## Court House \$483,625.00

## County Court Holds Special Meeting

The members of the Fisher County Commissioners Court held a special meeting on Monday, June 26, for the purpose of discussing some pressing business on the new Court House construction and other matters.

Commissioner Thurman Terry made a motion, seconded by A. J. Ford, to pay the architectural firm of Lovett and Sellers the preliminary fee of \$9,235.27. The balance of the architectural fee will be paid upon completion of the project.

Fisher County Judge Ralph Ammons informed those present that all the certificates of obligation were sold and spoken for by banks and individuals. The total amount of certificates sold amounted to \$375,000.00. The total cost of construction has

not been established, but is expected to be considerably less than the \$375,000.00 set aside. Total interest on the above figure is \$108,625.00 based on a ten and one-half year payoff. Assuming that all the \$375,000

is used and financed for the full 10-1/2 years the total cost on the new court house will amount to \$483,625.00.

Fisher County Commissioners also voiced unanimous approval by vote to three resolutions

from the Texas Association of Counties. The amendment is expected to be brought before the Texas Legislature in Austin. The local commissioners voted in favor of repealing the new trailer brake law; voted in favor of a \$1.00 delinquent tax date change and voted in support of changing the jury wheel selection system.

Judge Ammons gave a brief report to the court on his trip to Abilene last week to the West Central Texas Council of Government meeting. He reported that the proposed Fisher County Hospital District had received approval from the Council of Governments.

In other action by the court, at Monday's meeting, the Commissioners all signed a resolution asking Texas State Rep. Renal Rosson of Snyder to introduce a bill at the special session asking that a Fisher County Hospital District be created.

Frank Ginzell, District Attorney from Colorado City, spoke briefly to the Commissioners concerning the need of an investigator for the three counties of

Fisher, Nolan and Mitchell. Ginzell wanted the court to give consideration to funding the investigator after a 3 year grant expired. There is to be no cost to Fisher County for the first three years, but the court did agree to give consideration to possible funding in the future if the post is considered worthy of further financial support.

Fisher County Auditor, J. A. Finch, reported to the Commissioners on the proposed budget for the 1973 year. He was in the process of preparing the new budget with Judge Ammons and exposed some of his tentative budget breakdowns. A complete report will be carried at a later date when the final budget is passed by the Commissioners Court.

## Savings Bond

## Sales Hit 69% Of Goal For 72

May sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds amounting to \$6,118 in Fisher County were reported by County Bond Chairman R. L. Springer. Sales for the five-month period totaled \$34,494 for 69% of the 1972 goal of \$50,000.

Sales for the state of Texas during May were \$17,314,314-- a 5% increase over May 1971, when sales were \$16,476,145. January-May sales totaled \$91,572,743 with 45% of the \$202.3 million 1972 goal achieved.

Nationally, sales of E and H Savings Bonds amounting to \$573 million were reported during May--24% above 1971 sales of \$462 million. Total sales for the five-month period amounted to \$2,715 million--18% above a year earlier. Exchanges of Series E for Series H Bonds totalling \$142 million were reported for the first five months of 1972--36% above the \$105 million exchanged in 1971.

## Large Group Sign For Fish

The courthouse in Roby was a popular meeting place recently for several Fisher County farmers and ranchers. The occasion was a fish delivery from the Dexter National Fish Hatchery, Dexter, New Mexico.

Fish are delivered twice yearly from the hatchery to those who have filed an application for fish. Largemouth bass are delivered in the spring and channel catfish are delivered in the fall. For more information concerning fish applications, contact the personnel at the Soil Conservation Service office in Rotan.

Many hours of enjoyment can be provided by farm ponds that are properly managed to grow as many "keepers" as possible. The application of fertilizer at the rate of 8-8-2 per acre is recommended for use in farm ponds. This would be applying eight pounds of nitrogen, eight pounds of phosphorus, and two pounds of potash per surface acre of water. Several applications need to be made during the spring and summer months to maintain proper fertility level in the water.

To judge when to fertilize, place a white object 18 inches below the surface of the water. If the object is visible, the pond needs to be fertilized.

