PAPER JUDGED BEST IN WEST TEXAS PRESS COMPETITION

First Place 'General Excellence' Second Place 'Advertising Award'

The Rotan Advance-Roby Star Record took top honors at the 42nd Annual West Texas Press Association Convention held in Brownwood last weekend.

Kim Pease, editor and publisher since January 1971, and his wife Janece, associate editor, along with the Pease children were among the 118 persons present at the West Texas Press Annual Summer Convention. The West Texas Press Association is the world's largest regional press group, covering 122 Texas counties, and boasting a membership of over 114 Texas newspaper publishers.

The newspaper won the coveted "General Excellence" award in its category. Appearance

make-up, local news coverage, local columns, editorials, advertising, and pictures all are taken into consideration in determining the winner. The second place award in the "General Excellence" category was awarded to the Lockney Beacon in Floyd County and third place was captured by the Clifton Record in Bosque County by Waco, Texas. Others in the competition included: The Clay County Leader, Crosbyton Review, Earth News-Sun, Farwell State Line Tribune, Olton Enterprise, Matador Tribune, Stanton Reporter and Stratford Star.

The New Mexico Press Association judged this year's West Texas Press Association's "Bet-

ter Newspaper Contest". "It is a very gratifying feeling to know that our paper was judged the best in its field," said Pease. "We accepted the award on behalf of the almost 2,000 subscribers that read our paper and prepare their weekly shopping list from the ads that appear in the paper," said Pease. "It is the subscriber and advertisers working hand in hand that have made our publication a "General Excellence" winner. We do not publish our paper to win contests, we go to press each week in order to provide Fisher County with the best newspaper we are capable of printing. If we should win an award in pursuing this goal, then it is just icing on the cake."

The Fisher County Newspaper also took home a second place certificate in "Advertising Composition", Neatness, Layout, make-up, originality, and placement are some of the factors

taken into consideration in making this award. Others entered in this category included:

The Texas Spur, Stratford Star, Stanton Reporter, Olton Enterprise, Matador Tribune, Lockney Beacon, Hamilton Herald News, Earth News-Sun, Farwell State Line Tribune, Crosbyton Review, Clifton Record and Clay County Leader.

The Lamb County Leader won in "Editorials" with the Brownfield News and Breckenridge American scoring second and third respectively.

The Brady Standard was the winner of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce "Community Service" award.

Farm Tractor Generation 11 Coming Aug 19

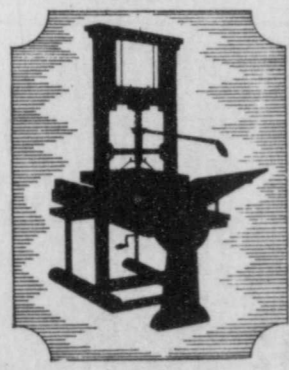

County Will Share In \$28,487 Surplus

Fisher County Commissioners will divide \$28,487.79 which represents Fisher County's share of the surplus in the lateral road fund in Austin, it was announced at last Monday's court meeting.

son representing a construction firm hired to erect a pipeline for West Texas Utilities appeared before the Commissioners. They were interested in securing permission to cross Fisher County roads with the pipeline. The commissioners agreed to allow the construction firm free access to the roadways.

Fisher County Judge Ralph Ammons informed the Commissioners of an equalization board meeting on Monday, Aug. 21, at 9:00 a. m., in the Fisher County Courthouse.

County Auditor, Al Finch, presented a proposed draft of the 1973 Fisher County budget to commissioners at the Monday

meeting. The 1973 budget would give each commissioner approximately \$61,000.00 in his local road and bridge fund.

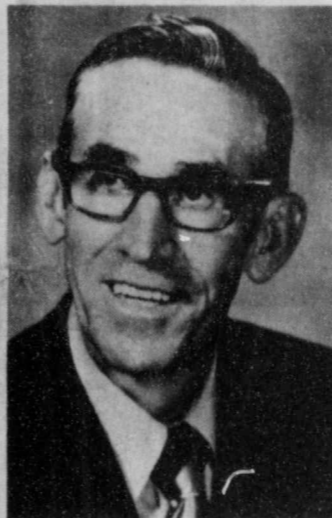
The court was left open until the scheduled Thursday, August 24, meeting, when commissioners will open bids on construction of the new Fisher County Courthouse.

