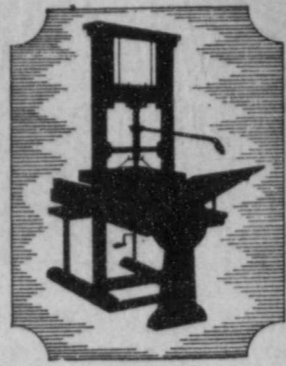
Ex-Pastor To Hold Baptist Revival

Doug Weathersbee, new president of the Rotan Chamber of Commerce, presided over his first meeting last Tuesday morning. The meeting centered around a familiarization and review of past activities conducted by the Chamber.

Those present for the meeting included: Ray Womack, Lester Sescil, Carlton Burrow and Weathersbee, Other Chamber of Commerce Directors are James Carter, Yoke Fleming, Garvis Hinson and Charles McCall.

Lester Sescil gave a report on the only hold-over project by the 1972-73 directors. The road signs, according to Sescil, are constructed and the committee is in the process of securing a site for their erection.

Some of the projects conducted in the past that were mentioned by Chamber officials for possible implementation in the 1973-74 year included: A Thanksgiving turkey promotion; Christmas Teasur Hunt; Cash money for the first bale of cot-

ton; Christmas Lighting; Holiday House Lighting Contest and the FFA project.

New project discussed for possible implementation were A Citizen of the Year Program; improving the towns appearance by constructing some benches on the downtown sidewalks; a renewal of the Clean-Up --- Paint-Up project; and sending letters to all newcomers.

Chamber Directors are going to undertake a program of surveying the citizens of Rotan for suggestions on possible projects that would improve the City of Rotan. This is expected to be printed in next week's local newspaper.

County Schools Start Classes August 20th

Schools in Fisher County will begin for students on Monday morning, August 20, as the summer vacation for residents of Hobbs, McCaulley, Roby and Rotan draws rapidly to a close.

Rotan students will be reporting at a new time as classes for the 1973-74 year begin at 8:15 a. m. Kindergarten students, grades 1 and 2 will dismiss at 2:15 p. m.; grade 3 will dismiss at 3:00 p. m.; and grades four through 12 will leave school at 3:30 p. m. Rotan school officials have indicated that the buses will run on normal schedule, the lunchroom will be open and a full day of school is on tap for opening day.

Rotan teachers begin a week of in-service training on August 13 in preparation for the first day of school on August 20th.

HOSPITAL BOARD ELECTS RALPH AMMONS PRES.

The newly appointed members of the Fisher County Hospital District held their maiden meeting last Wednesday night and discussed the plans and problems facing the committee for over two and one-half hours.

Those attending the meeting included Allan Houston, Wendell Morrow, Kermit Terry, Ralph Ammons, and David Williams, all directors of Fisher County Hospital District. Other citizens attending included Fisher County Judge Dwight Lovett, Commissioner E. J. (Junior) Kiker, Gene Vinyard, representing Vinyard and Street Financial Advisors in Austin, and Fisher County Hospital Steering Committee Chairman Wayne Harris, and Dr. Maurice Callan of Rotan.

Judge Lovett opened the meeting by welcoming the members of the hospital district board, thanking them for consenting to serve and stated, "We believe we have five of the best men in the county as members of this board." Judge Lovett then administered the oath of office to the five members.

The next item of business was the selection of a board president. Allan Houston made

a motion seconded by David Williams to nominate Ralph Ammons for the position of president of the Fisher County Hospital District Board. The nominations ceased and a motion to approve Ralph Ammons was made by acclamation. Wendell Morrow was named by the members to serve as vice president of the group and Allan Houston was elected as secretary-treasurer.

After considerable discussion a permanent meeting date of the first and third Monday night of each month was established. The meetings will be held in the Fisher County Commissioners Court Room until the proposed hospital is constructed. The meeting time was set at 8:00 p. m. with the first meeting to be held on August 20.

