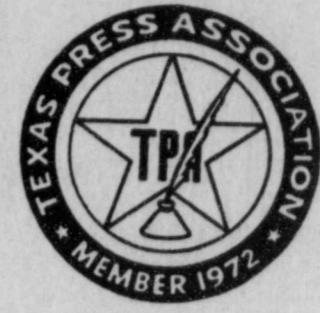

National Gypsum Sales Soar To All Time High

Operating results for the second quarter and first half were announced Monday by National Gypsum Company.

Quarter ended June 30: Net Sales: 1972, \$137,918,000; 1971, \$118,812,000. Net income, 1972, Per share \$.52, 1972: \$.32, 1971. Common shares—Average Outstanding, 16,245,456.—1972 and 16,325,523, 1971.

Six Months Ended June 30: Net sales \$249,698,000, 1972, \$210,599,000—1971. Net income, \$13,785,000—1972 and \$7,657,000—1971. Per share \$.84—1972, \$.46—1971. Common Shares Average Outstanding, 16,286,893—1972, and 16,324,081—1971.

In commenting on the results Colon Brown, chairman and chief executive officer, said: "Both sales and dollar earnings for the second quarter and first half of 1972 were at all-time highs. Second quarter sales of about \$138 million were up 16% from

the same quarter last year, while earnings of \$.52 per share were up 62%. Compared to 1971 levels, first half sales of about \$250 million were up 18% and earnings per share of \$.84 represented an 82% increase."

Chairman Brown added that "the second quarter represents the sixth consecutive period in which sales and earnings exceeded those of the prior year equivalent period and each of the Company's seven profit center divisions operated profit-

ably, and exceeded sales and earnings performances for the first half of 1971."

Regarding the full year 1972 he stated that "with the anticipated continuing strong market demand for the Company's product lines, and further improvements in sales and manufacturing efficiencies, sales are expected to reach and exceed one half billion dollars for the first time in the Company's history, with dollar earnings also expected to be at record levels."

Mid West Electric OK'd For \$259,000 REA Loan

A \$259,000 REA loan was approved for the Mid West Electric Cooperative, according to a report received by the Roby Star Record-Rotan Advance last Friday afternoon.

The Mid-West Electric Cooperative plans on supplemental financing from the National Rural Utilities Cooperative Financing Corporation, announced Jack Devour, an administrative assistant to Texas Senator Lloyd Bentsen.

The purpose of the \$259,000 loan is to construct 52 miles of distribution line to serve an additional 205 customers and also to finance system improvements.

Events will be 50¢ each. A belt buckle will be awarded.

