Joe Edwards Resigns As Highland Home Pastor

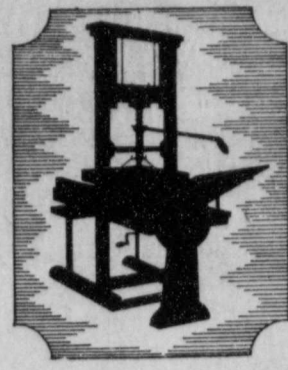

Election Called For July 28th HOSPITAL DISTRICT GETS COG APPROVAL

Seven Fisher County men went to Abilene last Monday to appear before the West Central Council of Governments in order to present the county's case for a "certificate of need" to construct a new Fisher County Hospital.

Those representing the county at the meeting included Judge Dwight Lovett, Wayne Harris, Dr. Maurice Callan, E. J. Kiker,

George McDonald, Raleigh Springer and Ralph Ammons.

Judge Dwight Lovett reported that the group voted unanimously to grant Fisher County the "certificate of need". The application for the certificate now must be approved in Austin, but according to Lovett, "we don't anticipate any problems in this area".

The Fisher County Hospital election has been called for Saturday, July 28. Fisher County residents will be voting to establish the county wide district as passed in the senate and house and also to approve the bonds for construction.

Votes of the July 28th election will be canvassed by commissioners on Monday, July 30, and at that time the five board members to the first hospital board will be appointed. These five men will serve until the first Saturday in April at which time all will be elected by the people if they desire to serve a full term.

Farmers Union President Calls For Priority Fuel

In a speech before a Stephenville farm audience, Texas Farmers Union president, Jay Naman of Waco, called on Governor Dolph Briscoe to convene a special session of the legislature to deal with the financing of the public school system and the farm fuel crisis.

Addressing the monthly meeting of the Erath County Farmers Union, Naman pointed out that the excessive property taxes which are being levied on agricultural land are imposing a discriminatory burden on farm and ranch producers. He pointed out that "the educational demands of the rural areas are becoming increasingly difficult to meet with the antiquated property tax structure."

Turning to the farm fuels problem, the farm leader said, "Reports of farm fuel shortages are becoming increasingly apparent as we move into the

harvest season. It is obvious that unless some strong measures are taken by the federal government or by our state legislature, we could find the completion of harvest seriously hampered.

The state-wide farm organization leader said that the present voluntary system of allocation of fuel is not working

and urged that the Congress pass proposed emergency legislation to establish mandatory priorities.

"In the absence of decisive action by our national Administration it is extremely important that Governor Briscoe call an emergency special session of the state legislature for

the purpose of solving the Texas farm fuel crisis. Each day that passes moves us closer to the deplorable situation where combines, cotton strippers, and other farm machinery could be idled in the fields. Are we going to wait until this happens before responsible people in government take action?" asked Naman.

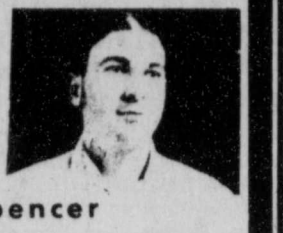

COUNTY AGENT NEWS

To prevent damage from the cattle grub, now is the time to treat. Heel flies, the adult form of the cattle grub, have laid their eggs. The eggs have hatched and the small grubs have tunneled into cattle. Generally, these grubs migrate through the connective tissue to the esophagus and from there to the back taking about 8 months to make the trip. Damage is not evident until the grub appears in the back but by this time most of the damage has been done. Grub-infested animals require more feed and heavily infested cows produce less milk resulting in reduced weaning weights of calves. Other losses after slaughter include trimming losses to remove damage in the back and a reduction in the price of the hide.

Several animal systemic insecticides can be used to control grubs early in their development. These include coumaphos (Co-Ral), curfomate (Rulene) prolate, trichlorfon (Neguvon), famphur (Warbox), fenitrothion (Tiguvon) and ronnel.

Certain of these animal systems can be administered to cattle as pour-on materials, dips, sprays, mineral formulations or feed additives.

When applying control measures for cattle grubs producers should follow closely the directions on the label. Treatment for grubs and drenching should not be done on the same day. Cattle that are sick or under stress should not be treated. Check the label for cautions on the treatment of certain cattle breeds.

Contact your county agent's office for further information on cattle grub control.

person using it.

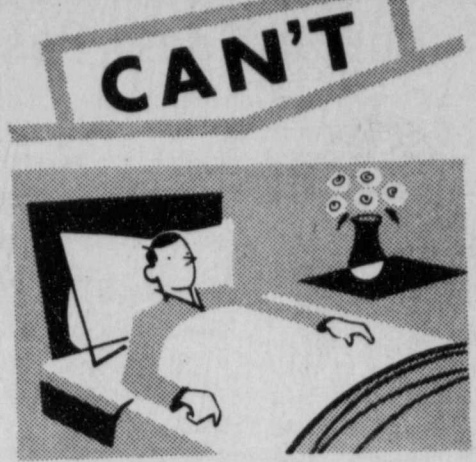
Refreshments of chips and dips, soft drinks and cookies were served to Mrs. Richard Shedd, J. W. Landers and the ones mentioned.

WHEREAS, under the provisions of S. B. No. 447, Acts of the 63rd Legislature, Regular Session, 1973, provision is made for an election to be held within the area of the proposed Fisher County Hospital District upon the question of whether the Fisher County Hospital District shall be created and established with the authority to levy annual taxes, and whether said District (in the event same is created) shall be authorized to issue bonds for the purpose hereinafter set forth and in accordance with said law, it has been and is hereby determined that such election should be ordered; therefore,

BE IT ORDERED, ADJUDGED AND DECREED BY THE COUNTY JUDGE OF FISHER COUNTY, TEXAS:

Section 1: That an election be held on the 28 day of July, 1973, which date is not less than thirty-five (35) nor more than sixty (60) days from the date of this order, at which election there shall be submitted to the resident qualified electors of the proposed Fisher County Hospital District, including those who own taxable property and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, for their action thereupon, the following propositions:

PROPOSITION NUMBER 1 "Shall the Fisher County Hospital District (with boundaries being all that territory situated in Fisher County, Texas) be created and established with authority to levy taxes at a rate not to exceed 75 cents on each \$100 valuation of all taxable property within such District subject to hospital district taxation for the purpose of meeting the requirements of the District's indebtedness and its maintenance and operating expenses?"

PROPOSITION NUMBER 2 "SHALL the Board of Directors of the Fisher County Hospital District (in the event the District is created) be authorized and empowered to issue the bonds of said District to the amount of ONE MILLION FIVE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$1,500,000) for the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovation of buildings and improvements and equipping the same for hospital purposes, and for any or all of such purposes, and shall there be levied, assessed and collected annually ad valorem taxes on all taxable property in the District, subject to Hospital District taxation, sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on said bonds as the same become due
