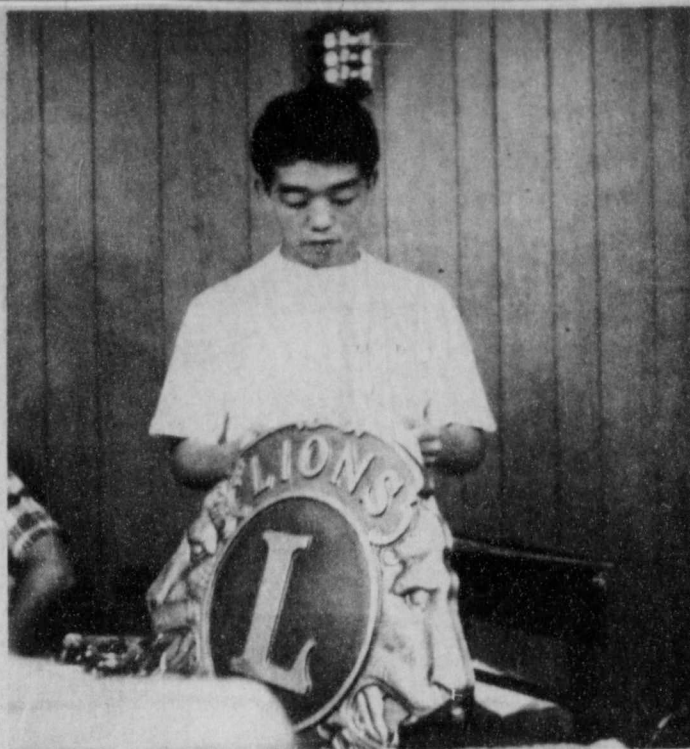

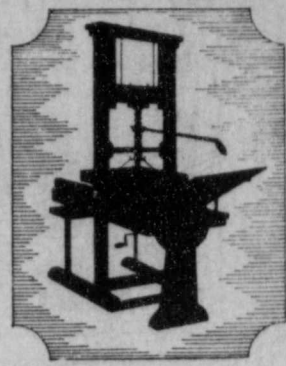

The Rotan Little League All Stars, under the direction of head coach Billy Henderson, Jack Cadenhead and Ted Posey, fell behind one run in the top of the first inning and even managed enough steam to get out of the hole as they lost to Stonewall-Kent's All Stars by a score of 6-0.

Rotan pitcher, Todd Goodwin, had 2 strikes on first batter of the night then glazed his arm with a fast ball to put Stonewall-Kent's first man on base. Goodwin struck out the second batter then nicked the third batter on the leg giving the Stonewall-Kent team a man on second and third (after steals) with one man out. The fourth batter

# Highland Home Baptist Church Votes To Disband

The members of the Highland Home Baptist Church voted in a meeting last Wednesday night to disband the church.

This makes approximately 16 churches that have closed their doors in Fisher County in the last 25 years.

The church will continue with services until it can dispose of its property. One church member indicated that the parsonage would probably be sold and the church building given away to be moved to a new location.

The majority of the 35 members present for the last meeting last Wednesday night voted to sound the death knell for the 84 year old institution.

In its history the Highland Home Baptist Church has had 45 pastors and 20 deacons ordained. The high attendance in

Sunday School was 185 in the late 1940's. A total of 984 people were baptized at the Highland Home Baptist Church since it opened its doors on October 27, 1889.

The attendance at the church has dropped from approximately 60 to about 25 in the last few months. One member said, "attendance got so low that we just couldn't carry on".

## Jim Laurie Completes Tech Ag Short Course

Jim Laurie completed a three week course in General Ag Mechanics at Texas Tech University. The course was designed to up-date teaching methods to help prepare today's high school youth for the labor market.

During the three weeks, topics were covered on Tractors and tractor problems, Farm Machinery service and repair, Mig, Tig and all types of arc and acetylene welding, Surveying and Soil and Water Conservation, small gas engines, electric motors and controls, and the use of many types of testing equipment.

