Cotton Harvesting Is Slowed By Bad Weather

Cotton harvesting progressed significantly, approaching full capacity early this week, but inclement weather slowed it during the latter part of the week; reports B. B. Manly, Jr. in charge of the USDA's Abilene Cotton Classing Office. The Abilene Classing Office processed 52,000 samples during the week ending November 10, bringing the season total to 125,000 samples.

The quality of the samples classed showed some improvement. This week 56 percent were in white grades, and 45 percent were light-spotted. This compares to 45 percent white and 56 percent with light-spotted grades the previous week. Grade 41 was the predominant grade at 28 percent. Twenty four percent was grade 42, and 15 percent was grade 51. Bark reduction declined from 24 to 19 percent this week.

Staple length this week were as follows: 3 percent staple 29; 25 percent 30; 48 percent 31; 19 percent 32; and 5 percent staple 33 or longer. Staples were a little longer this week. A week ago predominant lengths were: 47 percent staple 30 and 34 percent staple 31. Micronaire readings were stable with 92 percent in the premium range as compared to 90 percent in that category a week ago.

According to the Agricultural Marketing Service, prices increased during the week, especially for the higher qualities. Grades 32 or higher, with staple 31 or longer, brought about 36.9

cents above the government loan, Grades 42 or lower, with staple 30 or shorter sold for 30 to 32 cents above the government loan, Grade 3231 with premium micronaire, brought up to 54.40 cents per pound,

while a 4230 premium mike, brought around 50 cents per pound, Grade 5229, premium mike sold for about 44 cents a pound.

Reports also indicate cottonseed are beginning to improve in grade.

The meeting took on an air of festivity when Mrs. Fred Waddell gave a presentation of "Christmas Decorations" in a very charming and illustrated manner.

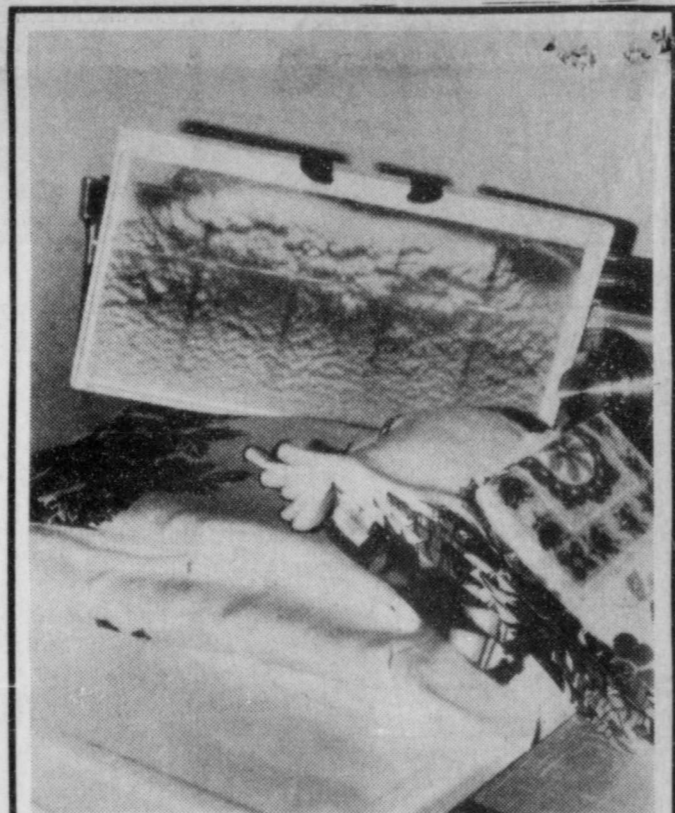

Dick Hogarth Captures Hearts Of Roby Friends

Dick Hogarth is truly an unusual man. The friends he made and those that knew him while he was visiting the Keifer-Cauble family in Roby can attest to that.

Dick Hogarth retired as the executive director of the Lorain, Ohio Y. M. C. A. in April of 1973, and decided he and his wife would take a one year vacation and see the United States. They met the Keifer-Cauble family in Roby in July of 1973.

"How did you happen to get to know the Caubles, Dick?" "Well, that's a funny thing" he said. Dick had his larynx removed in 1965 and uses an artificial batter operated device to amplify his voice. He cannot smell, has only 35% of his taste and breathes through an opening in his throat. He related that he and the Caubles struck up an immediate friendship at the Fun Valley Campground and when they departed for California, Keifer said, "You all come to see us".

Being a northern yankee, in Texas for the first time, Dick took him up on the visit. "We will", he said, "We will come see you". Well, the Hogarth's came and have since left, but Roby and those who made his acquaintance in Fisher County will never forget him.