The biggest task facing the Fisher County Hospital District Directors is planning a course of action to attempt to convince the appeals board to approve Fisher County for the treatment of Medicare patients. The Governor's Comprehensive Health Planning Board did not grant initial approval to Fisher County citing an excess number of

hospital beds in the area as the prime reason. The local board voted to submit a letter to Dr. Ervin Beddin, M. D., Acting Director of Comprehensive Health Planning in Austin, putting him on notice of Fisher County's intention to appeal the first ruling.

Dr. Maurice Callan spoke before the board at last Wednesday's meeting citing a desire by the doctors at Callan Hospital to cooperate with the board members and assist in anyway possible. Dr. Callan discussed the problem of transition from the old hospital to the new with a request that a meeting be arranged between the Hospital Board and all the doctors of Callan Clinic to discuss these problems.

Dr. Callan and the other three practicing physicians at Callan

Hospital, Dr. C. U. Callan, Dr. J.F. Johnson, and Dr. Bennie Le Bleu are scheduled to meet with the full Fisher County Hospital District Board on Monday night, September 3, to further discuss this situation that exists.

Dr. Callan informed board members that he felt it was not impossible to recruit a new doctor to practice in the county. He assured the board that he and the other doctors would do all in their power to assist in recruiting young doctors to maintain an adequate medical staff in Fisher County.

Judge Dwight Lovett ended the meeting by assuring those present that in his opinion a "hard knocking appeal to the Comprehensive Health Planning appeal board had a good chance of approval".

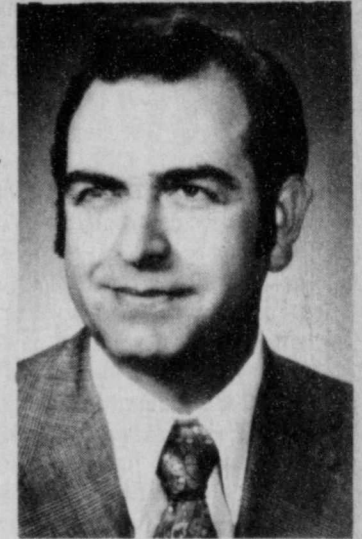
Johnny Jackson Heads Church of Christ Revival

"Think you can use these", she asked. "Sure," I said confidently with a bit of doubt in the back of my mind.