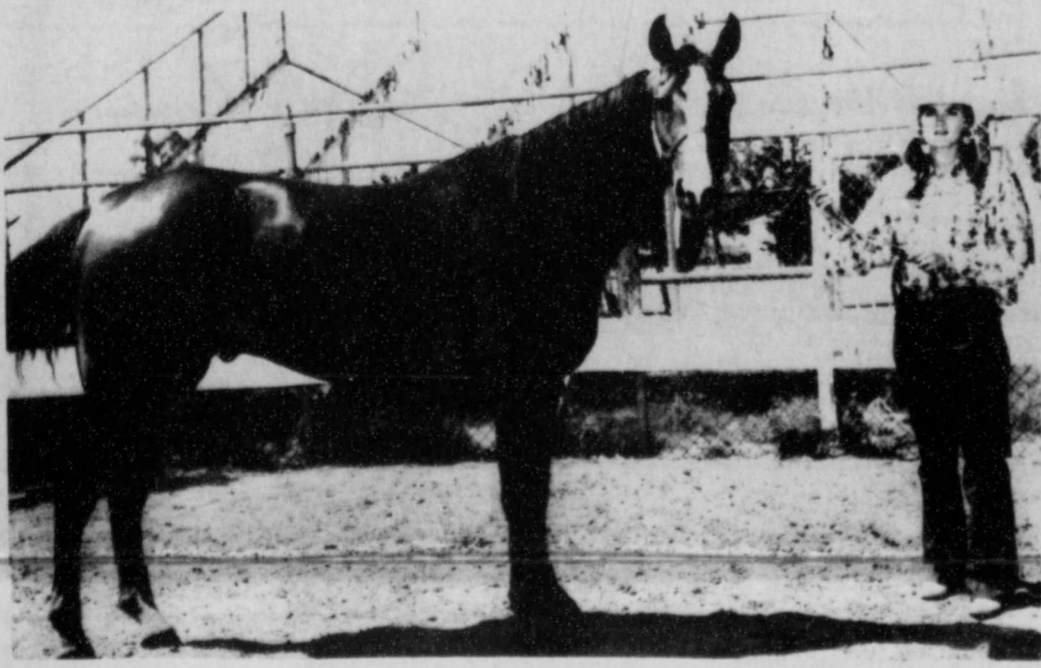

County Reaches 73% Of Years Bond Goal

During June there were new purchases of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds amounting to \$2,067 according to R. L. Springer, County Chairman Fisher County, Sales for the first six months totaled \$36,651 or 73% of the 1972 goal of \$50,000.

Texas sales during the month were \$16,451,782 compared to \$15,781,727 during June, 1971, a rise of 4.2 percent, while year to date sales totaled \$108,024,525 for 53 % of the 1972 goal of \$202,3 million.

New purchases of E and H Savings Bonds over the nation during June amounted to a record \$532 million, 9.5% above sales during June of last year.

Sales for the first six months were \$3,247 million, 16.6 percent above 1971. Exchanges of Series E for Series H Bonds

amounting to \$170 million were reported for the first six months of 1972, 34 percent above the \$127 million exchanged last year.

Rotan Book Review Club Traces Birth Back To 1922

While Rotan was a very young town, a group of civic minded women organized "The 1922 Study Club". The purpose of the organization was to afford an opportunity for interested persons to meet and study matters of an informative and cultural nature. The club was well received and continued to function until the beginning of World War II when meetings were discontinued. No extant list of members has been located. After the close of the war the group, with others, again felt the need for a study-cultural type program. This culminated in the organization of the Rotan Music Study Club.

The history of Rotan Music Study Club from its organization through 1950-51 is preserved in a scrapbook which is in possession of Mrs. Betty Patton. On the first page of the book is declaration of organization which reads as follows:

"In order to aid and develop musical education and to bring others to a higher appreciation for the Fine Arts through our study and interpretation, we hereby organize ourselves into the Rotan Music Study Club. The date was January 7, 1948. The following names are signed below: Mmes. Lance Davis, W. F. Taylor, C. C. Cate, Mark Strickland, Jack Patton, R. T. Williams, G. W. Rollins, H. W. Withers, R. L. Springer, Ewell Jenkins, Preston Morrow, Comer Collins, J. O. Roberts, Rudolph Morton, Robert Phillips, R. E. Scales, C. E. Leon, D. J. Smith, H. L. Davis, J. W. Day, C. W. Test, Ray Brown, A. L. Young, Ira Morrow, and Elton Upshaw. On March 12, 1948 the Rotan Music Study Club became a member of the National Federation of Music Clubs. The club scrapbook, made by Mrs. Ewell Jenkins, Historian, was awarded First Place at the District Meeting of Texas Federation of Music Clubs held in Vernon, Texas November 4 through 6, 1948.

A study of the scrapbook with newspaper clippings, yearbooks, programs and pictures gives evidence that members were enthusiastic workers who believed in the worth of what they did. Quoting one of the charter members, "We studied music, new composers, and the lives of famous composers. The programs were interesting. Many of the members had musical talent and we had a choral group that prepared programs and exchanged them with other area clubs. As time went by interest waned, some members withdrew, and it seemed to require too much effort to carry on." The last meeting was held May 14, 1955.

The present Book Review Club began as a take-off from the Music Study Club. It seemed to be time for a change but a need was still felt for something of a cultural nature that would be of interest to the community. Book reviews by well chosen reviewers seemed to be the answer. This enabled members to keep up with current publications in a time saving and interesting manner. The club, organized in its present form in 1958, still meets that need in today's busy world. Many of the organizing members are on the roll today.

As this club keeps no minutes nor permanent records, there is no list of charter members. Membership varies, the highest recalled is seventy-four and the lowest about twenty-five. This year there seems to be renewed interest and indications from early enrollments indicate that this may well be a record year.

Business of the club is carried on with three elected officers. The present officers are Mrs. James B. Day, president; Mrs. R. T. Williams, vice-president and program chairman; and Mrs. Fred Byerly, treasurer.