He did some speaking for the American Cancer Society while in Texas, in one 10 day period he spoke 43 times in Big Spring. This was before he spent the time with the Caubles.

Many years ago Dick Hogarth was a trainer for the Detroit Lions, Chicago Bears, and teams in the Canadian Football League. He is a Physiotherapist. A person that is trained in rehabilitating, massaging, articulating and exercising the body.

His background as a therapist is really what led him to Fisher County. While talking with Keifer in the cool mountains of Colorado, Keifer related a story about his father Lois Cauble. Lois had become inactive in recent months, and after hearing the full story Dick Hogarth felt he could help.

Help he certainly did. Dick proudly relates that now - Mr. Lois Cauble is built back up, his muscle tone is good and is doing fine.

Although Dick Hogarth is retired, he did not lead a retired man's life while in Fisher County. He helped Keifer Cauble with the chores every day. They rode, branded, dehorned, treated sick cattle, stripped cotton, built fence and a hundred other jobs that go with the farming and ranching business.

After seeing this 65 year old man work like a young buck, one of Keifer's friends asked "Dick, are there any more like you up in yankee land?" Dick said he just smiled and went on about his business of digging a post hole.

When Mr. and Mrs. Dick Hogarth left last week they were headed for Port Richey, Florida where they intended to spend the winter. They were going to visit some relatives, and "eat sea food".

The Hogarths have two children, both residents of Vermillion, Ohio, and six grandchildren. He enjoyed his stay with the Caubles. "I got an education in one month that some people in this United States will never get".

Dick Hogarth is handicapped but don't tell him that. He lost his voice box with cancer and has since dedicated his life to speaking for the American Cancer Society. He lives life to its fullest.

Dick Hogarth has left Fisher County, but those that knew him are not about to forget about him.

Roby, Rotan Telephone Book Cover Is Unusual

Twenty-five Texas cattle brands are included in the four-color artwork on the cover of the new Roby-Rotan telephone directory.

The cover painting features the 25 brands burned into the wood of an oldtime blacksmith shop. The painting, by Dalhart Winberg of Victoria, is an original commissioned by Southwestern Bell specifically for the directory cover, noted Bud McCasland, manager for Southwestern Bell.

Titled "The Blacksmith Shop," the cover picture does not exist

as Winberg painted it. It is a composite of three shops the native Texas artist found still open for business as he traveled across the state doing research for the painting.

Winberg said that he attempted to capture the blacksmith shop on canvas as he visualized it might have been during the days of the early west.

The artist was intrigued with the blacksmith's habit of burning a mark on a door or wall of his shop to test a newly forged branding iron. No painting of a Texas smithy would be

complete without the brands, Winberg said of his work.

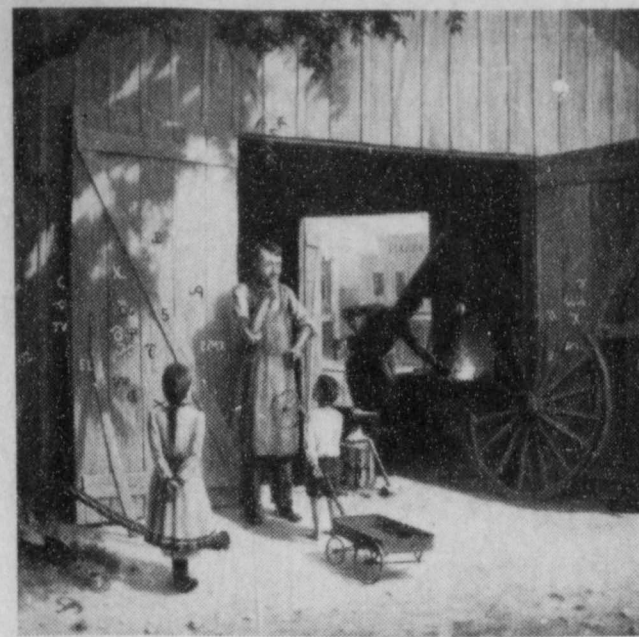
While many famous Texas cattle brands can be found in the painting, not all could be depicted by the artist. "I chose a few brands still in existence and some that may be recognized by many Texans," Winberg said.

The artist spent 100 hours researching and painting the scene used for the directory cover. He made more than 50 photographs and sketches of the three blacksmith shops and cattle brand col-

lections before final painting began.

The artist said that while researching the painting he found the blacksmith a vanishing part of the American scene, much like the cowboy after the turn of the century.

