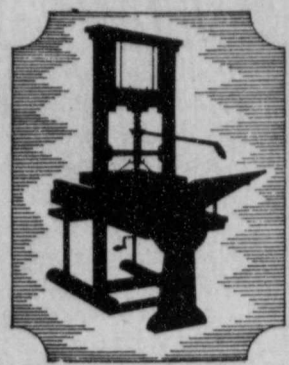


Annual Partnership Golf Tournament June 23-24

Charles Russell Is Hired As Rotan Head Coach

Members of the Rotan Independent School Board met for their regular monthly business session last Monday night and hired a head football coach.

The board selected Charles Russell, currently assistant football coach at Sweetwater High School, as the new head coach at Rotan. Russell has been at Sweetwater for the past 4 years. Prior to his Sweetwater position Russell was at Trent High School for two years. He was an assistant coach one year and head coach one year for the Trent squad.

Russell was an American History teacher, coached the varsity backfield, was an assistant track coach and coached the junior varsity basketball team in Sweetwater under Head Coach and Athletic Director Sonny Everett.

Russell is a native of Merkel and graduated from McMurry College in 1967.

He and his wife, Pat, have two children, Kelly age 5, and John age 9 months.

"I am looking forward to coming to Rotan", remarked the

new Head Coach. "All my life I have always heard that this is a good football town".

In other action by the board, Superintendent K.C. McCasland reported that after final tabulations of the 1972-1973 ADA (Average Daily Attendance) the school will lose the state financial assistance on one classroom teacher for the 1973-74 school year.

Board members authorized administrative officials to increase the monthly travel expenses for the school janitor (Mr. Holcomb) from \$10.00 to \$25.00 per month. This motion was made by Allan Houston and seconded by Bobby Smith.

Bobby Smith and Charles Thornton introduced a motion to declare the First National Bank of Rotan as the school depository through the 1974-1975 school year.

Board officials also passed on a revised "Free Lunch Policy" for the 1973-74 year. The new scale begins with one child and an income of \$2,190.00 up through 12 children with an income of \$8,700.00. Additional information on the free lunch program should be available from school officials when school opens again in August.

School Board President Charlie Joe Helms appointed Allan Houston as Chairman and Dr. Jerry Marshall and Charles Thornton as members of a special committee to investigate the construction of some additional tennis courts. This committee is expected to report back to the board at the next regular meeting in August.

