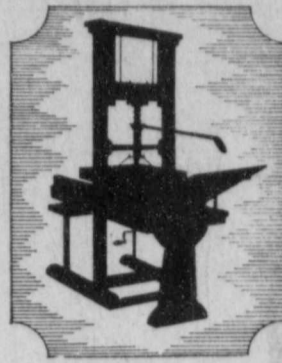


### Hobbs Baptist Sets Revival

## Rotan Yellowhammers Face Tough Hamlin Team Friday

Rotan Coach Charlie Davis came away from the Seymour scrimmage feeling confident that his offensive team could move the ball. The Yellowhammers scored on two occasions from the 20-yard line, and once

from mid field. Neal Summers was an offensive standout for the squad at Seymour. "Defensively, we were pretty well satisfied with the team's performance", said Davis, "but on offense we still need a lot of work".

Starting defensive unit for the Yellowhammers against Hamlin will be: defensive halfback, Ken Smith and Bruce Jones; Mike Cade and Neal Summers will start at defensive safety. The linebacker positions will be held down by William Duke, David Markham and Earl Ray Pearson. Defensive guards will be Jack McCall and Joe Mur-

phree. Defensive tackles will be William Cleveland and Marsh Hill.

The Yellowhammers expect a real fight from the Hamlin Pied Piper on Friday, Sept. 8th. Hamlin also scrimmaged Seymour and scored about as many points as the Hammers did.

According to Davis, the Hamlin team will operate from a basic split T on offense and from a basic split 6 on defense. The squad has a lot of talent, and an exceptional amount of speed. The backfield has 2 men that were on the regional sprint relays that ran 42.1 last year.

Roby's Mark Kiser was the man doing all the scoring last Friday as Roby scrimmaged Rochester for the second time.

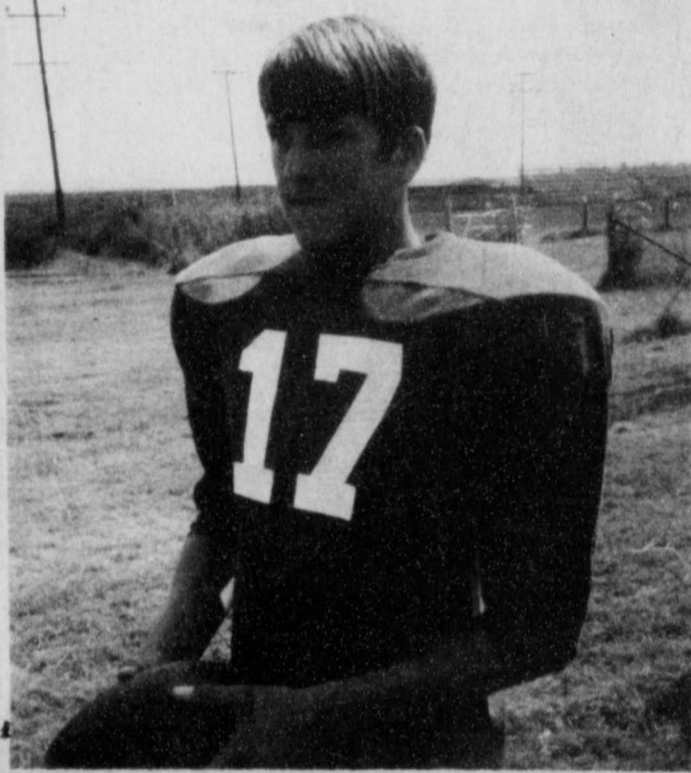

## Jo Tankersley To Work In Survey Pilot Study

Mrs. Jo Tankersley, Executive Director of the Housing Authority of the City of Rotan and of the Community Building, has been employed to assist in a Survey Pilot Study in the nineteen county West Central Texas council of Governments Region. Chosen as a pilot area in the state, the study will include a survey of housing conditions and occupant attitudes. Its intent is in the interest of the community and residents. Some twenty-five to thirty persons will be participating in the survey in which a new pictorial questionnaire technique will be utilized. The purpose of the study is to give a better picture of the housing situation and to determine actual needs. Sites for interviews will be picked by computer and based on the 1970 Census. It is estimated that the results will be 95 percent as accurate as would be if every resi-

dence was surveyed. The workers will attend a training session before beginning the survey which should conclude on or before September twenty-first. Area homes contacted during the interview phase are encouraged to cooperate with the personnel conducting the study. Mrs. Tankersley says, "this is not a part of my job with the Housing Authority, but it is a related field intended as community service".

