# 73% OF COUNTY STUDENTS FAVOR NIXON-AGNEW

A survey was released last week by Larry Rose and George Price, Hobbs High School teachers, on student preference in the November election and also twelve issues ranging from sex education to the draft system. The survey was completed by Fisher County students in Rotan, Roby, Hobbs and McCaulley.

In the Presidential race Richard Nixon and Spiro Agnew collected 254 votes or 73% to George McGovern and Sargent Shriver 92 votes or 27%. In the heated senatorial race between John Tower and Barefoot Sanders the margin of difference was not as drastic as in the presidential poll. John Tower collected the votes of 157

students compared to Sanders' 177 votes. In the Texas Governors' race Dolph Briscoe walked away easily with 237 of the 344 votes. Republican Henry Grover polled 65 votes and Raul Muniz collected 42 votes. Issue #1 "Do you favor busing to gain inter-racial balance and desegregation in public schools?"

Of those 351 students completing the question, 252 voted no and 99 voted yes. The second issue read "Are you in favor of the death penalty?" A total of 344 students completed this question. There were 210 no and 134 yes votes. The third issue question asked "Are you in favor of granting amnesty or pardons to those men

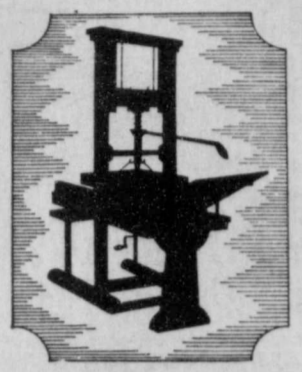
who would not serve in the military?" To this question 260 voted no and 82 voted yes. Seventy five percent or 260 students were not in favor of legalizing marijuana while 82 students voted that it should be legalized. Issue #5 on the student list was "Do you favor a withdrawal of all troops from Southeast

Asia?" There were 195 students voting yes and 133 voting no to this issue. "Do you think 18 year old should vote?" was issue number 6. A total of 332 students responded with 310 voting yes and 22 voting no. The 7th issue read "Do you think Texas should legalize horse racing?" Sixty eight per

cent of the students or 226 replied yes while 106 answered the question in the negative. Issue #8 involved gun control laws. "Are you in favor of stricter gun control laws?" To this question 205 voted that they were while 133 voted no. "Should sex education be taught in public schools?" was question number 9. A whopping 80% answered yes. A total of 67 students voted no while 270 were in favor of sex education in schools.

Question #10 asked "Should high school students be given a specific time to be at home at night?" Fifty seven percent of the students or 186 voted no while 139 replied yes. A majority of the students

polled felt that our present drug laws were inadequate and insufficient. "Do you think our drug laws are adequate or sufficient?" was the question. To this 186 students voted no while 146 voted in the affirmative. The final question was "Are you in favor of doing away with the draft system as a means of keeping an Armed Forces?" This question found Fisher County students voting 197 yes and 140 no. The poll was very complete in its final form. It broke each school down percentage wise on each issue and gave the percentage of boys in each school voting measured against the girls percentage vote.

### Farm Bureau OK's Protection Plan

The Fisher County Farm Bureau has adopted the new property protection plan offered by the Texas Farm Bureau, Horace Carter, Fisher County Farm Bureau president, announced. Effective November 1, 1972, all members who have the official "No Trespassing" signs posted on their property will be protected against trespass and other offenses. This reward program is provided by the Texas Farm Bureau and affiliated insurance companies. The new service provides for the posting of property according to the new anti-trespass law passed during the last regular session of the Legislature. A reward of \$200 is offered by the Texas Farm Bureau and Insurance Companies for information leading to the arrest and final conviction of persons committing trespass, felony theft, arson, or malicious mischief as defined by Article 1350 on property of a current Farm Bureau member. Each member will automatically have protection of the effective date provided he has properly posted his property. Signs will be available from the county Farm Bureau at a cost of \$1.00 each. In addition to the sign, the member may elect to purchase name plates that may be attached to the sign. These cost an additional \$1.00 each. Decals for automobiles will be provided at no cost to the member. The county Farm Bureau will be responsible for completing a form furnished to them for the purpose of reporting information leading to the arrest and final conviction under the program. The Farm Bureau insurance adjuster will investigate and send the report with further information to the state office. The \$200 check will be sent from the Texas Farm Bureau to the county Farm Bureau president who will deliver it to the property owner. There is no cost to the individual member for the protection except for the signs and optional name plates to be attached to the signs. The county Farm Bureau assumes the cost of the program for each current member of the organization not having a fire or casualty policy with the Texas Farm Bureau Insurance Companies.