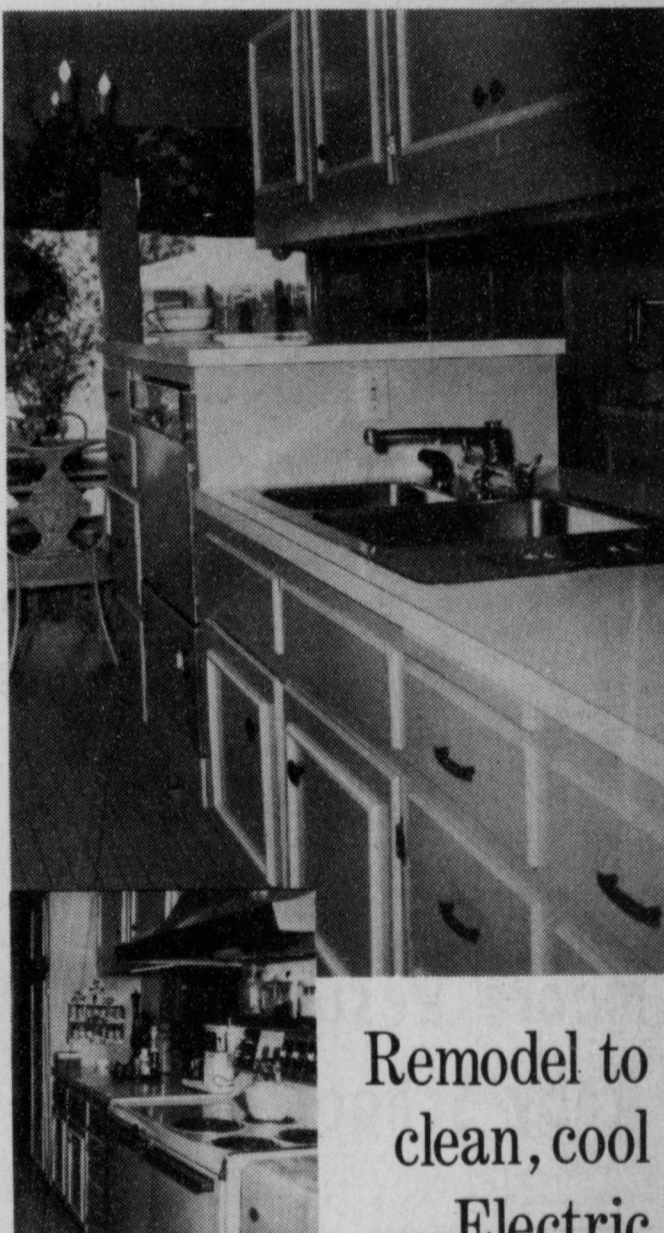

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First Clegg Family Moved To Long Horn Valley In 1881

For the first time since 1946 Mrs. J. F. (Narcie) Clegg has had her children all together. And for a few hours on Saturday, August 4, the Clegg home in Long Horn Valley resounded with the voices of descendants as they enjoyed a picnic lunch and reminisced under the trees in the pecan orchard.

Since 1888 the Clegg name has been almost synonymous with the name Long Horn Valley. Others came, and left, through the intervening eighty-five years but the Clegg family came and stayed. The first of the name to settle in the Valley was Joseph Clegg who brought a herd of 600 sheep when he moved with his family to the fertile land in a bend of the Double Mountain River in the northwest corner of Fisher County, Joseph Clegg died in 1889, and his son, the late J. F. Clegg, remained in the valley.

J. F. Clegg purchased the land of several other settlers in the valley in 1909. He was born in Bell County, February 12, 1873. Coming to Fisher County from Buffalo Gap in 1881, the family first settled a claim on the Clear Fork in Hobbs Community north-

west of where the town of Rotan now stands. This was before the county was organized and before Roby was established. From there Joseph Clegg moved his family to Long Horn Valley.

In 1899 J. F. Clegg married Paralee Barry in Sentinel, Okla. and brought her home to the Valley. She died in 1922, and in 1927 he was married to the former Narcissia Poteet of County Line Community. The nine children of the first marriage became as her own. Four children were born to the second union. The six surviving sons are Lewis of Abilene; Leon, Denton; Clifford, Long Horn Valley; Willard, Castle Rock, Washington; Jimmy, Whittier, California; and Dr. Luther Clegg of Fort Worth. Two sons, Jack and Wallace, are deceased. Daughters are Bertie (Mrs. Grundy Thomson), Molly (Mrs. A. H. Hudnall) Naomi (Mrs. Vinyard) of San Marcos, Nita, on leave from Missionary assignment in Africa, and Dr. Frances Clegg.

The Clegg family helped to establish the Nazarene Church in County Line Community when the services were held under a brush arbor. Later, a ta-

beracle was built and services continued there until the church was disbanded. The remaining members are a part of the Rotan Nazarene Church. Religion is an integral part of the daily lives of this family, and the lives of others have been blessed just by knowing them.

Narcie Poteet Clegg is the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. L. C. Poteet who were also pioneer settlers of County Line Community. A scrapbook beginning with the words, "Compiled by Narcissia Poteet Clegg down through the years" exemplifies the quality of her life. It is filled with inspiring poems, some clippings concerning people she cherished, and thoughts of her from friends. Cards from her children express the love and admiration she so richly deserves. There is a very touching letter from a man saying, "I have felt led for a good while to write this letter". It was to thank her for her prayers in his behalf, the songs she taught him, and the many good and kind things she and Mr. Clegg had done for them.

