 lb. of 2, 4-D when broomweed was from 4-6 inches tall (around May 1) resulted in 95-100% control. Even 1/4 lb. of 2, 4-D at this time reduced the stand of broomweed by 75%. Spraying with 2, 4, 5-T at 1/2 lb. per acre produced 60% control of broomweed when applied on May 1, and 90-95% control when applied on May 15. When spraying is delayed to June 1, 2, 4-D resulted in virtually no control whereas 2, 4, 5-T controlled about 85% of the weeds present at that time.

Dicamba applied alone at 1/2 lb. per acre resulted in 85-100%

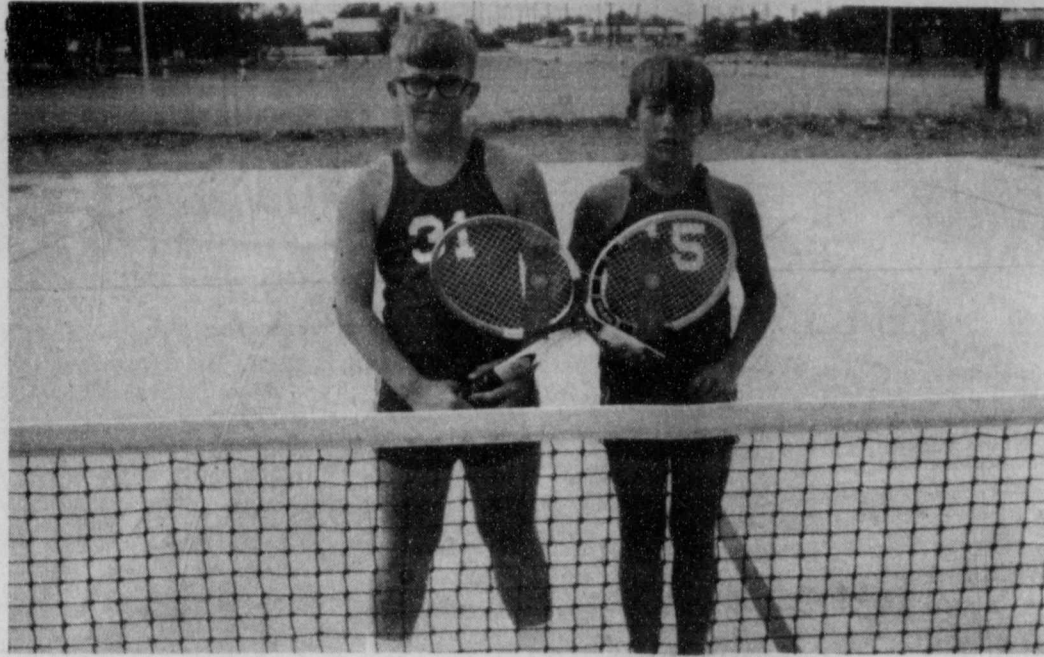
control of broomweed when applied between April 1 and June 1. One quarter pound of 2, 4, 5-T combined with an equal amount of dicamba produced similar results. The combination of dicamba and 2, 4-D and 2, 4, 5-T is not approved by the Environmental Protection Agency. Combinations of 2, 4-D or 2, 4, 5-T with equal amounts of picloram applied in totals of 1/4, 1/2, and 1 lb. per acre has resulted in virtually 100% control of common broomweed.

Economically speaking, 2, 4-D will control common broomweed for the lowest cost, but application time is rather critical. For best results pastures should be sprayed when the broom weed is about 4-6 inches tall (a period of about 10 days). Where weed control is desired in conjunction with brush control, other combinations of chemicals should be used, especially in cases where broomweeds have reached mature height. One-half pound of 2, 4, 5-T or 1/4 lb. 2, 4, 5-T plus 1/4 lb. dicamba or 1/4 lb. 2, 4, 5-T plus 1/4 pound picloram (Tordon 225) all result in satisfactory broomweed control. To date, the most effective combination for both mesquite and week control in the Rolling Plains has been the application of 1/4 lb. 2, 4, 5-T plus 1/4 lb. picloram.

