# FISHER COUNTY GOLD STAR WINNERS ARE ANNOUNCED

## Audrey Carey

Audrey Carey has been named Fisher County Gold Star Girl for 1972, according to Mrs. Alice Balingier, Fisher County Extension Agent.

Audrey is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Alford Carey of Roby. She is a senior in Roby High School and a member of the Fisher County Junior Leaders 4-H Club. She has completed 4-H projects in Public Speaking, Food and Nutrition, Clothing, Food Preservation and Beef cattle.

She has won county awards in clothing, dairy foods, food and nutrition, achievement, beef cattle and public speaking.

This year she won county and District in Public Speaking in 4-H and went to State 4-H Round-up to participate in State Contests. In July she attended the 4-H Citizenship Shortcourse in Washington, D. C. She has served her 4-H Club as president, vice-president, secretary, reporter, and is at present a representative of the Fisher County 4-H Council to the District III 4-H Council.

Audrey is a member of the First Baptist Church of Roby, serves on the Youth Council of the church, assists with Vacation Bible School and went with a group from the local church to teach Vacation Bible School across the Rio Grande from Ft. Hancock this past summer.

She has served her class as president, secretary and reporter in school. She was selected

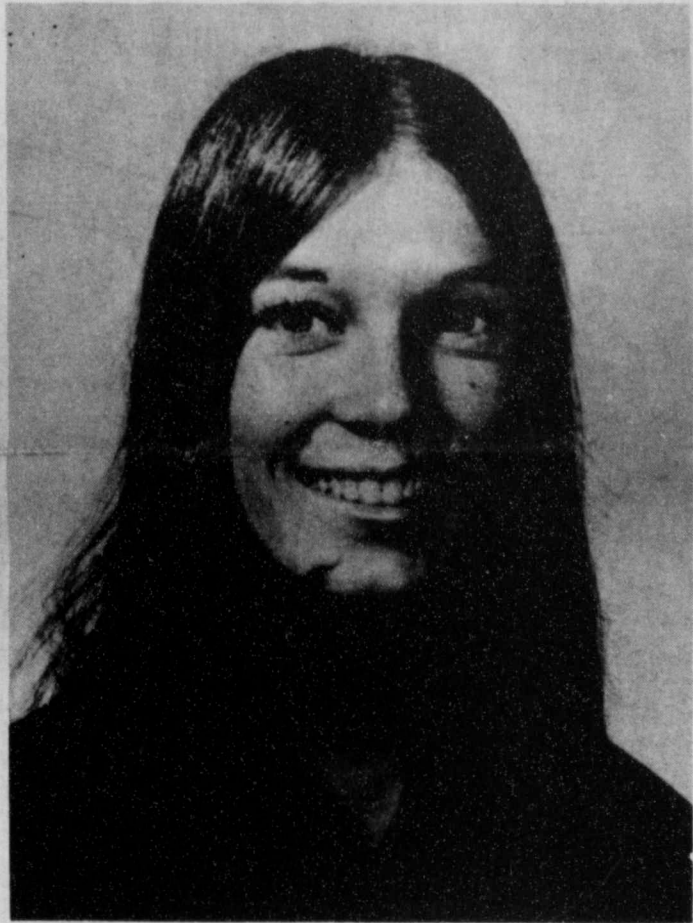
as class favorite, has been a twirler and this year is drum major for the Roby High School Band. She has been vice-president of the band and FHA. She also lettered two years in basketball.

James has done well in his lamb feeding program placing high at most of the major shows in Texas.