Some years ago in a personality building course an assignment was given to write a description of an adult who the student admired most. The teacher, feeling that people should have their flowers while they are living, asked the student's per-

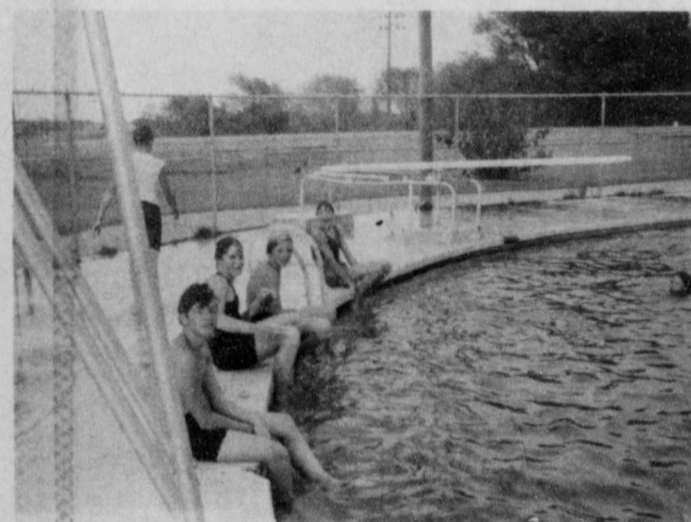

Hobbs HD Club met July 26 with Mrs. Turner Houghton.

Mrs. Edgar B. Balch of Abilene and with the Texas Rodent Predatory Service of A&M University, stated that beside rats and mice, rodents can even be squirrels, porcupines, or others.

She told the group to first find their trail, they are oily creatures, therefore leave a dark greasy smear in the opening they pass through. Rodents can cost you as much as \$20.00 a year in damage and have been known to travel house to house by walking telephone wires. Mice can go through 3/8 inch openings, rats 1/2 inch hole. "Clean up" rats are attracted by old lumber, trash piles, open garbage cans, unkept fence rows and rubbish heaps. She named a list of products to use for bait and warned against using poisons inside the home.

New Tire Safety Rules Listed

A new system of automobile tire rotation for maximum safe tread life has been adopted by tire industry experts, the Tire Industry Safety Council reports in a new edition of its "Consumer Tire Guide."

Using the new system, bias and belted bias rear tires should be moved straight forward, and front tires criss-crossed to the rear wheels.

The old rotation system was the reverse, front tires moved straight back and rear tires criss-crossed forward.

The new Guide also includes a rotation pattern for radial tires.

Radials should be exchanged front and rear on the same side of the automobile, the experts say. They should never be criss-crossed.

"Proper rotation procedures are spelled out in detail in the new Guide primarily because they are an important tire safety precaution," said Council

Chairman Malcolm R. Lovell Jr. "Premature and uneven tire wear can cause poor steering response and possible sudden tire disengagement," Mr. Lovell explained.

According to the guide, to realize the full potential of tread life, tires should be rotated at 6,000 to 8,000 mile intervals. The first such rotation is by far the most important in setting the stage for long even wear. In some instances, if irregular wear begins to develop, rotation will be advisable at less than 6,000 miles.

The Guide says that inflation should be rechecked after rotation to get proper front and rear pressure relationship.

Rotation time is also a good time to inspect tires for damage and to remove foreign objects embedded in the tread.

The Guide cautions that if different types of tires are used on front and rear axles, they should be rotated on the same axle.

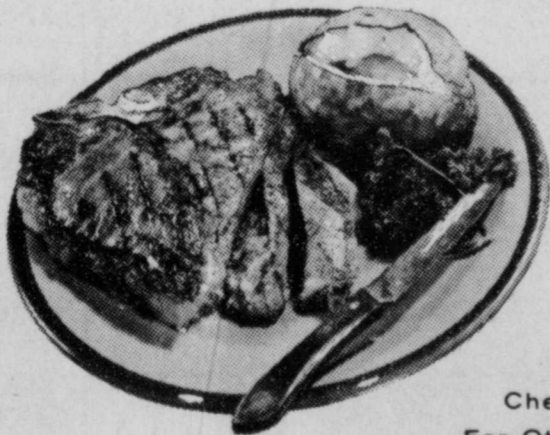

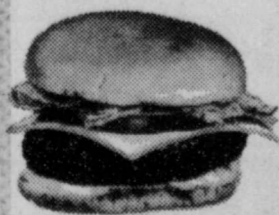

Richardson, Jr. Manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of Roby, announced today that the billing rate of Federal Land Bank farm and ranch variable interest rate loans is being increased from 7% to 7-3/4% effective August 1, 1973. The rate on rural residence loans is being increased from 7-1/2% to 8-1/4%. The variable interest rate loan plan which was introduced by the Houston Bank in July, 1969, lets the rate "float" over the variations in the money market.

