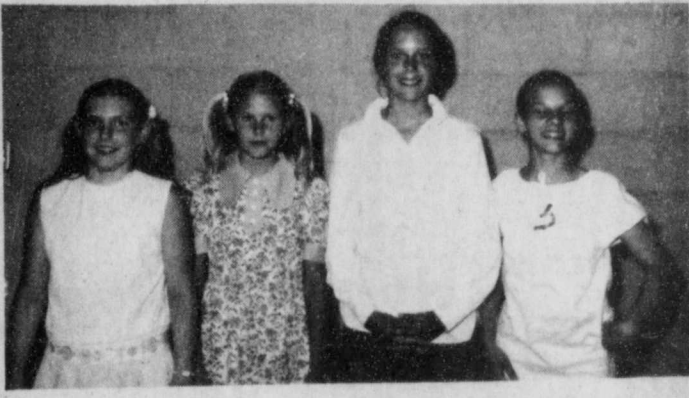

County 4-H Elimination Contest Winners Named

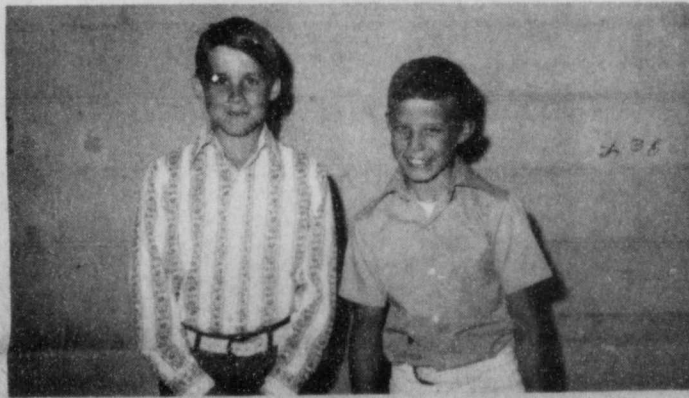

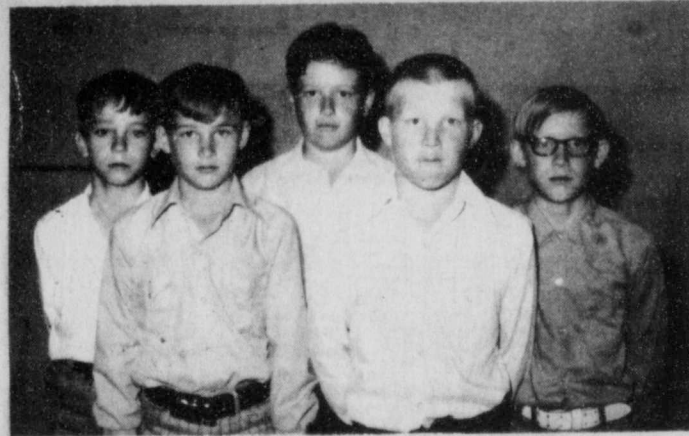

ROBY F. F. A. TO NATIONAL RANGE AND PASTURE JUDGING CONTEST: The Roby Range team qualified to the National contest at the State Judging contest at Stephenville on April 21. Sew Fair Session Is Scheduled For Rotan

Home sewing is of prime importance to homemakers these days, and the Texas Agriculture Extension Service wants them to have the latest information, according to Mrs. Alice Ballenger, Fisher County Home Demonstration Agent. Eight counties in District III will do their part to teach the latest in clothing construction. This is part of the campaign to move Sew Fairs across Texas.

The new method of teaching started in the large metropolitan shopping centers. Now it is being moved out by County Home Demonstration Agents and Family Living Committees.

On Tuesday, May 9, a Sew Fair will be held in the Community Building in Rotan from 9:30 a. m. to 11:30 a. m. and from 1:30 p. m. to 3:30 p. m. Educational demonstrations will be presented. Exhibits will be on display and homemakers will have the opportunity to register for Fact Sheets and Bulletins to help them practice what they have learned.

The old saying is that "clothes makes the woman", but with retail sales prices zooming, the saying might become "women

are making the clothes". Recent surveys reveal that two of every seven garments worn by women and children are made at home. All area homemakers are invited to attend one of these two sessions.

Robert Scott Receives Conservation Plaque

Robert Scott of Sylvester was recently awarded a plaque during a Roby Lions Club program that named him as the Outstanding Conservation Farmer for 1972 in the Upper Clear Fork

Soil and Water Conservation District.

The award was presented to Scott by Alfred Douglass who is on the Board of Directors of the Upper Clear Fork Soil and Water Conservation District. Douglass praised Scott for carrying out an excellent conservation program on his operating unit.

Headquarters for Scott's livestock and farming operation is approximately four miles south of Sylvester.

Several farms make up the operating unit and total about 2,000 acres. Scott has applied all practices necessary to control erosion and build up the soil on his rangeland and cropland.