### WEIGHT CONTROL FALLACIES

In the past year I have, for some reason, received several letters inquiring about the same thing—a column I wrote in 1971 in which I listed common fallacies concerning weight control. The American Dietetic Association had collected data on food misinformation that were in wide circulation in the United States. And I published some of the fallacies listed by the association.

My correspondents this past year remembered the columns but wanted the list. This got me thinking that it might be a good idea to repeat the list this week.

#### People Go For Fads

It certainly is true that the subject of weight control is surrounded by fad diets. I would say there is generally better information published now than a few years ago. But still, people seem to go for exotic and "far-out" presentations on the subject. The special foods that some diets require can be expensive. But the biggest objection to fad diets is not just that they are not sound, but that they confuse people and do not lead to the retraining of eating habits that usually is necessary if a person is to reduce and stay reduced.

So, to help clear the air, here is a list of statements that are commonly-held fallacies. All are false:

1. Obesity is due entirely to heredity.
2. In the experience of some people, all foods turn to fat.
3. Meal-skipping is a good way to lose weight.
4. You can eat all you want and still lose weight if you take "reducing pills."
5. Special low-calorie bread should be used in reducing diets.
6. Toast has fewer calories than bread.
7. One must not drink water when trying to lose weight.
8. Candy enriched with vitamins may be eaten when a person is reducing.
9. Washing rice after cooking reduces calories.
10. Sugar is not as fattening as starch.
11. High-protein foods and fruits have no calories.
12. Gelatin dessert is non fattening.
13. Milk should not be included in a weight reduction diet.
14. "De-starched" potato chips do not have calories.
15. Meat burns its own calories.
16. Margarine contains fewer calories than butter.
17. For reducing, eat high protein foods for a week; then eat anything you want for a week.
18. Grapefruit will reduce a person.

Remember the statements are all false, not true.

# Western Texas Offering Veterans Program

Western Texas College is planning an expanded program of services to veterans for the 1973-74 school year, according to a schedule of events submitted by Dr. Duane Hood, Dean of Student Services.

Included in the services are pre-registration for veterans (to allow for advance payment of benefits), organization of the student veterans on campus to take advantage of tutorial programs offered through V. A. and to allow for improved communications, and employment of a special veteran's advisor to work with veterans and their problems in line with the requirements of the Cranston Amendment of 1973.

The expansion of services has been precipitated by three new features of the Veterans' educational benefits which allow for increased benefits, advance pay-

ment for school attendance, and direct payment to colleges for attendance of veterans. In addition, the 1973-74 school year will be the last opportunity for many veterans to take advantage of their educational benefits. Veterans must complete their educational programs within eight years after discharge. Veterans discharged before June 1, 1966, have until June 1, 1974, to complete their programs.

The pre-registration of veterans will be held on Tuesday, July 24, at the Science Lecture Hall on the WTC campus. Sessions are at 9:00 a. m. and 7:00 p. m. This registration will allow the veteran to receive his first benefit check during the regular registration period rather than waiting until after a month (or sometimes two) after he begins attendance. WTC personnel will be on hand to assist

in scheduling as well as preparation of applications for new veterans who wish to begin their educational programs. Regular registration for the fall term is set for September 4, and 5. Officials of local Veterans' organizations will also be present to assist the veterans at these meetings. According to Dr. Hood, the pre-registration is not mandatory for drawing V. A. benefits, but is required before advance payment can be made.

New applicants for V. A. assistance should bring copies of the following documents to the meeting: marriage license, birth certificates of children, and separation certificate DD214.

## Local Artists Capture Past In Paintings

Mrs. Calvin Phillips is well known for her paintings which include a number of historical subjects. Those attending the recent Art Show presented by Mr. and Mrs. Phillips will attest to the fact that she is also an outstanding art teacher.

Mrs. Phillips says, "I try to teach all my students to paint things like these old buildings. They will all soon be gone. By putting them on canvas I feel

that maybe we can preserve history. I am very interested in doing just that.