An added benefit from proper fertilization is that many water weeds will be controlled. The weeds die because they cannot get the sunlight they need to sustain growth.

Dix, previously associated with the First National Bank of Abilene goes to San Angelo from Ft. Worth where he was an Investment Officer.

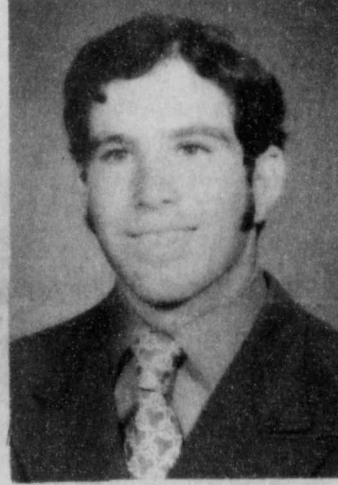
A graduate of McMurry College, he has a bachelor of arts degree in speech and a bachelor of business administration in finance.

## COG Gives County Hospital Plan OK

The Fisher County Hospital Steering Committee received unanimous approval from the West Central Texas Council of Governments in Abilene on the need for a new hospital facility in Fisher County.

This powerful group must give their approval to new projects of this type in order to qualify for Hill-Burton Hospital grants. The committee gave their approval to the facility in Fisher County based on needs, geographical location, and costs of services to patients.

The next step, as far as the council of governments is concerned, will be when the recommendation goes before the Texas State Department of Health for final approval of Hill-Burton grants.

The steering committee will be faced with a very important meeting in the near future when

Susan's mother, Mrs. Jennie Cade was winner in 1952. Other entries are expected to start coming in rapidly. Mrs. Carl Jared, secretary to the sponsor contest chairman, Jack Mills, said, "Invitations and rules have gone out to more than 200 possible sponsors."

The girls ride in the big street parade and then "ride the barrels" to determine the winner. Last year, some 100 girls entered with the girls drawing lots to determine at what show they would ride.

The ten girls with the fastest times go into the final night's event and the girl with the lowest time during the final performance wins the suitably named

bosomed saddle. Joann Whitehead of Morton was winner last year with a low time of 19.83 seconds. The annual celebration will get underway July 1 with a big street parade, skip the next day, Sunday, and continue on Monday and Tuesday.

## Sale Of Fisher County Oil & Gas 24 Million

Sale of Fisher County oil and gas production accounted for \$24,843,916 of the county's economic output for 1971, according to a study by Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Assn.

In producing 6,604,854 barrels of crude oil and 10.5 billion cu. ft. of natural gas, the county ranked 60th in Texas. Value of its crude oil was \$23,249,086; natural gas value was \$1,594,830.

The county is among 190 Texas counties with oil and gas production value topping \$100,000, although 211 counties produce oil and gas.

"Fisher County oil and gas wells made a significant contribution to Texas' share of the nation's energy needs last year, but growing demand is sapping reserves in Texas faster than

they can be replaced." Robert A. Buschman, Association president, said. "As fewer new fields are discovered due to less drilling, the continuing strong economy and tax base of many Texas counties may now depend on updating Texas oil conservation laws to encourage wider use of new recovery technology," he said.

The Association study showed that Fisher County farmers, ranchers and other royalty owners received \$3,105,490 as their share of the production.

The county's wells generated \$1,069,458 in crude oil production taxes for state government and \$119,612 in state taxes on natural gas. Oil and gas producers spent \$808,148 in drilling 38 wells in the county last year. \$285,948 of which was lost in drilling 18 dry holes.



