\$339,900.00 Contract Awarded

NEW COURT HOUSE CONSTRUCTION COULD BE FINISHED IN ONE YEAR

The Fisher County Commissioners officially accepted a bid from C. B. Oates Construction Company in Abilene for \$339,900.00 as the general contractor on the construction of the new Fisher County Court House. All offices should be moved to their temporary headquarters by the end of this week and destruction of the old court house is expected to begin around September 20, 1972. Commissioners spent a few anxious moments in waiting last Monday morning on a decision from Dallas concerning the absence of Commissioner Thurman Terry. He has been hospitalized recently in Abilene and

special measures had to be taken in order for all the legal papers to be initiated and signed. C. B. Oates Construction was low bidder on the construction and estimated 330 working days for completion. His bid listed \$203,500.00 for material and \$136,400 for labor on the job. Others bidding on the construction job included: Alston Construction Company, Commercial Construction Company, Haney & Spivey Construction Company, Burl Nash Construction Company, C. M. Phare Construction Company, Rose & Sons, Inc., and Rouse and Parsons Construction. The motion to officially award

the contract was made by Wayne Porter and seconded by E. J. Kiker. A delegation of four interested citizens from Wayne Porters precinct appeared before the court asking that something be done about the poor conditions of the roads in their area. Those present included Forrest Hunsaker, Truitt Strickland, Vernon Surratt and R. L. Yantis. Hunsaker remarked that he had been waiting for 25 years to get something done to the roads and the reason that they weren't fixed in the past was always money. He remarked that he was under the impression that the County had the money to

fix the roads now. Hunsaker indicated that because of the poor conditions of the roads a family working for him has had to move to town. Vernon Surratt was concerned about the huge amount of water being "dumped" into his yard and onto the feedlot after a rain. He remarked that he was not asking for any special treatment, but that he would like something done to the road. Commissioner Porter cited lack of gravel and right of way problems as one of the prime reasons for the road being in the condition that it is now. He assured the group that something would be done about the road

before the end of the year. Commissioners Kiker and Ford volunteered to assist Commissioner Porter in the near future in making an attempt to get the roads in that area in repairable condition. All commissioners seemed to agree that this was one of the hardest hit areas in the county after the recent heavy rains. Commissioners passed a resolution that was read by County Attorney Rudy V. Hamric asking Senator John Tower and Senator Lloyd Bentsen to return county business to the county. This was in reference to the recent ruling by Federal District Judge Sarah Hughes in Dallas concerning the Dallas Legal Services Project

and strict requirements for County jails. The motion to pass the resolution was made by E. J. Kiker and seconded by A. J. Ford. Commissioners also heard a request by Louis Johnson, a resident of the east section of Fisher County, asking that the court grant his organization water right of ways on several roads. They intend on constructing a water line to the area from Hamlin. Final action was the approval of commissioners to purchase a new 930 Wheel Loader for A. J. Ford's precinct. Cost was \$29,447.00. After trade-in the net cost was \$20,000.00.

Judy Van Liew Named New FCYH President

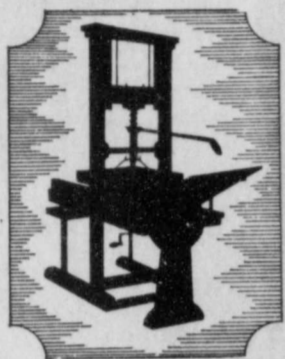

Roby Lions Roar Past Sweetwater "B" 42-6

The Roby Lions scored a very respectable victory over the Sweetwater "B" team last Saturday night by completely dominating the contest. Roby scored a morale boosting 42 points while holding their opponents to only 6 points for the evening. The entire Roby squad looked extremely sharp and well conditioned and could finish the season much higher than predicted, if they continue to play the type football they displayed on a packed Roby cheering section last Saturday night.

