

Begins Search For Administrator And New Hospital Site

HOSPITAL BOARD HIRES ARCHITECT, PASSES RESOLUTION TO TAKE OVER CALLAN HOSPITAL

The members of the Fisher County Hospital District board of directors voted to hire an architect, passed a resolution outlining some of the agreements reached with the Callan Hospital doctors concerning the eventual takeover of Callan Hospital by the board, authorized President Ammons to begin looking for a hospital site and discussed hiring a hospital administrator.

After discussing the qualifications of 5 architectural firms, the board members voted to hire Hewyett and Royer Associates of Kansas City. This firm specializes in the design of hospitals and has designed the complexes at Muleshoe, Naples and Mount Pleasant, Texas. Their fee is to be 8% of the cost of construction. If the hospital costs

\$900,000.00 to construct, Hewyett and Royer Associates will receive \$72,000.00. The motion to hire the architectural firm was made by Wendell Morrow and seconded by Kermit Terry. The board also voted to retain the firm of Condley and Company of Brownwood, C.P.A. firm specializing in hospital and medicare counseling. David B. Kriskhe, C. P. A., is to begin immediately surveying, analyzing and planning the probable

approval of medicare assistance. He will also be working with the doctors in auditing the hospital books for the January 1, 1974 takeover of the Callan Hospital by the Fisher County Hospital District. The motion to hire Condley and Company was made by Kermit Terry and seconded by Allan Houston. Board members authorized Board President Ralph Ammons to begin looking for possible sites for the new hospital and to

begin writing for resumes on possible hospital administrators. The most important action last Monday was a resolution, made by Wendell Morrow and seconded by Kermit Terry, by the board to offer to undertake the ownership and operation of the Callan Hospital and Clinic. The resolution, printed in its entirety below, is the first step in attempting to put down in black and white some of the agreements between the doctors and

the board. There will no doubt be several amendments by both the doctors and the board before a final agreement is reached. The board showed their good faith by passing the resolution and letting the doctors and public know that they are making an attempt to keep the hospital in operation until a new complex can be built. Hewyett and Royer expects to have plans drawn and be in a position

to take construction bids on the construction of the new Fisher County Hospital in 90 to 120 days.

A RESOLUTION by the Board of Directors of Fisher County Hospital District, offering to undertake ownership and operation of Callan Hospital and Clinic

WHEREAS, by the direction of the qualified electors of the Fisher County Hospital District, the Board of Directors of said District are in the process of doing any and all things necessary to construct a 30 bed acute general hospital to serve the medical needs of the citizens of said District; and

WHEREAS, the medical needs of the citizens of said District are now served by the facilities of the Callan Hospital and Clinic, Rotan, Texas, owned and operated by C. U. Callan, M. D.; J. F. Johnson, M. D.; Bennie LeBleu, M. D. and C. M. Callan, M. D., hereinafter referred to as "Doctors"; and

WHEREAS, Doctors have advised the Board of Directors that the hospital portion of said Hospital and Clinic will be closed and cease to operate as an acute hospital on January 4, 1974, thus depriving the citizens of the District of hospital facilities until the new acute general hospital has been constructed; and

WHEREAS, when said hospital is closed the personnel employed therein will be forced to seek positions in other areas and thus will not be available to staff the new acute general hospital when it has been constructed; and

WHEREAS, Doctors have indicated that the land and buildings comprising the hospital and clinic, in addition to all furniture, fixtures and equipment contained in that portion of the structure operated as an acute general hospital, can be made available to the District as a gift or a sale at a token price, whichever is the most advantageous to the Doctors for tax purposes; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors considers it necessary to keep the hospital in operation until the new hospital has been constructed, in order to provide hospital facilities for the health and care of the citizens of the District, and further to be assured that the personnel employed therein will be available to staff the new hospital; therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE FISHER COUNTY HOSPITAL DISTRICT:

SECTION 1: That the Doctors be advised that the Fisher County Hospital District will accept said hospital properties, as heretofore described, as a gift or will purchase said properties at a token price, subject to the terms and conditions as hereinafter stipulated.