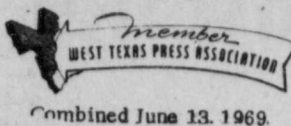

## Mrs Whit Clark Helps Conduct Conference

Mrs. Whit Clark of Rotan was one of nine Area Directors who conducted the Leadership Conference for incoming chapter presidents of the Delta Kappa Gamma Society International, in Ft. Worth on June 21. Delta Kappa Gamma is an honorary professional association of women educators. International headquarters are in Austin where the society was organized by Dr. Annie Webb Blanton and eleven other women teachers on May 11, 1929. The organization now has chapters in all fifty states, the provinces of Canada, and Norway and Sweden. Texas chapters recently contributed money, at ten cents per member, to organize the first chapter in Sweden and to bring its president to the International Convention which is to be held in Houston July 31-August 6. Mrs. Clark is supervisor and

consultant for Area VII, which includes 31 chapters in Wichita Falls, Ft. Worth, Abilene, Sweetwater, Rotan, and the area between these cities. The Leadership Conference preceded the 43rd annual convention of the Alpha State (Texas) Organization held June 22-25 in Fort Worth. Over 700 delegates registered for the convention. Theme of the convention was "To strive, to see, to find, and not to yield," a quote from "Ulysses" by Alfred Lord Tennyson, which represents a challenge in answer to the many problems educators face today. Mrs. LeVonne Davis, Alpha State President presided at the business sessions at which committee reports were approved and constitutional amendments were discussed in preparation for the International Delta Kappa

Gamma Convention to be held in Houston. Recipients of 40 scholarships, totaling \$13,025 were announced by Ruby Lee Lafferty, Scholarship Chairman.

Directors for 28 Fall Regional meetings were announced by Phillis Ellis, State Executive Secretary. Gamma Tau Chapter, Rotan, Roscoe, and Sweetwater, will attend a Regional in Abilene, directed by Ruby Lee Lafferty and Frances Lowrance. # Legal Notice

An Ordinance of the City of Roby, Texas Defining "Junked Vehicles" Declaring the same to be public nuisances, with certain exceptions, providing for the abatement of such public nuisances; Providing for the assessment of costs of abatement in certain circumstances, providing for the fixing of a Lien for the costs of abatement, and providing for the disposition of any junked vehicles impounded in accordance with the terms hereof; Providing a severability clause; Making this ordinance cumulative of all existing ordinances except those in conflict herewith; Providing a penalty and providing an effective date.

WHEREAS, There are, or may be in the future, junked vehicles left about the City other than in junk yards or other appropriate places; and

WHEREAS, such condition tends to interfere with the enjoyment of and reduce the value of private property, invite plundering and theft, create fire hazards and other safety and health hazards to children as well as adults, interfere with the comfort and well being of the public, and create, extend and aggravate urban blight and

WHEREAS, adequate protection of the public health safety and welfare requires that such conditions be abated.

NOW, THEREFORE, the City Commission of the City of Roby, Texas does hereby ordain:

**Section 1. Definitions**

As used herein the following words and phrases shall have the meanings set forth adjacent to them:

(a) **Junked Vehicle:** The term "Junked Vehicle" shall mean any vehicle which does not have lawfully affixed thereto both a valid Texas license plate and a valid Texas Department of Public Safety Motor Vehicle inspection certificate and the condition of which is one or more of the following: Wrecked, partially or wholly dismantled, inoperative, abandoned or discarded.

(b) **Person:** The word person as used herein shall mean any individual, firm partnership association, corporation, company or organization of any kind.

(c) **City:** The term "City" as used herein shall mean the City of Roby, Texas.

**Section II Junked Vehicles Declared Public Nuisance: Exceptions:**

The location or presence of any junked vehicle or junked vehicles on any lot, tract or parcel of land or any portion thereof, occupied or unoccupied, improved or unimproved, within the City of Roby shall be deemed a public nuisance and it shall be unlawful for any person to maintain such a public nuisance or to permit or to allow the same to exist on his property or on the property of another, provided that this section shall not apply with regard to a junked vehicle or junked vehicles in an enclosed building, a junked vehicle or junked vehicles in an appropriate storage place or depository maintained in a lawful place and manner by the City; or to vehicles in operable condition specially adapted or constructed for racing or operation on privately owned drag strips or raceways.