Mark Kiser took the opening kickoff at the 19-yard line and returned it to the 30 before being stopped. The Lions held the ball for 12 plays before being forced to punt on 4th and 11 from the Sweetwater "B" 46-yard line. Mark Kiser, Donnie Stephens, Pax Beauchamp and Robert Morgan picked up good yardage on Roby's first drive. Defensively for the Lions Mike Goodrum, Roy Rivas, Jimmy Reed, Dale Evers, Mark Kiser, Robert Morgan, Pax Beauchamp and Donnie Stephens lined up to hold off the first Sweetwater offensive attack. Both teams failed to score in the first quarter. First quarter highlights were fine offensive and defensive plays by Donnie Stephens and David Clark. Roby's first score came early in the second quarter and was a result of a roughing the kicker penalty called against Sweetwater for roughing Robert Morgan. Mark Kiser raced 41 yards then Donnie Stephens picked up 3 yards to give Roby a 2-7 at the Sweetwater 25-yard line. Frank Castor replaced Jimmy Reed at end and three plays later Donnie Stephens scored on a 7 yard sweep off left end. Morgan kicked the extra point giving Roby a 7-0 lead. Roy Rivas and David Clark jarred a Sweetwater runner causing him to fumble with 9:00 left in the second quarter. The fumble was recovered by Manuel Lujan. Roby could not capitalize on the fumble recovery and was forced to punt. On the punt re-

tained Pax Beauchamp belted the runner causing him to fumble and Roby was on their way to a second score. The second score came with 6:35 left in the half. Mark Kiser scored on a 5-yard drive over the right tackle. (CONTINUED TO PAGE 4)

Rotan School Board Talks Of New Bus Storage Site

Rotan School Board members discussed the possibility of purchasing the old Garland Furniture Store building on the east end of Snyder Avenue for a school bus storage site, at the regular Rotan School Board meeting held last Monday night. Superintendent K.C. McCasland indicated that he had received approval from Austin to use transportation fund money for a bus shed. Board members discussed the feasibility of securing the building, repairs that would have to be made, and agreed to postpone action until after the Superintendent had conferred with the building owner and board members had inspected the building.

K. C. McCasland reported to the Board on a recent meeting of the Advisory Committee for Title I. Those present at the

board meeting included John Pearson, S. Sepada and Thomas Yanez. Those absent were J. D. Sharp and Eugene Powell Sr. Dr. Jerry Marshall made a motion seconded by Bobby Smith to accept a 2-year contract with Pritchett and Abbott for appraisal services. The contract was for the same 4¢ per \$100,00 valuation as the previous contract.

The board members discussed enrollment, fireproof storage facilities for the school tax office, the football field P. A. system and transfer students at the Monday night meeting.

K. C. McCasland reported to the board on the new air conditioning system installed in the lunchroom. The job, awarded to an Anson firm after a low bid of \$1,891.00, is fully completed and in excellent work-

ing condition. Others bidding on the job were Abilene Sheet Metal, \$2,200.00; and Joe Kiker for \$2,065.00.

Final action of the evening was centered around discussion to change the monthly board meeting time from 8:00 P. M. to 7:00 p. m. until further notice.

WHY I AM NOT A CAMPBELLITE

An age old fallacy of man is that, when he cannot make a rational defense of a position he adheres to, he often resorts to name calling to divert the attention from himself and in an attempt to discredit his opponent. Such is often the case with our religious neighbors and their usage of the term "Campbellite."

More often than not the name is spoken in derision and calculated to irritate or agonize and belittle the one being so called. The greater one reacts to being called "Campbellite," the greater the delight and persistence of the caller.

Generally the caller, in this age at least, doesn't know what a "Campbellite" is supposed to be (just that it must be bad). He doesn't know who Campbell was or what he stood for or whether his name was "John" or "Joe." He just heard someone else (probably some denominational preacher trying to shore up his position through use of prejudice) dub someone as "Campbellite."

Thus, he too, takes up the practice of name calling unaware that this only tends to reveal his own lack of knowledge and the weakness of his own position.

Understanding the foregoing, I have never felt greatly disturbed when someone calls me "Campbellite." But in behalf of those sincere persons earnestly seeking to know God's truth and interested in seeing the true issues without the clouds of sophistry, I simply affirm, "I am not a Campbellite" and here are the reasons why.

I am not a "Campbellite" because Campbell did not die for my sins (I Cor. 1:13; I Pet. 3:18).

I am not a "Campbellite" because there is no salvation in the name Campbell (Acts 4:12).

I am not a "Campbellite" because I cannot read about any such people as "Campbellites" in the New Testament (I Cor. 4:6ASV; 2 Jn. 9; I Pet. 4:11).

I am not a "Campbellite" because the Bible condemns such human designations as being divisive and carnal (I Cor. 1:10-13; 3:3-4).

I am not a member of the "Campbellite church" because there is no such institution found in the Bible.

I am not a member of a "Campbellite church" because if such institution could be found in existence, it would be no part of the New Testament church.