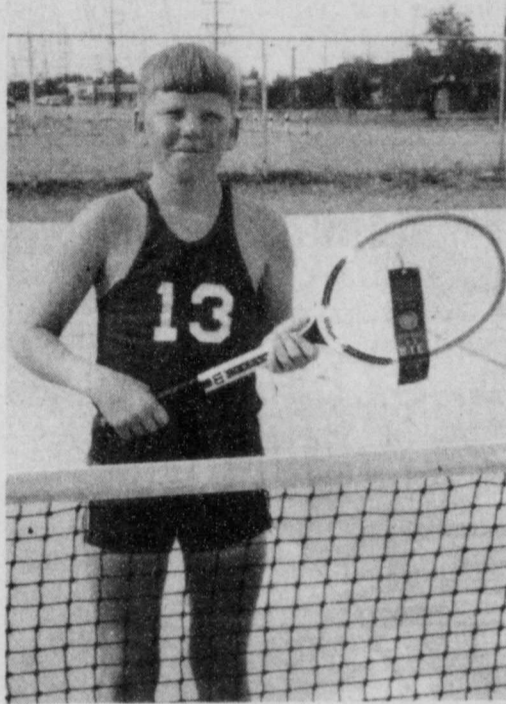

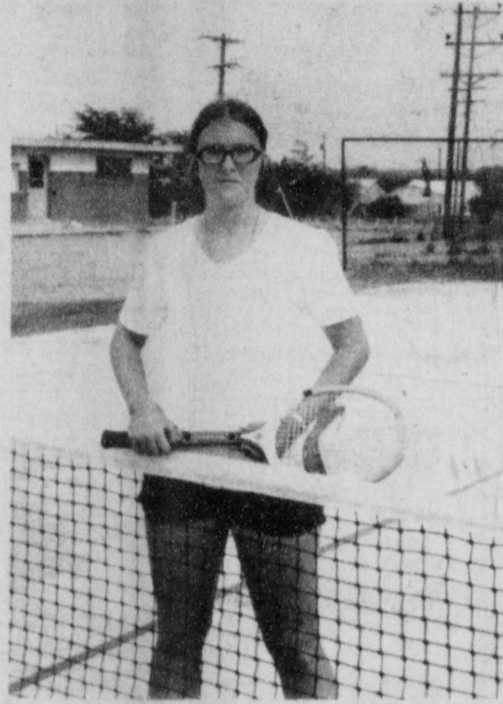

Meat cooked at low to moderate temperatures is more tender, juicy and flavorful than meat cooked at high temperature.

To best conserve the valuable nutrients and good flavor of milk, keep it cold, covered and away from strong light.

Roasting beef to the rare stage conserved more thiamine than cooking it until it's well-done. For an easy snack or a colorful dessert, serve cheese and fresh fruit.

Use low oven temperatures for baking casseroles containing a high percentage of milk.

When braising, broiling or frying lamb, brown the meat and then sprinkle seasonings on. When roasting lamb, rub seasonings into the meat before cooking. (Garlic cloves may be inserted beneath the fat.)

Dried beans, peas and lentils should be kept in tightly covered containers and stored in a dry, cool place (50-70 Deg. F.)

For a delicious new breakfast idea, try an apple. Peel, core, and dice it. Then top with a scoop of cottage cheese and sprinkle with sugar and cinnamon.

Packaged cereal, grain that are to be cooked should not be washed. To do so removed valuable nutrients—especially B vitamins. Except for macaroni products, it's best to cook cereals and rice in just enough water so it will be completely absorbed.

Are your french-fried potatoes soggy and greasy? Maybe your frying fat isn't hot enough. Temperature of the fat should be 370 to 385 Deg. F. At this temperature, a one-inch bread cube will brown in 20 to 45 seconds.

Vitamin destruction is accelerated in some fruits and vegetables when their tissues are cut. So whenever possible, avoid cutting, slicing or shredding them very far in advance of meal preparation. Eating quality is

also better if you wait until just before mealtime to cut vegetables.