Mrs. Day, a retired teacher (who still teaches), has long been active in civic and professional organizations. She has served as president of Fisher County TB Association and as a member of the County Welfare Board for several years. She is a Charter Member of Gamma Tau Chapter of Delta Kappa Gamma in which she has held a number of offices including that of Chapter President. She is an organizing member of Anne Pettus Shelburne Chapter of Daughters of the American Revolution and is serving as the chapter's first Chaplain and as chairman of several committees. She is an ardent supporter of the Book Review Club. Mrs. Day is a Presbyterian but participates in the work of the Methodist Church of Rotan.

Mrs. Williams, one of the Charter Members of the Club in

its present format, and a capable reviewer in her own right, served as its first president. She is interested in community service. She helped set up the Welfare Board in the county, served one term on the Rotan School Board, and helped to organize the first Fisher County Historical Survey Committee. She is active in the work of the First United Methodist Church. Her husband contributed the opinion that her most important activity at present is opening gates!

Mrs. Byerly, treasurer of the Club, states, "I'm the newest of the three officers. Because I was working, I was never able to attend the Book Review Club. I always envied those who could go. When I retired about five years ago, I became a member and have thoroughly enjoyed it." As to other activities, Mrs. Byerly says, "Since I retired I just keep house and do nothing, in enjoy being able to keep my grand-children occasionally." Mrs. Byerly is an active member of the First Baptist Church, served as church pianist, and often teaches a Sunday School class in the Adult Department.

The Book Review Club meets at 3:00 p.m. on the first Tuesday of each October, November, February, March and April. The meetings are planned to be brief, enjoyable, and relaxing. Everyone is eligible, welcome, and invited to be a member of Rotan's Book Review Club.

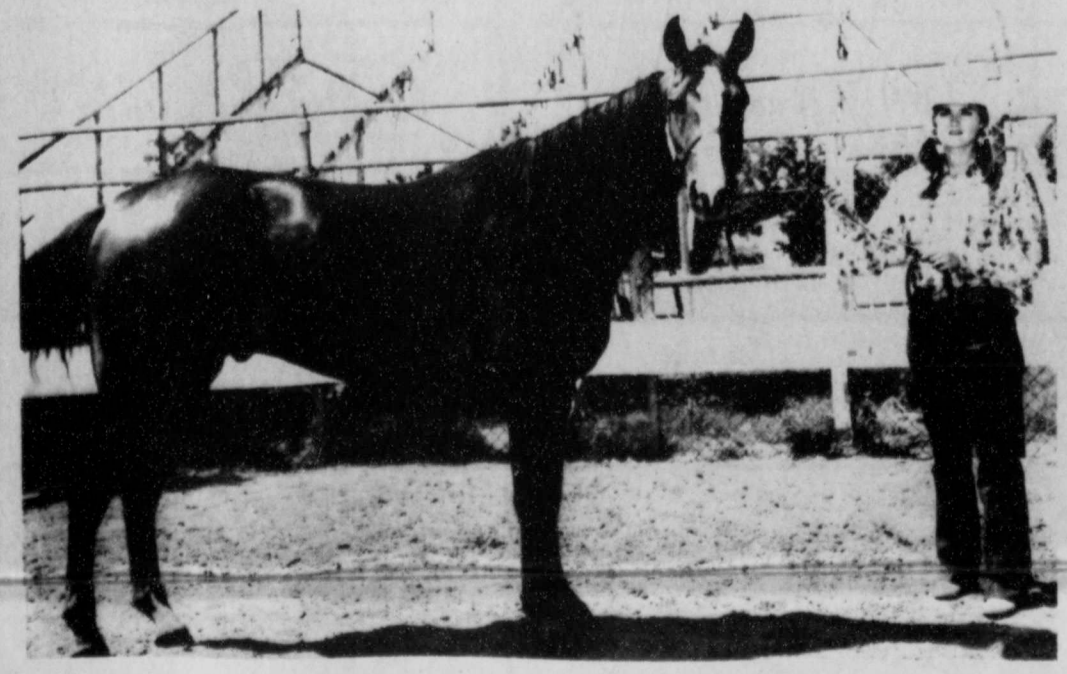

Rotan Book Review Club Traces Birth Back To 1922

While Rotan was a very young town, a group of civic minded women organized "The 1922 Study Club". The purpose of the organization was to afford an opportunity for interested persons to meet and study matters of an informative and cultural nature. The club was well received and continued to function until the beginning of World War II when meetings were discontinued. No extant list of members has been located. After the close of the war the group, with others, again felt the need for a study-cultural type program. This culminated in the organization of the Rotan Music Study Club.