I am not a member of any "Campbellite church" because the Lord didn't build it and "except the Lord build the house, they labor in vain that build it" (Psa. 127:1).

I am not a "Campbellite" because I am a Christian.

To sum it up, I am not a Campbellite for the very same reason that I am not a Baptist, Methodist, Lutheran, Presbyterian, Catholic, etc.

I earnestly desire a day in which men would, laying down their party names and human doctrines, go back to the word of God and stand united in the doctrine of Christ and under the name of Christ.

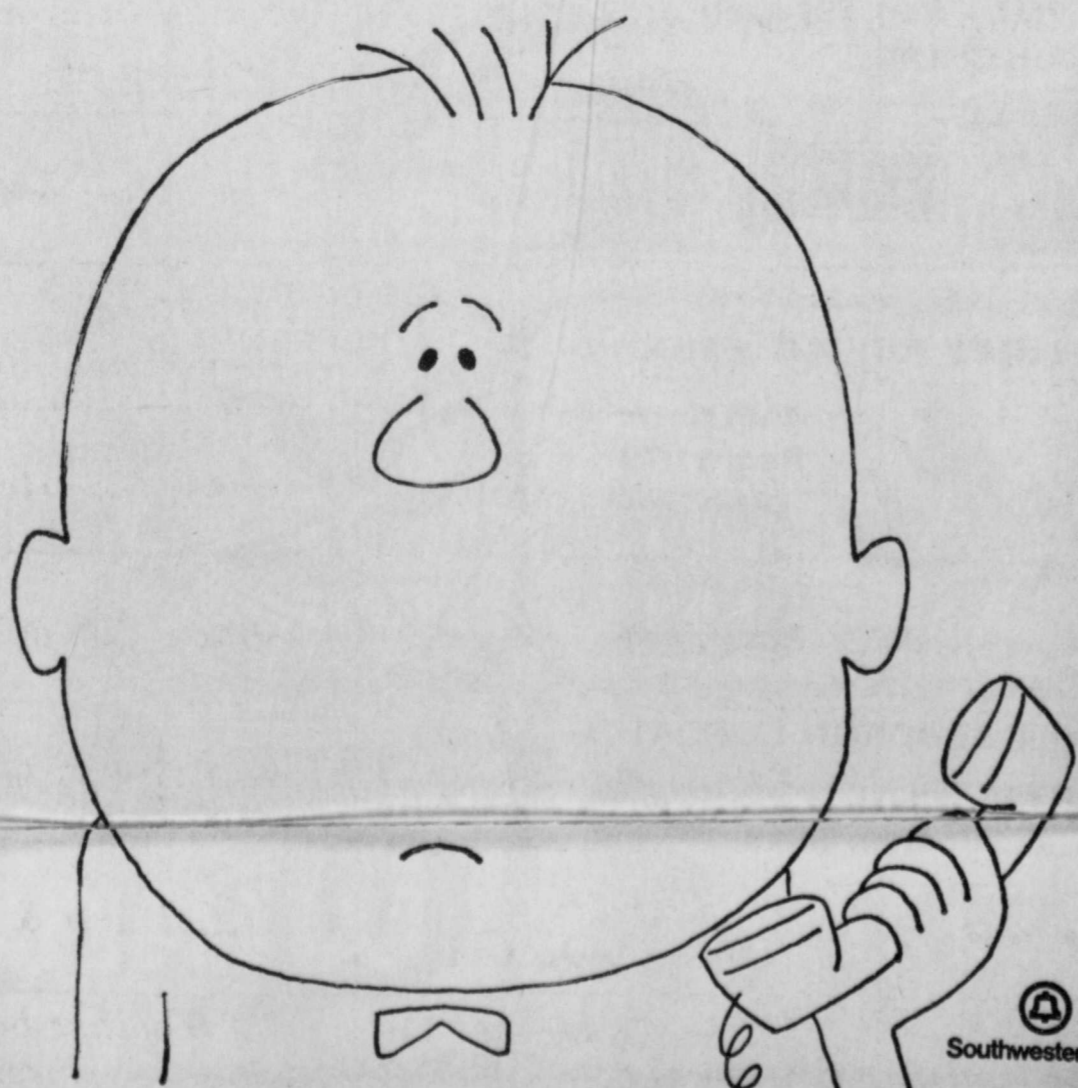

City Trash Pick-up Will Begin In Roby November 1

Members of the Roby City Council have set a tentative date of November 1, 1972 to initiate their new city-wide trash collection. Mayor Cecil King and Commissioners Jimmy Hayes and Jimmy Price seemed excited about the new service to be offered by the City. Although a set figure has not been established for residential charge, the commissioners seemed to be leaning toward \$2.50 for the approximate 300 residential pickups and a minimum of \$3.50 for businesses. The business rate will be scaled upward according to the amount of trash collected and the time it takes to accomplish the job. The commissioners will in all likelihood vote to pick up residential debris on a weekly basis and make daily business runs.

