

HOLD ON TO YOUR HAT... IT'S RODEO TIME!

Members of the Fisher County Sheriff's Posse are in the process of preparing for the 16th Annual Amateur Rodeo to be held June 15, 16, and 17.

The Fisher County Rodeo will begin on Thursday with a big downtown parade beginning at 5 p. m. Leading the parade will be the Six White Horses from Hardin-Simmons University in Abilene.

The parade is open to anyone desiring to enter a float of any kind. There will be trophies awarded to the adult riding clubs and a first place trophy to the best Junior Riding Club in the parade. Judging will be according to the American Association of Sheriff Posse and Riding Club standards.

Connie Byrd of Rotan, a student at Hardin-Simmons and member of the Six White Horses team will be participating in the grand entry drill Thursday night.

The rodeo is being produced by Adrian Parker of St. Jo, Texas. Jack Lain of Sweetwater is the rodeo clown.

The 73 Club will sponsor a country-western dance each night at the Community Center. Music to be furnished by J. W. Brewer and his Auctioneers.

The events in this years rodeo include calf roping, double mugging, bare back bronc riding, saddle bronc, open barrel race, jack pot barrel race and bull riding.

There is going to be a special Pony Express race involving several Fisher County Sheriff Posse youth during the three-day rodeo.

Several Fisher County cowboys are scheduled to participate in various events of the rodeo. On Friday, Mike Cade and Tommy Frierson are entered in the bull riding event and on Saturday night Buddy Jones will try his hand at bull riding. In Friday night's bareback bronc event, Frank Garcia and Ronnie Martin are scheduled to ride and on Saturday Larry Gruben and Mike Cade are entered in the event.

Free Ride Over

In the distant future Fisher County residents will be faced with what could prove to be the most important decision they will ever be asked to make, when they vote for or against forming a county hospital district.

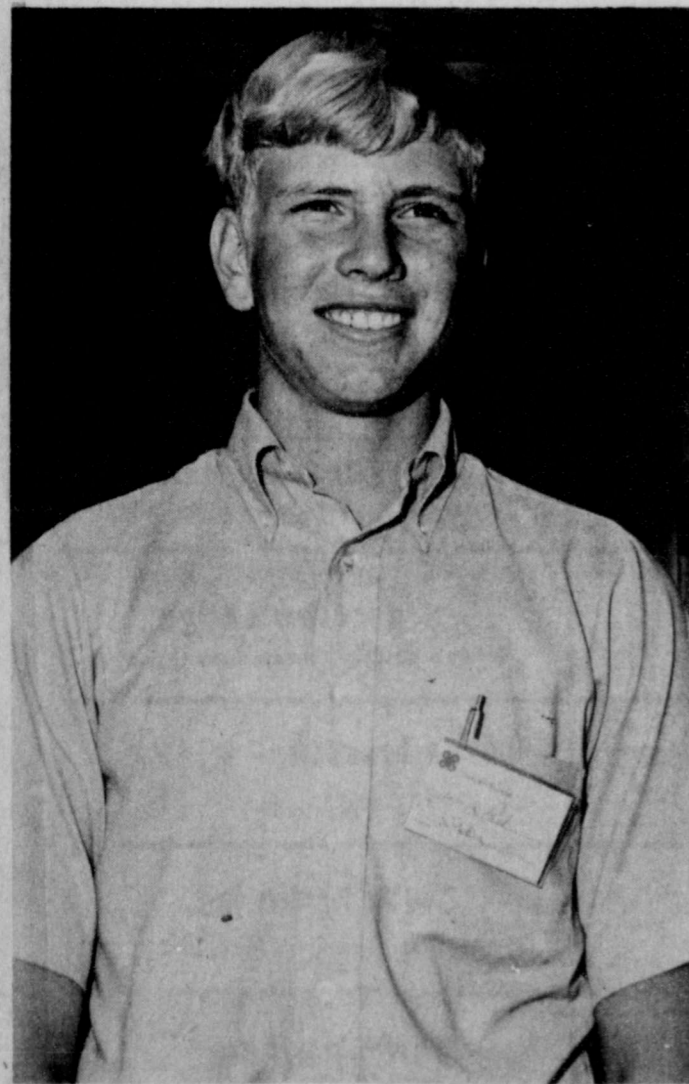
We pledged to keep our readers informed on important issues involving the progress of the hospital steering committee, and to date there have been no significant changes in the committee's plan. The next important step comes when the proposal is brought before the Legislature in Austin during the special session. If the members of the Texas House of Representatives and Senate approve the district as submitted, then it will be up to the residents of Fisher County to accept or reject the proposed hospital district. A special election will be called and each resident will be given the opportunity to vote after the district has received approval in Austin.