Kevin Crowder Tops With Honor

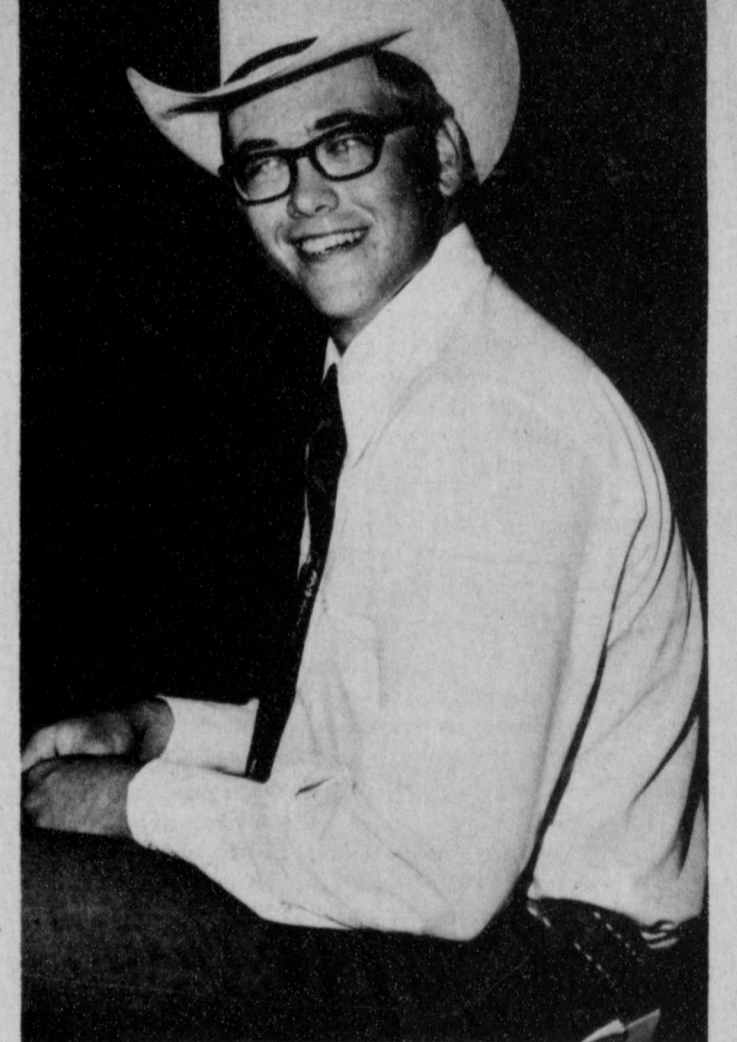

All the thrills and excitement of big time rodeo comes to Fisher County this weekend as the Fisher County Sheriff's Posse makes final preparations for their 18th annual Rodeo. The Rodeo will be held this Thursday, June 14th, Friday and Saturday nights.

The Sheriff Posse Rodeo will begin Thursday with a big downtown parade at 5:00 p. m. Leading the 1973 parade will be the famous Hardin Simmons University "Six White Horses" from Abilene. Two Rotan girls are now members of the riding team, Connie Byrd, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Byrd, and Lou McCombs, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Billie Joe McCombs.

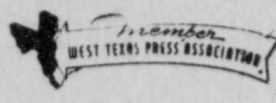

Rotan HDC Hears Story Of Cookwear Material

The Rotan Home Demonstration Club met June 7 with Mrs. Rosa Horton.

Mrs. Barney Bigham presided at the business meeting. Mrs. Ben Hargrove read the minutes of the last meeting and also gave the treasurer's report.

Mrs. Hargrove gave an interesting program on "Know Your Cookware Material". The many features to look for in buying a pan; Heat Transfer utensils should be good conductors of

heat, heating quickly and evenly. The saucepan should be well balanced. If the handle is too heavy for the pan, the pan is

easily tipped over when empty or when it contains a small amount of food. Range-top utensils should have close or snug fitting covers, this permits waterless or near waterless cooking and reduce cooking time and saves food value. Knobs and

handles should be made of heat resistant material. The ideal shape for a sauce pan is one with a flat bottom, straight up and down sides help fuel economy, are easier to use, especially when stirring, and are easier to clean and store. Pans should be of medium to heavy weight material to withstand high temperature and direct heat without warping. The cookware should be of style, color and finish that

is pleasing to the person using it. No one material has all the advantages. Choose the material which best meets your needs. Select the best quality cookware your budget will afford. Buy from reliable dealers and manufacturers.

Two From County Return From Nuclear Symposium

The Symposium was jointly sponsored by the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation and the University of Texas. West

The 500 selected high school science students and teachers who attended the session were offered the rare opportunity of hearing lectures by some of the nation's outstanding nuclear scientists.

The Foundation was formed for the primary purpose of conducting the world's first and largest privately financed research effort in the field of nuclear energy.

Currently, the Foundation and General Dynamics Corporation are jointly sponsoring a program in nuclear fusion research aimed at controlling thermonuclear reactions for the production of electric power. Fusion is the energy process of the sun and the stars.

The goal of the Foundation and WUT is not research alone, but to also assist in the advancement of the knowledge of nuclear science in Texas schools.

Of special interest to the sponsors is bringing to students and teachers a realization of the privileges, responsibilities and opportunities which scientific discoveries in the field of nuclear energy presents.

WTU paid all expenses for the

21 students and teachers attending from the area served by the company. Lecturers at the Symposium were chosen from top men in their field.



Brazos Transport Employs Fifty-Four

During the years 1906-1907 the Texas Central Railroad was extended from Stamford to Rotan. The town established as the terminus was originally known by several descriptive names before the final choice was made naming it for Ed Rotan who was a member of the board of the railroad. The first trains into the town consisted of two passenger trains and one freight train per day. In 1932 the passenger trains to Rotan were discontinued. The one per day freight was extended during the cotton harvest. Big herds of cattle were driven to the terminal for shipment, and as many as five cattle trains would be in the yard at one time. In the early days the terminus did about \$75,000 business per year, and eventually it grew to the two million dollar mark per year.

