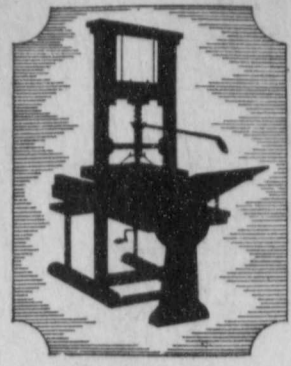

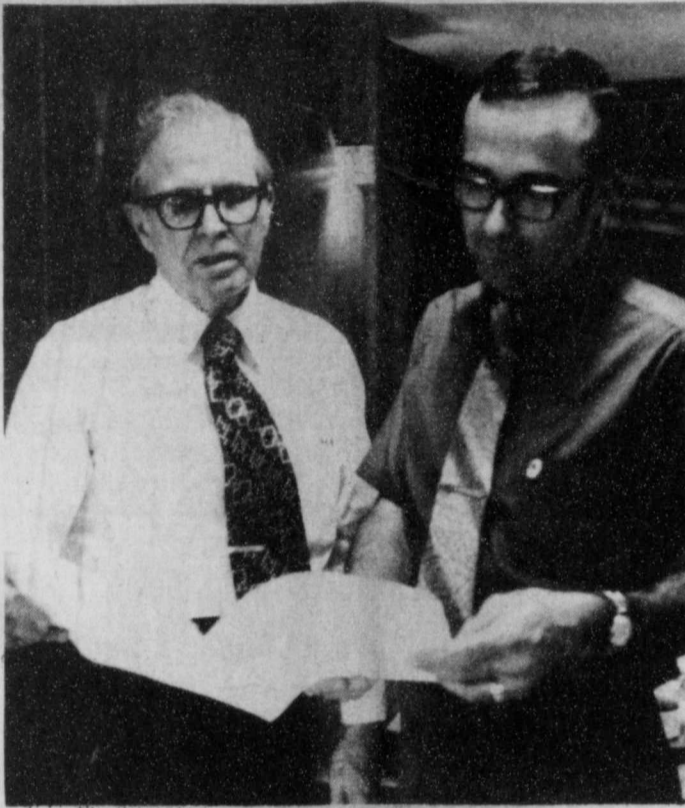

Coaches List Starters For Seymour Scrimmage

The Rotan Yellowhammers held Eastland to only one touchdown during the 2-hour controlled scrimmage last week. Rotan allowed Eastland to score on their first possession, but tightened down for the remainder of the scrimmage holding Eastland to the lone score.

The Yellowhammers did not score any touchdowns. "Our closest penetration was to the three yard line", said Charlie Davis, head coach. "We were extremely pleased with the defense", said Davis, "but we have an awful long way to go in getting our offense in shape".

"We have several inexperienced players with relatively no game experience and its going to take a few scrimmages and a few actual games to build up their confidence", said Phil Petty, assistant coach.

Davis and Petty seemed quite satisfied with the Yellowhammer play taking into consideration that Eastland is ranked 6th in Texas in their class.

The coaching staff of the Yellowhammers made some major moves on the starting offensive team after the Eastland scrimmage. It is their hopes that the moves will make a better team, giving them more depth at weak positions.

William Cleveland was moved from tackle to center. Bub Allen was moved from center to left guard, David Markham moved from halfback to tackle and Jerry Gentry moved into a starting halfback slot.

Coach Davis listed the eleven

probable starters for the Seymour scrimmage as follows:

At the center position senior William Cleveland is scheduled to start. Behind Cleveland is Louis Yanez a sophomore.

At right guard Jack McCall is getting the starting call. He is a senior and is being backed up by Alan Weathersbee and Cecil Womack.

David Markham will start at right tackle. He is a senior and will be backed up by Don Aldridge, junior.

Two Residents Die In Head On Collision

A head on collision between Roby and Rotan left two county residents dead in an accident that occurred 5.8 miles north of Roby last Friday night.

Raymond Grametbaur, age 46, driving a 1955 Chevrolet, and Hazel Carrillo Flores, age 19, driving a 1962 Chevrolet collided head on midway between Roby and Rotan on State Highway 70, killing both of the drivers.

Texas Highway Patrolman Don Underwood investigated the accident that allegedly occurred at approximately 10:45 P. M. Friday, August 25.

Hazel Flores was transported to Callan Hospital by Weathersbee Ambulance Service and pronounced dead on arrival. Grametbaur was pronounced dead at the scene after being pinned in his 1955 Chevrolet.

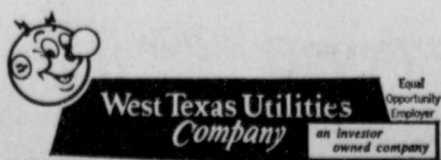

COUNTY AGENT NEWS

Tamwheat 101 and Centurk are new varieties of hard red winter wheat which will be available to Texas farmers in the fall of 1972. Both varieties can be sold only as a class of certified seed.

Tamwheat 101 was released by the Texas Agriculture Experiment Station and is recommended for irrigation on the High Plains of Texas. It is about the same maturity and height as Sturdy. Its straw is more flexible than Sturdy but it is resistant to lodging at high levels of fertility. The test weight of Tamwheat 101 is good, and it produces a high quality bakery flour. Tamwheat 101 is better adapted to dryland than Sturdy, but its straw may be too short for effective combining under dryland conditions. It is susceptible to leaf and stem rust therefore, it is not recommended in areas where these diseases are prevalent.