Elmer Martin, Democratic Party nominee for State Representative, 61st district, was in Fisher County this week on his first "Study Tour" of the District's five counties.

The former Mitchell County Judge said he was visiting the communities in Jones, Taylor, Fisher and Nolan Counties in a special effort to meet with individual citizens and learn what the people of the district are thinking.

Roby School Board Hiring Completed

Member of the Roby Independent School Board met in regular session last Monday evening. School Superintendent Ray Pruitt called the meeting a short routine business session.

The only matter drawing unusual attention was the discussion by board members of not making English 4 a mandatory subject. This discussion was not acted upon, but is expected to be acted upon at a future meeting.

The Roby Board held a called session on July 31, according to Pruitt. This meeting was specifically called to fill vacancies in bus driver position and open bids on a milk contract.

Foremost Dairies was awarded the milk contract for the 1972-73 school year based on their low bid of .0775 for one-half pint of homogenized milk, and .0825 for chocolate milk.

Burt Hale was hired by the board as a full time bus driver.

Buck Hughs and Paul Mitchell were both hired as half-time bus drivers as a result of action at the called meeting.

The only other item was amending the 1971-72 school

year budget in operation of the plant, according to Pruitt.

The next regular Roby School Board meeting will be held at 8 p. m., September 11, 1972.

City Postpones Contract Awarding On New Paving

The Rotan City Council met in regular session on August 8, and opened bids on the proposed paving of approximately 46 blocks within the Rotan city limits.

Price Construction Company of Snyder submitted a bid of 21¢ per square yard; Goldthrop Construction Company in Seymour, Texas, 18¢ per square yard, and the low bidder D & L Construction Company in Aspermont presented a bid of 16¢

per square yard. The awarding of the contract was tabled until city officials could inspect some of the work previously completed by the low bidder.

Councilman Mac Weatherbee made a motion, seconded by Jay Hendon to accept a contract with the city of Roby allowing them to use Rotan's solid waste fill area. This motion was passed pending Roby's presentation and acceptance of the contract.

Councilman Sam Hamm made a motion seconded by Jay Hendon to hire C. D. Ferris as a guard at the dump ground. Ferris will be working 40 hours per week enforcing dumping regulations.

Roby Classes Begin At 8 15 Monday Morning

Roby Schools will begin classes Monday, August 21, at 8:15 a. m. Classes will dismiss at 3:30 p. m. each day with the exception of grades 1 and 2 which will be dismissed at 2:45 p. m. Buses will run at regular scheduled time.

Lunches will be served beginning Monday. Grades 1 through 4 will be 30¢, grades 6 through 8 are 35¢ and high school students pay 40¢.

Golf Tournament Postponed Until August 25 & 26

The Rotan Golf Club has announced the postponement of the annual invitational "Individual Tournament" originally scheduled for August 18 and 19. According to Club Secretary, Arvin White, the tournament will be held Aug. 25-26. Flights will be determined by the total number of entries and each flight will contain an equal number of golfers, regardless of the stroke difference.

Rotan School Board Sets Hair Length Standards

Members of the Rotan Independent School Board unanimously passed a "student appearance code" at Monday night's meeting that sets down in black and white specific guidelines concerning boys hair length.

Bobby Smith made the motion that be seconded by Charlie Joe Helms to adopt the following guidelines concerning student appearance. "No beards, no mustaches, sideburns will be no lower than the lobe of the ear and will be neat and trimmed. Hair must not touch the collar of an ordinary shirt and will be neat and clean. The respective school principal is

to be the judge concerning the above policies".

The school board members awarded the 1972-73 school milk bid to Gandy's Dairies. Their bid of .0765 for one-half pint of homogenized milk and .0820 for chocolate milk was accepted over Foremost's bid of .0775 for homogenized and .0825 for chocolate. The motion to accept the bid was made and seconded by Bobby Gruben and Charlie Joe Helms respectively.

A motion made by Board Member Helms and seconded by Bobby Smith concerning eligibility passed unanimously. The

motion reads as follows, "that the eligibility rule be changed from six weeks to semester for students holding offices, nominations or appointments. Students holding office, seeking nominations, seeking elections or trying out for drum major or majorette must have passed all subjects the previous semester. Students holding any of the above will hold positions in case of failing grades until the end of the current semester.

