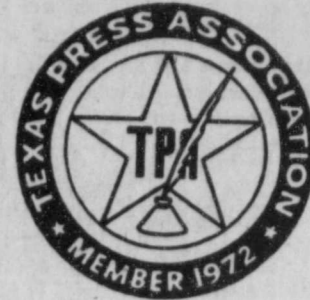
Dr. Ben Brock, Dean of the College, pointed out that pre-registration is very important in that it allows each freshman a chance for individual counseling on matters of course selection

## Bonnie Duke Named New Farmers Gin Manager

The Board of Directors of the Farmers Gin Company in Rotan held a special meeting last Monday morning and hired Mrs. Bonnie Duke as the new gin manager.

The members of the board present for the meeting included Herbert Kennedy, president; Kaufman Florida, vice-president; Roland Ray, Jr., secretary; Glen Posey, Bill Hardy, W. E. Hale and Truman Upshaw.

Women gin managers are few and far-between in the great southwest, but that fact doesn't seem to faze Mrs. Duke. She can trace her family involvement back in the ginning business for several generations. Being the first female named to manage a gin in Rotan is accepted by Bonnie Duke as another one of life's challenges.

Mrs. Duke's father, James West and relatives for three generations back owned and operated cotton gins and cotton mills in Roanoke, Georgia, before coming to Texas. She also had an uncle, Nick West, that owned and operated two cotton gins at Dunn, Texas during the late 1920's and 1930's.

Bonnie Duke has been employed at the Farmers Gin in Rotan since November 1971. Until her recent appointment as manager she was the organizations bookkeeper. Her duties will include buying and selling cotton, and the overall responsibility of full gin operation. "It will be my responsibility to see that the total gin operation and plant runs as smoothly as possible," said Mrs. Duke. She will be counting heavily on two other key Farmers Gin employees as she carries out the duties of Farmers Gin Manager. Elvis Elrod is the ginner and Eugene Allen is bookkeeper and will be counted on to assist once the ginning season gets underway.

Bonnie and her husband, Leon Duke, moved to Rotan 25 years ago from Loraine, Leon is the owner-partner of J&J Supply Co. The couple have three children. James, age 19, is a sophomore at Western Texas College; William age 17, is a senior at Rotan High School; and Ginger, age 11, is in the 6th grade.

Bonnie is a member of First United Methodist Church in Rotan where she teaches Sunday School Nursery 2.

Prior to her employment at the Farmers Gin, Mrs. Duke was employed under the Government cotton seed program. She worked with the four gins in Rotan during the 1950-51 season. She also helped manage the Arrowhead Yarn Mill in Lubbock

in the middle 1960's.

"I was very surprised," said Mrs. Duke, "when learning that I had been named manager." She remarked that in her opinion it was a vote of confidence and she intended to do the best she

could to justify the board's decision.

Mrs. Duke remarked that the cotton looked good around the Rotan area but also indicated a good general rain would be most beneficial for the crops.

## Mayme Shelton Named To World Who's Who List

No one person is more eligible to bear the title Fisher Countian than Mrs. Hooper (Mayme A.) Shelton. Although a resident of Rotan she is known and appreciated in all parts of the county for her interest in civic affairs and love of young people. Mrs. Shelton, former editor of the Roby Star Record for 7 years, received many honors for her work in the publishing field.

A recent honor is selection as one of among 2,000 to be included in "The World Who's Who of Women", Volume 1, 1973. This incorporates a former publication, "Two Thousand Women of Achievement". The compendium is edited by Ernest Kay, International Biographical Centre, Cambridge, England, and copies will be placed in the British Museum, London; libraries of Ireland, Scotland and Wales; the Library of Congress, Washington, D. C.; national and state universities; and public libraries in most countries. Biographies and photographs are featured.

The letter of notification reads in part: "Your name has been selected for inclusion in Volume 1 after most careful scrutiny of many thousands of recommendations. The Volume will include women from all walks of life as well as prominent countries." The subject is never informed as to the name of the person sending the recommendation. Some times they are selected from other biographical publications.

This is the fourth such honor received by Mrs. Shelton, the first being the 1967 edition of "Personalities of the South." In this book it is stated, "These persons have, in different ways

through different professions, helped to build better communities in the Southland. This edition includes biographical information on people from all walks of life--civic leaders, educators, mayors, lawyers, doctors, and others who have made contributions to the community, state and country. This is based on past achievement, positions of responsibility held, and contributions made to the American way of life. . . . Biographies are chosen from nominations made by business and civic clubs."

