

Dr. Bennie LeBleu Remarks.....

HOSPITAL CAN'T REMAIN OPEN MUCH LONGER

Dr. and Mrs. Bennie LeBleu have resided in Fisher County since October 1955 when he entered private practice following completion of post graduate work in San Francisco. He has been associated with Callan Hospital and Clinic since that time. A graduate of Rice University, Dr. LeBleu entered the Medical Branch of the University of Texas at Galveston. He had further training at San Antonio and at Denver before going to San Francisco.

When asked why he chose to enter practice in Fisher County, Dr. LeBleu replied, "I was familiar with large cities and their way of life. I preferred to live and work in an area where I could have a more personal relationship with patients and

with the community. I did not wish to raise my family in the environs of a large city".

Dr. and Mrs. LeBleu have four children. David Alan, age seventeen, is a senior in high school; Stephen Anthony, fifteen, is a freshman; Richard Andre, twelve, is in the sixth grade; and Rebecca, eleven, is a fifth grader. Mrs. LeBleu said, "The three boys are interested in sports and scouting. Ricky is excited about Little League--this being his last year. Rebecca keeps busy with her 4-H Club and her G. A. work. She and Ricky are both in the band and are very interested in music".

Dr. LeBleu has served as a member of the Rotan School Board for a number of years. Mrs. LeBleu is a Leader in 4-H and G. A. organizations. She is

a member of Anne Pettus Shelburne Chapter of Daughters of the American Revolution, and is presently organizing a Chapter of Children of the American Revolution. The LeBleu family are members of First Baptist Church in Rotan. Their community involvement reflects their interest in youth, and is a tangible expression of the desire for personal relationship with the people and the com-

munity which he serves as physician.

In speaking of the present hospital facilities in Rotan, Dr. LeBleu said, "I do not feel that it can remain open much longer because there are certain physical deficits which cannot be brought up to required standards. At present it remains open only on a temporary authorization basis.

"I think that several points need to be reinforced regarding the matter of establishing a county hospital unit. Whether we like it or not, we are ALL going to be members of someone's Hospital District; it might as well be our own. Hospitals are needed much the same as schools and other types of public facilities. People often do not realize that a hospital is

not a money making business. Present requirements in the way of physical plant, equipment, and regular operating expenses are beyond the reach of private individuals. It is my opinion that privately owned and operated hospitals, even in large cities, will soon be a thing of the past.

"I am elated over the enthusiasm shown by the people in general concerning the building

of a new hospital. Doctors are geared to utilizing the hospital as a medical tool. Those now in training will go into practice where there are hospitals. Without one the chances of keeping doctors in the county are very poor.

"As to the facilities that would be provided in a new hospital, that would be up to a Board of Directors. Conceivably, some types of surgery could be per-

formed which it is not possible to do under existing circumstances. Of course there are types of surgery that will always require special facilities and a team of specialists.

"Big city doctors would never understand the situation in a small community. I have no way of even estimating the hours I have donated to patients who could not pay for medical ser-

County residents were well satisfied with the remarks made by Senator Babe Schwartz concerning the eventual creation of a Fisher County Hospital District.

The first of these meetings is to be on April 2, at the Roby High School Auditorium.

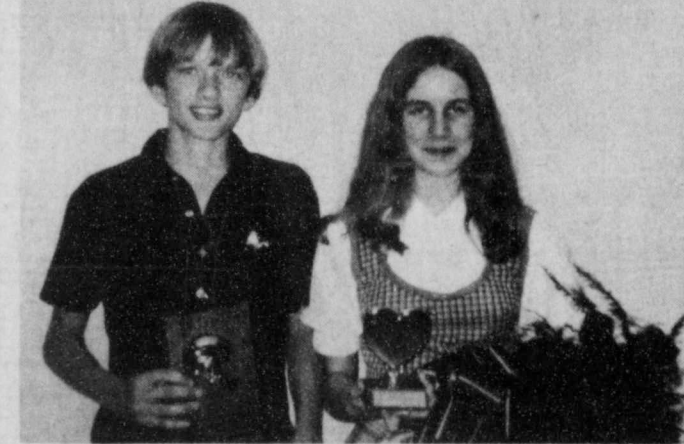
Residents will be given an opportunity to ask questions that will be answered by qualified personnel in the county