The new 1972-73 school budget amounting to \$503,736.00 was approved by the board members at Monday's meeting. SEE HAIR PAGE THREE

Riding Clubs will be judged and awarded 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place trophies for senior clubs and 1st place trophy for junior club.

All organizations are urged to enter floats as cash prizes of \$25 for first place, \$15 for 2nd, and \$10 for 3rd place will be awarded. Judges for floats are from out of town.

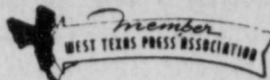


GYP MILL ROAD UNDER WATER AFTER SUNDAY MORNING RAIN

condition. The Double Mountain Fork of the Brazos River swept over the bridge Sunday and one area rancher, Garland Upshaw, reported a cow and six calves missing. One of his cows was swept down the river and hung on the river bridge. Upshaw rescued the cow Monday and on Tuesday it gave birth to a calf.

Cecil King, at Citizens State Bank in Roby, indicated that there was very little damage in Roby. He registered just under 4 inches of moisture Saturday night and about an inch prior to that--giving a total of five inches.

Mr. and Mrs. Dallas Neal east of Rotan suffered extensive water damage to their home. Two bedrooms and a bath were completely covered by water that left a thick residue of black mud after draining.

Dwight Nowlin had several terraces broken and damaged during the swift downpour. Several area farmers are in the same boat. These terrace breaks will cause some problems when strippers begin gathering the crops.

Water flooded the Rotan Flower Shop and seeped into the Soil Conservation Offices and Landes Furniture, early Sunday morning. Loys Landes indicated that damage was very light to his store.

At the Bobby Smith farm, 7 miles east of Rotan, water swept with such force that it damaged several cotton trailers and leaked into their home for the first time.

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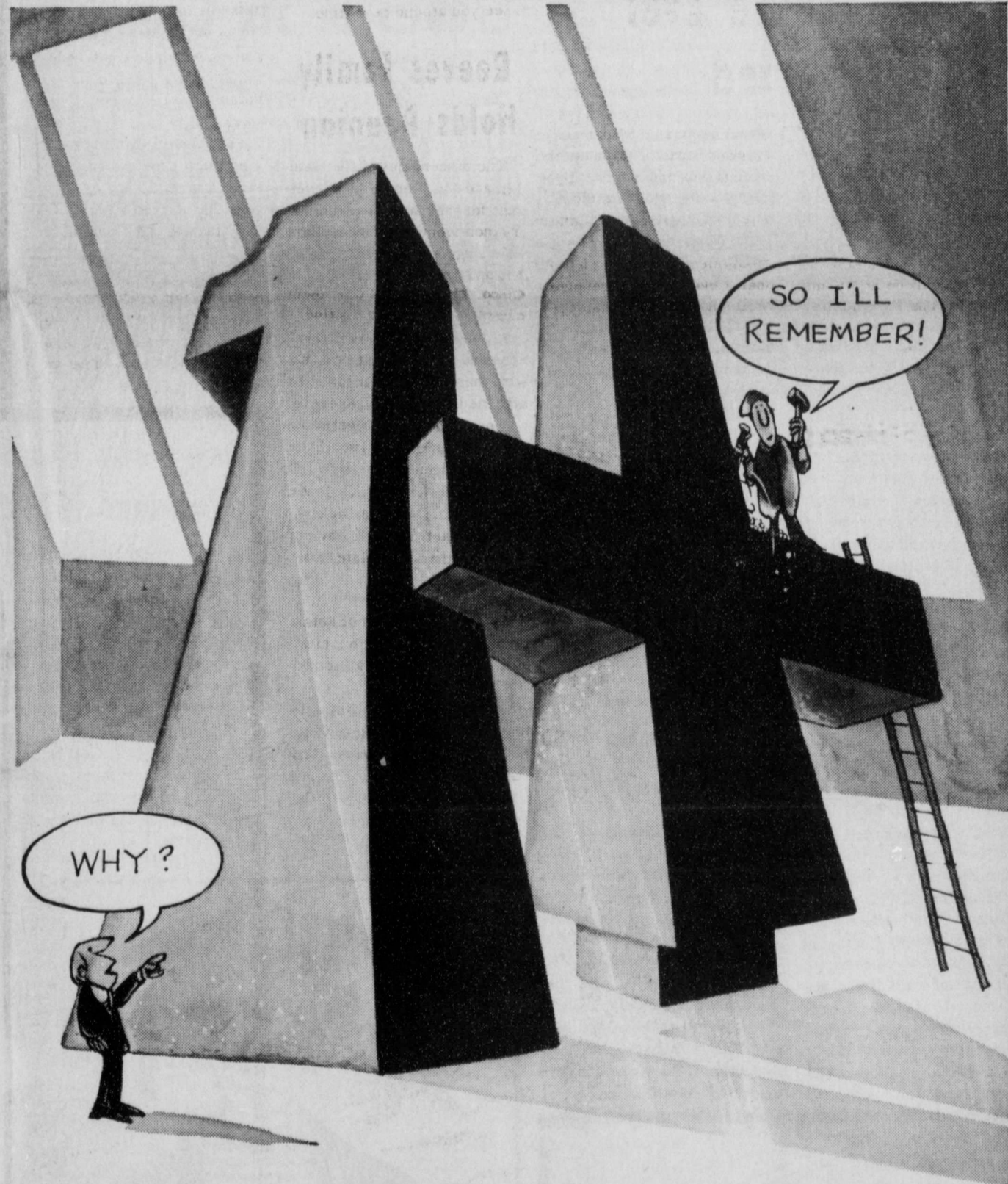
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Climbing Your Family Tree

