## Rotan First Baptist Plans Irish Weekend

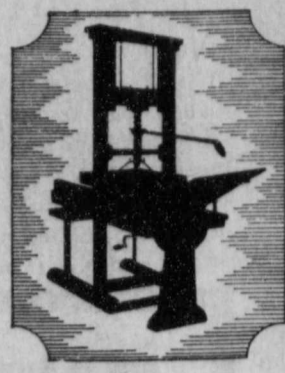

## Rotan Council Discusses Pool, Paving, Street Signs

The Rotan City Council met last Tuesday night and voted to "ear-mark" the \$18,599.00 in Federal Revenue Sharing money to be received between July 1973 and June 1974 to be spent on sewer improvements.

The council is expected to begin a step-by-step plan that will eventually completely re-

place the current system thus eliminating the unsanitary condition and odor that now exists.

The motion to set aside the money for the improvements was made by Councilmen Lawrence Bredemeyer and seconded by Councilman Jack Jones.

Councilmen discussed the progress being made on the revenue

sharing money set-aside for the golf course and cemetery water improvement and the money designated for the construction of a new city barn. Mayor James Springer requested that City Manager Kenneth Vann secure some proposals and bids on both projects to be presented to the council at the September meeting.

Councilmen were generally of the opinion that a steel building be considered for the new City barn.

After discussing the Cemetery Committee Councilman Sam Hamm made a motion to ask the members of the current committee to continue to serve in that capacity. Current members include: Mac Weathersbee, Kenneth Vann, Annie Mae McKinney, Bemice Hardy, Roby Smith and Bobby Orben.

A long discussion took place concerning requesting the owner of Block 174 in the City of Rotan to remove a partially erected fence that was being built on

## Commissioners Award Bid On New Office Furniture

Fisher County Commissioners opened bids last Monday morning on the purchase of approximately \$10,500.00 of office furniture for the new court house. Commissioners accepted the low bid on 15 desks, 64 chairs, two tables and other miscellaneous office furniture. Harold Bennett's Office Supply in Snyder submitted a bid of \$7,831.70 for the furniture; Bill Stephens' Office Supply in Snyder submitted two bids, one for \$8,233.96, the other for \$7,463.96, but the low bid of \$6,697.50 was turned in by the Rotan Advance-Roby Star Record.

Commissioners also approved a contract with a firm to check smoke sensors in both the Golden Haven Rest Home in Roby and Fisher County Nursing Home in Rotan. The inspection is to be made every 90 days.

Fisher County Auditor Al Finch explained to commissioners that work on the budget for next year would begin soon. He and Judge Dwight Lovett are to review some phases of the budget prior to the next meeting and make some preliminary recommendations to the commissioners.

L. V. Armstrong Implement Company in Roby was low bidder on a 990 David Brown Tractor purchased for \$3,805.00 with a trade in.

R. J. Schumacher was awarded an oil and gas production lease on all of the NW 1/4 of section 75, block 1 of the H & T C RR Company lands (Rushing property). It was a one year lease with a 1/8 royalty provision and \$100.00 bonus payment to the county.

## John Deere To Show New Tractors, Disks Saturday

Wendell Morrow at Farm Tractor and Service Inc., recently returned from Waterloo, Iowa, where John Deere officials announced that four new 35 to 70 horsepower tractors would be added to the John Deere line-up of equipment this fall.