SECTION 2: That Condley, Morphew & Co., Certified Public Accountants employed by the District, be authorized to proceed with an application to the Department of Health, Education and Welfare seeking its approval of the District to receive reimbursement from Federal funds under Titles V, XVIII, and XIX of the Social Security Act (medicare, medicaid, etc.) and that such approval must be assured prior to the time that the District acquires title to said properties.

SECTION 3: That Condley, Morphew & Co. be authorized to proceed with the examination of the books and records of the hospital to determine the feasibility of the District owning and operating said facilities.

SECTION 4: That the area now occupied by Doctors and operated as "Clinic" be leased to Doctors, the terms of said lease agreement to be mutually agreeable, but as a minimum the monthly lease payment by Doctors shall include the following:

1. 25% of the gross revenue produced by the x-ray department of said clinic.
2. 25% of the gross revenue produced by the laboratory department of said clinic and EKG shall be defined as a part of said department.
3. A mutually agreeable percentage of the gross revenue produced by the pharmacy department of said clinic, or in the alternative the gross profit on medicines prescribed and administered to the patients in the hospital.

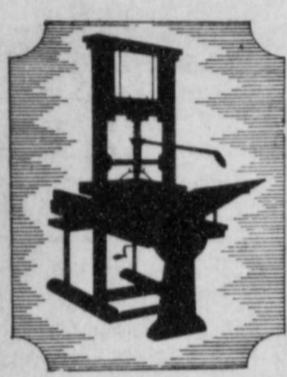
SECTION 5: That in order for the District to initially have sufficient funds to maintain and operate the hospital, the cash balance on hand of the District shall be used.

Revis Cauble, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Keifer Cauble, has been selected Fisher County Gold Star Girl for 1973, according to Mrs. Alice Ballenger, Fisher County Extension Agent. Revis is fifteen years old and is a sophomore in Roby High School. She has been enrolled in 4-H Club six years. The Gold Star Award is the

highest 4-H Award which can be attained on County Level. To be eligible, the 4-H member must have passed her 13th birthday before January 1 of the year she received the award, must have been enrolled in 4-H three years and must be currently participating in the 4-H program. Revis has carried 4-H projects in Clothing, Food Preparation, Food Preservation, Beef Cattle, Child Care and Leadership. She has won first place in County Food Show three years, first place in County Dress Revue four years. This year she won Alternate in the District III 4-H Dress Revue in Abilene in July.

Revis has been a Junior Leader for a younger group of 4-H girls for three years. In addition to this she has assumed leadership rolls in 4-H Clothing Workshops, County 4-H Rally Days, making exhibits for National 4-H Week and County Wide 4-H parties. The spark plugs wouldn't spark, the gears wouldn't mesh and the wheels wouldn't turn as the Big Orange Machine went down to its most humiliating defeat at the hands of the powerful Albany Lions. It was one of those nights that nothing worked right, a night that keeps coaches awake pulling out their hair and pampering their ulcer wondering what went wrong. The Yellowhammers failed to register a first down in the first quarter. In fact it was 9 minutes into the second quarter before that premier first down was finally recorded. Rotan ran 8 plays in the first quarter to Albany's 23, and 16 plays in the second quarter to the Lions' 19. Bruce Jones scored Rotan's first touchdown on the first play from scrimmage as he darted 30 yards with 8:10 remaining in the second quarter. His score was set by Jerry Gentry who returned the kickoff to the 30 yard line. That 30 yard TD jaunt by Jones and a 39 yard scamper by Jerry Gentry early in the final period

amounted to 69 yards of Rotan's total of 140 yards rushing for the evening. The remaining rushing yardage of 71 yards came in bits and pieces throughout the evening. Punt returns and kickoff returns executed beautifully by Albany gave the charged up Lions excellent field position

all night. Enroute to their first score Rocky Alexander darted 55 yards on a punt return to set Albany up 1-10 from the Hammer 25 yard line. Six plays later the scoreboard lit up with the first of four scores by Albany. Clay Helms fumbled on the Continued to Page 6