The desire to know about one's family is as old as recorded history. The Bible gives much genealogy of both individuals and nations. The Valley of the Nile has monuments which reveal that the upper-class families of Ancient Egypt took pride in their ancestral lineages. In the second century of our era a Roman writer, Suetonius, commenced biographies of the Caesars with a critical account of their families, often tracing them to the very beginning of Roman history.

One does not have to go back into ancient history to find people interested in family lineage. A visit to any of our major genealogical libraries reveals both men and women, young and old, delving into records for traces of an elusive ancestor. Miss Josie Baird of Rotan is presently in Salt Lake City, Utah, doing research in what is reputed to be the most extensive genealogical library in the world. This type research is popularly termed climbing your family tree.

Miss Baird states, "To me there are four good reasons why one should climb the family tree. First, for the inspiration and stimulus. If one searches for fact concerning Revolutionary Ancestors, she finds attributes which we might well emulate today. They had unbroken faith in God, courage, fortitude, and integrity. When they went to war they went as civilians fighting with devotion, courage, and effectiveness inspired only by the sense of a righteous cause, liberty.

A second reason for climbing my family tree is that it makes me familiar with the history of my country. As Viscount Bryce has said, the history of the nation is the history of the men who compose the nation and not their dwelling place. And, quoting Thomas Carlyle, "History is the essence of innumerable biographies."

A third reason for climbing my family tree is an ablytical one. It is something like a crossword puzzle, or piecing together the queer pieces in a jigsaw puzzle. It is fun to piece together the parts of one's family history, using all of one's power of analysis. I have written many letters, spent vacations in musty rooms of old court houses, and copied information from tomb-

stones in old family cemeteries. It has truly been a worthwhile experience.

A fourth reason for believing it is worthwhile to climb my family tree is both psychological and physiological. This is perhaps the most important reason to me. I am interested in knowing why I am what I am; why I behave in a certain manner, and why I react in a certain way. To know something about my ancestors helps me to understand myself. "We are omnibuses in which all our ancestors ride", stated Oliver Wendell Holmes.

There are other reasons why people climb the family tree, not always worthy ones. Some try to establish social prestige through connection with noble ancestry. We must remember that real worth depends not upon ancestors but upon ones self. Often one hoping to find noble ancestors upon the branches finds rogues and impostors! There is the story of the woman who paid a well known genealogist to trace her family tree and analyze the findings. To his amusement and to her horror he found one limb that represented an ancestor who had been electrocuted in the state penitentiary. As it did not seem feasible to eliminate the limb entirely, a method of concealment was invented. The limb was recorded as an ancestor who had occupied a chair of applied science in a state institution! This was not my experience, but had it been, I would still be grateful to the erring ancestor. Had he not lived, neither would I be here today!