### Wilfong Shows Reserve Champion County 4-H Members Place High At Texas State Fair

A 12 year old Fisher County 4-H member, Clay Wilfong, showed his 1090 pound Angus steer, Stag, to Reserve Champion honors at the State Fair of Texas Junior Steer Show held in Dallas October 18. The steer was named 1st place winner in the heavy weight Angus class and the Champion Angus and then Reserve Champion of the entire show. The steer was bred by J.H. Strain of Haskell and came off the Half Moon Ranch in Fisher County managed by Ed Wilfong. The steer sold for \$2700 to Jesse Roach, president of the Cattleman's Steak House. Others placing high in steer classes were Dale Wilfong 4th and Audrey Carey 5th in the heavy Angus class, Mike Herron 4th and Shiela Jeffrey 10th in the medium Angus class, David Posey placed 11th in the medium Hereford class, Leslie Carey placed 5th in the heavy cross and Terry Posey placed 6th in the light cross class. Wilfong, Jeffrey and Posey sold steers through the auction for 46 cents a pound. In the Angus heifer division Mike Herron placed 7th in the senior heifer class, 1st in the summer yearling class and 3rd in the junior yearling class. Tim-

my Morton placed 17th in the senior Hereford calf class, and Leslie Carey placed 20th in the winter Hereford class. In the swine division, James Kemp showed his second place heavy crossbred barrow to Reserve Champion of the breed honors. The 232 pound barrow was bred by Kemp Brothers of McCaulley. The pig sold for 50 cents a pound. In the lamb division, Brad Stuart placed 8th in the Finewool class and Britt Stuart placed 9th in the Dorset class. The Stuart Brothers also placed 15th in the Suffolk and Southdown classes. They also placed 30th in the Hampshire and Crossbred classes. Fisher county 4-H had their best showing ever at Dallas this year and are all to be congratulated for doing an outstanding job, according to Richard Spencer, County Agent.

### Rotan Teachers Invite Public To Drug Meeting

Almost! That was the name of the game for the Rotan Yellowhammers. Six costly turnovers and ineligibles receiver down field prevented the Hammers from chalking up a victory. Bruce Jones, Mike Cade, Neal Summers, William Duke, David Markham, Jack McCall, Bub Allen, Joe Murphree, Marsh Hill and Earl Ray Pearson started offensively for the Rotan squad and marched from their own 37 yard line to the Wylie 6- yard line before suffering the first of seven set backs for the evening. 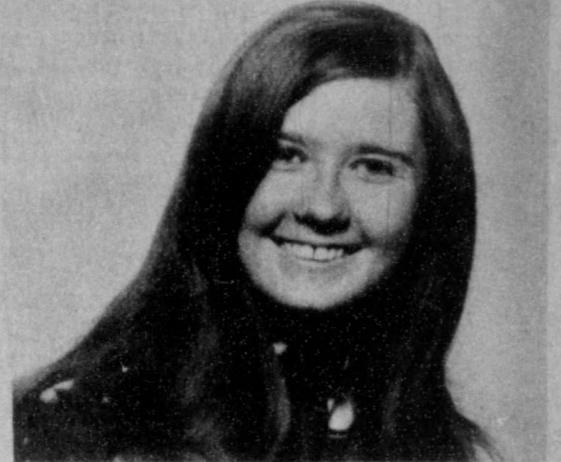

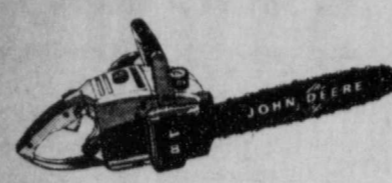

**A HELLISH HEAVEN:** Ran across this in a financial newsletter and thought you would enjoy sifting the information through your brain. "Which is hotter, heaven or hell?" That question, seemingly appropriate for medieval theological tomes, is raised this month in a highly unlikely place; the current issue of Applied Optics. Even more surprising, the usually serious technical journal gives tongue-in-cheek scientific arguments to provide a totally unexpected answer.