Roby Lions Blank Forsan Before Homecoming Crowd

A large homecoming crowd watched with delight as the Roby Lions shutout the Forsan Buffaloes 26-0 Friday night. This gives Roby a two win, no loss record in district play and a 4-1-1 record for the season. With 5:45 left in the first quarter and Roby on the Forsan 30 yd. line, halfback Carlo Jones grabbed a short pass and ran into the end zone for the first of his two touchdowns. Dale Evers then attempted to kick the extra point but it was blocked. The Lions' second score ended a 63 yard drive when halfback Donnie Stephens ran 10 yards on a third down situation in the first quarter. Evers kicked the extra point and Roby had

a 13-0 lead which lasted until the last quarter. In the third quarter Forsan threatened to score when a 46 yard pass play and a short run took them down to the 4- yard line. On the next play, however, Frank Castor set the quarterback back over 10 yards and the Buffaloes were unable to get a first down so the Lions took over the ball on downs. With 8:35 left in the fourth quarter, Evers connected with Castor on a 21- yard touchdown pass, then Evers kicked the PAT. The Buffaloes came to the form of a 31- yard run by Jones with 1:30 left in the game. Evers tried to kick the extra point, but it was again blocked, and

the score ended at 26-0. The tough Lion defense led by Frank Castor, James Park, Donnie Stephens, Dale Evers and Stephen Evers set the Buffaloes back for a loss so many times that the team ended up with a minus nine yards rushing for the night. Jones intercepted one pass and Ricky Morton intercepted a pass and ran it back 46 yards but it was called back because of a penalty. Forsan ended up with 74 yards passing compared to 164 yards for Roby. Evers completed 11 of 24 passes for 173 yards. Castor led in pass reception as he caught 5 passes for 64 yards. Jones caught 2 passes for 46

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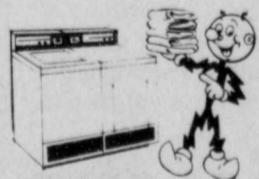
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Roby Exes From 1898 To 1917 Entertained

Generation Gap Bridged By 4-H

Several years ago the phrase "generation gap" was bounced around by adults and young people alike. Youths were accused of not wanting to communicate with their elders while the elders were accused of not wanting to talk to their youngsters.

Today the "generation gap" has eased and both adults and kids can take some of the credit. Now, young people and adults are working together to solve mutual problems, says County Agent Richard Spencer.

This sort of cooperation was well demonstrated through 4-H which observed 1973 National 4-H Week, October 7-13. Key-noted with the theme "4-H Gets It All Together."

Across the country, five-and-a-half million boys and girls, ages 9 to 19, a half million volunteer adult leaders and thousands of Extension Service personnel are involved in 4-H. Texas boasts a 4-H enrollment of almost 146,000 with about 14,000 adult leaders and over 6,250 junior leaders. Working together they are putting the 4-H Week theme into action, in many ways helping to make their communities better places in which to live.

The timeliness of their efforts is indicated by the 4-H emphasis on helping educate communities on ways to economically operate vehicles and to conserve electricity during the current energy shortage.

Other 4-H groups are helping to ease the food shortage by

supporting agricultural production and marketing efforts. Also drug abuse programs improving the environment, and community development planning are being given a high priority in 4-H programs.

4-H is reaching out to bring more people together to make the best better in new ways. 4-H television series on nutrition and nuclear energy are premiering this year on hundreds of stations. These and other 4-H efforts will reach hundreds of thousands of young people who've never been exposed to the 4-H program before.

Helping 4-H'ers and their leaders "get it all together" are business organizations, foundations, civic groups and private individuals who aid the 4-H program. On the national scene alone, over \$3 million is being expended in 1973 to aid 4-H programs through the National 4-H Service Committee.