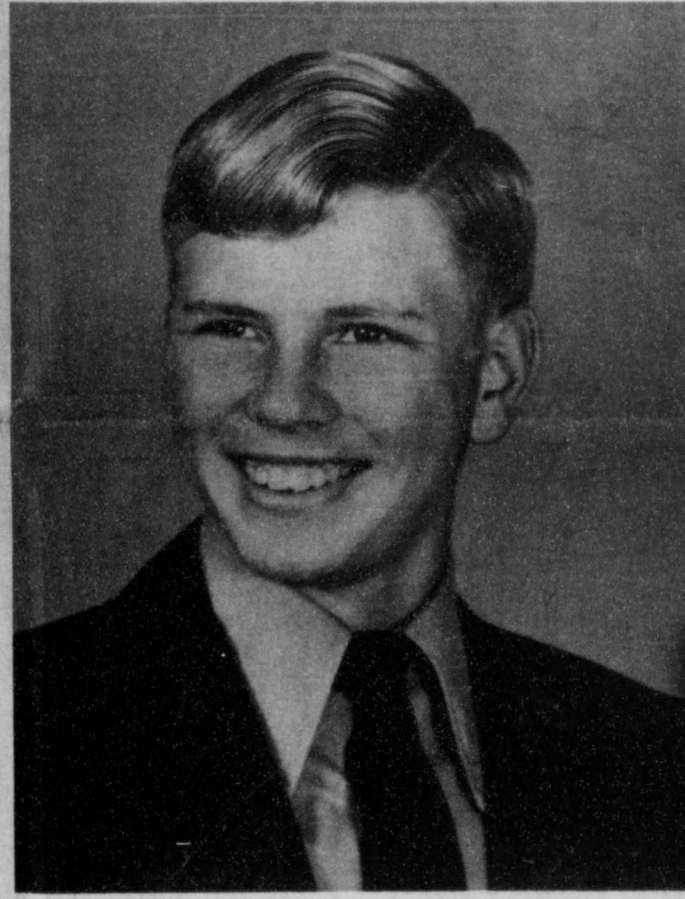
James has also been on livestock, dairy and soil judging teams during his 4-H career.

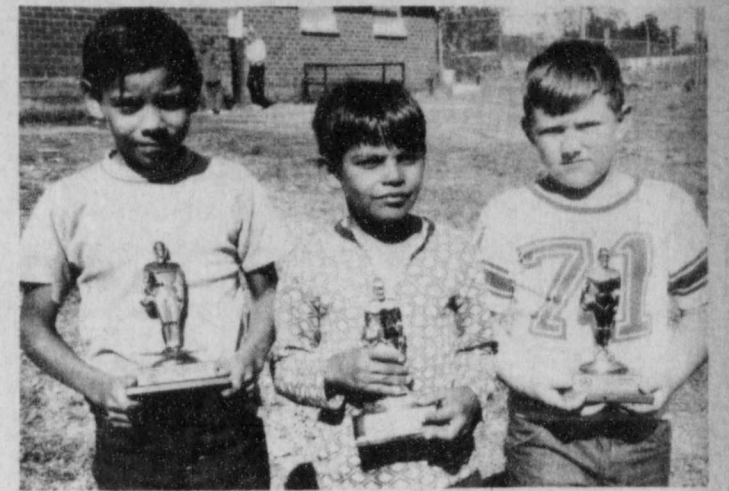
James has served as president, vice-president and Council Delegate for his 4-H club. He is currently a member of the Fisher County Junior Leaders 4-H Club.

James has been very dependable in his 4-H work, and truly deserves the county's highest 4-H award, according to Spencer.



