The Roby Lions, boys basketball team, has just about completed their most successful season in several years. They have a record of 14 wins against 11 losses going into their last game. The Lions made big news last week when they beat the number 1 rated team in the Big Country, as Hermleigh fell to the Lions 42-38.

The Lions had won only eight games in four years, prior to this season, so the Lions are proud of what they have accomplished. The Lions beat Hermleigh by controlling the ball until they had the good percent shot. David Stephens and Mark Kiser led the Lions with 16 and 12 points respectively. Dale Evers and Stephens controlled the boards for Roby.

Throughout the year, the Lions have been led by Mark Kiser, David and Donnie Stephens, Dale Evers, Robert Morgan, Jimmy Reed and Pax Beauchamp.

Kiser is the leading scorer, with 426 points on the year, averaging 17.8 points a game. He also leads in total steals with

with 65 and assists 60. Dale Evers trails Kiser in points with 392 on the year, averaging 15.8 points a game. He is team leader in rebounds with 290. Evers also has the best field goal shooting percentage----- David Stephens is just behind Evers and Kiser in points and rebounds as he has scored 299 points and pulled down 263 rebounds. He is the team leader in free throws made.

The Lions have scored 1418 points this season, averaging 56.6 points a ball game.



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Mrs. Edgar Gilliland
"I Am Going To Live To Be 100"

Paul S. McIlroy in "Moments of Meditation" has said, "A ship with a list sails unevenly, a top when it loses speed is not properly centered, spins unsteadily, and an individual who does not keep his balance soon finds himself in trouble. The secret of keeping life on an even keel is to have, as a kind of gyroscope, an inner certainty. This stabilizing power comes when we are right with ourselves, with our neighbors, and with God. Only then can we keep in proper balance".

The wisdom of the elderly can give great help to the struggles of the young and middle aged. Sometimes we forget this. Their inner strength and faith helps to put things in proper perspective. They are often lonely because others are too busy to take the time for a quiet visit. Maturity isn't gauged by how long one has lived, but how well. Mrs. Edgar Gilliland, a resident of Leisure Lodge in Rotan, seems to have lived both long and well.

Mrs. Gilliland was born February 4, 1875. Last Sunday she celebrated her 98th birthday replete with cake and candles. When Birthday greeting cards began to arrive and out-of-town relatives dropped in on Saturday, she remarked, "How did they know Sunday will be my birthday? I haven't told anyone."

In speaking of her early life, Mrs. Gilliland said, "I was born in Parker County, Texas--about two miles from Weatherford. My father was Jasper Burford and my mother's maiden name was Mary Jackson. My father died when he was only forty-nine years old--people became old quickly in those days.

"Life was quite different then, and times were pretty hard. We went to school in two or three different places. I recall that one of them was named Content. It was about four miles from home. We went in the wagon

every chance we got, but most of the time we walked.

"My father taught us that it was important to go to church. He would never miss a Service either day or night. We would go to a church that was 4 miles away, and to one in the other direction that was five miles. Any time there was a Meeting at either place we were there.

"My husband, Edgar Gilliland, died in 1950. We had eight children; four are still living. I have about fifteen grandchildren and some great-grandchildren. I don't see them very much because they live all over the country."

One of the blessings for which Mrs. Gilliland is thankful is her remarkably good eye sight. She said, "I guess my eyes are the best part of me. I spend most of my time reading and writing. I read my Bible every day, and I read the Church Bulletin. I am Church of Christ. I went to church regularly for as long as I could. Now since I am in this wheelchair, I can't go; but I know that God understands that.

"I don't feel capable of giving advice to anyone. People should live right, go to school until they are married, and work. They should go to Church every Service."

Mrs. Gilliland concluded, "I love people, I love to live, and I am going to live to be one hundred." She'll make it!

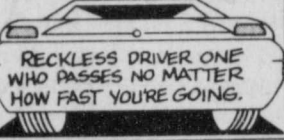

2. The target area, within which the precipitation is intended to be enhanced can be described as follows: The boundary may be described by a line beginning at a point of origin at Big Spring, Texas, and running along Highway 87 in a northwesterly direction to Lamesa, thence north-northeast on Highway 87 to the north border of Dawson County, thence

east along the north border of Dawson, Borden, and Scurry Counties to Highway 84; thence south-east along Highway 84 to Roscoe, in Nolan County; thence south-southeast to Maryneal; thence southwest to Silver in Coke County; thence south-southwest to Highway 87 at a point approximately 13 miles northwest of Sterling City; thence northwesterly along Highway 87 to the point of origin at Big Spring, Texas.

3. The equipment, materials and methods to be used in conducting the operation within this area of approximately 3500 sq. miles include a 3cm radar system, cloud seeding aircraft, and the application of silver iodide ice nuclei, hygroscopic nuclei or other nuclei considered appropriate to the artificial nucleation of clouds or weather systems.

4. The program will be operational during the period from April 15, 1973 through October 15, 1973.

5. Any persons who feel they may be affected in some adverse way by this program may file a formal complaint to the Texas Water Development Board, P. O. Box 12386, Austin, Texas, 78711.