## Fisher County Eligible For New EDA Assistance

Senator John Tower has been informed by the Economic Development Administration that 18 Texas counties not now participating in EDA programs are statistically eligible for assistance upon application by local officials. Fisher County is among these counties, and others are: Cochran, Dawson, Lynn, Menard, Reeves, Terrell, Stephens, Edwards, Hudspeth, Presidio, Floyd, Motley, Armstrong, Bailey, Hansford, Lipscomb, and Foard.

EDA, an arm of the U. S. Department of Commerce, obtained authority under amendment earlier this Congress to the Public Works and Economic Development Act, to qualify for designation as "redevelopment areas" any county which has suffered a decline in the population of employed persons of more than 1.2% over the ten-year period covered by the 1970 census. Upon designation, the counties would be eligible to receive EDA assistance designed to bolster the local economy. Census Department figures made available to EDA showed

the 18 Texas counties to be statistically eligible under the new law for designation as "redevelopment areas".

EDA informed Senator Tower

it would be sending representatives to meet with local officials in the 18 counties soon to fully explain available EDA assistance.

The women will leave on a chartered bus with other women from Extension District III, on September 12 and return Sept. 15. Those planning to attend from Fisher County include 3 elected delegates, Mrs. Howard Noles, Mrs. Dale Cave and Mrs. Barney Bigham. Also, Mrs. Bill Hardy who is vice-president of the organization and a candidate for State President; and Mrs. Lowell Thornburg who is the newly elected director of Extension District III, plans to attend. The group will be accompanied by Mrs. Alice Balenger, Fisher County Home Demonstration Agent.

The meeting of the Texas Home Demonstration Association is open to the public. Three speakers will discuss various aspects of home economics in Texas during the 2-day meet.

Addressing the public assemblies will be Dr. L. S. Pope of College Station, Associate Dean for Administrative Affairs, Texas A&M University College of Agriculture, Dr. Mina Lamb of the Department of Food and Nutrition, Texas Tech University in Lubbock, and Wayne E. Thomas of Hereford, chairman of the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, will also speak.

Pope will discuss the problem

of food costs and the consumer, and Dr. Lamb will present a "Eulogy of Nutrition."

Special guests at the meeting will be Dr. John E. Hutchison, director, Texas Agricultural Extension Service; Mrs. Florence W. Low, assistant director for home economics; Claudia Williams, state home demonstration agent, all of College Station and Mrs. Toy Smith, organization Specialist of Texas Agricultural Extension Service, College Station.

Home demonstration clubs, numbering 1,315 in Texas with more than 21,000 members, are sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University and the U. S. Department of Agriculture cooperating.

Extension Service sponsors local clubs throughout Texas--- which focus on the needs of homemakers in their counties as a part of state-wide educational effort to bring the latest information on homemaking to all families of Texas.

In addition to public assemblies during the meet, members will attend workshops concerning citizenship, family life, 4-H work, health, cultural arts, recreation and safety.

Election and installation of state officers will conclude the meeting.