In 1968 Mrs. Shelton was included in "Who's Who in Texas Today", a biographical compendium of contemporary Texans engaged in successful accomplishments and significant service to community, state and nation. Recognition was given to Texans in every walk of life. An honor received the following year was "Community Leader of America Award". She was presented a Plaque which reads, "Mayme Anderson Shelton has been selected to appear in the 1969 Edition of Community Leaders of America in recognition of past Achievements and Outstanding Service to Community and State. This was presented by the Editorial Board of Community Leaders of America, a Division of News Publishing Company, in recognition of her work as editor of Roby Star Record.

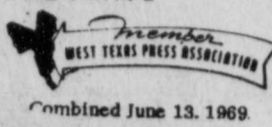

Two members of the Roby School faculty, Mrs. D.L. Lovett and Mrs. J. H. McElaney, returned this week after having attended the Texas Association for the Improvement of Reading Conference. This Conference is held each summer on the campus of West Texas State University at Canyon.

Attendance at the Conference numbered about 350 persons who are concerned with the teaching of reading. The group was addressed by two speakers, Miss Audrey Claus of St. Louis, Mo., began the activities. She is a curriculum specialist, a co-author of a widely used spelling series, co-author of a vocabulary development program, adaptor of a series of fairy tales, and has written a series of workbooks for children.

The second main speaker was Dr. Frank J. Guszak, professor in the Dept. of Curriculum and In-

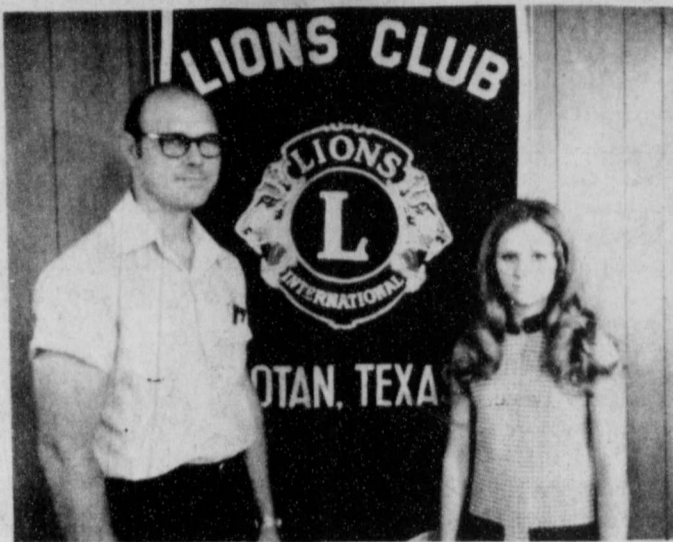
struction at the University of Texas at Austin. Among Dr. Guszak's published works are teacher's manuals on reading, chapters on reading in several different books, numerous magazine articles, and a 1972 book, "Diagnostic Reading Instruction in the Classroom".

Bobby's ten-year old brother, Glenn, was also on the Angels team as pitcher and 3rd baseman. All-Star players are the 11 and 12 year olds.

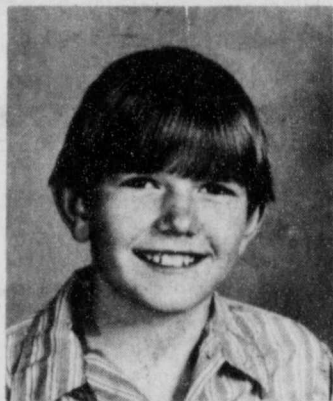

## MENTAL HEALTH MATTERS

Bertram S. Brown, M.D., Director  
National Institute of Mental Health

In Las Cruces, New Mexico, the people are operating a telephone emergency service which troubled residents can call any moment of the day or night for immediate help at a time of mental or emotional crisis.

Manned by volunteers and sponsored by the Dona Ana County Council of Churches, the round-the-clock crisis intervention services puts callers quickly in touch with a sympathetic ear and appropriate action.

The round-the-clock phone service is one of many services available through the Southwest Comprehensive Mental Health Center, supported in part by a grant from the National Institute of Mental Health. The number to dial for help is listed in three places in the local telephone directory and is carried by the Las Cruces Sun News as a public service. Volunteers do not even have to leave home to lend a helping hand.