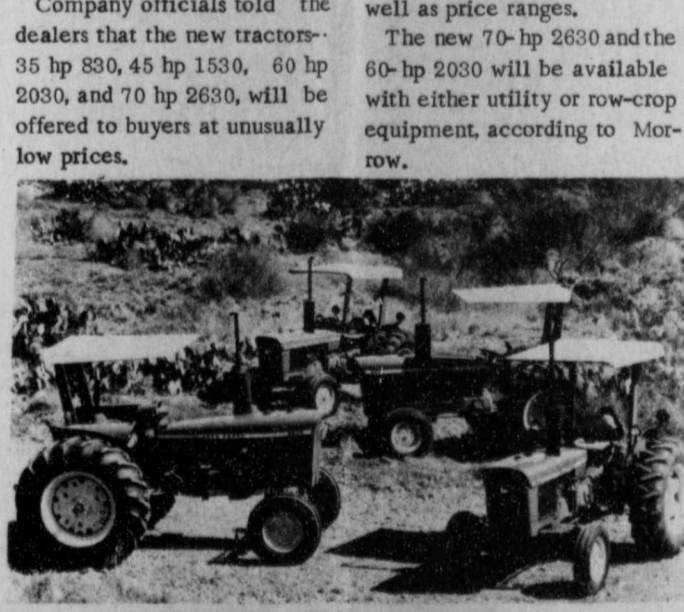
The new tractor plus two of nine new level-action disks will be on display at Farm Tractor and Service Inc. beginning Saturday, August 18. "The disk to be displayed is especially suited for farmers of this area", Morrow said, adding that the new line is "... perhaps the biggest advance in disk design since disks were invented".

Company officials told the dealers that the new tractors—35 hp 830, 45 hp 1530, 60 hp 2030, and 70 hp 2630, will be offered to buyers at unusually low prices.

Base prices on all four new models include quality features such as hydraulic brakes, planetary final drives, variable speed diesel engines, 8-speed collar-shift transmission, and power steering.

The four new John Deere diesel models have a suggested list price that's hundreds of dollars less than comparably-equipped competitive tractors. Another point made was the fact that there are now four models in the 35-to 70-hp class in the John Deere line, compared to 3 previous models, which makes it possible for a John Deere dealer to offer more variety in horsepower sizes as well as price ranges.

The new 70-hp 2630 and the 60-hp 2030 will be available with either utility or row-crop equipment, according to Morrow.

## Lunches Increased 10¢ By Board Roby High Secures New Assistant Grid Coach

Roby Independent School Board trustees increased the price of lunches for the 1973-74 school year at their August board meeting. Effective Monday, August 20, 1973, children in Kindergarten through grade 4 will pay 40¢ for lunches. Grades 5 through 8 were increased 10¢ per lunch over last year when board members voted to establish 45¢ as the daily price for those grades.

High school students will see an increase in lunches from 40¢ to 50¢ for the 1973-74 school term.

Walter Holik, a graduate of San Angelo State, was hired by school officials to conduct studies in Junior High, coach junior high girls basketball and act as an assistant high school football coach.

Mrs. Forrest Price and Mrs. Ruth Davis were both hired under Title I as resource teachers. Kenneth Savage was employed as the bus maintenance man for the 1973-74 term and Buck Hughes was hired as a half-time bus driver. The school officials have cut out one bus route, bus route #4 that went northward Rotan was cut out but students on the route will be picked up by other buses that will modify their routes.

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## School Board Reduces New Budget After \$19,000 Loss

Despite a \$1,305,066 tax evaluation loss amounting to approximately \$19,000 in tax money to the Rotan Independent School System, school officials and Rotan School Board members accepted the proposed budget for the 1973-1974 school year. Ironically, with the spiraling inflation, increased costs of materials and loss of financial aid, the administration and board members have managed to put together a budget that is almost \$8,000,00 less than the previous year's budget. The 1972-73 amended budget amounted to \$505,511. Proposed revenue from all sources for 1973-74 budget have been estimated at \$533,290, with estimated expenditures of \$497,668.00.

Former school board member E. W. Cade, Jr., who was on the school board when K. C. McCasland was hired some 13 years ago, appeared before the board with some ideas concerning the future of the school system. Cade was sincere in his appearance and voiced the shadow of doubt concerning the possibility of constructing additional tennis courts. He was

of the opinion that if the school had the money (citing that it was quite evident that they did not after reviewing the tight 1973-74 budget) to construct new tennis courts then he thought they should also look at some other areas that needed improvements. Cade discussed with board members the financial structure of the school, a field house, improvements to the track field, consolidation, the \$1,300,000 tax evaluation loss and school pride. He made it clear that he was not appearing before the board with any simple answers to any specific problems, that he did not have "an ax to grind with anyone", but simply was interested in the future of the school system without regard to personal benefit.