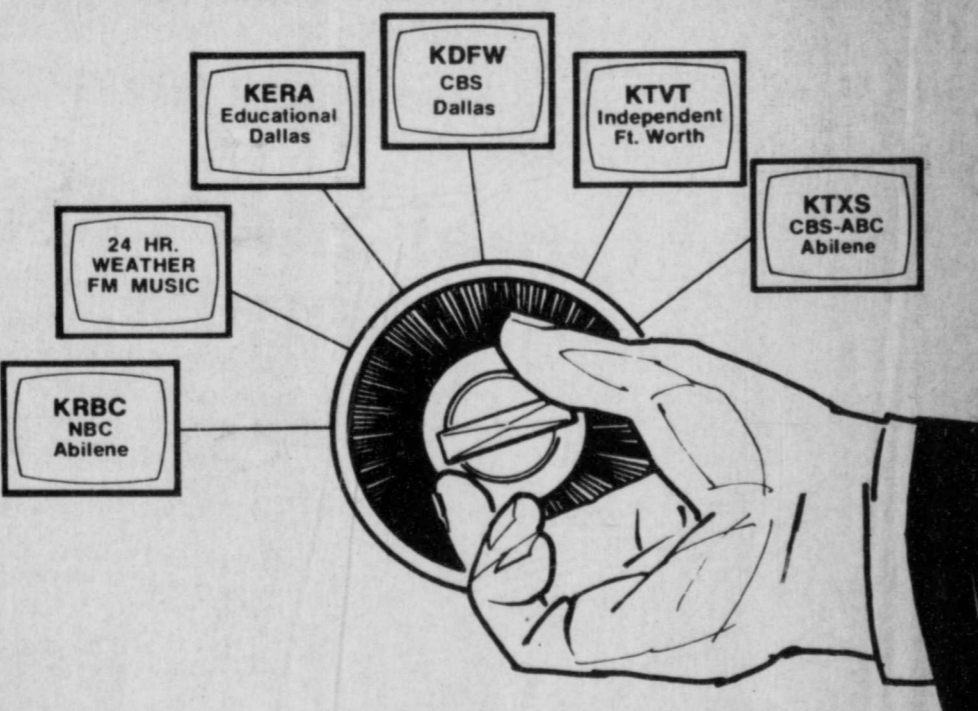

Good records can save tax dollars at income tax filing time for taxpayers.

Ellis Campbell, Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue in North Texas, said good records help you get all the deductions and credits you are entitled to.

A good system for keeping records is to label envelopes or folders according to the types of income and deductions you have. Mr. Campbell said. Bills and receipts should be put in the appropriate folder as they are paid.

Taxpayers who itemize their deductions on Form 1040 must have available cancelled checks, receipts, statements, and other material to support the claimed deductions.

## COUNTY AGENT NEWS

Wheat producers in Fisher County should study the 1973 Wheat Program closely before making a decision on participation.

The major differences in the new program compared with the 1972 version are:

1. Mandatory set-aside has been increased from 83 to 86 percent of the domestic allotment.

2. Additional set-aside limit has been increased from 75 percent to 150 percent of the domestic allotment.

3. Payment on the additional set-aside has been decreased from 94 cents to 88 cents per bushel.

4. For the coming season, planting is limited to the 1972 harvested acres (includes acreage credited as failed, grazed out or harvested for hay) plus 1972 additional set-aside acres and less the 1973 additional set-aside.

The loan price remains at \$1.25 per bushel and marketing certificates will again be paid based on the difference between the national average loan rate and 100 percent parity.

To what extent a farmer decides to participate in the additional set-aside provision of the program will depend mainly on his ability to profitably use the set-aside acreage for grazing.

An increase in payments may be offset by a decrease in production due to less acres being harvested. Also, the amount of acres planted for harvest will be influenced by the number of additional set-aside acres which a farmer had in 1972, if he elects to set-aside additional acreage in 1973.

Each producer should sit down and carefully calculate all the angles of the program. Then, an intelligent decision can be made.

Many Texas swine producers are faced with making changes in their operations to comply with regulations set down by the Texas Water Quality Board.

The whole idea of the Board's regulations is that "treated or untreated wastes may not be discharged to water courses except under rare rainfall events".

Two agricultural engineers with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service have taken a close look at the overall situation of swine waste management and have developed a report to assist swine producers with the problem. "Liquid Manure Management for Swine" was authored by Dr. Billy R. Stewart, environmental control specialist, and Dr. John M. Sweeten, animal waste management specialist.

The Texas A&M University specialists point out that producers meeting certain criteria must register with the Texas Water Quality Board. Registration is based on the number of hogs in confinement, minimum stocking rates, duration of confinement, daily period of confinement, pollution potential and purpose of holding and feeding areas.

Registered producers must comply with several minimum standards for preventing water pollution from confined feeding operations.

"Proper design of swine waste management systems can yield benefits of pollution control, increased animal productivity and improved production efficiency," say the specialists. "In planning new or modified swine production units to meet environmental pollution standards, producers should attempt to incorporate all these benefits."

Basically, manure can be handled as either a liquid or a solid. In confinement housing, liquid handling will usually prove advantageous since it generally requires less labor, can be handled periodically rather than daily, and contains

more nutritive value than stockpiled solid manure.