Other contributions are the more than 31 million Americans

who are 4-H alumni. These former 4-H'ers get together with young people in 4-H programs at all levels, working together, growing together, learning together—that's what 4-H is all about, in 1973.

Spencer encourages youths to explore opportunities for developing their talents and skills through 4-H. And parents and others may wish to volunteer their services as leaders or program consultants. Further information on 4-H may be obtained at the county Extension office, at the court house in Roby.

SECTION 6: That in order to maintain a cash flow to the operating fund and to provide the funds necessary for the future operation of the hospital, all accounts receivable placed on the books of the hospital during the two months period immediately preceding the date of transfer, and outstanding on such date, shall likewise be considered a part of the assets of said hospital properties, as stated in SECTION 1 hereof, and shall be included among the assets on the date of transfer.

SECTION 7: That a copy of this resolution be delivered to Doctors with a request that they signify in writing their acceptance or rejection of the general terms and outline as stated herein, it being recognized that the definitive terms of a lease agreement and a contract of sale or acceptance of the hospital properties must be executed by both parties at a later date.

Western Texas Has 37 Attending From County

Western Texas College enrollment has reached 1,002. Dr. Duane Hood, registrar, has announced, This is an increase of 139 over fall enrollment for 1972, which was 809.

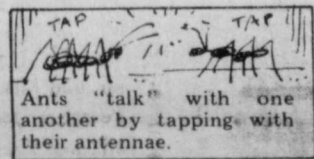
A total of 1,210 students are enrolled at the college, including 986 college credit students, 16 vocational nursing students, 60 high school students in occupational-technical courses, 112 persons in Community Services courses, and 36 persons in Adult Basic Education.

Counties represented in the enrollment include Scurry with 549 students, Mitchell with 69, Haskell with 54, Nolan with 50, Fisher with 37, Taylor with 42, Jones with 36, Garza with 14, Lubbock with 11, Howard with 6, Dawson with 5, and Kent with 3. Fifty-four Texas Counties and 14 other states are represented in the enrollment.

Of the total, 674 students are classified as freshmen and 211 as sophomores, and 450 of the freshmen are attending college for the first time.

Western Texas College, one of the state's newest public institutions of higher education, opened in the fall of 1971 with 649 students enrolled for college credit courses. The college is located on a 160-acre tract south of Snyder and has recently completed the sixteenth building on its campus.

Anson Sewing Factory Wants County Workers

Other benefits, including insurance, holidays and vacations are also assured.

Only other requirement of the company for opening the Anson plant and starting operation at once is a suitable building for sale or lease, and arrangements for a suitable building are expected to be completed this week.

Rules For Buses

At the beginning of the school year, new regulations for school buses and drivers took effect.

The bus driver must have a chauffeur's license which is renewable every two years. They are required to have a physical by a medical doctor each year. Cross-walk mirrors have been installed on the front right fender of the buses. This mirror enables the bus driver to see children in the cross-walk in front of the bus. 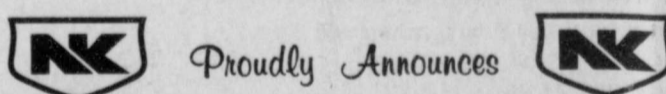
The following are some of the actions you may want to take to conserve gas during the coming months:

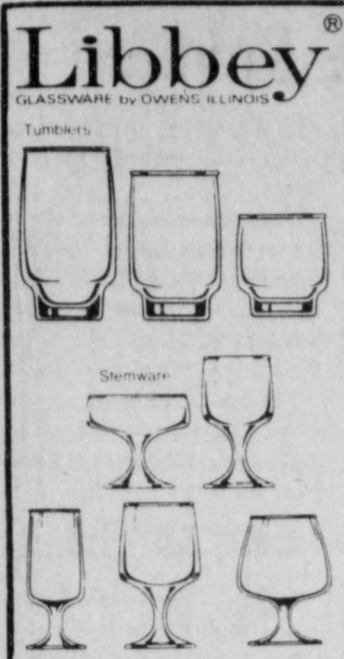