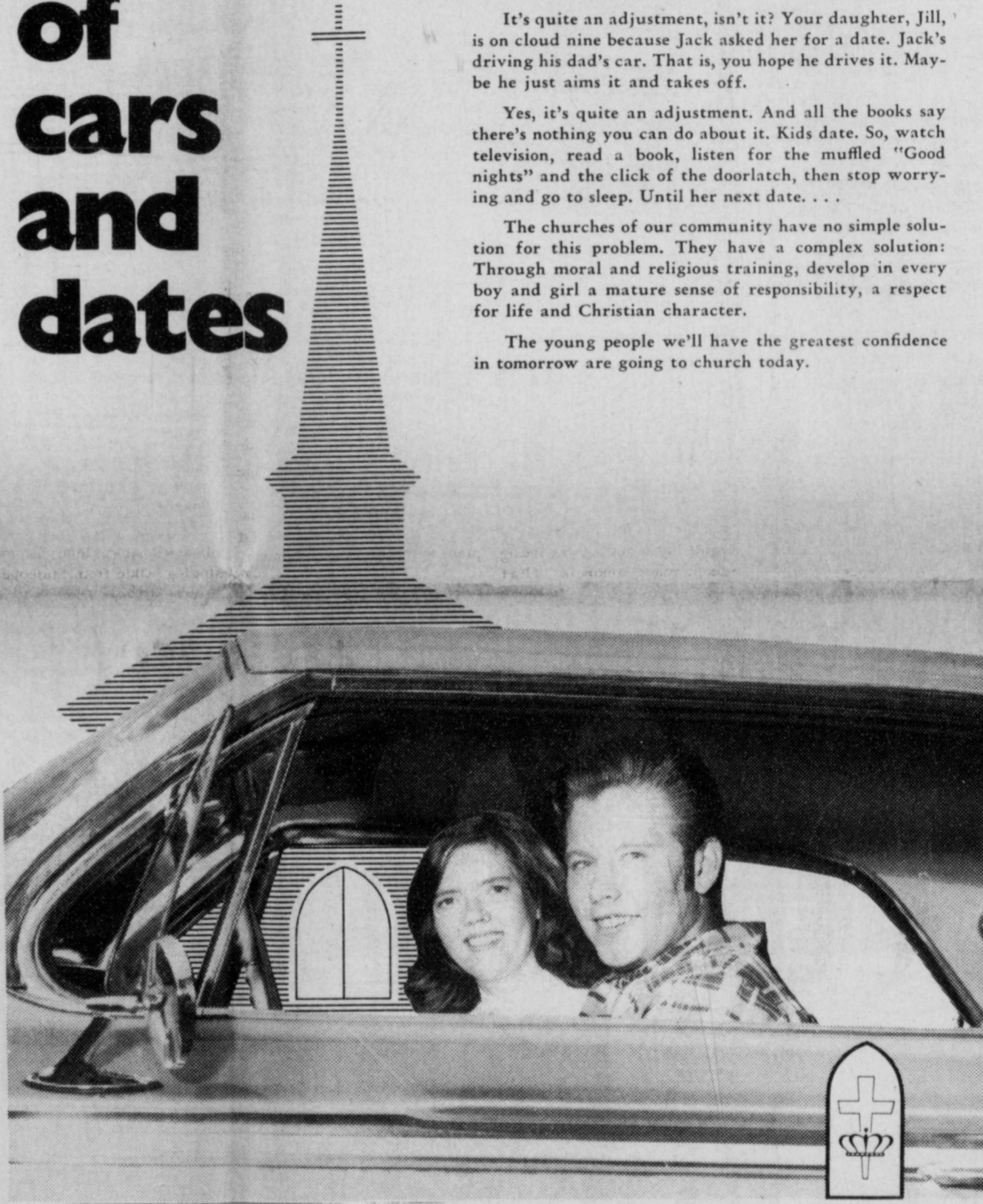

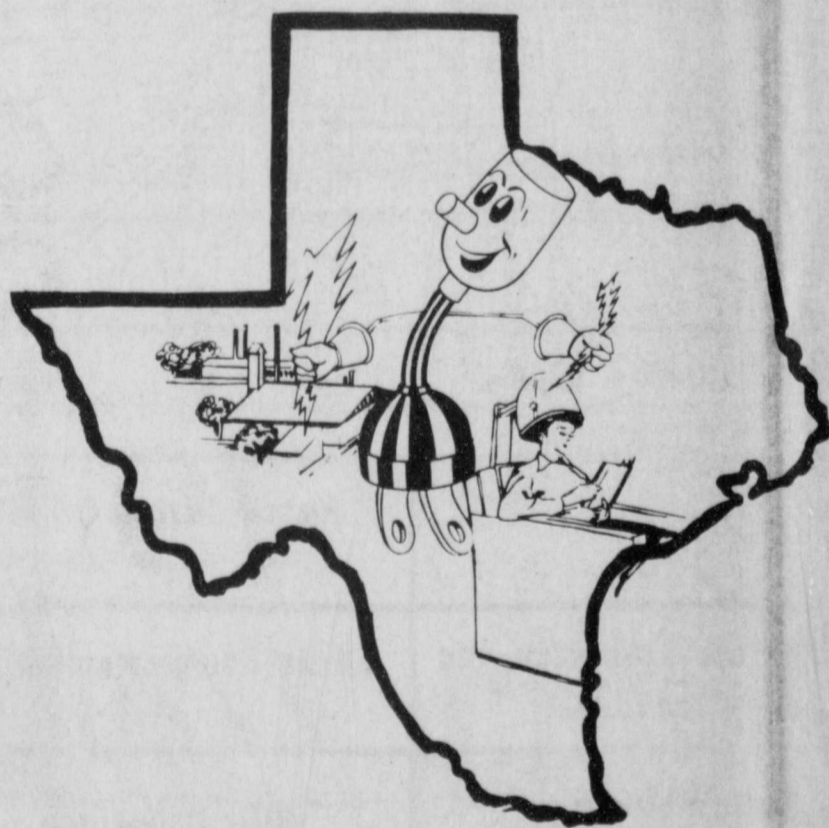

ON DOGS WITHIN THE CITY OF ROTAN; PROHIBITING DOGS FROM RUNNING AT LARGE WITHIN THE CITY OF ROTAN; PROVIDING FOR A VACCINATION OF DOGS AGAINST RABIES; PROVIDING FOR THE QUARANTINING OF DOGS SUSPECTED OF HAVING RABIES OR EXPOSED TO SAME, AND THOSE HAVING RABIES WHICH HAVE BITTEN PERSONS; PROHIBITING THE KEEPING OF DOGS, WHICH BY LOUD BARKING DISTURB THE PEACE AND QUIET OF THE NEIGHBORHOOD OR THE OCCUPANTS OF ADJACENT PREMISES; PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR VIOLATION OF ANY PROVISION OR PART OF SAID ORDINANCE AND REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES OR PARTS OF ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT WITH OR INCONSISTENT WITH THE PROVISIONS OF THIS ORDINANCE.

BE IT OBTAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROTAN, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. License required; when fee payable - I shall be unlawful for the owner or harbinger of any animal of the dog kind to harbor or permit said dog within the city limits of the City of Rotan without having paid the assessor and collector of taxes of the City of Rotan, an annual license tax of \$1.00 upon each male and \$1.50 upon each female dog six months of age or over. It shall be unlawful for the owner or harbinger of any animal of the dog kind to permit said dog to run at large within the city limits of the City of Rotan. The license fee required by this ordinance shall be due and payable as of January 1st of each calendar year, and when paid shall be good for the year ending December 31st following.

SECTION 2. Upon payment of such tax the tax collector shall in addition to the receipt for such tax, furnish the owner of such dog with a metal tax tag with a number inscribed thereon, and that the number of the tax tag shall correspond with the number of the receipt given the owner of the dog and with the duplicate kept by the Tax Collector. That such tax tag shall be so made that it can be fastened around the neck of the dog with a collar.