Here's how the service works: When the person in distress dials the emergency number,

he reaches an answering service which in turn takes his telephone number and refers it immediately to a trained volunteer on duty. The volunteer calls back, assesses the problem, and ascertains what help is needed.

Sometimes all the caller needs is an interested, thoughtful person to talk over his problem with, and about a third of the calls require no further action. The crisis in such a case has been relieved by a chance to talk and some useful suggestions.

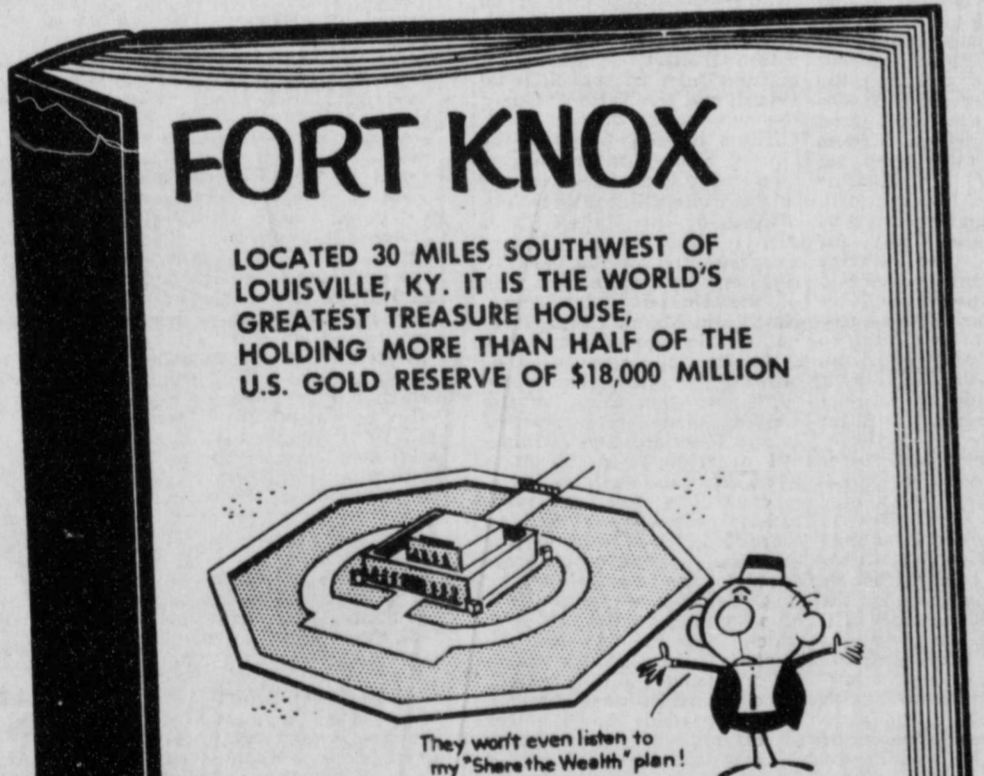

**Social Security Coverage Expands 3-Fold in 35 Years**

August 14 is the 35th anniversary of the social security program.

Almost three times as many people are now working in jobs covered by social security. The rolls have grown from 33 million workers covered when social security started to 94 million.

Today, 9 out of every 10 workers are covered, compared to 5 out of 10 when social security began. At first, only jobs in commerce and industry were included. Today, practically every job is covered by the program.

The 1950 amendments to the Social Security Act extended coverage to farm workers; domestic workers; certain nonfarm self-employed; Federal, civilian, State, and local employees not under a retirement sys-

tem; U.S. citizens working abroad; and employees of nonprofit institutions.

In 1954, more self-employed people—including farmers and professional people, other than lawyers and individuals in the medical professions—were covered.

Two years later—in 1956—members of the uniformed services and all professional self-employed people except doctors of medicine were covered. Coverage was extended to doctors in 1965.

Originally, benefits were for retired workers only. But, today social security is a family program protecting dependents, survivors, and the severely disabled, as well as providing hospital and medical insurance for people 65 and over.

Social security pays monthly cash benefits to nearly 2.5 million disabled workers and their families.

### COUNTY AGENT NEWS

Owners and buyers and sellers of rural land can look for current trends--higher prices, more sales, and increasing land taxes--to continue in the years just ahead.