The liquid system must perform conveyance, storage, partial decomposition, transportation and disposal. Several methods could fill these requirements. Scraping and washing floors daily is one and slatted

floors with temporary storage pits underneath is another. A third method uses slatted floors plus shallow underground pits which discharge continuously into outside lagoons. Each must meet the requirements established by the Board.

Using the liquid system, either underfloor or outside storage pits must be provided. These must be cleaned to remove sludge accumulation and to preserve liquid capacities. When cleaning, leave some waste material in the pit to seed subsequent wastes with the needed bacteria and microorganisms.

Lagoons are used to treat and store wastes and liquid effluent. Here, the manure organic matter is decomposed. Aerobic lagoons must be naturally or mechanically aerated. They are recommended mainly where odor-free treatment and disposal of effluent are important. Anaerobic lagoons are relatively inexpensive but must be designed and managed properly to reduce odors such as ammonia and hydrogen sulfide.

From the lagoon, wastes are carried either by tank wagons or irrigation systems and applied to the soil. Besides enriching the soil, the manure increases water and nutrient holding capacities and granulation and makes it more porous.

Application rates should be determined from soil test data and a nutrient concentration table.

With tank wagons, the subsoil injection or plow-furrow-cover method eliminates both odors and flies, reduces the possibility of water pollution through surface runoff, and decreases nitrogen losses from volatilization. However, this method requires a lot of horsepower to pull the necessary equipment. Requirements vary with soil characteristics, tractor speed and soil moisture content.

On the other hand, irrigation systems utilize less labor and lower operating costs. But the solutions must be more diluted. Manure liquids may be disposed through flood irrigation, or a sprinkler system can be used if large particles are screened out. However, odor can be a problem with an aerobic effluent. Unless rates are properly controlled, surface or ground water pollution may occur.

All factors must be considered in choosing the system to use.

Sorghum midge is present in many late planted sorghum fields. The midge resembles a gnat and has an orange color.

Insecticides should be applied when the sorghum head is shedding pollen. If heavy midge populations are present a second application is needed in 5 days.

Materials recommended are sevin, trithion, diazinon, and parathion.

Full care of shrubs is very important if you want them to survive the winter in healthy condition and be ready to grow next spring. Thus, several jobs must be performed to have a beautiful landscape planting.

Shrubs should be well watered ahead of a predicted cold, windy norther. This is very critical for evergreens and for new plantings which may not be well established. If the weather is dry during the fall and winter, apply water to shrubs about once every week to ten days.

Why do shrubs need water during the winter when they are dormant? Actually, they do not stay inactive all winter. This is especially true with evergreens. Whenever the temperature gets above 40 degrees F., growth may start. They lose water constantly through transpiration, especially if they are in a windy location.

Sunburn and windburn are primarily caused by loss of water. Thus, a good supply of soil moisture is as important in winter as in summer.

Evergreen shrubs in windy locations and those which have been recently transplanted may need extra protection during the winter.

## Get Set For Old Fashion Ranch Day

"A Pioneer pushing westward left civilization behind, carving a place for it to follow. He tamed his land, dug a home and brought his family west." This quote from Gerry Burton in the RANCH RECORD for September typifies the spirit of the people who settled this area.

On the campus of Texas Tech University in Lubbock there is in the making a living outdoor museum dedicated to preservation of the history of this area. It is called Ranch Headquarters and completion is expected by the

beginning of the Bicentennial Celebration of the U. S. A. in 1976. It is of such magnitude and authenticity that it has been chosen by the Bicentennial Commission of the United States in Washington, D. C., as the official project to portray this part of the history of the entire south-west. Headquarters Association, which

includes our area, has been active in the project since the formation of the association. Each year the Snyder unit sponsors Ranch Day as part of its program

of furthering the preservation of the historic heritage of our area. The fourth annual Ranch Day is scheduled for September 30 in the Scurry County Coliseum.

Ranch Day in Snyder will feature booths and displays in keeping with the historic theme of the day. They will portray people doing work which was done by the early settlers such as baking, carving, weaving, and other activities. Hobby collections in keeping with the theme will be displayed. The coliseum will be open to the public from 3 o'clock until 7 P. M.