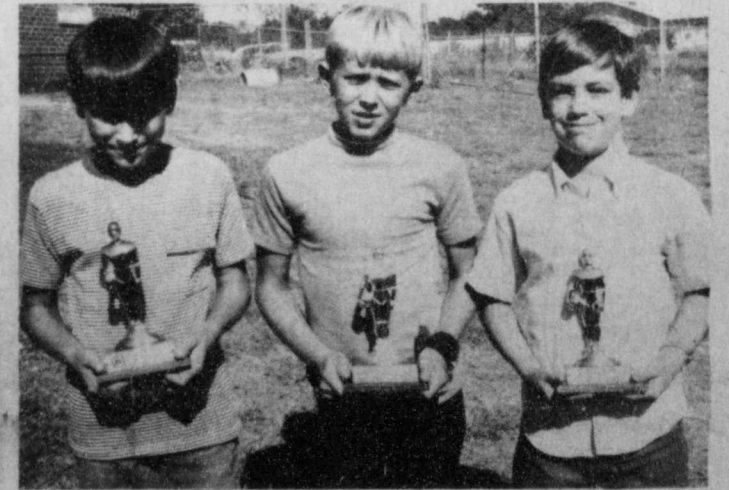

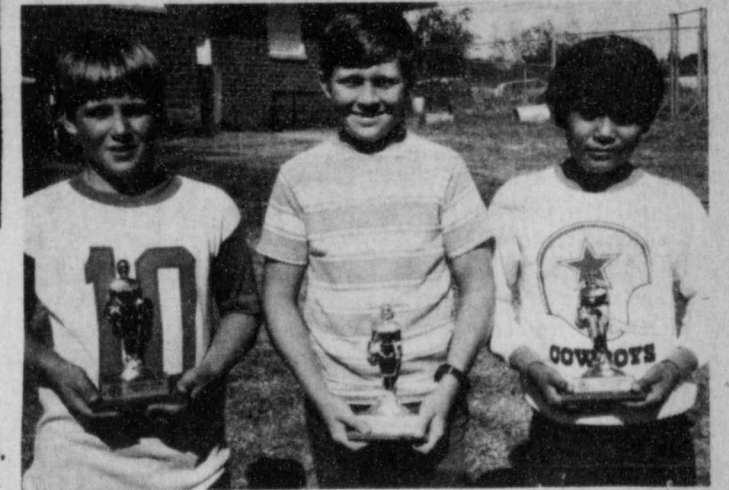
8-YEAR OLD WINNERS: Left to right, first place, Richard Mendoza; second place, Larry Ramirez; third place, Weldon Hayes.



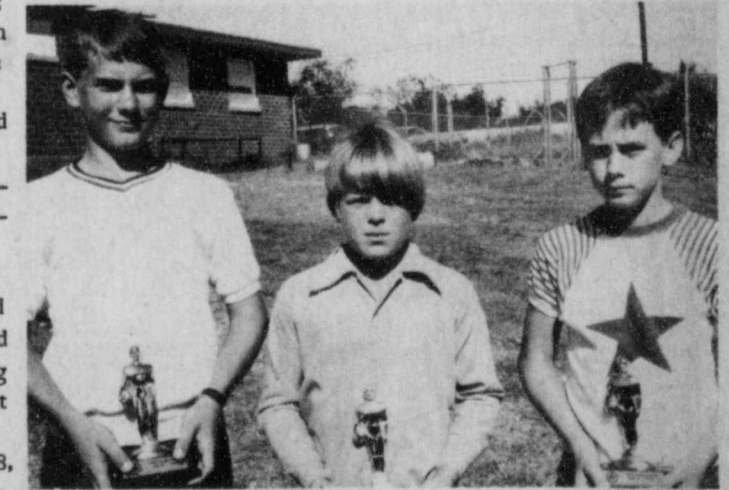
9-YEAR OLD WINNERS: Left to right, first place, Wesley Counts; second place, David Thornton; third place, Kip Pease.

## Yellowhammers Shock Spur Squad 39-0

The Rotan Yellowhammers stepped onto a chilly field last Friday night and in 48 minutes walked away with a most impressive 39-0 victory of Spur.

Game captains William Duke, Marsh Hill, and David Markham called the coin toss and won, electing to receive. Ken Smith took Spur's opening kick and returned to the 28 yard line. Neal Summers took the opening play from quarterback Bruce Jones and rambled 11 yards for a first down to the Hammer 39-yard line. On the next play David Markham bulled his way for 8 yards and William Duke gained 4 yards to the mid-field stripe. Summers picked up 9 yards in two carries trading off with his running partner Duke to carry the ball to the Bulldog 4-yard line. After 11 plays and 72 yards with less than 4 minutes expired on the clock Neal Summers ripped through the Spur line to give the Rotan eleven a 6-0 lead. The extra point attempt by Duke failed.

Joe Murphree decked fullback

Terry Jester on the Spur 38 yard line following Rotan's kick. On the Bulldog's first play from scrimmage William Cleveland, Neal Summers and Joe Murphree stopped wingback Calvin Walker for no gain. The Bulldogs tried to "quick kick" on third down but alert Mike Cade scooped up the pigskin and darted to the Rotan 25 before being stopped.

Neal Summers capitalized on the field position, given the squad by Cade, by sweeping over right end for his second score in less than 7 minutes, but a holding penalty nullified the 175 senior's second TD. A penalty and a few incomplete passes left the Hammers with 4th and 14 from the 39 and they were forced to punt.