"My husband and I take pictures of old homes and other buildings and try to get the history of each. When I teach the students to paint them, I find that if I tell them about the old houses, or barns, or even places they are eager to paint them. By doing this I teach a little of the history of our surroundings as well as art.

"Monte Morrow's painting is that of the first school house at Cottonwood built in 1890 in the Rough Creek community. In 1910 it was sold to Bud Hardin, (Monte's great-grandfather). With the help of his neighbors, it was moved by horses to his ranch where it was used as a barn. The old building had stood near the Cottonwood cemetery before it was moved. It was replaced with another one-room building which was later moved

and another room added.

"My daughter, Patricia Porter, has painted the old two-room building at Cottonwood and this is also in the show. I went to school in this building when I was in the second grade.

"Kim Ratliff's painting is the old J.K. (Jim) Adair house which is on her father's ranch. It started as a dugout. When Mr. Adair married he moved two rooms and added them to the dugout with the help of his neighbors. In 1905, again helped by neigh-

bors, two more rooms and a porch were added.

"A Post Office was needed in Loughorn Valley so one room of the Adair house was converted into a Post Office. For years the residents of the Valley received their mail at Adair, Texas. I do not know when the first part of the house was built, but as far as I can find out it was in the late 1880's. The house is still in good repair.

"Mark Henderson's painting is of the old two story house

which, until destroyed by fire a few years ago, was a land mark

east of Rotan. Tradition is that the house was built about 1890 by a Thompson family, and was ordered pre-cut from Sears & Roebuck mail order catalog. I have been unable to prove or disprove this tradition, but I did

learn that pre-cut houses were listed in the catalog during that era.

"There are three generations

represented in the show here-- my daughter Patricia Porter, her two children, Tanya and Michael, and me."

Other artists featured in the show were Shirley Byrd, Carol Byrd, Lynn Deen, Linda Deen,

Mickey Ferris, Pat Kelley, Nathan Kelley, Kris Lenier, Evelyn Vaughn, Kaye Vaughn, Helen Elkins, Judy Petty and Sandy Mathies. Their paintings represented a variety of subjects

and techniques--each worthy of note.

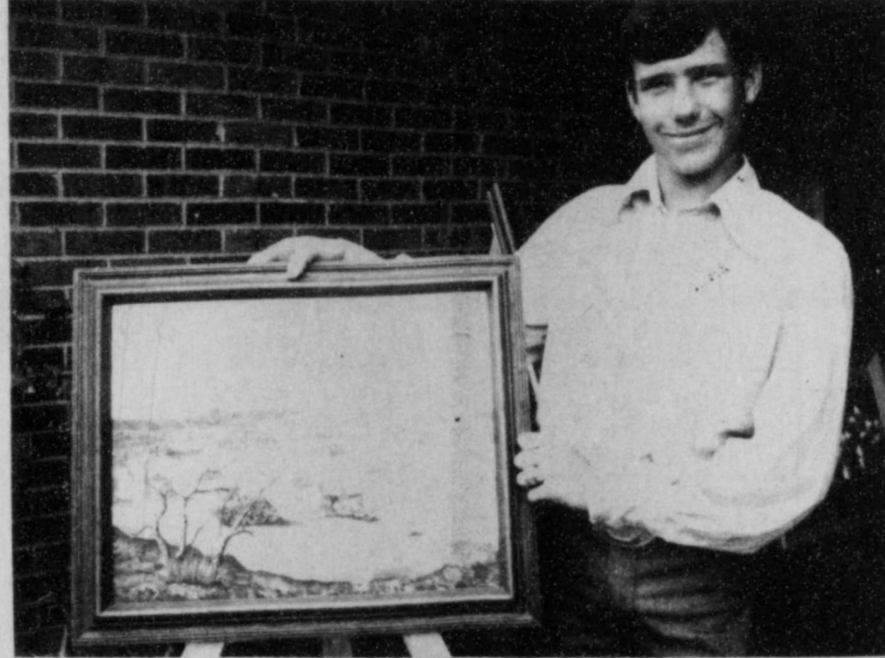
Mrs. Phillips is one of four

## Young Men Face Prosecution If They Fail To Register For Draft

Colonel Melvin N. Glantz, the State Director of Selective Service for Texas, reminded young men that they still must register with Selective Service even though there is no draft.