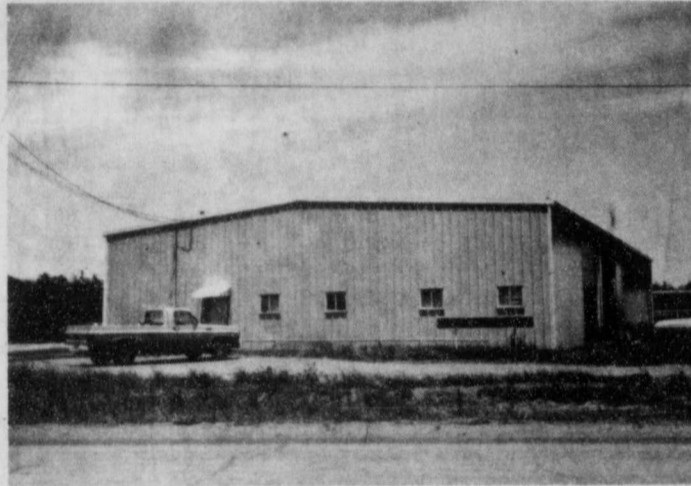
When the gypsum plant began operation in Rotan, the railroad played an important role in its success. Times changed. People began to travel by car, and cattle to go by truck. It was the end of an era in our nation's history as well as in the history of transportation in Fisher County.

In 1964 Brazos Transport Company selected Rotan as the terminus for their fleet of trucks. Late in that year they began the operation with six trucks. The company felt that within 10 years they could possibly be operating thirty units.

Recently Mr. Marvin Hartman stated, "In April of 1968 the

number of Brazos Transport trucks had been increased to seventeen. When I came on the first of February in 1971, we had thirty-two. We now have thirty-seven trucks in service and seventy-three trailers. In addition, we are leasing ten outside trucks--a total of forty-seven. Company side, we have eighty-three road trucks, plus the ten leased, and approximately one hundred fifty-five trailers.

"In 1971 the company began buying ten new trucks at a time. This year we are adding nine new units, replacing eight. Yet, we are hauling only eighty to eighty-two per cent of all truck shipments from this gypsum plant. The need for expansion is apparent.

"Brazos Transport Trucks were driven five million miles in 1972, and used almost one million gallons of fuel. We are now working to improve our safety program. The accident ratio was an average of one hundred eighty-six thousand miles per accident which rates only fair among carriers. It needs to be at least two hundred fifty to three hundred thousand.

"Through our Safety Program we present a seventy-five dollar per year safe driving award. In 1972 we gave eleven such awards. Already in 1973, we have given thirteen. The increase is due largely to keeping driver turnover down, buying better trucks, and maintaining them better.

"We now have fifty-four employees with annual payroll of just over one half million dollars. And, I am pleased to say that the trucks will now be registered in Fisher County. This is something that I have worked for since coming to Rotan in 1971. The financial benefit to the county is obvious.

"Of the fifty-four employees only twenty-five live in Rotan. If we can get twenty of the remaining families to live here that would actually amount to a fair sized new industry. For this, we need additional housing. Our anticipated growth to seventy or seventy-five employees in the next three years is hampered only by the fuel shortage. And that, of course, hampers everyone's activities."

Mr. Hartman concluded, "But we have already outgrown by far our wildest expectations when we began; so if we have faith in ourselves and in our Nation's ability to overcome any obstacle, all of us will continue to grow."

Surely the ingenuity and faith of people who built this great nation can solve the problems of production and distribution of fuel so urgently needed for continued growth--in fact, for survival. (How about a fleet of Brazos Transport Tankers in lieu of that controversial Alaskan pipe line?)