The history of Rotan Music Study Club from its organization through 1950-51 is preserved in a scrapbook which is in possession of Mrs. Betty Patton. On the first page of the book is a declaration of organization which reads as follows:

"In order to aid and develop musical education and to bring others to a higher appreciation for the Fine Arts through our study and interpretation, we hereby organize ourselves into the Rotan Music Study Club. The date was January 7, 1948. The following names are signed below: Mmes. Lance Davis, W. F. Taylor, C. C. Cate, Mark Strickland, Jack Patton, R. T. Williams, G. W. Rollins, H. W. Withers, R. L. Springer, Ewell Jenkins, Preston Morrow, Comer Collins, J. O. Roberts, Rudolph Morton, Robert Phillips, R. E. Scales, C. E. Leon, D. J. Smith, H. L. Davis, J. W. Day, C. W. Test, Ray Brown, A. L. Young, Ira Morrow, and Elton Upshaw. On March 12, 1948 the Rotan Music Study Club became a member of the National Federation of Music Clubs. The club scrapbook, made by Mrs. Ewell Jenkins, Historian, was awarded First Place at the District Meeting of Texas Federation of Music Clubs held in Vernon, Texas November 4 through 6, 1948.

A study of the scrapbook with newspaper clippings, yearbooks, programs and pictures gives evidence that members were enthusiastic workers who believed in the worth of what they did. Quoting one of the charter members, "We studied music, new composers, and the lives of famous composers. The programs were interesting. Many of the members had musical talent and we had a choral group that prepared programs and exchanged them with other area clubs. As time went by interest waned, some members withdrew, and it seemed to require too much effort to carry on." The last meeting was held May 14, 1955.

The present Book Review Club began as a take-off from the Music Study Club. It seemed to be time for a change but a need was still felt for something of a cultural nature that would be of interest to the community. Book reviews by well chosen reviewers seemed to be the answer. This enabled members to keep up with current publications in a time saving and interesting manner. The club, organized in its present form in 1958, still meets that need in today's busy world. Many of the organizing members are on the roll today.

As this club keeps no minutes nor permanent records, there is no list of charter members. Membership varies, the highest recalled is seventy-four and the lowest about twenty-five. This year there seems to be renewed interest and indications from early enrollments indicate that this may well be a record year.

Business of the club is carried on with three elected officers. The present officers are Mrs. James B. Day, president; Mrs. R. T. Williams, vice-president and program chairman; and Mrs. Fred Byerly, treasurer.

Mrs. Day, a retired teacher (who still teaches), has long been active in civic and professional organizations. She has served as president of Fisher County TB Association and as a member of the County Welfare Board for several years. She is a Charter Member of Gamma Tau Chapter of Delta Kappa Gamma in which she has held a number of offices including that of Chapter President. She is an organizing member of Anne Pettus Shelburne Chapter of Daughters of the American Revolution and is serving as the chapter's first Chaplain and as chairman of several committees. She is an ardent supporter of the Book Review Club. Mrs. Day is a Presbyterian but participates in the work of the Methodist Church of Rotan.

Mrs. Williams, one of the Charter Members of the Club in

its present format, and a capable reviewer in her own right, served as its first president. She is interested in community service. She helped set up the Welfare Board in the county, served one term on the Rotan School Board, and helped to organize the first Fisher County Historical Survey Committee. She is active in the work of the First United Methodist Church. Her husband contributed the opinion that her most important activity at present is opening gates!

Mrs. Byerly, treasurer of the Club, states, "I'm the newest of the three officers. Because I was working, I was never able to attend the Book Review Club. I always envied those who could go. When I retired about five years ago, I became a member and have thoroughly enjoyed it." As to other activities, Mrs. Byerly says, "Since I retired I just keep house and do nothing. In enjoy being able to keep my grandchildren occasionally!" Mrs. Byerly is an active member of the First Baptist Church, served as church pianist, and often teaches a Sunday School class in the Adult Department.

The Book Review Club meets at 3:00 p. m. on the first Tuesday of each October, November, February, March and April. The meetings are planned to be brief, enjoyable, and relaxing. Everyone is eligible, welcome, and invited to be a member of Rotan's Book Review Club.

COUNTY AGENT NEWS

Screwworms are being reported from all areas of Texas, as well as two-thirds of the state of Oklahoma. Only the far eastern and northeastern portions of Oklahoma remain free of the five-stock pest. In addition, screwworms are being reported from the southern one-third of the state of New Mexico, the southern half of Arizona, and from Imperial and Riverside Counties in California. Although screwworms have been reported near the Louisiana border in far east Texas, there have not as yet been any cases confirmed this year from Louisiana or Arkansas.