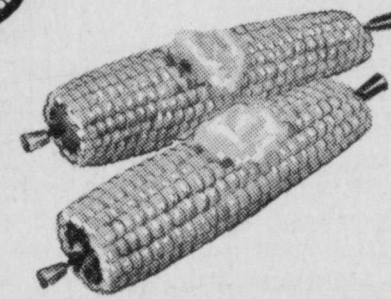

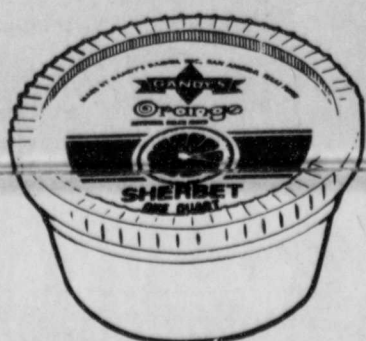

On this, the 16th day of March, 1973, the Commissioners' Court of Fisher County, Texas, convened in regular session at the regular meeting place thereof in the Courthouse at Roby, Texas, the meeting being open to the public and notice of said meeting giving the date, place and subject thereof, having been posted as prescribed at Article 9252-17, Section 3A, V. A. T. C. S., the following members of the Court being present, to wit: Dwight L. Lovett, County Judge, Presiding, and A. J. Ford, Commissioner, Precinct No. 1; E. J. Kiker, Commissioner Precinct No. 2; Wayne Porter Commissioner Precinct No. 3; Thurman Terry Commissioner Precinct No. 4, and the following absent: none, constituting a quorum; and among other proceedings had were the following:

Whereas, a petition has been duly presented to the Commissioners' Court of Fisher County, Texas, wherein the petitioners, alleging themselves to represent ten percent (10%) or more of the resident qualified property taxpaying voters of Fisher County, Texas, who have duly rendered their property for taxation, and praying this Court order that an election be held in said County to determine whether this Court should be authorized to issue bonds of Fisher County in the total principal amount of ONE MILLION FIVE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$1,500,000), for the purpose of providing funds for establishing and equipping a County Hospital and for all other necessary permanent improvements in connection therewith, pursuant to authority conferred by the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas; and whether a tax sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and to provide a sinking fund sufficient to pay the principal thereof at maturity shall be levied on all taxable property within said County; and

Whereas, this Court, upon due advice and investigation, has ascertained and determined that said petition is signed by ten percent (10%) or more of the resident qualified property taxpaying voters of Fisher County, Texas, who have duly rendered their property for taxation; and

Whereas, this Court further finds and determines that no petition for a County hospital bond election has been presented to this Court during the twelve (12) months' period preceding the presentation of the above petition and that no County Hospital bond election has been held during the last twelve (12) months' period preceding the date of this order; and

Whereas, it is hereby found and determined that said petition should be granted and that an election as prayed for in such petition should be ordered; therefore,

BE IT ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS' COURT OF FISHER COUNTY, TEXAS:

Section 1: That an election be held in said County on the 14th day of April, 1973, which date is not less than fifteen (15) nor more than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of this order, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:

"SHALL the Commissioners' Court of Fisher County, Texas, be authorized to issue bonds of said County in the principal amount of ONE MILLION FIVE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$1,500,000) for the purpose of providing funds for establishing and equipping a County hospital and for all other necessary permanent improvements in connection therewith; said bonds to mature serially or otherwise over a period of years not to exceed forty (40) years from their date, to be issued and sold at any price or prices and to bear interest at any rate or rates as shall be determined within the discretion of the Commissioners' Court of Fisher County, Texas, at the time of issuance; and shall the Commissioners' Court of Fisher County, Texas, be authorized to levy, assess and collect annually while any of said bonds are outstanding, a tax upon all taxable property in said County, sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and to provide a sinking fund for their redemption at maturity, pursuant to authority conferred by the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, particularly Section 9 of Article VIII of the Constitution, and Chapter 1, Title 22 and Chapter 5, Title 71, Revised Civil Statutes of 1925, as amended?"

Section 2: That said election shall be held under the provisions of the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, particularly Section 9 of Article VIII of the Constitution and Chapter 1, Title 22, and Chapter 5, Title 71, Revised Civil Statutes of 1925, as amended.

Section 3: All resident qualified electors of the County, including those who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be permitted to vote at said election. That at said election two separate ballot boxes shall be provided at each polling place, in one box only resident qualified electors who own taxable property and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be allowed to vote. In another box all resident qualified electors (who are otherwise qualified but do not own taxable property which has been duly rendered for taxation) shall be allowed to vote. The votes cast in each of said boxes shall be recorded, returned and canvassed in such manner as will reflect separately the votes cast by the qualified electors who own taxable property and who have duly rendered the same for taxation from the votes cast by all qualified electors (including those who own taxable property and who have duly rendered the same for taxation).

Section 4: It is further ordered that the ballots for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number and in conformity with Chapter 6, V. A. T. S., Election Code, and printed on such ballots shall appear the following proposition:

"THE ISSUANCE OF HOSPITAL BONDS AND THE LEVY OF TAXES IN PAYMENT THEREOF"

The word "FOR" and beneath it the word "AGAINST" shall be made to appear to the left of the proposition. A square shall be printed on the left of each of the words "FOR" and "AGAINST" and each voter shall place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way he wishes to vote.