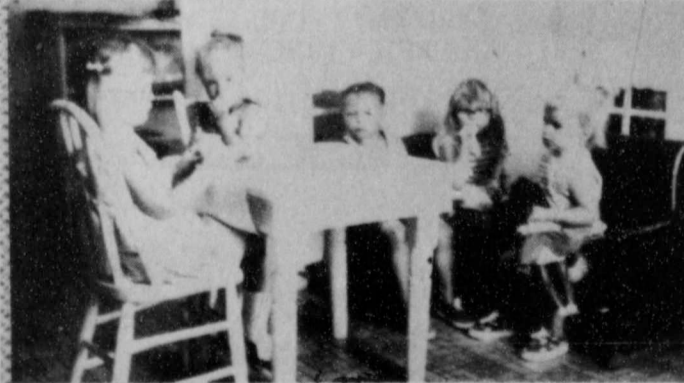

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

The First Twenty-Five Years

Supplement To Roby Star-Record Rotan Advance, June 14, 1973-20 Pages

The International Association of Lions Clubs was organized in Chicago on June 7, 1917 by business and professional men who seek to recognize and meet the needs of their communities. The association held its first national convention in Dallas, Texas. Since that time Lions Clubs have been established in all parts of the free world and holds an International Convention. The Lions Magazine is published in nine languages.

Lions International is the world's largest service organization with more than 26,000 clubs in 148 countries and geographical territories. Recently Bernard A. Gill of Virginia was recognized as the one millionth member according to Lions President George Friedrichs, Annecy, France. It is the first service association to reach one million members. Gill, age 45, a retired Army Lieutenant Colonel and Viet Nam veteran, received a special plaque in ceremonies at Oak Brook, Illinois.

Among approved activities of Lions International are citizenship and patriotism, civic improvement, community betterment, education, health and welfare, safety, sight conservation and aid to the blind, agricultural needs, and international affairs.

On July 21, 1947, thirty years after organization of the International group, Rotan Lions Club was chartered with twenty-seven members. Those signing the Charter were Charles Hogsett, H.L. Davis, J. D. Burk, Henry Withers, A. C. Dotson, Wayland F. Taylor, Charles Powell, Jr., L. E. Newton, L. E. Newton, Jr., Ollie T. Brown, R. D. Sartor, Lance M. Davis, Vern Underhill, J. L. McCombs, Bill Day, H. Thompson, Robert F. Morris, O. B. Williams, R. L. Springer, Jim E. Nayfa, Jack Wilhite, Harry C. Shelton, Ray Brown, Arvin White, Dave Posey, R. Watkins and C. C. Cate. H. Thompson, serving as the Club President 1972-73, holds the distinction of being the only current member whose signature appears on the Charter.

Early records of the Rotan Lions Club are, at most, very sketchy. Mrs. Mayme Lois Gray (now Johnson) served the Club as secretary for a number of years. The minutes which she kept of the formative years have been lost. A few newspaper clippings have been preserved by Oleta Parker. These give a glimpse of the services rendered individuals and the community. Not every worthwhile activity makes headlines, but the news stories preserved show continuity of concern and services to those in need. The earliest record found is dated May 19, 1950. It states in part, "Members of the Rotan Volunteer Fire Department were honor guests at the regular meeting of the Rotan Lions Club Tuesday. Presiding was the club president, Supt. H. F. Railsback. Fire Chief A. B. Parker spoke briefly of activities of the Fire Department. He also expressed appreciation for the honor accorded the Department by the Civic Organization. . . . Lance M. Davis, former mayor, told the group that Rotan was to host the fall meeting of the Mid-West Fireman's Convention. . . motion was made and approved that the civic organization under-write a portion of the expense of the convention".

A news item dated August 1, 1957 was titled "Rotan Lions Club Completes Numerous Projects in Past Year". It stated that the Club was organized in July of 1947, and had a current mem-

bership of more than thirty, meeting in the Texas Cafe each Tuesday. It reported, "The Lions, a service club, helps to support the Texas Lions Club Camp for Crippled Children in Kerrville. buy glasses for needy children, and many other worthwhile projects. The Club sponsored and helped build Aaron Park. . . The latest project was construction of a motor scooter to take to and from work a handicapped man. In cooperation with the Chamber of Commerce they are sponsors of a community Christmas program." Officers for the year were listed as Roy Kingsfield, president, Loyd Hurst, 1st vice-president, M. S. Weathersbee, 2nd vice-president, Homer Fillingim, Jr., 3rd vice-president, John Leach, secretary-treasurer, Mrs. R. R. Gray, executive secretary-treasurer, and John M. Jackson, tail twister.