The 1972 Ranch Day will provide an opportunity to enjoy both history and entertainment in a western dramatic production directed by Charles Holland, assistant professor of speech and drama at Snyder's new Western Texas College.

A new book containing stories about ranching in the area will be introduced at Snyder's Ranch Day. It will tell authentic stories of some of the well known watering places and will include a map showing rivers, creeks, rivers and springs in this vicinity.

The Snyder unit of Ranch Headquarters Association will present the entertainment for the third annual meeting of the association at the Museum of Texas Tech in Lubbock on Saturday, October 7. A quilting exhibition, a Western Art Show, and fiddlers music will be other features of interest at the October meeting. The "period gun collections of several outstanding collectors will be on display. The well known saddle maker, Bert Schweitzer, will display saddles made by his father and give a demonstration of saddle making.

Featured also at the October 7 meeting in Lubbock will be a branding fire where small blocks of wood will be branded for souvenirs, a horseshoer at work, a blacksmith performing his forge, demonstrations of leather playing, whip making and rope plaiting.

Eleven buildings and 2 windmills are on the site at Headquarters. These are in varying stages of restoration. The windmills and six of the structures are now completely restored.

The latest acquisition by the Ranch Headquarters is the old Harrell House which was originally located five miles north-east of Snyder. It was donated by Myrtle and Faye Harrell and is an example of early housing in the area. It began as a one-room structure of stone in 1883. Later a wing of box and strip construction was added, between 1901 and 1912 a second box and strip wing completed the T-shaped structure. The Misses Harrells also donated the collection of furnishings. It will complement the first box and strip house placed at Ranch Headquarters which was acquired from Slaughter's Long S Ranch. Members of the Snyder unit were instrumental in providing furnishings for this structure.

Ranch Day in Snyder on September 30 promises again to be an enjoyable occasion as well as a productive enterprise toward furthering the preservation of our colorful heritage. On completion, the Ranch Headquarters in Lubbock will not only be an exhibit for the Bicentennial visitors; it will be a living museum where future generations can "see it like it was". The Snyder unit is to be commended for their diligent efforts and contributions on behalf of this project.

The National Society Daughters of the American Revolution is one of the organizations of the country that is taking an active part in preparations for the Bicentennial of the United States of America. Anne Pettus Shelburne Chapter of Rotan, with Mrs. J. L. McCright as chairman of the Bicentennial Committee, has included Ranch Headquarters as a chapter project. (The foregoing information is submitted by the Chapter.)

## Accent on Health

Immunization records, primarily of concern only to doctors, patients and parents in the past, have taken on extreme significance under the new compulsory school immunization law, says the Texas State Department of Health.

Also of more urgency now is the keeping of records for pre-schoolers. Pre-schoolers who attend a child care center are included under provisions of new laws which become effective January 1. Immunization records will be their ticket into regular school later on.

Public health experts point to the incidence of communicable disease among younger children in stressing the need for early immunization. Since immunizations will be needed later on anyway, health experts recommend starting a program early in the life of each child.

The importance of accurate, current and certified records will be brought home to you in a hurry if your youngster is ready for school or kindergarten. The health record can be of permanent value for the children's school records, insurance data and your family doctor's use.

Since many types of personal immunization records are in current use, any document listing each immunization received by year will be acceptable during the 1971-72 school year for either initiating or updating school immunization records.

Signature or rubber-stamp validation of personal records by physicians or public health clinics is recommended but not required until the summer semester of 1972, after which validation of new records is required.

Many forms on which to keep personal immunization records are available, but you can keep all vital information in a tablet or notebook if desired. This can be taken with you on each trip to a doctor or health clinic for recording of the date, type of immunization and doctor's signature.

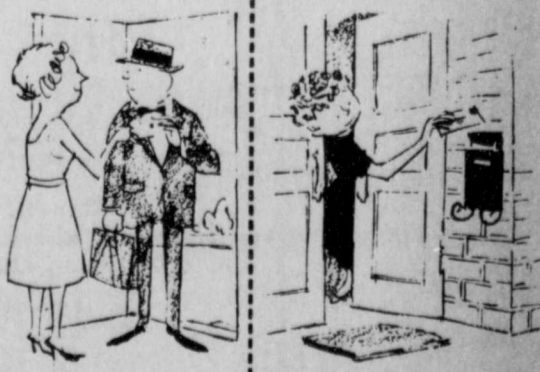
Make a section for each family member, listing birth date and place of birth and other pertinent information such as the presence of a chronic illness, physical handicap, allergies and RH factor if it is present.