Spur started their second offensive drive of the night from their own 18-yard line. On 4th and 5 from the 23 one overly anxious Yellowhammer picked up a roughing the kicker penalty that gave Spur a 1st and 10 from the 48. Spur could only

manage to lose 9-yards in the next 3 offensive plays and once again faced a punting situation. The Hammers showed no signs of being "snake bitten" on the previous roughing the kicker call as William Duke & Company charged the punter, successfully blocked the punt and had it recovered by Mike Cade.

Cade once again set his team up in good scoring position with a 1-10 from the 20 yard line. David Markham and Neal Summers both picked up 5 yards apiece but it was William Duke that charged the last 10 yards into the end zone to give Rotan a 12-0 lead. Spur ran one offensive play before officials signaled the end of the first quarter of action.

Terry Jester picked up Spur's first 1st down of the evening before being stopped at the mid-field stripe by Mike Cade, Marsh Hill, William Duke and Ken Smith.

Earl Ray Pearson shopped a sweep around left end on second down forcing Spur's quarterback

to the air on 3rd down. Neal Summers intercepted that pass, giving his team mates possession on the 34 yard line.

With 7:15 remaining on the clock in the first half of action, the Hammers were forced to punt after a run by Duke and 2 incomplete passes left the Rotan eleven with a 4th and 18 from the 36.

Jack McCall, Earl Leach and Joe Murphree forced Spur to punt again after three unsuccessful cracks at the Hammer defensive wall.

Neal Summers took the punt and returned it to the 32-yard line then picked up 13 yards and a first down on the following play to give Rotan the ball at the 45-yard line.

Duke rambled to the Spur 48, Summers on three straight calls, carried to the 27 and David Markham darted over center to the 14 yard line setting up the TD. With 3:01 left in the first half, Junior Quarterback Bruce Jones bootlegged around left end for

## Lions Edged Out By Munday In Second Half

The Munday Moguls, trailing 21-8 at the half, rallied for 18 points in the second half to take a 26-21 victory Friday night over host Roby in non-conference play.

The victory was the first of the year for the Moguls, now 1-2 while the host Lions fell to 2-2.

The Lions, coming up with alert defensive plays throughout the first half, held the Moguls until the District 7A representatives used the pass in the fi-

nal half for the comeback win.

Roby, of District 3B, got on the board first, Steve Pumbley recovered a Munday fumble at the Mogul 22-yard line to get the Lions rolling. Lujan then carried the ball for a three yard gain. Mark Kiser ran to the 12 yard line for a Roby first down.

After two more plays, fullback Robert Morgan, 6-0, 170 pound senior, cracked over from the 8-yard line with 8:55 remaining in the first period, Morgan then toed his own PAT kick and Ro-

by led 7-0.

However, Munday used a bit of aerial trickery early in the second period to take an 8-7 lead with 11:35 showing.

Roby's Dale Evers plunged through midway through the 2nd period to block a Munday punt. The ball went up for grabs and Morgan, who picked up 21 yards

extra point, but it sailed wide and Roby held a 13-8 lead with 8:45 on the clock.

The Lions then pushed their lead to 21-8 with 2:10 remaining in the first half. Senior halfback Mark Kiser, with 26-yards on nine carries for the game, finished a 60 yard drive on 4 plays, scoring on a three yard scamper around left end. Morgan then passed to Kiser for the two bonus points.

The Moguls began their comeback with a 10-10 tie. Morgan kicked for the

## Editorial Comment

### \$44,000.00-Who Cares?

Who knows whether the Rotan City Councilmen will make the right choice.

In a very few days the councilmen will be called upon to make a decision whether or not to vote in a new city trash pick-up system. The cost has been estimated at \$44,000.00 and in our opinion, this is a very conservative estimate.

As a newspaper we like to feel that we are progressive. Firmly supporting those things that seem best for Fisher County and opposed to the ones that are not. We want to see Rotan move forward, but we feel there must be other priorities that \$44,000 can be spent on besides doing away with an existing system and replacing it with another.

This newspaper does not pretend to have any premonition on how the councilmen will vote, but we do hope that they will take into consideration the logical scheme of priorities when they make their final decision.

We just may need a new sewer system, or we could possibly consider paving some streets in the city limits before we pass on spending in excess of \$44,000.00 to implement a new trash pick up system and junking the old one.