Roby City Commissioners signed a swimming pool note for \$2,000.00 which represents the final payment on the swimming complex. They paid \$2,000.00 in principal this year and \$200.00 in interest to Citizens State Bank. Swimming pool receipts for the 1972 year amounted to \$978.25 with season ticket receipts in the amount of \$355.00. In order to pay the note and interest on the pool for 1972 the commissioners had to transfer \$875.00 from the general fund.

Mayor King reported that approximately \$5,198.31 in delinquent taxes had been collected, leaving some \$3,000.00 outstanding from the total of \$8,200.00. The commissioners voted unanimously to uphold the decision of the equalization board concerning adjustment of taxes. Jimmy Price made the motion that was seconded by Jimmy Hayes. The general feeling was that the equalization board did an outstanding job and was fair and reasonable in all respects.

A long discussion on junked vehicles, revenue sharing and a non-discrimination policy took place before the 2-hour meeting broke up.

Rotan recorded its first fumble of the season. Summers was trying to pick up a first down on 3rd and 5 from the 30.

On Hamlin's first touchdown drive William Cleveland stopped Hamlin's Joe Mays for a 2-yard loss then David Markham and Joe Murphree nailed Cork for a three yard loss. With 3rd and 15 from the 36-yard line Bruce Jones tackled the ball carrier but he alertedly pitched back to another Piper runner that carried down to the two yard line. Johnnie Jones scored Hamlin's first touchdown, running over right end with 1:13 left in the first quarter. The kick by Jim Johnson failed.

Summers took Hamlin's kick at the 10-yard line and darted to the 22 before being stopped, Summers carried on the next three plays, but the Hammers were forced to kick on 4th down as reserve quarterback Joe Vann came in to call signals on Pearson's punt.

The first quarter of a ction ended 6-0 in favor of the Pied Pipers.

Jack McCall, Marsh Hill and William Cleveland made key tackles on the following series forcing Hamlin to punt on 4th down.

The Hammers picked up 3 first downs on the next possession, Jones, Markham, Duke and Summers picked up good yardage along the way but had to punt on 4th down after a Jones to Markham pass fell incomplete. With 1:03 seconds remaining to play in the first half, Rotan took over the ball deep in their territory but could not muster an effective drive.

Rotan gave the ball over to the Pied Pipers who maintained possession for two plays before fumbling thus enabling the Hammers' Summers and Duke to start toward the first Rotan score of the night.

William Duke carried the ball over right guard from 2 yards out with 8:55 remaining in the 3rd quarter to put Rotan on the scoreboard, Duke ran the extra point play over right tackle, giving the Hammers an 8-6 lead.

Their lead lasted exactly 13 seconds. On the kickoff Hamlin's Milton Jones took the ball on the 22 yard line and faked to two runners giving it to Bill Cork the third man by, who raced for 78 yards and the score. The play was well executed and gave Hamlin the lead 12-8 after McCall, Markham and Cade stopped the extra point run.

The Yellowhammers took the lead back with 1:55 remaining in the 3rd period. The TD drive began with Ken Smith taking the Hamlin punt and returning it to the 50-yard line, Summers got the first two calls from scrimmage then Duke carried 5 straight times to get the ball down to the 21-yard line. Summers picked up 8 yards over the right side of the line then beautifully picked his hole on the next play to put the Hammers in front 14-12. David Markham ran the extra point play that gave Rotan a 16-12 lead.

Ken Smith recovered an on side kick following Summers touchdown drive but the drive ended on the 31 yard line of Hamlin when Duke fumbled with 3 seconds remaining in the 3rd quarter.

Rotan's next TD came with 8:25 remaining in the game. Neal Summers darted over from 20 yards out giving Rotan a 10 point lead.

Hamlin looked strong midway through the 4th period and managed to come within striking distance of the Hammers when they scored their final points with 6:54 left in the game. The game ended with Rotan scoring its first victory of 1972 by defeating the Pied Pipers 22-18.