The health record should include a check list of diseases which each family member has had and the dates. Have a section for immunization records of such diseases as measles, mumps, polio, whooping cough, diphtheria, tetanus, and rubella. Allow room for boosters.

Also write down any serious illnesses, accidents, surgical procedures and instances of hospitalization, including dates. Finally list the family's health and accident insurance information for quick and easy reference.

### What Did He Mean by That?

ONE of the main sources of difficulty in dealing with people lies in our use of language. In technical papers, scientists usually use words with a high degree of precision. They have, in effect, a language which is not capable of deliberate misinterpretation. This is not true in all the three ways in which language is used. 1) We use language to convey factual information. "The controller's report shows that you ran \$1,012.83 behind in your budget." Language is used here to convey facts and we can communicate without getting upset or resentful. 2) We use language to convey sentiments and emotions. "You were pretty sloppy in your handling of the budget!" Notice that I did not preface my remarks with "I think". The statement has the appearance of a statement of fact. The word "sloppy" is emotionally charged. In short, the statement hardly makes you want to be cooperative. The key: try to listen to what the speaker means, not merely to what he says. They may be different. 3) We use language as a tool for building our egos. The person that says "I really told the boss off" is not necessarily relating all the facts, but he is building up his own self-esteem. Dr. Merritt A. Williamson

**1040 U.S. Individual Income Tax Return Taxpayers Ask IRS**

This column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U.S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

**Q** I understand that many taxpayers can claim a "special withholding allowance" to reduce the amount of tax withheld from their pay. Does this mean that they can claim an additional exemption when they file their tax return?

**A** No. The "special withholding allowance" is like an additional exemption, but for withholding purposes only. You may not claim the additional exemption on your tax return. A special withholding allowance should not be confused with the personal exemption or dependency exemption. The latter may be claimed only for the taxpayer himself or for each of his dependents.

**Q** Is it true that employed taxpayers with child care expenses may get a larger deduction next year?

**A** Yes. The Revenue Act of 1971 has greatly liberalized the deduction for care of children and disabled dependents and spouses. Beginning in 1972, certain taxpayers will be able to deduct up to \$400 per month for household and dependent care expenses. However, taxpayers with adjusted gross incomes of more than \$18,000 for the tax year, must reduce the otherwise allowable amount by 50 cents for each dollar of adjusted gross income over \$18,000. For example, a taxpayer with an adjusted gross income of \$20,000 might be limited to \$9,800 for the year (the maximum annual deduction of \$4,800 less one-half of \$2,000) if he made payments for these expenses incurred during the year of at least \$400 for every month. To qualify, a taxpayer must be gainfully employed and provide over one-half the cost of maintaining his household that includes a dependent child under 15, a disabled dependent of any age, or his disabled spouse. These qualifications apply to both husband and wife when the taxpayer is married. For more information on child care deductions, write your Internal Revenue district office for a free copy of IRS Publication 553, "Highlights of 1971 Changes in the Tax Law."