**Section III Order To Abate**

Whenever any such public nuisance exists in the City in violation of this ordinance, notice of such violation shall be given, as applicable, to the owner or such vehicle, or the owner or occupant of the premises upon which such vehicle is situated or to all such persons, as hereinafter provided. Such notice shall be in writing, shall specify the violation and its location, shall specify the corrective measures required, shall provide that any owner of such vehicle, or owner or occupant of such premises, may protest the determination that such vehicle is a nuisance by filing written notice thereof with the City Manager within ten days, and that protest shall constitute the consent to the removal and impoundment of such vehicle. A copy of the notice shall be served upon the owner or occupant of the premises and/or the owner of the vehicle, either by personal service, by mailing a copy, certified mail, return receipt requested, to

the last known address of such person; or by attaching such a copy to the vehicle in question. Any notice attached to any vehicle need not name the owner thereof, or the owner or occupant of the premises where it is situated, and any such notice attached to a vehicle shall constitute notice to the owner of the vehicle and to the owner and occupant of the premises where such vehicle is located.

**Section IV Abatement of Nuisance:**

If the owner or occupant of the premises, or the owner of such vehicle, fails, neglects or refuses to either file notice of protest or to comply with the terms of any notice issued under the provisions of the preceding section, within ten days after service of such notice by personal service, mailing, or attachment to such vehicle, appropriate City officials shall abate such public nuisance by removing the junked vehicle from its location and impounding the same. All expenses incurred in the abatement of such nuisance, and costs of preserving such vehicle prior to final disposition, shall be charged against the owner, or owners, of the junked vehicle payable in Roby, Fisher County, Texas, and the City shall have a privileged lien on such junked vehicle, together with ten per cent (10) interest on the delinquent amount from the date of impounding such vehicle.

**Section V Procedure In Event Of Protest:**

Should any person file a protest, in accordance with Section IV hereof, of the determination that any vehicle constitutes a nuisance under the terms of this Ordinance, the City Manager shall place such protest on the agenda of the City Commission give notice to the protestant of the time and place of the next meeting of the City Commission, and state in such notice that the City Commission will make a determination as to whether the protestant's vehicle constitutes a nuisance under the terms of this Ordinance, and shall invite the protestant to appear in person or by an attorney and present the reasons for his protest. If, after hearing the evidence and making such investigation as the Commission deems necessary, the Commission shall determine that the vehicle in question constitutes a nuisance, the Commission may order the same removed from the premises, or it may recommend prosecution in Corporation Court in accordance with the penal provisions hereof.

**Section VI, Owner May Acquire Possession:**

The bona fide owner of any such junked vehicle or junked vehicles which have been impounded in accordance with the provisions of this Ordinance may acquire possession of such junked vehicle or junked vehicles by paying the costs of abatement as shall have been computed in accordance with the preceding section and by paying a reasonable storage charge based upon the period of time such junked vehicle or vehicles have been impounded.

**Section VII, Abandonment and Sale; Severance:**

In the event that possession by the bona fide owner thereof of any junked vehicle or junked vehicles impounded in accordance with the provision hereof is not acquired within ninety days from the date of such impoundment, such junked vehicle or junked vehicles shall be deemed to have been abandoned and may be sold by the City. Proceeds from any such sale shall first be applied to reduce or satisfy the storage charges computed in accordance with the above section, and any amount of such proceeds then remaining shall be applied to reduce or satisfy the lien perfected. Such lien shall remain in full force and effect with respect to any portion of the costs of abatement remaining unsatisfied.

**Section VIII, Penalty:**

The violation of any provision of this ordinance relating to the maintaining of a public nuisance as described herein or in permitting or allowing such public nuisance to exist shall be punished by a fine not exceeding

\$200.00, and each day's violation thereof shall be, and is hereby declared to be a distinct and separate offense and punishable as such.

**Section IX, Effective Date:**

This ordinance shall become effective and be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication as required by law, and it is so ordained.

Of the many great days in the history of our country, none is more universally celebrated, none more filled with meaning to true patriots, than July 4, 1776, the birthday of the United States of America.

Thomas Jefferson was entrusted with the important work of writing what was to become the Birth Certificate of a new nation. No better choice could have been made. Jefferson, though only thirty-three years of age, had been for some time a leader of the colonial cause in Virginia.

The location of the house in which Jefferson wrote the Declaration has been definitely established, although unfortunately it is no longer standing. It was on the southwest corner of Market and Seventh Streets in Philadelphia. The desk upon which he wrote was preserved. More than one hundred years, as a gift from the family, it became the treasured possession of the Department of State in Washington.