Absentee voting shall be conducted at the County Clerk's Office in the Courthouse, in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 5, V. A. T. S., Election Code.

ON ELECTION DAY the polls shall be open from 8 o'clock A. M. to 7:00 o'clock P. M.

Precinct Number 12, Police Station, Rotan, Texas, Presiding Judge, Mrs. J. A. Finch; Alternate Presiding Judge, Lawrence Weatherman. Precinct Number 13, School House, Community of Hobbs, Presiding Judge, David Williams; Alternate Presiding Judge, Ivey Jones. Precinct Number 17, Community Center, Community of Capitola; Presiding Judge, Glenn Webb; Alternate Presiding Judge, Bennie Kidd, Sr. Precinct Number 18, Community Center Longworth, Texas; Presiding Judge, Bert Killingsworth; Alternate Presiding Judge, W. If the regularly appointed Presiding Judge is unable to serve at the election, the Alternate Presiding Judge therefor shall serve as Presiding Judge. The Presiding Judge shall appoint at least three (3) clerks (one of whom shall be the Alternate Presiding Judge if the election is conducted by the regularly appointed Presiding Judge) and not more than three (3) additional Clerks, as he deems necessary for the proper conduct of the election.

The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the General Laws of the State of Texas regulating general elections, except as modified by the provisions of Chapter 1 of Title 22, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, as amended.

Section 5: A copy of this order, signed by the County Judge of said County and certified to by the County Clerk of said County, shall serve as proper and sufficient notice of such election.

The County Clerk of Fisher County, Texas, is hereby authorized and directed to cause said notice of election to be posted in each of the election precincts of the County of Fisher, and at the County Courthouse, not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date on which said election is to be held, and to be published on the day in each of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation, published in Fisher County, the first of said publications to be not less than fourteen (14) days prior to the day set for said election.

Over 90 percent of the people reaching 65 this year are eligible for monthly cash social security benefits.

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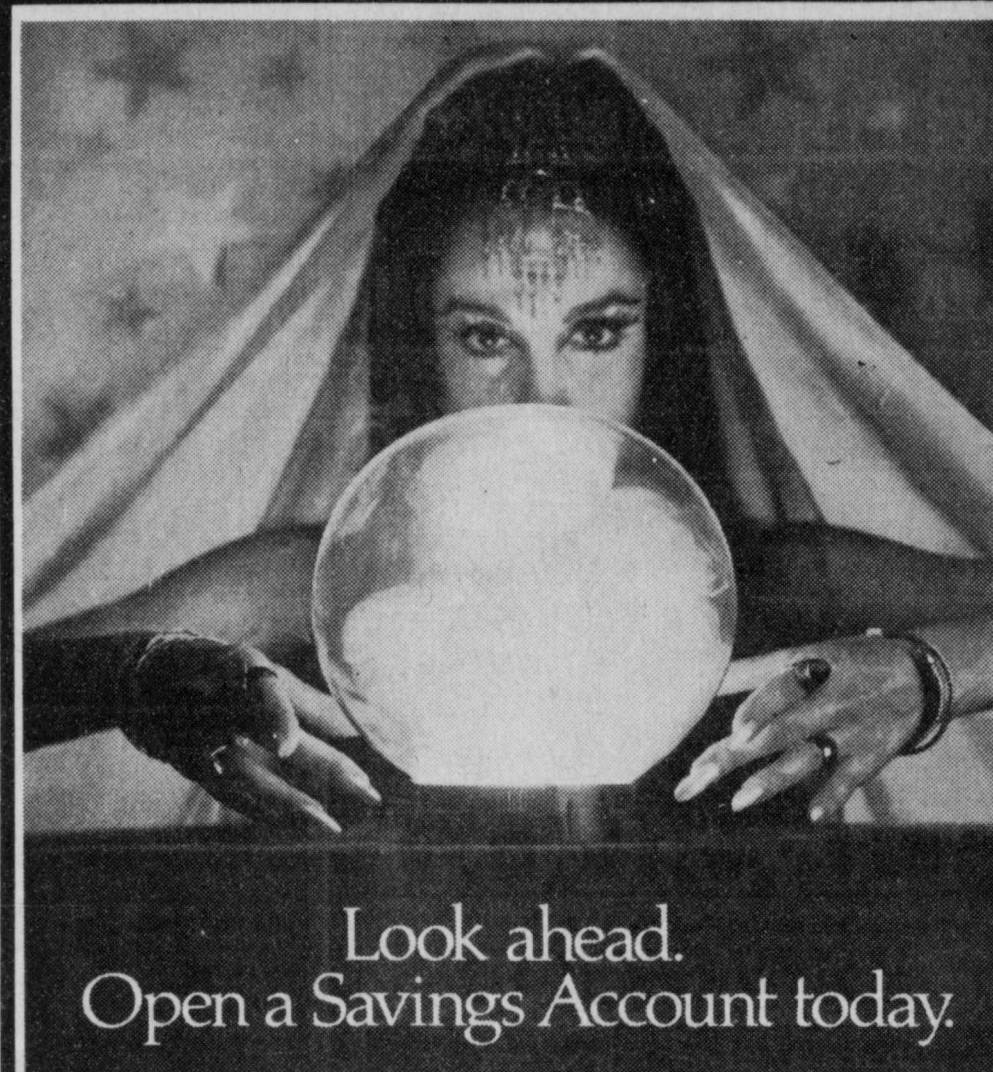