Rotan may very well need a new trash pick-up system before we need a new sewer system, or some more paved streets in the city limits, or new and additional stop and yield signs in the city limits, or a teenage recreational hall, or additional city patrolmen, or salary increases for city employees, or more street lights, etc., etc., etc., who knows.

Every citizen of Rotan should care enough about this city to ask questions and let his feeling be known to city council members. Do we as a city have enough money to take on a \$44,000 obligation such as this one? Frankly, we don't know how the city stands financially. The city council should publish a financial statement each year listing the receipts and expenditures and the condition of the treasury; but, it doesn't because we as citizens don't care enough about the operation of the City of Rotan to ask questions.

Unofficially we are of the opinion that the City of Rotan is in great shape financially. We think that the City is in better shape now than they have ever been. We also feel like Rotan is fortunate to have a top notch Mayor and Council working for the best interests of the taxpayers.

We hope the "city fathers" don't rush into spending \$44,000 plus on a new sophisticated trash pick-up system just because of a report that it is working for the City of Abilene and City of Snyder.

The right choice may very well be for the councilmen to vote in the new system, who knows.

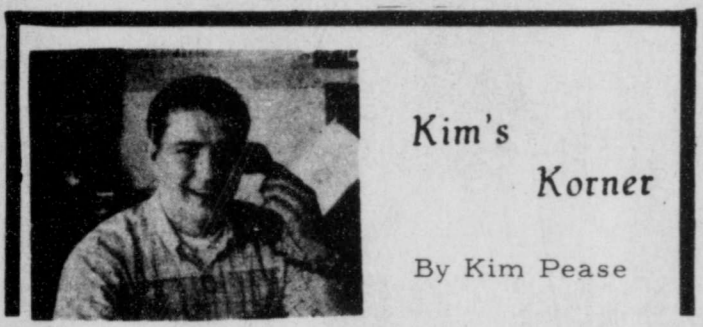

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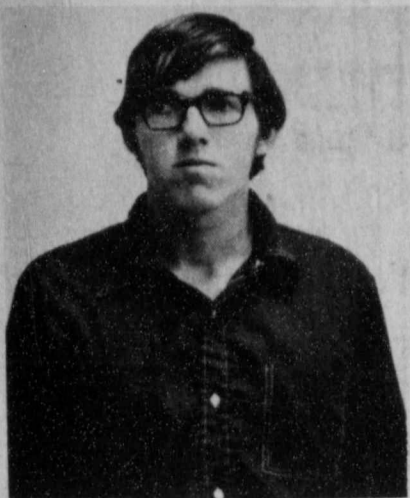

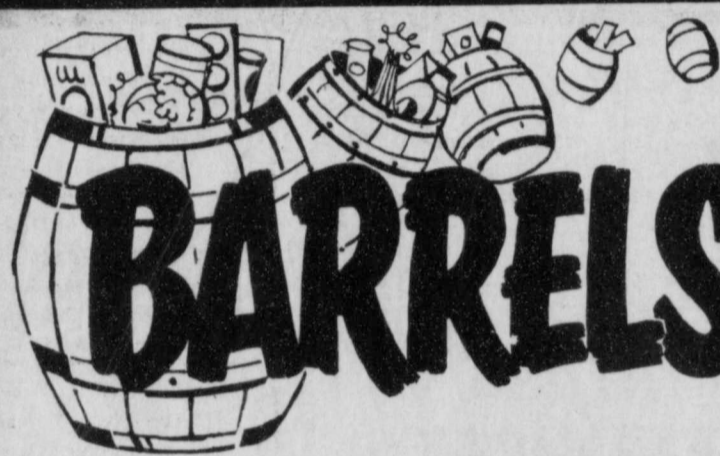
**Linda Lawlis-Roby**

## Fred Byerly...The Weatherman

The weather! Everybody talks about it, complains and speculates. Throughout the years it continues to be a theme for popular songs. We say, "This has been the hottest summer I've ever known, or the coldest winter, longest drought. . . ." Our recollections are often inaccurate because we are overly influenced by the present. No two people can agree, it seems, even on the amount of precipitation at any given time.

