

"Listening gives you an opportunity to check yourself and your actions," says Mrs. Ballenger.

Paying attention to what children say gives clues about what they've been learning. Adults are often surprised to discover that children learn something different from what parents think they teach.

"Try keeping a record for one day of the things you say to your child when it's time for bed or when you want him to do a good job," Mrs. Ballenger said. "And write down what you say when you want him to turn off the

TV or change his behavior."

How many times a day do you say the words "no", "don't",

"stop", or "quit"? You might be surprised. Write down the number of times you say these words.

"If you find that you use such words often, why not try stating your requests in a more positive manner?" asked Mrs. Ballenger.



COUNTY AGENT NEWS

Experimental research which has succeeded in developing a male-only strain of houseflies could have far-reaching implications for the hard-pressed USDA Screwworm Eradication Project.

This apparently self-defeating deviation would, if it could be duplicated with screwworms, permit the Mission Lab to raise twice as many male flies on a given volume of food.

Scientists would prefer to sterilize and release only male flies because females mate just once whereas males mate several times. A significantly increased supply of sterilized males at no extra cost would be particularly welcome this year since the lab has been inundated by a screwworm invasion of epidemic proportions. A stepped up supply of sterile flies is badly needed but production has been hampered by a restricted budget.

Heretofore, the method of obtaining males only for release required mechanical or hand sexing both inefficient or prohibitively costly when dealing with 150-million flies a week.

So sexing has been ignored as impractical and all screwworm pupae are sterilized and released, male and female alike, on the assumption that at least half would be the preferred males.

Sterilizing programs involve rearing insects in a laboratory, sterilizing the males and releasing them in quantities sufficient to significantly outnumber native males. As a result, almost all matings in any release area should occur between normal females and sterilized males.

Sterilized insects carry defective chromosomes so that matings between treated and normal flies result in eggs that don't hatch.

Now a team of entomologists at the Agricultural Research Laboratory in Fargo, North Dakota have manipulated the genetic traits of houseflies to isolate a heat-sensitive lethal factor. This results in the death of flies reared at 92 degrees. With further cross-breeding and additional genetic manipulation, the Fargo researchers have obtained a strain in which males always inherit this temperature-dependent factor in a different set of chromosomes than the females. Thus, the males are more resistant to heat than their sisters.

When the offspring of this strain are reared at temperatures above 92 degrees F, the females die in the pupal stage and only adult males emerge.

Another advantage of high-temperature rearing would be a reduction in rearing time because the immature stages develop faster, allowing an increase in annual fly production with no additional outlay for plant.

Studies are now in progress to obtain a heat-sensitive factor acting in the egg stage. Females could then be killed before hatching and twice as many males obtained from a given volume of food material in which the insects are reared.

As far as is known, no such research with screwworms has been done. However, the lab director at Mission indicates he would be happy to see such work undertaken, especially since the annual cost of food media for the screwworm flies is so high.

To raise 100 million voracious flies at Mission each week calls for this staggering menu: 105,000 pounds of nutrients, including 71,550 pounds of nutria meat.

720 pounds of horse meat, 6,600 pounds of dried milk, 6,575 lbs. of dried egg, 4,150 pounds of cottage cheese and 110 gallons of honey.

For beautiful roses in your lawn or garden this summer, take steps now to control black spot.

Black spot is the most serious rose disease problem encountered by rose growers. It is caused by a fungus which leaves a black spot with an irregular margin surrounded by a zone of yellow tissue. In addition to the unsightly black spots on the blossoms, plants may also shed their leaves.

Begin control measures by raking and burning all fallen leaves in the spring and removing all old leaves from the rose plants. This will reduce one source of fungus spores that can cause new infections. At the same time, prune the tops of infected roses to eliminate overwintering infection sites on the upper stems.

In spite of cultural methods, chemical protection will also be required for most hybrid teas. Begin fungicide applications when the first leaves are one-half inch long. Repeat applications at regular intervals according to label directions. Direct sprays to both top surfaces of the leaves are covered. The degree of black spot control will be no better than the coverage obtained.

Effective spray materials include Benlate, Daconil 2787, Dithane M-45, Phaltan and Zineb. Other fungicides may also be available at your local garden or supply store. Sulphur dust, an old "standby" fungicide, is still used by many growers and is an effective material. However, its use should be discontinued after temperatures reach 85 degrees F, or the leaves will bronze.

Due to lack of spring rains, most homeowners are getting into the regular routine of watering their lawns and gardens. The key to watering for lush, green plant growth all summer is to base your watering schedule on the type of soil.

If the lawn has a tight, heavy or compact soil, water movement will be slow. So, watering as a slow rate for a long period will be necessary to allow the water to move through the soil and to prevent run-off.

Keep lawn and garden soils moist to the proper depth and you can expect dividends throughout the growing season. How to water to that depth depends on the soil type.