**Q** Is the cost of sending a handicapped dependent to a special school a deductible medical expense?

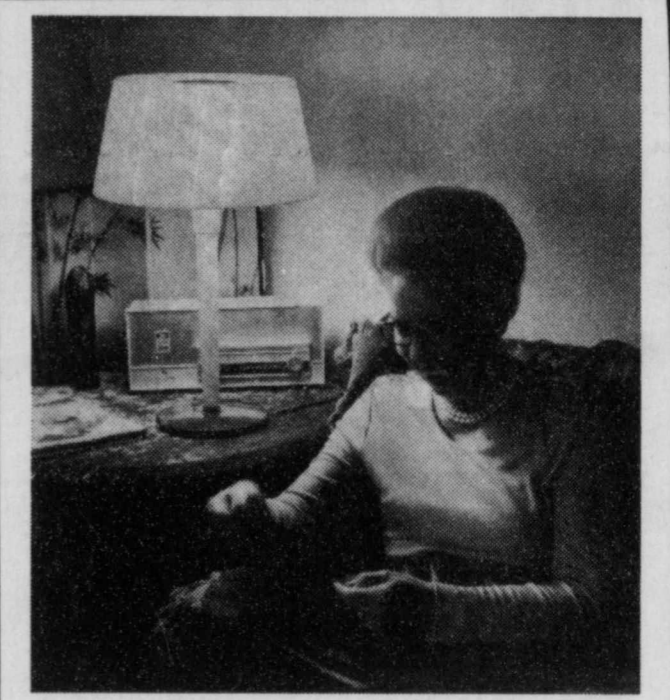
**A** Yes, if the taxpayer itemizes deductions and does not claim the expense as a child or disabled dependent care deduction, payments for sending a mentally or physically handicapped dependent to a special school are medical expenses if the principal reason for his attendance is the institution's resources for alleviating the handicap. For example, the cost of sending a blind child to a school to learn braille, or a deaf child to learn lipreading, are medical expenses. They may be included with other medical and dental expenses which are deductible to the extent they exceed three percent of the taxpayer's income. In addition, the cost of meals and lodging supplied by the institution, and of ordinary education furnished incidental to the special services may be deductible.

**Q** I received a cash award from my employer because a suggestion of mine was adopted. Is the award taxable?

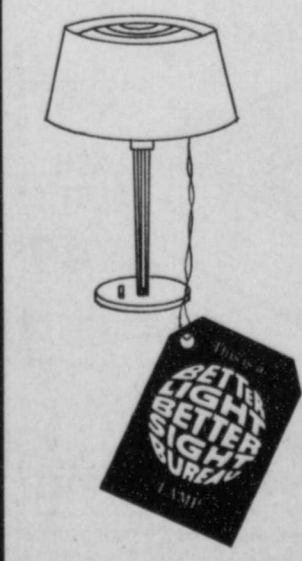
**A** Yes. An award or bonus given employees for work achievements or suggestions is taxable.

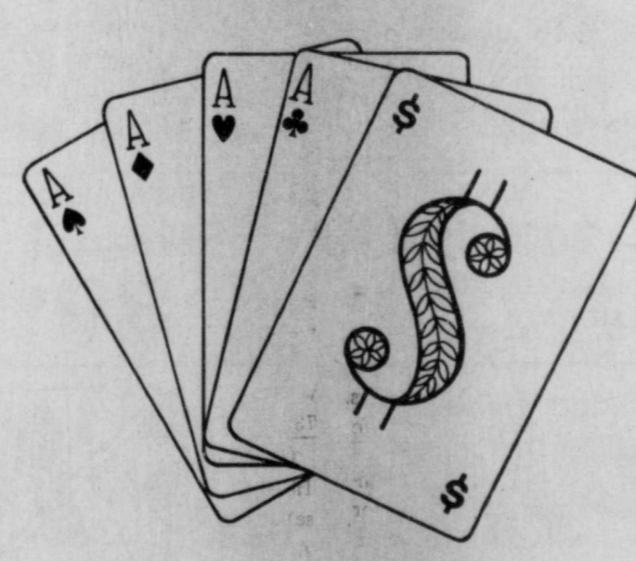
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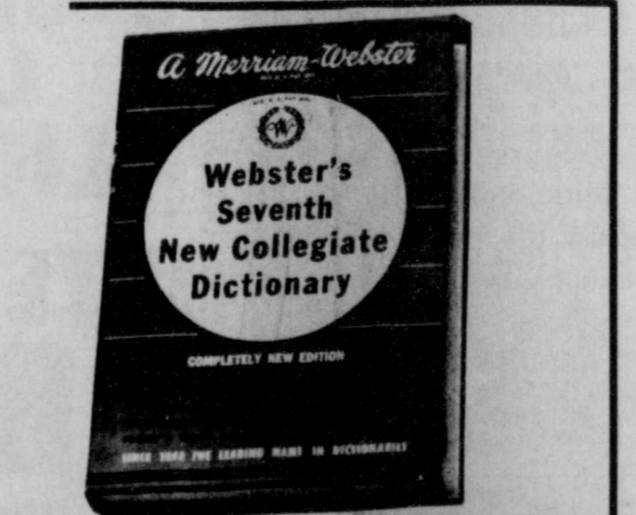