We attempted to emphasize in our editorial of May 11th that residents would have a vote and we re-emphasize that point today. We understand that there is a group circulating a petition in the east section of Fisher County that is informing potential signers that if the proposal passes the legislature, there will not be a vote by the people. This is absolutely untrue. There will never be a hospital district in Fisher County if the people don't vote to have one established.

We, in Fisher County, need to begin to realize that "the free ride is over", if we don't pay hospital district taxes for a hospital in Fisher County, we'll eventually pay them somewhere. Hamlin is beginning to move toward establishing a hospital district, and they would just love to take in the eastern portion of Fisher County. Sweetwater is not beyond creating a hospital district and swallowing up as much of Fisher County as they want. They have the vote in Sweetwater to do just about what they please.

If we are going to have to pay taxes in the future, why not pay them in Fisher County for a county hospital?

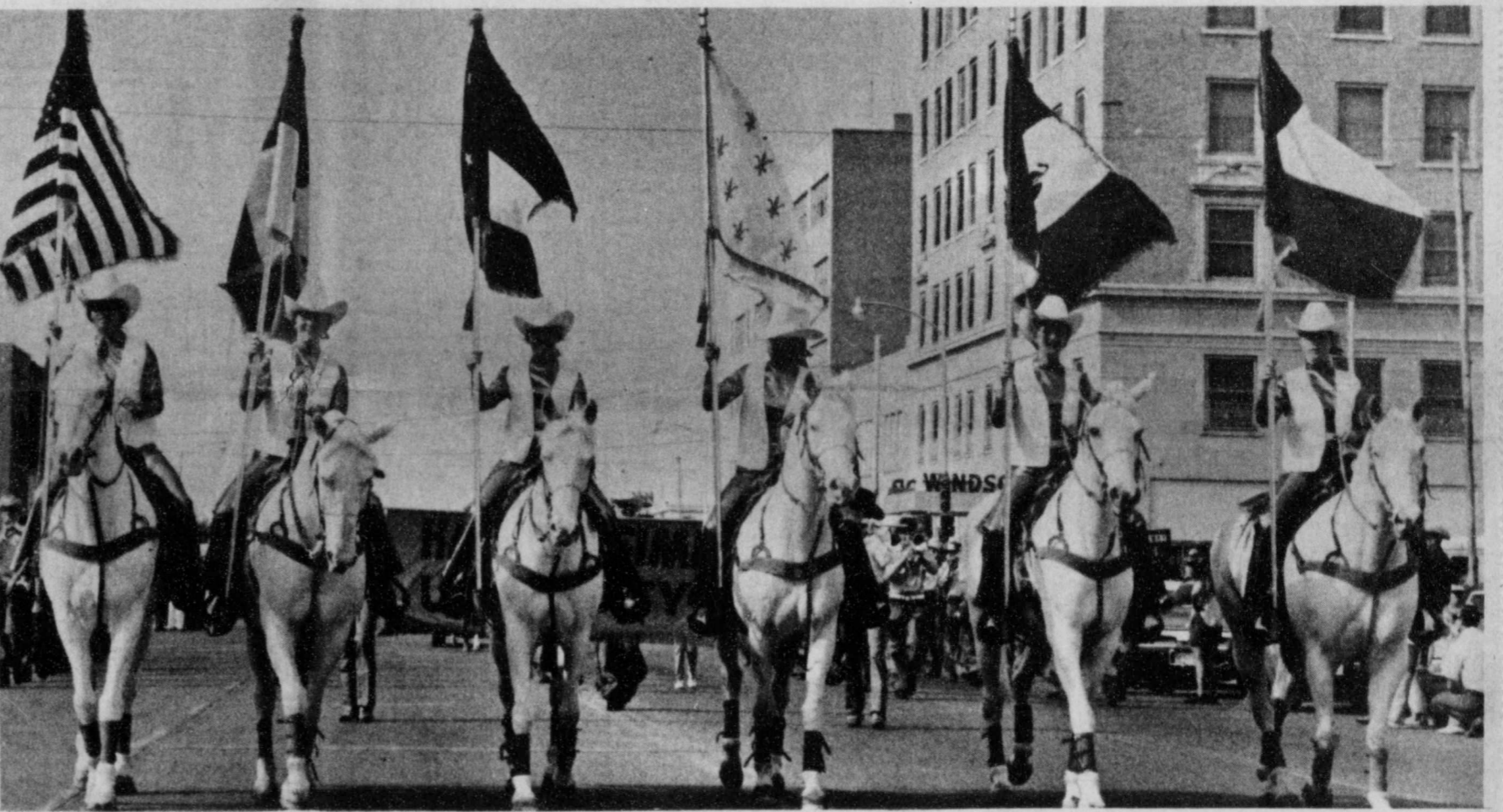
Purpose of the workshop is to help coordinate classroom experiences with home and community needs.