Continued high interest rates in the money market have made it necessary for the Bank to take this action. Interest rates have risen rapidly since early 1973 and the Bank has delayed action until this time in order to determine whether or not these rate increases were temporary. Mr. Richardson stated, The Bank recently marketed an issue of bonds which sold at an average

effective cost of 7.6%. It now appears that present interest levels will probably not change materially until the end of the year.

The Federal Land Bank of Houston makes long-term real

estate loans on farm and ranch land and rural residences throughout Texas and now has more than 775 million dollars in volume of loans outstanding. The local association makes and services loans in Fisher, Nolan, and Taylor counties. Officers

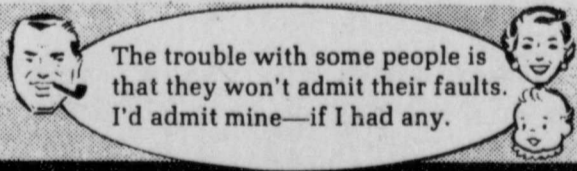

COUNTY AGENT NEWS

The old familiar cattle cycle has become less evident in recent years but is still with us.

A count of the total number of cattle on farms as of the first of each year continues to show some distinct "buildup" years followed by some "liquidation" years. Herds expand during the buildup years and are reduced during liquidation periods.

During the buildup years, since more calves are being produced, more are being fed and consequently more cattle are slaughtered. Prices during such periods, in general, move lower. As the liquidation years occur, less calves are born, feeding decreases and slaughter becomes smaller, allowing prices to strengthen.

Does the numbers cycle cause the price cycle or vice-versa? For the most part, they are opposite to each other and act as a cause as well as an effect. For example, the reason for increasing and decreasing herd size is a reaction of producers to the profitability of the cattle business.

The last buildup peaked in 1965, eight years after it began. Two years of liquidation followed, but the reduction was small. The present buildup cycle began in 1967. This buildup is

expected to peak by 1975 and will probably be followed by a slight liquidation for about two years. Prices in general, should be moving to slightly lower levels as the peak year approaches.

Animals account for one out of every 10 accidents, according to a recent survey by the National Safety Council. And with horses becoming more popular and horse related activities increasing by leaps and bounds, special attention should be given to safety precautions.

The following safety tips for working with horses are urged.

- Always approach a horse at an angle, never directly from the front or rear. Always speak to a horse as you are approaching it.

- While working around horses, stay in close to the horse so if it kicks, you will not receive the full impact of the kick. Work about a horse from a position as near the shoulder as possible.

- Be calm, confident and collected around horses. A nervous handler causes a nervous, unsafe horse.

- It is not safe to leave a halter on a loose horse. The horse may catch a foot in the halter strap, or the halter may catch on a fence.

The Raspberry Flummery, which blends the flavors of raspberries and currants is a popular European type dessert.

Quick Raspberry Flummery

1 package (10-ounces) frozen raspberries, thawed	¼ cup sugar
1 jar (10-ounces) red currant jelly	½ cup corn starch
¾ cup water	½ cup water
	1 tablespoon lemon juice

Press thawed raspberries through sieve to remove seeds. Mix together berry puree, jelly, ¼ cup water and sugar in saucepan. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until jelly is dissolved. With a spoon, blend corn starch and ¼ cup water. Stir into berry mixture. Cook, stirring constantly, until mixture thickens and boils 3 minutes. Remove from heat. Stir in lemon juice. Pour into 1 quart mold. Chill until firm. Makes 4 to 6 servings.