The Rotan squad will be at home this week with Anson in a game scheduled to start at 8:00 p. m.

Preamble To The Constitution

We the people of the United States, in order to form a more perfect Union, establish justice, insure domestic tranquility, provide for the common defense, promote the general welfare, and secure the blessings of liberty to ourselves and our posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America.

The United States Constitution is the supreme law of the land. It establishes the form of the United States' government, and the rights and liberties of the American people. It was adopted September 17, 1787. It consists of a preamble, 7 articles, and amendments which have been added since its adoption on September 17, 1787.

The framers of the Constitution could look back on all of English history since King John granted the Magna Charta in 1215 and on all of American history since the first assembly at Jamestown in 1619. The constitutional government of the United States emerged from a study of these hundreds of years of trial and error. The resulting document with its great principles has kept in tune with needs of an expanding nation. Amendments have expanded powers and base of the government but have not changed the basic structure.

By an Act of Congress and by proclamation of the President of the United States each year, the week from September 17 through 23 is observed as Constitution Week. It is sponsored each year by the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution.

In observing the week, we should remember the words of Daniel Webster: "It is the people's Constitution, the people's government, made for the people, and answerable to the people." It provides the foundation for a free prosperous life for all. However, this is true only if in each generation every citizen claims it and works for it. Through neglect or indifference these rights may be lost. The greatest need of America's citizens is to get back to a firm reliance on the protection of, and obedience to, Divine Providence.

Read the Preamble again and you will find within these words the ardent hope of the human heart, and the high aspirations of the human soul.

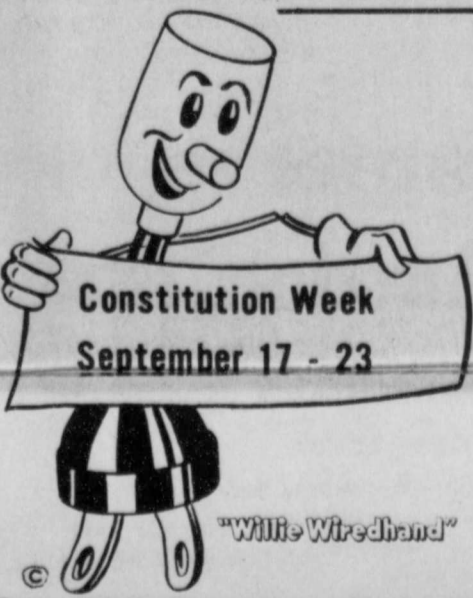

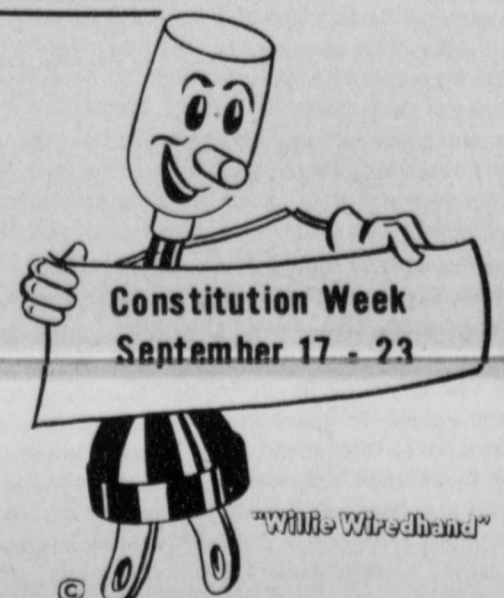

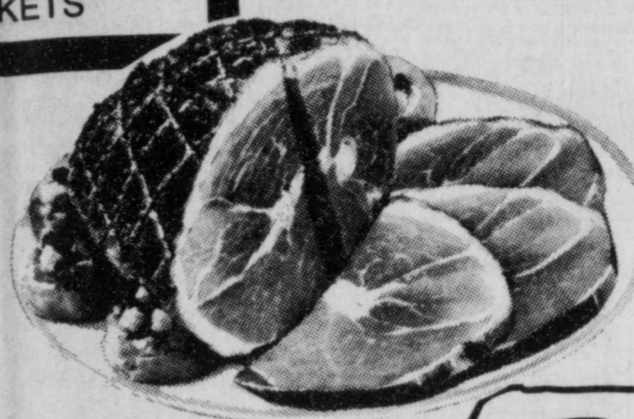