SECTION 3. Vaccination - All animals of the dog kind within the city limits of the City of Rotan are required to be immunized against rabies by means of an anti-rabies vaccine approved and administered by a duly licensed veterinarian; and every veterinarian who vaccinates such animal or animals of the dog kind within the City of Rotan shall issue a certificate of vaccination to such owner, stating the name of the owner and the address of the owner, description of the dog, the date of vaccination, the number of the rabies vaccination tag and the kind of vaccine used; and it is further provided that, upon vaccination each dog, the veterinarian shall furnish the owner of such animal a metal tag on one side of which is stamped the words "rabies vaccine administered" or a similar phrase, and the date of vaccination, which tag at all times shall be securely attached to a collar around the neck of the animal or harness around the neck and body of the animal vaccinated.

SECTION 4. Duty of Officer to Impound - It shall be the duty of the Chief of Police, City Health Officer, Police Officer or Poundmaster, to cause to be taken up or impounded all animals of the dog kind loose or at large in violation of this ordinance.

SECTION 5. Right to redeem; conditions - The owner of any dog impounded as aforesaid shall have the right to redeem same upon payment to the Chief of Police, City Health Officer, Police Officer or the Poundmaster, of the sum of \$1.00 per day for each animal so redeemed, in addition to the tax or fine, if any. (The sum so paid to the Chief of Police, City Health Officer, Police Officer or Poundmaster shall be paid by him into the City Treasury, and he shall issue a receipt for same in duplicate,

the second or carbon copy of which shall be turned over to the City Treasurer.)

SECTION 6. Time to redeem - All impounded dogs shall be redeemed within three (3) days after their capture and impoundment and all such animals not redeemed within the said time shall be destroyed.

SECTION 7. Vaccination of redeemed dogs - All animals redeemed at the dog pound must be immediately vaccinated against rabies, subject to the provisions of SECTION 3 of this ordinance.