Glantz urged those men who have not registered to do so promptly, saying: "Failure to register is a violation of Federal

Law and could result in prosecution by the Department of Justice."

The President's authority to induct men into the Armed Forces expired on July 1, 1973. The Nixon Administration does not plan to seek an extension of this authority, and the Defense Department is relying on volun-

teer enlistments to supply military manpower.

Glantz emphasized that only the authority to induct expired. All other provisions of the Military Selective Service Act remain in force. The annual lottery will be held, young men will continue to register, and their local boards will continue to classify them as to their availability for possible military service should Congress authorize the resumption of inductions in the event of a national emergency.

The State Director said the law requires all male persons, except certain nonimmigrant aliens, to register with Selective Service within 30 days before or after their 18th birthday. He said: "Young men have three legal obligations: (1) they must

register at age 18, (2) they must notify their local draft board when they change address, and (3) they must carry their draft cards with them until their liability for service expires, for most men this is age 26."

The Colonel explained that Selective Service is undergoing a major reorganization and that as Selective Service goes into a standby operation, no inductions are taking place. Many local board offices are being relocated, with the result of fewer draft board offices in Texas. Glantz said there are places of registration provided in each Texas county for the convenience of young men in registering.

The registrars for Local Board 96 are Mr. Tom Collins, Courthouse, Roby, and the Local Board Office in the basement of the Post Office in Sweetwater.

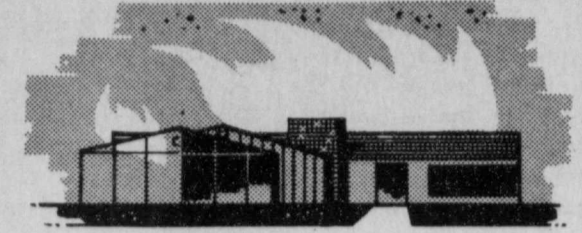

### Patio Party Good Time To Introduce Peanut Butter Ice Cream

Chances are you won't find peanut butter ice cream at the local ice cream parlor. But you can make it at home. Take your choice from a variety of methods. However you make it, it's a nutritious combination, offering protein both from the peanut butter and ice cream, vitamin A from the ice cream, and niacin, a B vitamin, from the peanut butter.

**Extra Smooth Peanut Butter Ice Cream:** Beat 1 cup Skippy creamy or chunk style peanut butter with mixer at high speed until soft and light in color. Gradually add 1 quart vanilla ice cream, softened, beating well after each addition. Beat until light and fluffy. Pour into 9 x 5 x 3-inch loaf pan. Freeze about 2 hours or until firm.

**Peanut Butter Dot Ice Cream:** Soften vanilla ice cream just enough to be able to stir it. Stir in 1/2 teaspoonfuls of peanut butter so that it is dotted throughout the vanilla ice cream. Refreeze.

**Peanut Butter Sundae:** Serve vanilla ice cream with this peanut butter sundae sauce. Mix together in a saucepan 1/2 cup firmly packed brown sugar, 1/2 cup light corn syrup and a pinch of salt. Stirring constantly, bring to a boil and boil 2 minutes. Remove from heat. Stir in 1/2 cup Skippy creamy or chunk style peanut butter, 1/2 cup heavy cream, and 1/2 teaspoon vanilla. Cool. Serve over ice cream.

**Fudgy Peanut Butter Topping for Ice Cream:** Mix together 1/2 cup Bosco, 1/2 cup Skippy chunk style peanut butter. Stir in 1/2 cup light corn syrup until blended.