Scott is ably assisted with the farming chores by his wife, Alma, and his son, Randy. Randy is a freshman student at Trent High School. The Scotts have two older daughters, Mrs. Susan Kimes of Baton Rouge, La. and Mrs. Joyce Talbot of Arlington.

County Progress Thriving

Progress is thriving in Fisher County, according to County Agent, Richard Spencer.

Some 40 hay barns have been built throughout the county with an average cost of \$4000 each. Ten new grain bins have also been put up. The hay barns and grain bins have been made available to the farmers and ranchers through the Agricultural Conservation and Stabilization Office.

The Bitter Creek Water Supply Corporation is busy putting in water lines for rural residents of the county. When completed, the Bitter Creek Corporation will have added lake water to over 400 customers in Fisher County. The Sylvester-McCauley Water Supply Corporation

has been in service for seven years and has 200 customers. Both of these Water Supply Corporations are funded by Farmers Home Administration.

Many new homes are also built in Fisher County each year. One home builder reports building 10 new homes here over the past two years, and is five behind now. Most all home builders in the county are staying busy with new home construction.

The state has just completed five additional miles of farm to market roads in north west part of the county.

The progress described above greatly improves the surroundings of Fisher County, according to Spencer.

Wayne Walton Speaker For Roby Sports Meet

Wayne Walton, starting offensive player for the New York Giants and 2nd round draftee is to be guest speaker for the Roby Athletic Banquet to be held, Saturday, April 29, in the Roby Agriculture Building at 7:30 p. m. Mr. Walton resides in Abilene where his wife attends Abilene Christian College.

All Roby High School girl and boy athletes will be honored at the banquet. The general public is invited to attend. The tickets can be purchased from any Athletic Club member or the school superintendent's office. Adult tickets are \$2.00, and student tickets are \$1.50.

The New York Giants rated Walton among the top two offensive tackles in the country. He has a growth potential of 250 pounds and rated outstanding among pass blockers with great speed and pulling on runs.

Walton was named to All-Conference team two years in succession, and to All-Texas Team in 1970. He snapped the ball on punts and field goals in college so the Giants will also give him a look as possible backup center.

Native of Azle, Texas, the 23-year old Walton has been rated a top prospect for the past two seasons by pro scouts. Also a track letterman, Walton holds the school record at ACC

of 180'10-1/2" in the discus throw. He was an outstanding basketball player in high school as well as being all-state in both football and track.

Walton received action in his rookie year on the special teams. He did start the last few games against teams such as Washington, and Dallas.

In Grasses...."Looks Not Everything"

Looks are not everything, take for example the local cattleman inspecting his range. Although the rancher may see what appears to be a good cover of grass on his land, he may not necessarily have a proportionate amount of grazing for his livestock, stated range conservationist Steve Holtz of the Soil Conservation Service. This is due to the difference in the genetic ability of various grass species to

produce forage. Some grasses are heavy forage producers, others slight; some grow in winter, others in summer; some are shallow rooted, some deep; some are liked by livestock, some are not.

Holtz continued, "knowing range grasses, like knowing livestock, is the foundation of the ranching business. A ranchman is actually in the grass business, with livestock as his grass harvesters and eventually his salable by-products."

The measuring stick in the ranching enterprise is in terms of pounds of beef produced—not in the number of head grazed. Thus, one rancher may produce an equal poundage of beef by grazing fewer head on the better producing grass species than another rancher running more head on poorer producing grass. This is not only due to better animal gains but heavier weaning weights and higher

calving percentages. Good palatable grass is the cheapest feed that can be grown. Thus, for maximum production, the cattleman should strive to manage his range to maintain the "better" grasses. To do this, he must know the kinds of plants growing on his range, the forage value, when to utilize them properly with the right kind of livestock and at the proper season. He must know the drought resistance and livability of grasses, how and when to control and manage noxious plants, how to properly distribute livestock for uniform use of forage and how to develop a grazing system that will keep livestock numbers and forage in balance

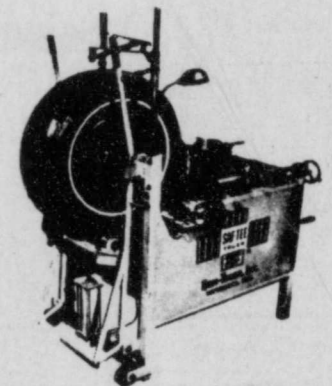
The kind and amount of vegetation determines the kind and number of livestock that can be grazed for most effective and greatest economic returns.

The Soil Conservation Service suggests stocking rates by which not more than 50% of the grass by weight is grazed to obtain proper use at the end of each growing season.

Thus, some grass is left for the next growing season resulting in faster growth and stronger plants the following year. In this respect grass is like a savings account—it takes money to make money and it takes grass to grow grass. And the better grass species "draw a higher rate of interest" for the progressive rancher.