SECTION 8. Quarantining of dogs exposed to rabies - Any animal of the dog kind that has rabies or symptoms thereof, or that is suspected of having rabies or that has been exposed to rabies shall be at once released to the Chief of Police, City Health Officer, any Police Officer or Poundmaster for disposal or confined in a veterinary hospital approved by the Chief of Police or Public Health Officer of the City of Rotan, or immediately and securely confined by tying with a chain of good quality and kept there under the supervision of the Chief of Police or the Public Health Officer of the City of Rotan, for a period of not less than sixty (60) days.

SECTION 9. Quarantining of rabid dogs or animals which have bitten persons - Every animal of the dog kind that has rabies or symptoms thereof, or any animal that bites, scratches or otherwise attacks any person or persons within the city limits shall be immediately and securely confined by the owner, or one having custody, by tying with a chain of good quality for a period of ten (10) days in such a place that no person or animal may be bitten by it, and there held subject to inspection from time to time so as to be able to determine whether said animal is affected by rabies; or said animal shall be quarantined and held for a like time in any veterinary hospital approved by the Chief of Police or Public Health Officer of the City of Rotan, or shall be held at the city pound for a period of twelve (12) days, after which time the dog shall be killed if in quarantine at the city pound.

SECTION 10. Reporting rabid dogs - It shall be the duty of the owner or the harbinger or the practicing veterinarian to report to the Public Health Officer or Chief of Police of the City of Rotan, all cases of rabies which he comes in contact or to which his attention has been directed. This report shall be made immediately upon diagnosis or suspicion of such cases of rabies.

SECTION 11. Any person violating the provisions of any of the foregoing sections pertaining to dogs shall be fined not exceeding Fifty Dollars (\$50.00); provided, that the provisions requiring payment of tax shall not apply to dogs following transient through the City.

SECTION 12. Any person who shall harbor or keep on his premises or in or about his premises under his control, any dog or animal of the dog kind, which by loud or unusual barking or howling, shall cause the peace and quiet of the neighborhood or the occupants of adjacent premises to be disturbed, or reasonably liable to be disturbed, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction, shall be fined not exceeding Twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00) and each and every twenty-four hours that said dog shall remain or be kept on any such premises shall constitute a separate offense.

SECTION 13. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with or inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed and are of no further force and effect.