Some folks have found innumerable to climb their family tree because they have established proof as rightful heir to a fortune. Many have tried for this reason, but few reap rewards. Every family seems to have a tradition of "three brothers who came to America" or of lost fortunes waiting to be claimed. And in spite of widespread efforts many fortunes do remain unclaimed.

Many people climb their family tree in order to establish eligibility for membership in various organizations. To me, the interest in genealogy came first and the organizations are secondary. I am a member of Daughters of the American Revolution because I am proud of

my forefathers who came to America in the early days and helped to build this the greatest country in the world. I also believe in the purposes and the programs of this patriotic organization that is always ready to participate in any activity either educational, patriotic or historical, that will help this country of ours."

In addition to membership in the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, Miss Baird also is a member of the National Society of Magna Charta Dames, The Royal Order of Knights of the Garter and will be listed in Volume V of "Living Descendants of Blood Royal in America" which will be released this year. She is one of relatively few Certified American Lineage Research Specialists accredited by the National Board of Professional Genealogists. She has been interested in historical research for many years. Publications include her Master's Thesis, "Ranching on the Circles Bar", "Tom Bond-Cowpoke, Bronc Buster, Trail Driver", "A Miller Family Tree Grows into a Forest", and "A Baird Family in America".

Miss Baird is currently serving as Registrar and Chairman of Genealogical Records and Lineage Research for Anne Pertus Shelburne Chapter of Daughters of the American Revolution. The foregoing article is contributed by this chapter.

Horace Carter Attends Farm Bureau Conference

Horace Carter, President of Fisher County Farm Bureau, attended a statewide conference of county presidents August 9-11 in Austin.

Issues facing agriculture and new programs in Farm Bureau were discussed by the more than 125 county leaders in attendance. The presidents also heard a report on a farmer-rancher image study conducted recently in Dallas. According to the report, there is a "reservoir of good will" in metropolitan areas for agriculture in general.

Speakers included J.T. (Red) Woodson of Fannin County, president of the 130,000 member state farm organization; TFB Executive Director Warren Newberry of Waco; and Jack Angell, Chicago, American Farm Bureau Federation labor specialist.

Fisher County Schools Offering New Dimension In Education This Year

Rotan, Roby and Hobbs Schools are a part of the Tri-County Education Co-op, through which plans are being finalized for the addition of many new services. These are being made available to classroom teachers and their students through a new state plan for special education. Schools in the counties of Jones, Stonewall, and Fisher are part of this co-op, which emphasizes individualized instruction for those children who are eligible.

Eligible children are children between the ages of 3 and 21 who have difficulties in learning. Several new categories are included, the largest new addition being for those children with "language and/or learning disabilities." These are children who have at least average intelligence but who have had difficulty in learning through the use of conventional teaching methods. These students need special training suited especially for their individual needs, and they work much better in a small group or one-to-one relationship.

Each student considered must have a thorough appraisal, including educational, sociological, physiological, and psychological. An educational plan must then be developed for his own individual needs.

Most children receiving help under the new provisions will continue in the regular classroom for the majority of their time, going to a resource room for a period or more a day.

Included in the Tri-County staff are 5 educational diagnosticians, 3 counselors, 41 teachers, 13 aides and the supervisor, Mr. Pete Lollar.

Teacher for the Hobbs school will be Miss Barbara Churchill. She has a B.S. from A.C.C. with previous experience in Jr. High and High School Physical Education. Teachers for the Roby school include Linda Joslin, B.S., Sul Ross State College, with previous experience in the elementary grades; Geneva Maberry, B.S., McMurry College, with previous experience in the elementary grades and early childhood; and Kathy Carrier, B.S., Texas Tech, with previous ex-

perience in the elementary grades. Aide for the Roby school is Varona Mitchell. Teachers for the Rotan school include Chrystelle Hawkins, B.S., H.S.U. with experience in Jr. High math and

Jr. High and High School English; Virginia Campbell, B.S., A.C.C.; Nancy Billingsley, B.S., A.C.C.; and June Anderson, experience in Snyder at head of pilot District Program. Serving as aide is Lupe Cabrera.