Citing as its source "an unnamed environmental physicist of several decades back," Applied Optics points out that the temperature of heaven (considered by the ancients to be the entire firmament, including sun, moon and stars) can be accurately computed from data available in the Bible. The data can be found in an Old Testament passage from Isaiah 30:26 that defines the total light radiated heavenward by the sun and the moon in terms of the portion of that light that hits the earth. Moreover, the light of the moon shall be as the light of the sun, and the light of the sun shall be sevenfold, as the light of seven days. Thus, according to modern interpretation, heaven receives seven times seven (49 times) more solar radiation than does the earth. The total received by heaven must therefore be 50 times that received by earth.

Assuming that the temperature of heaven remains constant, Applied Optics says, heaven must also lose by radiation 50 times as much heat as does the earth. Then, with the absolute temperature of the earth known, it is a simple task to calculate the precise temperature of heaven; a scorching 977 deg. F.

And the temperature of hell? The journal takes its cue from a line in Revelation 21:8; "But the fearful and unbelieving shall have their part in the lake which burneth with fire and brimstone." Since brimstone boils at 833 deg. F., hell must be somewhat cooler than that; if it were not, it would be a vapor, not a lake. Thus, Applied Optics' unnamed scientist concludes with scientific conviction, heaven is hotter than hell by at least 144 deg.

# Leonard McCombs Just Piddling.... Fascination Of Windmills Realistic

windmill replicas stand as a reminder of a way of life that is a part of our Fisher County heritage.

The location of natural watering places played an integral role in the early settlement of our country because grass was of no value to the cattlemen unless there was water for his herd and for the people who came with them. During times of extended drouth both natural sources and man made earthen tanks were depleted. The uncertainty of water was the big fear for owners of the large ranches and for the farmers who settled in their wake.

One seemingly inexhaustible resource of West Texas was, and is, wind. Thus, the introduction of the windmill into the area was a stabilizing factor in the growth of the economy and the population of Fisher County.

Although the windmill is by no means extinct, and retains its importance in furnishing water on ranches in the area, it is no longer the decisive factor in survival. No longer is a town dotted with a sea of windmills, nor is the windmill considered as one of the most needed residents of the community. With the availability of electricity, consistency of power during a lull of the wind, and lesser expense in initial installation, the windmill is losing some of its prominence.

A reminder of the not too distant past may be seen in the yard of Mr. and Mrs. Leonard McCombs of Rotan. Many people, both young and old, pause to watch his windmill replicas as the wheels turn in the breeze.

Mr. McCombs, when asked about his hobby, said, "Ever since I was big enough to remember, I liked to see a windmill running. When just a kid I would try to make little ones by whittling two sticks. I never stopped". In speaking of the ones exhibited in his front yard, he said, "I just started 'playing' and made them. They do attract a lot of attention". To make the little windmills more realistic, Mr. McCombs devised a system of recirculating the water with a pump from an air conditioner. It gives the appearance of water being pumped from a well into a near by trough. He said, "It tickles the kids to see the wheel turning and water running".

It is needless to ask why Leonard McCombs spends so many hours at his chosen hobby. He enjoys it, and that is reason enough. He said, "It is quite a bit of trouble to make one of the little windmills. I spend a few minutes today and a few minutes tomorrow. I don't know how many hours it takes, but I am sure it would be a full day. There is lots of piddling to it. I just hammer and saw. I make the towers of wood and wheels from metal. Sometimes I use a lid from a syrup bucket. At one time I had seventeen little wheels mounted on the roof of the building in the back yard, but the wind eventually wore most of them out. I plan to make another or two--each a little different. I've never made them for other people excepting for for one boy who wanted it so very much".