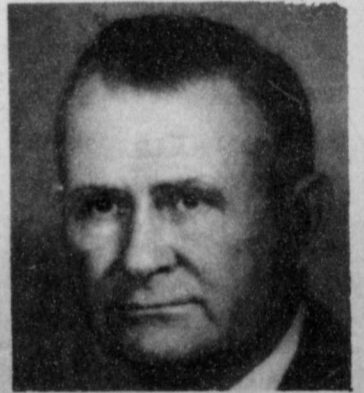

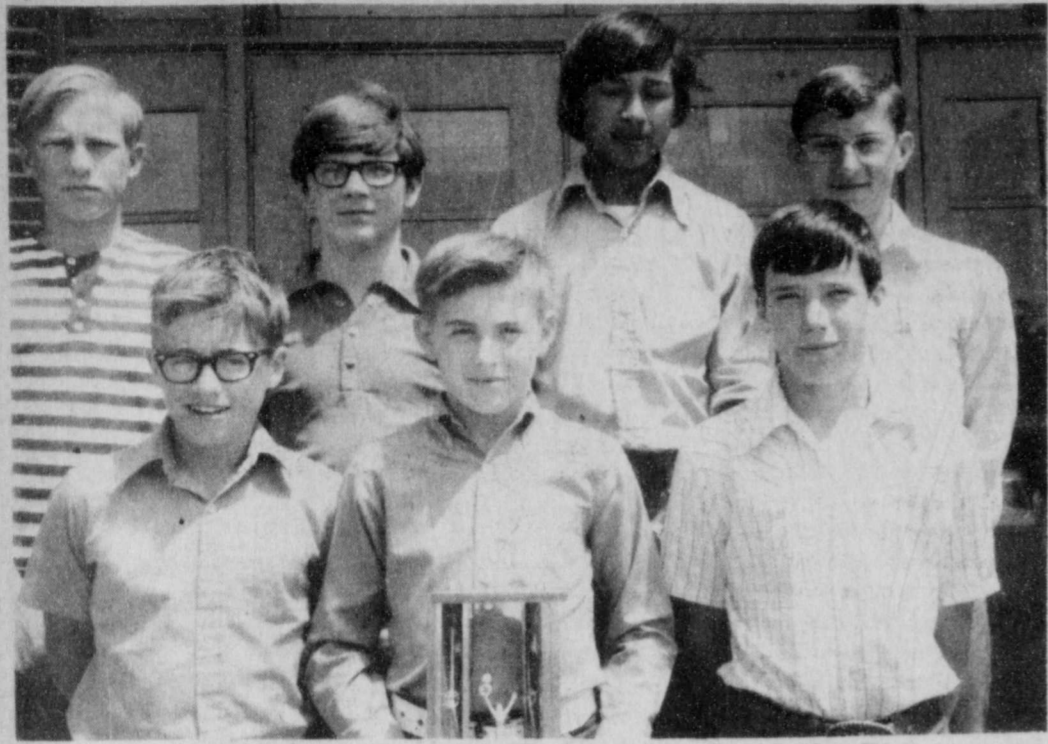

Congressman Burleson Announces

Congressman Omar Burleson has formally announced his candidacy for re-election to Congress, subject to the Democratic Primary on May 6 and the General Election in November. The 17th Congressional District, which he represents, is composed of 31 Counties, covering approximately 30,000 square miles. Within this area live about 468,000 people.

Burleson says, "During my tenure of office I have followed two guiding principles: First, to know the views of my constituents and reflect their sentiments to the greatest degree possible in my actions in the Halls of Congress. Second, to inform and advise as closely as I can on those issues

as closely as I can on those issues which affect your District, our State and our Nation."

Burleson termed his approach to Government as one of "common sense," gained through the years of public service. "I have tried to see that the people's tax money is spent as wisely and as judiciously as you would have spent it had you been in my place," he said.

"The record will show that a greater part of the time I have found myself in the minority in opposing the vast spending programs of doubtful value which have been put into effect in recent years. In every Session of the Congress the record will show my votes for expenditures below that recommended by the Executive Department and far less than actually appropriated by the Congress, except in the field of National Defense." Burleson said. He continued, "Without meaning to appear boastful,

if the Congress had followed those of us who have voted consistently over the years for fiscal responsibility, our financial affairs would not be in the shape they are today."

"In areas providing for the defense of our Country, I have always supported those things to make and keep our Nation stronger than any other in the world," he said.

"I have been discerning in separating those activities which the Federal Government was not designed to do, from those which are truly its responsibility," he said.

Burleson stated that activities

of State and local governments in accordance with the Constitution, should not be infringed and encroached upon by the Federal Government.

"The Federal Government does have specific missions," he said. He gave as examples the conservation of our natural resources, the defense of the Country and its general welfare.

"At the same time," he said, "the Federal Government can not and should not try to take care of everything from Washington. The Federal Government has grown to colossal proportions and centralized power in Washington has increased." Burleson pointed out. "To this, I am opposed and my record is clear in this respect."

Burleson is among the senior members of the U. S. House of Representatives in points of service. He was elected to the 80th Congress from the 17th District and has been re-elected to each succeeding Congress. He is a member of the Ways and Means Committee, considered to be the most powerful and prestigious in the Congress.

Burleson is a former County Attorney and County Judge of Jones County. He was appointed an FBI Agent, and served in a number of assignments over the U. S. He resigned from the FBI to join the Navy in World War II, and saw duty in both the Atlantic and the Pacific.

Burleson ended his formal announcement by saying, "Although not having opposition in this year's election, it is my hope to visit my constituency as opportunity affords. The Congress being in session at this time and expected to be long after the Primary Election, there will be little time to leave duties in Washington. I expect, however, to get back home at short intervals to do the best I can in seeing my friends and to make new ones. I believe it is incumbent upon a Congressman to know people and that they know him, to have the best representation. This is fundamental to our system."

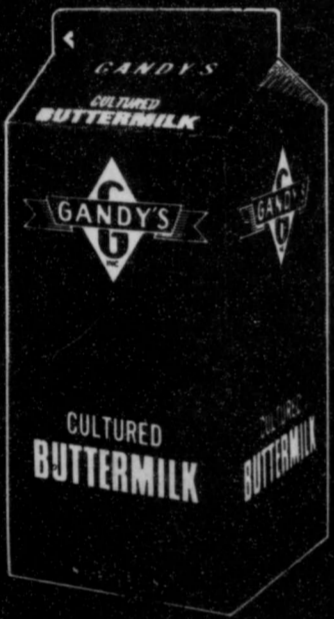