Centurk is a hard red winter wheat variety developed by the Nebraska Agricultural Experiment Station and Plant Science Research Division of the USDA. It has high yield potential and has yielded well under both irrigation and dryland on the High Plains and Rolling Plains of Texas. It is taller than Caprock and slightly shorter than Tascosa under most conditions. The lodging resistance of Centurk is better than most commercial varieties but less than Sturdy. Centurk has moderate resistance to leaf and stem rust. Its test weight is satisfactory and usually better than Sturdy. Centurk is recommended for dryland and irrigated wheat production on the High and Rolling Plains. It has good milling and baking quality. Centurk will perform well north of Dallas except severe leaf and stem rust may reduce yields in some areas.

The easy-to-care for crape myrtle is becoming a popular plant around the state. In fact, it's the official "beautification tree" of many towns and cities.

Few plants offer as much beauty for so little care. Large spikes of brightly-colored flowers cover the plant for long periods of time, even during the hot Texas summer. The blooms come in shades of purple, lavender, pink, red and white plus many variations.

The new dwarf varieties offer much versatility. These smaller plants are often used in mass plantings as well as in areas where larger plants are not appropriate. Heavy pruning during the winter causes these dwarfs to bloom even more profusely.

The beauty of the tree-type crape myrtle is not limited to its flowers. Its trunk has an almost sculptural quality after the tree is several years old. This is especially apparent during the winter when its branches are bare. Thus, limiting pruning to only the small branches allows the structure to develop and become more apparent.

In some areas of Texas these attractive plants give an added bonus in the form of excellent fall leaf color. In the Panhandle area they sometimes freeze to the ground in winter but come up from the roots the following spring and provide their usual colorful summer blooms.

Although adaptable to a wide assortment of conditions, crape

myrtles do best in sunny locations with good, well-drained soil. By applying a complete fertilizer annually, the plant will grow faster and bloom more. However, there may be little or no blooming if planted in shady places.

These versatile crape myrtles are easily propagated from cuttings taken in early winter. These cuttings should be placed in a moist media to root. Transplanting is easy and presents no special problems. Although the larger specimens should be dormant when moved, nursery-grown plants can be moved anytime if handled properly.

Handsome crape myrtles are often found around deserted farms and home sites. This shows that they are quite rugged and thereby need little care to produce showy blooms.

Powdery mildew is probably the worst pest of these plants. This disease is usually reduced if the plant is located in a sunny area. Powdery mildew can be controlled by spraying with Actidione PM or Benomyl.

New and improved varieties of crape myrtle are sought through research. Much is being done to develop plants having more vigor, faster growth, larger mature sizes and powdery mildew resistance.

Many consider crape myrtles to be nearly ideal plants, so improved varieties should be even more valuable.

Clinton McCain of Eastland introduced and recognized the Rev. J. D. Vaughan of Arlington as being the oldest member present. Dr. B.R. Nail Named Clayton College Dean

Roby native Dr. Billy R. Nail has been appointed dean of Clayton Junior College in Morrow, Ga. Dr. Harry S. Downs, president of the institution, has announced. The college, a unit of the state-wide University System of Georgia, is located 15 miles south of Atlanta.

Dr. Nail comes to Clayton Junior College from Morehead State University, Morehead, Ky. where he was chairman of the division of mathematical sciences and professor of mathematics.

Dr. Nail graduated from Roby High School in 1951 and received his bachelor's degree in physical education with a minor in mathematics from Hardin-Simmons University in 1956. He was a teacher and football line coach at Merkel High School from 1957 to 1961.

He received a National Science Foundation Fellowship for study during the summer of 1969 at the University of Illinois where he continued study during the 1960-61 academic year under a second NSF fellowship. Dr. Nail completed his A. M. degree in mathematics at the University of Illinois in 1962, and, until 1964, was an instructor of mathematics at Wayland Baptist College, Plainview. He was appointed an acting department head at Wayland in 1964.

Dr. Nail then returned to the University of Illinois, where he held National Science Foundation fellowships for study during the academic years 1965-66 and 1966-67. While at Illinois, he was a graduate assistant assigned to the NSF Academic Year Institutes for High School and College Teachers of Mathematics for three years. He completed his Ph. D. degree in mathematics in 1967.

Upon completion of his doctorate, Dr. Nail went to Morehead State University as head of the department of mathematics and associate professor. He was appointed chairman of the division of mathematical sciences at Morehead in 1968 and professor of mathematics in

1969.

Dr. Nail is a member of Pi Mu Epsilon and the Society of Sigma Xi. He was listed in the 1971 edition of "Outstanding Educators of America" and is listed in editions of the "Dictionary of International Biography" and "American Men and Women in Science".

Dr. Nail also is a member of Kiwanis and Gideons International and is listed in the 1971 edition of "Community Leaders of America". Dr. Nail and his wife, Glenda, have 3 daughters and will make their home in Morrow. He is the son of Mrs. Juanita Nail Moore of Roby.