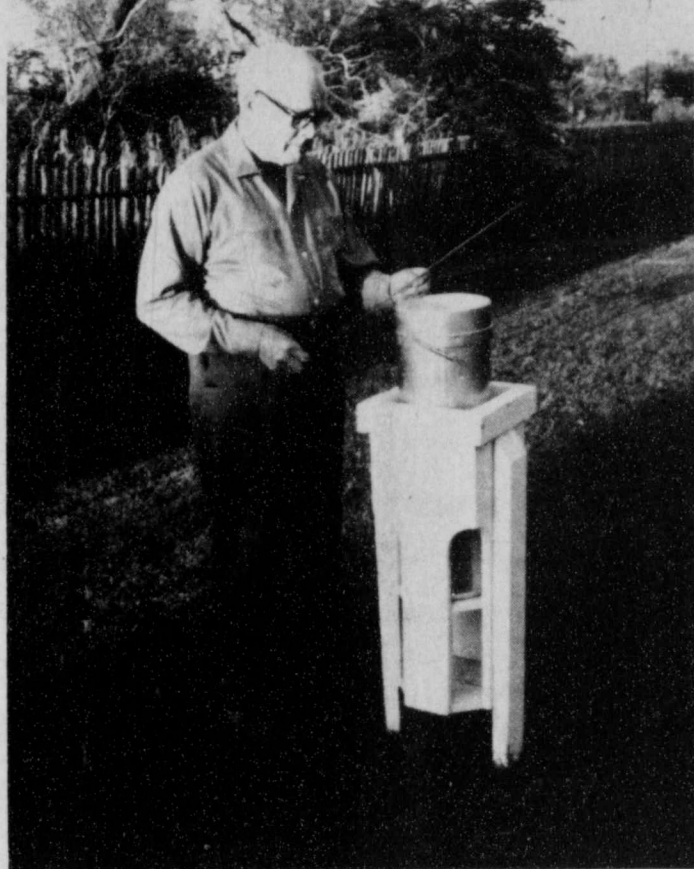
One resident of Fisher County is qualified to speak with authority regarding temperature and rainfall for this area. Recently Fred Byerly of Rotan received a letter which stated in part, "Sep-tember of this year marks your completion of 30 years as a cooperative weather observer. We join the Secretary of Com-merce, the Administrator of the National Oceanic and Atmos-pheric Administration, and the Director of the National Weather Service in congratulating you on this outstanding record of public service."

"Every day many organiza-tions and individuals in govern-mental activities as well as in private enterprises use the val-uable information made avail-able only through your efforts and wholehearted support."

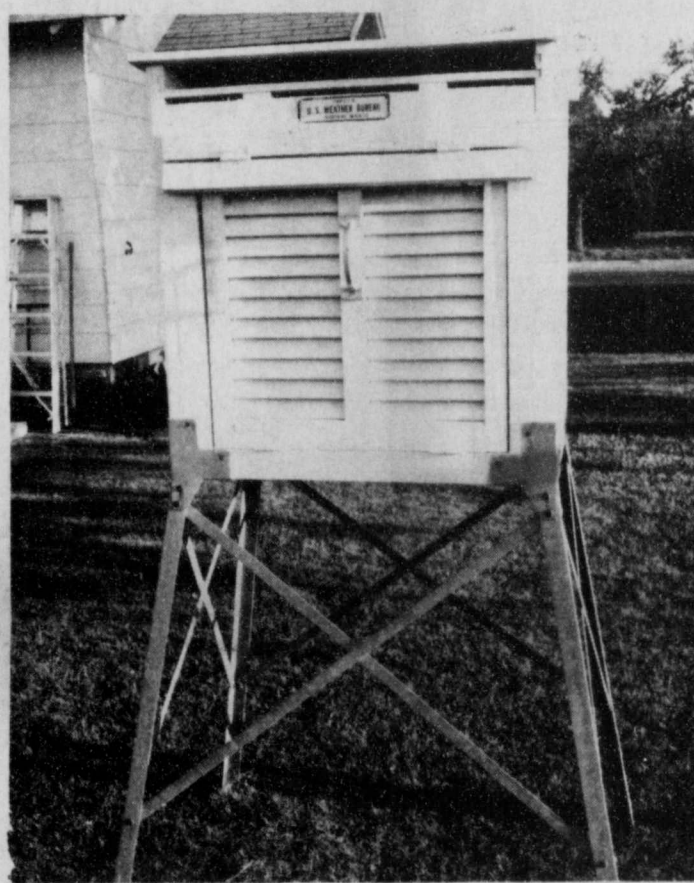
"Please accept the enclosed emblem as a small token of the high esteem with which your service is held. We hope you continue to find your weather work interesting and many more years are added to your worth-while record of public service."