A letter of resignation was read to board members by Dr. Jerry Marshall from former high school teacher Jerry Scott. Scott's letter of resignation was accepted with regret.

School Board Secretary, Dr. Jerry Marshall, made a motion, seconded by Charles Thornton to hire four teachers for the 1973-74 school year. Mrs. Joe

Date Burk will be teaching Remedial Reading under the Title I program in grades 1 through 8; Mrs. Wesley Ballard will teach related math and physical science; Mr. Wesley Ballard will teach social studies in high school and Mr. Gordon Dave Goodrich will teach history in the 7th and 8th grades.

Another new school employee for the 1973-74 term is Mrs. Kelley Thompson, who will be a teachers aide in the Junior High School Building.

Gandy's dairies was awarded the milk bid for the 1973-1974 school year. Their bid of .0920 cents for 1/2 pint of homogenized milk, and .0960¢ on 1/2 pint of chocolate milk was accepted over Foremost Dairy's bid of .0925¢ for white milk and .0925¢ for chocolate.

School Board members accepted the bid of Bush Distributing Company in Dallas on a 1964 Chevrolet bus for \$1,233, and a 1966 Chevrolet bus for \$1,856. Allan Houston and Bobby Smith made and seconded the motion respectively to accept the bids over others from College Avenue Baptist Church in Lubbock; Boulevard Assembly of God in Ft. Worth, First Baptist Church in Leuders, and Clifton Jones of Clute, Tex.

In order to comply with a new state law concerning school bus drivers, school board members discussed the required physical examinations and driver training courses. Each bus driver will be required to take a physical and have some type of drivers training. Board members voted to pay for the physical examination and training.

After a brief discussion concerning the lunchroom, Superintendent K. C. McCasland informed school board members that he "anticipated no increase in the price of meals" for the coming year.

The 1973-74 budget, although accepted, will not be officially adopted until Saturday at 12:00 noon. This allows time for anyone interested in asking questions about the budget to meet with school board members at that time in the Superintendent's office.

The meeting lasted approximately 3 hours and 15 minutes. The next regular scheduled school board meeting will be on September 10, 1973.

The reunion is held each year on the third Sunday in August. Friends are invited to attend.

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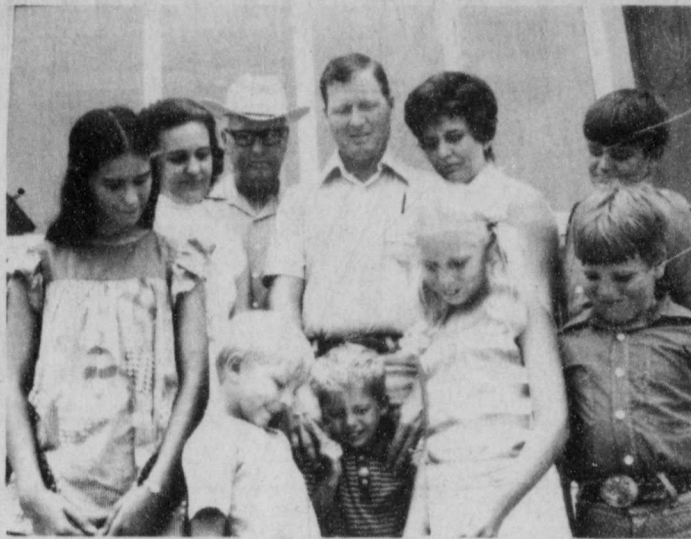
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## Mr. And Mrs. Bobby Gruben Serving On Farmers Union State Task Forces

members to use the Farmers Union to solve problems. The three Task Forces will serve in the areas of the environment, international trade, and farmers' economic problems."