Never in the history of political writing has the fundamental basis of government been so clearly stated as in Jefferson's Declaration. The ideas were what the colonists all believed and were fighting for - but Jefferson possessed the ability to combine words and phrases that cling to the memory. To this day such phrases as "We hold these truths to be self-evident; that all men are created equal; that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of

Happiness," are as true today as the day Jefferson wrote them. But American ingenuity and innovation didn't end in 1776.

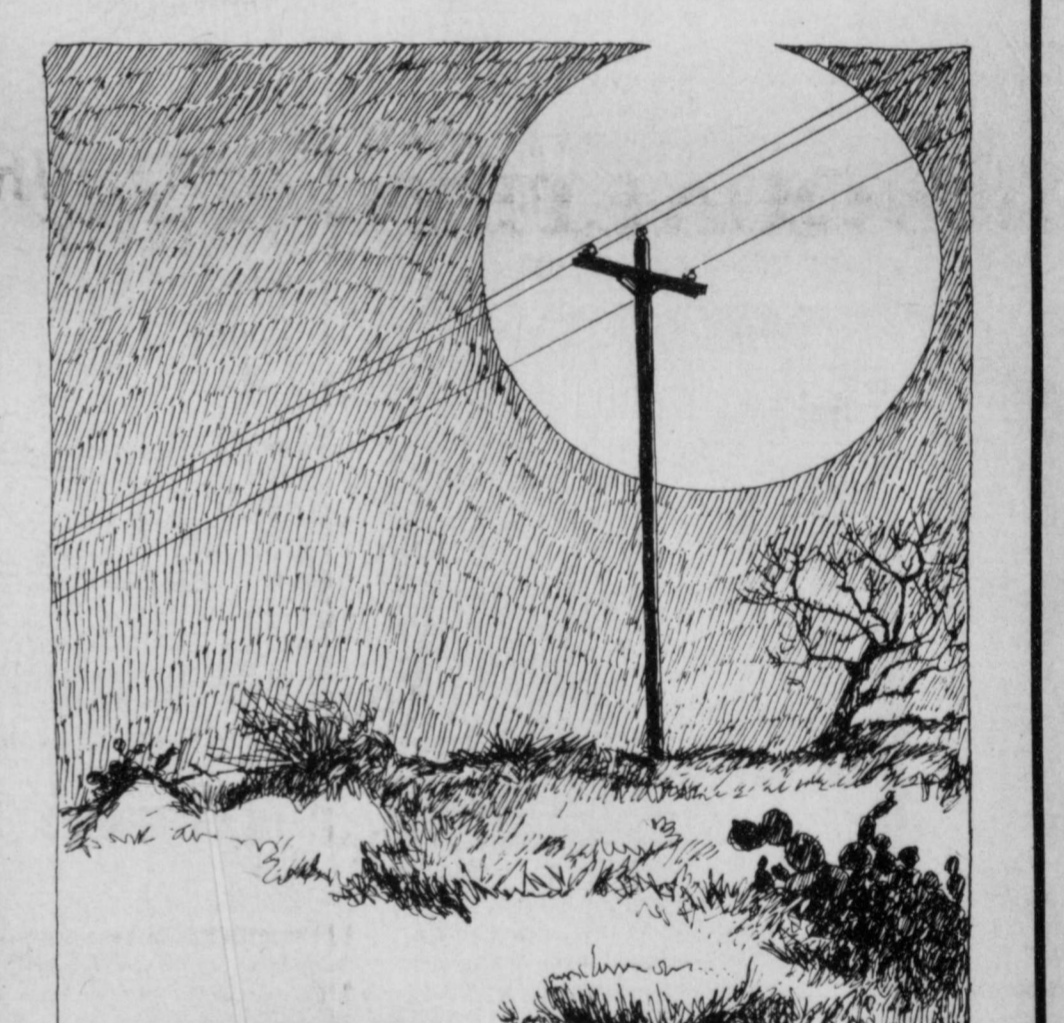