On August 23, 1957 the Abilene Reporter News carried an article titled, "Doodle Bug, Kind Folds Give Felix Reason to Live". This project of Rotan Lions Club, had it been their only service during this quarter of a century, would justify their being. The story of Felix Garcia warmed the hearts of all who read the story, and serves as a reminder that there are people who care enough to do something for those in need. It exemplifies the true spirit of Lionism.

The above noted article began, "The 'little red doodle bug' is a respected vehicle in Rotan traffic. . . . Come morning, noon, or night, and the oversized, motorized toy wends its way down main street, holding its own with truck or limousine. The driver is the happiest man in town. How else would you describe a man suddenly liberated from the chains of a room and bed---chains that stretch kown a long, long trail of 19 stagnated years?"

The article gave the story of the tragic tractor accident that left Felix Garcia paralyzed from the waist down. When the Fisher County Welfare Department put the then 50-year-old man into his first wheel chair and installed him as an apprentice leather tooler in the Dee Reese Boot and Saddle Shop, he became a man again. Dee Reese, out of the goodness of his heart, wanted to give the respected man a chance to be independent and self supporting. He proved to be too weak for the task, so he was installed in the shoe shine business in the shop. He gradually gained strength and in self-confidence.

Transportation was a problem. Roy Kingsfield, president of Rotan Lions Club, dreamed up the idea of hand-operated, glorified motor scooter that would make Felix Garcia a completely independent man. The project was adopted by the club, and the members, as well as other individuals in the town and surrounding communities made donations to buy the needed materials. The work of making the vehicle was entirely volunteer. Two Rotan Lions, Don Rollins and Bob Scales, did most of the actual construction. Roy Kingsfield was around to supervise. Many others put in spare hours. The news article concluded, "Thanks to the goodness of two organizations and several individuals who cared enough to do something, he's gained strength, his color is good from getting out of that house, he talks again and he can smile."

"On Felix it looks good!"

On September 23, 1956 the Abilene Reporter carried an article by Oleta Parker, headed, "While Planners Plan, Rotan Folks Build Park For All on Own Time". The story stated, "The best way for a community project to 'go over' is to let the folks go ahead and do what they want to—even before the planning committee can get through planning." It described Aaron Park as the community's most popular project, and listed various groups contributing to the success of the endeavor. It is the story of people working together in a common cause--- a success story; and Rotan Lions Club were the original sponsors of the park project.

The Rotan Lions Club received the outstanding community service award in 1959. According to a news release, "An estimated 200 persons saw A. B. Parker, Rotan Lions Club president and fire chief, accept a bronze plaque. Parker introduced 20 of the Lions members who attended the banquet."