Mr. McCombs said of his family, "Six brothers came to Fisher County in 1889. They all lived to be eighty and past. My father, Wash McCombs, settled west of Rotan in Grady community. I was born there and lived on the same place until I moved here in 1943. The families came from Denton County".

It seems that the McCombs family and the windmill came to the area in the same decade. At 401 East Burnside three little

up to stop a Wylie drive at the Rotan 37 yard line.

an unquenchable hunger for meats, an appetite which poultry, especially broilers and turkeys could satisfy.

It seems logical that so long as the economy remains at or near its present level, Americans will continue to consume more meat and poultry products.

If your power mower, outboard motor and other small engine tools have finished another season, don't just shove them into storage without a little preventive maintenance.

Improper storage can cripple small gasoline engines. Gasoline left in the carburetor can become gummy and foul fuel lines. And excess moisture may cause rust on cylinder walls and pistons and allow piston rings to freeze. Salt water corrosion can also damage outboard motors that are not washed and

flushed with fresh water after salt water use.

Most major engine manufacturers include storage suggestions in operating and maintenance manuals. But if you've lost or misplaced the manual, there are several key steps to head off storage deterioration.

Drain all gasoline from the tank, start the engine and run until fuel lines and carburetor are empty. Now remove the carburetor bowl, clean it thoroughly and replace. Remember to drain the crankcase of old oil and replace with new.

Next, remove the spark plug and clean or replace it if necessary. Before replacing the plug, however, pour a teaspoon of SAE 10 weight motor oil into the opening and crank the engine several times. This helps to distribute the oil and forms a protective coating over pistons

and cylinder walls. Do not reconnect the spark plug lead before storage.

Finally, clean the engine exterior with an old toothbrush or wire brush, paying particular attention to the cooling fins on the cylinder and head. Coat all unpainted metal parts with grease or oil.

Store the engine in a dry place if at all possible, and leave the cap off the gas tank to prevent moisture collection. If the engine must be left in the open, cover it with waterproof fabric or plastic for protection from the weather.

# Waste-Areas Paradise

"Disgusted with that grown-up fence row? Dissatisfied with the view of the clump of trees, grass and weeds on the vacant lot next door? Don't be! They serve as sources of food and shelter for wildlife—especially birds," says Gerald Harmon, Soil Conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service.

On the farm the overgrown fence row produces various kinds of food—grass and weed seeds, mast from trees and shrubs, and insects that the grasses, weeds and trees harbor. This type of area is an excellent habitat for game birds such as dove and quail and for other useful birds as well.

The vacant lot in town may be thought of as nothing but an eyesore to many people. However, many species of birds use these areas in town as a major source of food. They catch insects that inhabit these areas and eat large amounts of grass and weed seed that are produced. Many of these birds may nest

in the trees and shrubs on these vacant sites. Towns and cities benefit from having these birds around because many species of birds consume large amounts of insects, including mosquitoes, that infest backyard gardens, become a nuisance during cookouts, and invade households.

These so-called "waste areas" provide hours of recreation for the sportsman in the countryside and provide the city dweller with a natural means of destroying insects. Also many pleasurable moments can be spent listening

to and watching the various species of birds.

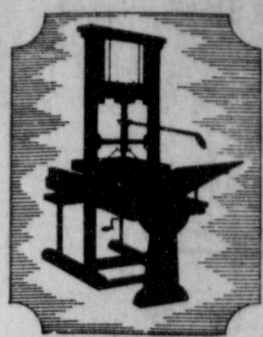

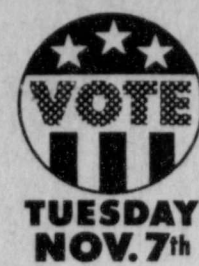

If you have any questions concerning the proper procedures of voting and marking the ballots, consult the election judge for clarification. In order to be sure that your vote is going to be counted you must mark the ballot according to the "instruction note".  
A. J. Ford's name will appear on the voters ballot in Precinct #1. D. F. Miller's name will only appear on the ballot in Precinct #3.