The emblem referred to in the letter is an attractive lapel pin bearing an eagle, the num-ber 30 on a crest, and designat-ing government service. Mr. Byerly is getting quite a col-lection of them, each different in coloring and number of years service beginning with the fif-teenth and presented for each ad-ditional five years. He recalls the occasion of the presentation of the twenty-fifth year emblem when he appeared on television in Abilene, Mr. Sitchler of the Weather Bureau made the award. Area residents have been aware of the fact that Mr. By-erly had the official weather gauge but few realize the amount of time and dedication required for the accurate records he keeps. It is all volunteer ser-vice without remuneration and is an every day job. The official equipment includes two ther-mometers which register the high, low and present tempera-tures for each twenty-four hour

period. The rain gauge has been worked out and carefully in-spected to that it is the most accurate that can be found. Mr. Byerly keeps a daily record sheet showing the high and low temperatures as well as any precipitation that falls within the twenty-four hour period from 7 A.M. to 7 A.M. He also records the time rain begins to fall and when it ceases. Any time there

is as much as one-half inch he calls the Weather Bureau in Abilene. He notes if the day is clear, partly cloudy, or cloudy. He can also tell you when it thun-dered and didn't rain, when there was excessive wind and estimat-ed velocity, and storm damage in the area. The daily report is recorded on an official chart and sent each month to the Weather Office in Fort Worth. There, it becomes a part of the records of the National Weather Service.

When asked how he became involved in this volunteer work, Mr. Byerly said, "I more or less inherited it. A man at Clay-tonville who had kept the rainfall record for a long time gave it up in 1926. Lon Adams decided to take up the responsibility and I went with him to get the equip-ment. Later, when Lon moved away for a time, I was persua-ded to keep it. That was thirty years ago. I have the daily rain fall records from 1926, but have had the thermometers for only ten years."

One ponders why a person will devote so much time to a vol-unteer service. It is not for recog-nition because few people are aware of it at all. Mr. Byerly en-joys doing this because he knows it is beneficial for the country. He said, "At first I didn't know the data was used so widely. It is important in predicting the weather. County Agents use it for making a summary. I have been called on for information by the Soil Conservation Service, and West Texas Utilities. A num-ber of school groups have come to see the equipment. In some isolated instances, the records have been used in court cases where damage claims were de-pendent on moisture."

West Texas, of course, is noted for its unpredictable weather and many jokes have been told about it. Fred Byerly, even with his of-ficial knowledge, wouldn't ven-ture a forecast. According to Boyce House, noted recorder of many tall tales of Texas, "No one would predict weather in West Texas but newcomers or fools". Our official weather observer would qualify as neither.



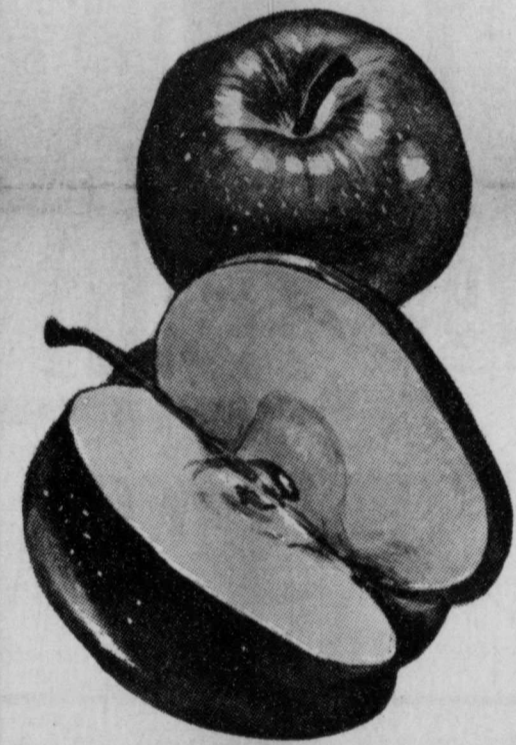