Twenty-two outstanding students and teachers from the area served by West Texas Utilities Company attended the 12th Annual Nuclear Science Symposium at the University of Texas at Austin. The conference got underway Monday, June 5th and ended Thursday, June 8th.

Vick Burk, Rotan High School student, was among those attending from this area.

The symposium was jointly sponsored by the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation and

the University of Texas. West Texas Utilities is one of the sponsoring companies for TAERE.

The 500 selected high school science students and teachers who attended the session were offered the rare opportunity of hearing lectures by some of the nation's outstanding nuclear scientists.

The foundation was formed for the primary purpose of conducting the world's first and largest privately financed research effort in the field of nuclear en-

ergy. Currently, the Foundation and General Dynamics Corporation are jointly sponsoring a program in nuclear fusion research aimed at controlling thermonuclear reactions for the production of electric power. Fusion is the energy process of the sun and the stars.

The goal of the Foundation and WTU is not research alone, but to also assist in the advancement of the knowledge of nuclear science in Texas schools. Of special interest to the spon-

sors is bringing to students and teachers a realization of the privileges, responsibilities and opportunities which scientific discoveries in the field of nuclear energy presents.

There are over 1,000 accredited senior high schools in the state of Texas. Rotan can be justly proud of his high school for having been chosen by the University of Texas as one of the 150 high schools in the state invited to send a student and a teacher to the Symposium.

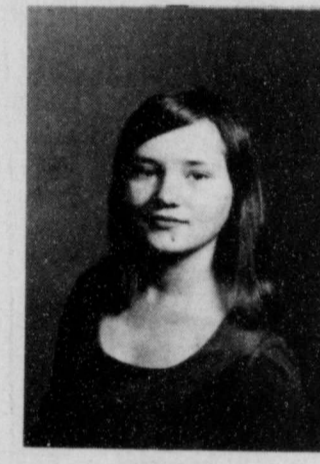
Frances Wicker Named Head Of Abilene TARS

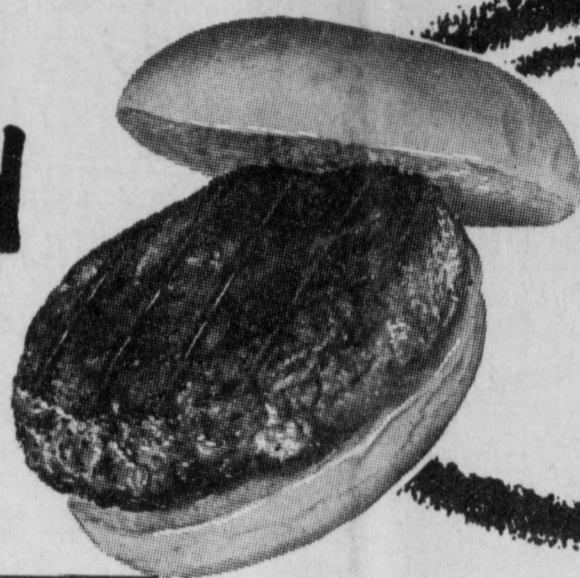

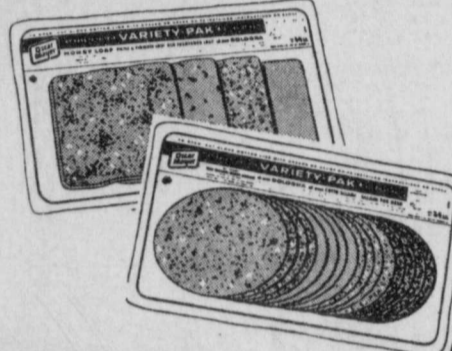