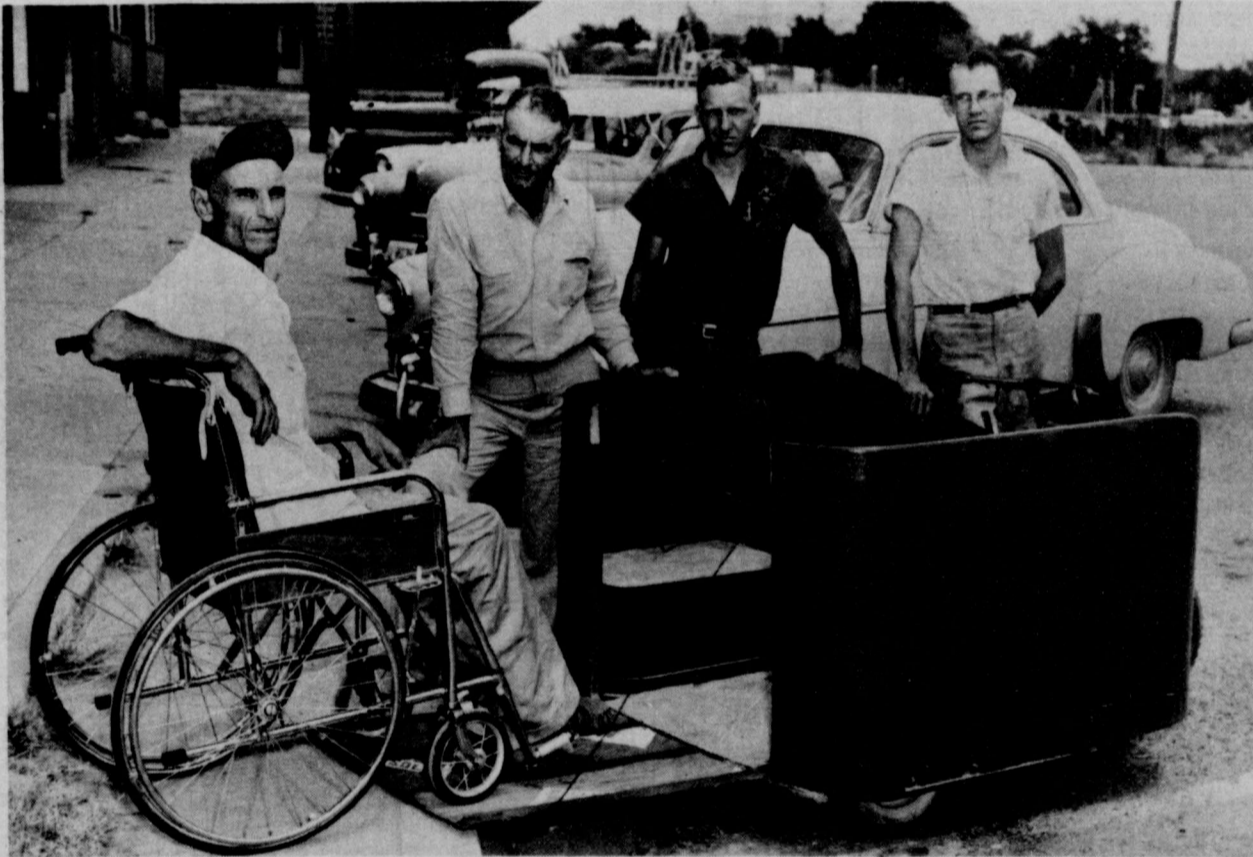
The presentation was made by Mrs. R. R. Gray who had won the award the previous year. In making the presentation she stated, "The Lions Club has not only served Rotan, but has served adjoining town. The Lions Club has sponsored many civic projects including the furnishing of glasses for needy children. The

club was instrumental in developing Aaron Park, and the group has sponsored the Junior Rodeo here." D. Y. McKinney, superintendent of Rotan Schools was master of ceremonies and music was presented by Mr. and Mrs. Wade Burroughs.

Rotan Lions Club, as all other organizations, has experienced slumps in interest, activities and accomplishments. But throughout the years since its organization in 1947, it has been here to provide help to any individual or organization that needed it. Many projects, often unsung, have been carried on without interruption. At one time the club was "broke", in debt, and very near to disbanding. They were behind with National dues and owed a \$400 lumber bill. W. T. Helms, club financial chairman, sponsored two or three tournaments that helped to get the club "back on its feet". It has been going strong ever since, and Rotan has been a better community because of it.

Twenty-six thousand Lions Clubs throughout the world, all working towards a common goal, can help to provide a bridge of understanding between the people of the 146 countries that they serve.

Congratulations to Rotan Lions as they enter the second quarter century of community service, and through cooperation with Lions International, service to the world.

As Lions Club Sweetheart, Betty is pianist for the regular Tuesday Luncheon meetings.

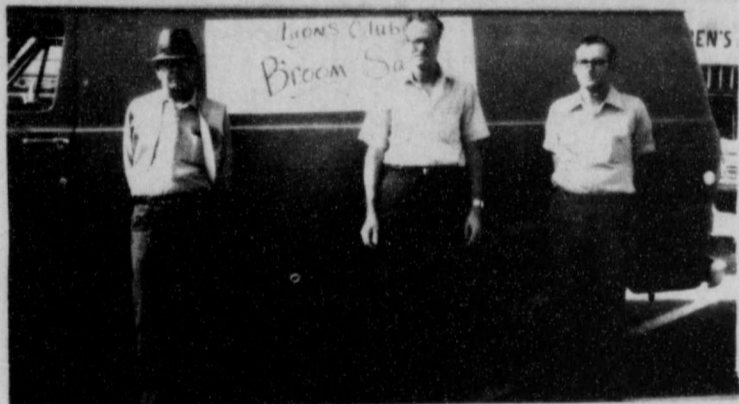
At the 1973 District 2-T2 Lions Convention in Lubbock the Ro-