Dr. Ivan W. Schmedemann of the Texas A&M University Agricultural Economics Department said rural land also will experience greater recreation use, and more large tracts will be cut up for developmental purposes.

Rural real estate loans are shifting from a land base to a man base. That is, lending agencies are taking a closer look at the person applying for a loan. Appraisal methods also are changing rapidly.

Increased land demand, will probably build to even greater pressure if three and four-day work weeks become widespread. The result would be more leisure time and commuting, as people flock to the country and buy and live on small acreages.

Up until recent times, land owners could do just about anything they wanted with their property. But now, non-landowners are pushing for more influence and how land is used.

There are two land use control bills currently before Congress, which if passed, will have much to do with how landowners utilize their property.

Rural real estate is in a peculiar situation these days. Before World War II, land prices fluctuated according to good and poor crop years. But since the war, zooming land prices are affected very little by agricultural conditions.

Why not add zest to the color of your summer and fall landscape by selecting plants now.

Zinnias and marigolds are two hot weather plants often taken for granted. These versatile annuals come in a large range of colors and a variety of sizes. Thus they can create desired effects in the landscape.

As a whole, both zinnias and marigolds are readily available and convenient. The dwarf sizes are suitable for borders and ground covers while the giant ones are used for mass planting and cutting for arrangements. Sometimes bedding size plants are hard to get from nurseries during the summer, but there is still plenty of time to start these from seeds.

Two heat-tolerant shrubs are Plumbago and Chinese Hibiscus. Both will thrive even in the hottest Texas sun. In southern parts of the state they are normally root hardy and sometimes are even evergreen. However, both should be treated as annuals in central and northern areas since they may be killed by sub-freezing weather.

Numerous other plants are showy and colorful in late summer and fall. These include the familiar periwinkle, shrimp plant, copper plant, sultana, pentas and salvia. Available in a wide variety of colors and sizes.

the sultana thrives in the shade and is readily propagated from cuttings or seed.

Since fall is the time for many outdoor activities, we suggest investing a little time and effort now in order to provide a pleasing landscape for the coming months.

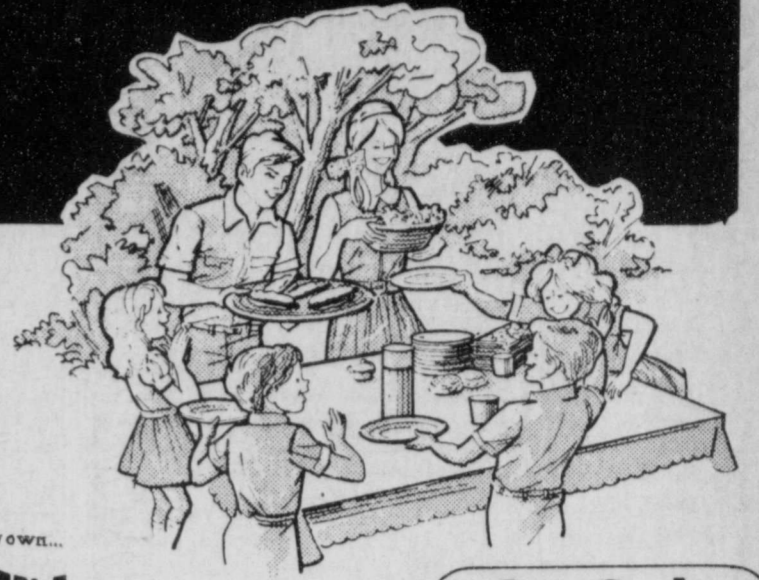

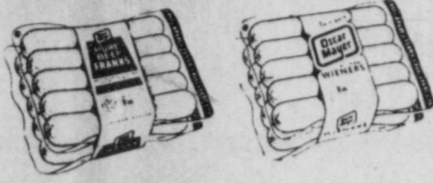

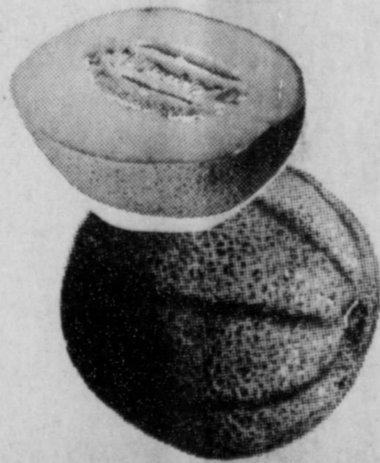