Bobby Gruben is serving on the Economic Task Force. Mrs. Gruben is serving on the International Trade Task Force.

Each Task Force selected co-chairmen at the meeting. Co-chairmen of the International Trade group are Buddy Tate of Quail and Joe Ranking of Rawls. Ben Archer of Maxwell and Mrs. Karen Tate of Samnorwood are co-chairing the Environmental Task Force. Co-chairing the Economic Task are Vernon Chandler of Midland and W. R. Sage of Lubbock.

The Task Forces also each agreed on a plan of action for the coming months. The Economic Task Force will organize a series of District Meetings to be held while Congress is in recess to discuss the new farm legislation. The group also plans to invite city congressmen to the sessions in an attempt to inform them of the farmer's side of the consumer problems.

The Environmental Task Force defined four problem areas for consideration. These are (1) the quality of rural human life, (2) the farmer's role in relation to the total environment, (3) oil related problems, and (4) the relationship of natural fibers and the energy crisis.

The International Trade Task Force agreed to sponsor a series of area seminars to attempt to bring the farmers more accurate foreign and domestic market information. It also agreed to a

research project on the feasibility of the development of an international cotton agreement to establish minimum world prices.

## Follow Jesus Crusade In Rotan August 27th

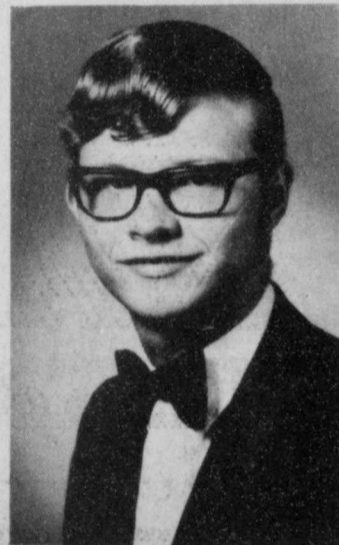

## District Meetings Planned By Farmers Union

Farmers Union members will be given a briefing on the details of the 1973 Agriculture Act passed by Congress at a series of district meetings beginning August 20. The farm program briefings will be part of a series of district meetings coordinated by the Texas Farmers Union to alert the grassroots membership of the bill's provision and shortcomings.

TFU President Jay Naman of Waco had this to say regarding the farm bill. "I know that our members will take advantage of the opportunity they have to study our new farm legislation at the planned district meetings. In fact, I feel confident that following discussion of the bill they will wish to visit with their individual Congressman, while home on recess, as to the reasons behind the bill's many shortcomings. These shortcomings are the reason that Texas

Farmers Union has called upon the President to veto this inadequate piece of farm legislation."

Both state President Jay Naman of Waco and State Vice President Joe Rankin of Ralls will attend the district meetings and discuss late developing national and state issues. Emphasis will be given during these informal discussions on the local fuel situation.

At a recent leadership conference sponsored by Texas Farmers Union on the campus of Southwest Texas State University in San Marcos, 3 task forces have developed action programs to deal with problems arising in three areas. The task force areas of concern are environment, international trade, and economics (primarily farm program development and cooperative relations. Members

of the task forces will be present at each of the district meetings to acquaint the membership with the goals and action programs of the various task forces.

Naman outlined the district meeting itinerary as follows: District I, Monday, August 20, Noon, Pampa, Furr's Cafeteria, Coronado Shipping Center; District II, Monday, August 20, 7:00 p.m., Lubbock Furr's Cafeteria, Town and County Shopping Center; District III, Tuesday, Aug. 21, noon, Anson, Sirloin 66 Cafe; District VIII, Tuesday, Aug. 21, 7:00 p.m., Colorado City, Villa Inn Restaurant; District VI, Thursday, August 23, 7:00 p.m., Denton, Underwood's Cafeteria, 2109 University Drive. All district meetings are being planned in conjunction with a Dutch Treat meal.

In referring to the district meetings, Naman stated, "We are expecting a large turnout