Sugar was another item that was almost unheard of-- so many families learned to sweeten pies and cakes with Maple syrup.

The 17th and 18th centuries brought many changes. The south developed a reputation for cookery and hospitality that has seldom been surpassed.

Williamsburg Orange Cake
Grind 1 orange rind and 1 cup raisins; add 1/2 cup chopped nuts and set aside. Cream 1/3 cup butter (or margarine) with 1 cup sugar; add 2 eggs beating well after each. Add 1 teaspoon vanilla. Sift together 2 cups flour, 1 teaspoon soda, 1/2 teaspoon salt; add alternately with 1 cup sour milk to creamed mixture. Add fruit mixture and blend well. Pour into well greased square cake pan. Bake at 375 degrees for 30-40 minutes. While hot, cake may be glazed by spreading with 1 cup sugar mixed with 1/3 cup orange juice and returning to oven a few minutes. Or ice with the following icing when cake is cool.

Sherry Orange Icing
Cream together 1 cup butter, 2 cups powdered sugar, some egg white for liquid, grated orange rind and Sherry to taste.

Note: Baking this cake batter in miniature muffin pans makes dainty individual servings.

1792 Cheese Pie
Separate 2 eggs. Beat yolks with 3/4 cup sugar until light and fluffy. Sieve 1/2 pound cottage cheese and add to yolks. Beat the egg whites stiff and fold in along with the juice and grated rind of 1/2 lemon. Pour filling into unbaked pastry and sprinkle with chopped nuts. Bake at 375 degrees about 30 minutes. Note: This quantity will fill about 36 very small individual tarts. Double this recipe fills a deep pie shell.

1812 Cookies
Cream 1/2 cup butter (or margarine) with 1 cup sugar. Beat 2 egg yolks very light then combine with 2 well-beaten egg whites and add to creamed mixture. Sift together 1 3/4 cups flour, 1/2 teaspoon cream of tartar, 1/4 teaspoon soda and 3/4 teaspoon nutmeg. Add dry ingredients and 1/2 teaspoon vanilla to creamed mixture and blend well. Dough will be soft so chill until stiff enough to roll out thin on floured board. Cut into small rounds and bake

on greased cookie sheets at 375 until delicately browned, about 12 minutes. Remove cookies from sheets while still warm as they get very crisp and break easily when cool. This dough can also be made into small rolls, chilled overnight and sliced into small cookies before baking. Makes 12 dozen 1-1/2 inch diameter cookies.

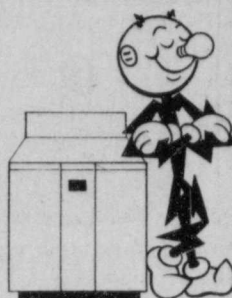

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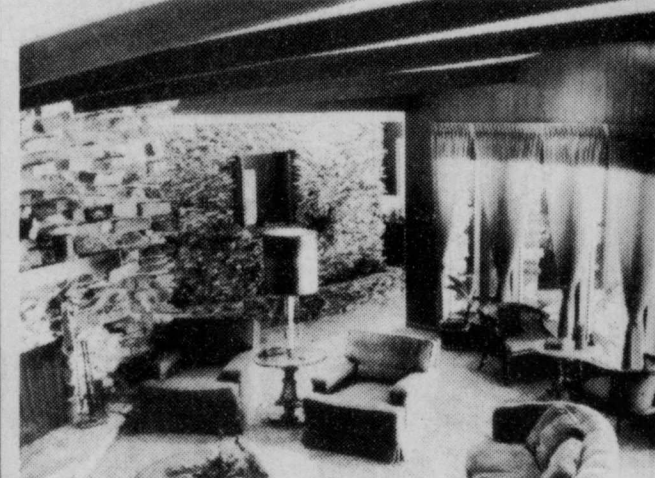