The National Screwworm Production Facility at Mission, Texas, has been at maximum production since the first of May this year. The average sterile fly release since that time has been nearly 200 million per week, whereas prior to the first of May, the average weekly production was about 120 million per week.

It was apparent by the end of 1971 that additional funds would be necessary in order to prevent a spring buildup of screwworms in the United States and particularly in Texas, as screwworms migrate north from Mexico naturally in the spring. It was also apparent that any delay in receiving additional funds after the spring buildup began, coupled with favorable weather conditions, could very likely result in the spread of screwworms throughout most of the southwestern United States.

The spring buildup began about a month earlier than usual this year due to an exceptionally mild winter in northeastern Mexico and in south Texas. By the time additional funds became available to allow the plant at Mission to increase production of sterile flies to the maximum, screwworms had migrated north from Mexico and invaded more than half of Texas, as well as southern Arizona.

Weather conditions in northern Mexico and over most of the southwest United States have remained exceptionally favorable for screwworm propagation on into the summer. Screwworms have continued to spread into previously free areas and the southwest United States is now experiencing the worst outbreak since 1961, which was one year prior to the inception of the screwworm eradication program.

The theory of eradication of screwworms with the sterile male technique is to release a large enough number of sterile male screwworm flies over a vast area to outnumber or overwhelm the native male screwworm population in that area. Enough of the female screwworm flies, which only breed once in their lifetime, may then mate with sterile males, resulting in a significant reduction in the native fly population. As heavy as the screwworm infestation is in Texas at the present time, eradication of screwworms would take at least four to six months of weekly releases of sterile screwworm flies in sufficient numbers.

During the last six months of 1972 sterile screwworm flies have been released over all areas where screwworm cases were being reported in the United States. Also, in order to cope with the northward and eastward migration of these insects a band of sterile flies were released 100 miles north and east of the most northern reported cases. It is now apparent, since failure to halt the spread of screwworms throughout the southwest, that sterile fly releases have not been in sufficient numbers to significantly reduce the native fly population. The primary reason the native fly population is so great this year is probably due to the exceptionally favorable weather conditions.

In order to release sufficient numbers of sterile flies in some areas of the southwest which are considered critical to the success of the screwworm eradication program, there are other areas where screwworms now exist that will not receive sterile fly releases. The critical areas are considered to be east and southeast Texas due to the threat posed to the southeast United States and southern Texas where

screwworms could continue to be a problem through in winter months. The first areas of the southwest where sterile fly releases have been discontinued are the northern two-thirds of Oklahoma and all of the Texas panhandle and extreme northwest Texas. As additional sterile flies are needed in the critical areas, sterile fly releases will be discontinued over other areas to the north where cold weather will eventually kill out screwworms this winter.

Cooperation from the livestock industry is needed more now than in many years:

- 1) The submission of samples of suspected screwworm cases to our laboratory for identification is the only way of knowing where screwworms are and in what numbers they exist. These samples are important whether sterile flies are released over the area or not.
- 2) The creating of wounds on animals, such as castrating, de-horning or branding should be avoided until cold weather.
- 3) Animals should be inspected daily or as often as possible and all wounds, regardless of how large or small, should be treated with a larvacide and insect repellent.
- 4) Animals should be sprayed or dipped in one of the recommended organo-phosphate systemic insecticides when animals are gathered for whatever purpose.

Although the battle against screwworms is apparently lost this year, we need to begin to think about next year. A United States-Mexico Screwworm Eradication Program is at least two years away. It is thus necessary to push screwworms as far south as possible this fall and winter in order to minimize another spring buildup next year in the southwestern United States.

The fly production facility at Mission, Texas, will remain at maximum production at least until this fall in the light of the present outbreak, even though the annual budget does not allow for this continued high level of spending.

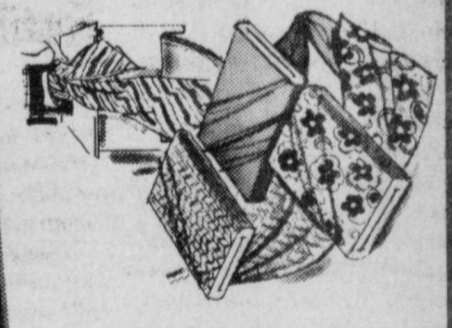