He pointed out that feasibility of a brand depended greatly on the craftsman forging the iron. Cattlemen jumped at a chance to use the skill of a blacksmith to produce a stamping iron that left a neat, clear mark.



Artist Dalhart Winberg selected 25 Texas cattle brands from the 250,000 registered in the state for inclusion in the 1973 telephone directory cover painting. In the upper right, each brand symbol is shown along with the brand's name, owner, and location. In addition to the brands on the doors, a close look will reveal three brands in the shadow on the

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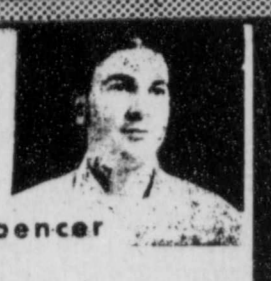
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COUNTY AGENT NEWS

Texas livestock producers will be faced with new regulations on brucellosis control following a state wide public hearing in Austin on Oct. 1.

The changes are being proposed by the Texas Animal Health Commission so that Texas will be able to move toward a "certified-brucellosis free status" and thereby be able to comply with the standards of other states to which cattle are shipped.

The major changes in the brucellosis testing program are as follows:

1. Testing of all animals two years of age and over at local auction markets rather than just testing those that terminate at slaughter.

2. Maintaining cattle in groups until they are tested and found clean or are quarantined, with testing expense to be paid by the seller.

3. Herds found to have the disease will be tested until they have two negative tests, not to exceed 120 days apart.

4. Retesting must be done with 60 days.

5. Animals may move from ranch to ranch owned by the same individual within a county or similar certified area without testing.

6. Animals moving and changing ownership must be tested. Numerous other conditions and procedures are also specified in the proposed changes.

All livestock producers are invited to attend the public hearing in Austin on Oct. 1 to obtain further information on the program and to voice any concerns they may have about the proposed changes.

Fisher County recorded its first case of screwworms for the year on September 16. The case was on the Kenneth Justis near Busby. Producers are urged to keep a close watch on their livestock from now until frost.

All suspected cases should be sent to Mission, Texas, for confirmation. Vials are available from our office.

Officials are gearing up for the approaching 5th annual Statewide Brush Control and Range Improvement Field Day set for October 4 on the Waggoner Ranch near Vernon.

The event will be hosted by the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Chillicothe-Vernon. An expected crowd of more than 600 will view firsthand the latest developments in brush control and range improvement.

Among the noted speakers on hand for the occasion will be Dr. Jarvis E. Miller, director of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station; Dr. John E. Hutchison, director of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service; Ed Thomas, state conservationist, Soil Conservation Service; John Matthews, chairman, Brush Control and Range Improvement Association; and Dr. L. S. Pope, associate dean of the College of Agriculture, Texas A&M.

Guests will view first hand recent advances in chemical and mechanical control of mesquite and range improvement by research scientists and range specialists. Tours will be made during the morning with the field day program beginning at 1:30 p. m. at the Wilbarger County Auditorium, headquarters for the event.

Early visitors from 8:00 to 9:30 a. m. will have the opportunity to make complete tours of the research work. Intermediate tours from 9:30 to 10:30 will cover major points of interest. The short tour from 10:30 to 11:30 will consist of a

tour of the Texas A&M Center and an equipment display at the Waggoner Ranch.

Major attention on the extended tours will be devoted to chemical control methods using low volume, low pressure aerial application of herbicides for mesquite and related species, as well as mechanical control methods using root plowing, grubbing and chaining.

Other developments to be discussed in connection with mechanical control research include newly developed range seeding equipment, small grubbers and ground spraying equipment for control of mesquite and weed re-infestation, and use of the railroad chain for low-cost seedbed preparation after root plowing.

Visitors also will view research undertaken in 1973 to study the role of remote sensing in monitoring rangeland improvement.

Tours will originate at the auditorium in Vernon. A catered Dutch lunch has been arranged for field day participants.

In addition to topics presented by notables from major agricultural agencies, a panel discussion by ranchers will focus on benefits, costs and needs for developing an economical brush control program for ranchers.

Scientists, ranchers, officials of agricultural organizations and industries and others from across the state are expected to attend. Interested persons may contact G. E. Fisher at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Lubbock or Jim Mulkey at the Chillicothe-Vernon Center for details.

SSI Benefit Information

Many of the more than 1,000 persons who have applied with the Abilene social security office for the new Supplemental Security Income (SSI) that will replace the adult assistance payments from the state of Texas as of January 1974 followed the request that they stagger their filings according to their last names, reports Bob Tuley, district manager.

Persons whose last names start with S-Z, or who put off action are reminded that November is the last month the social security people feel completely confident that they'll have enough time to get that Jan. 2, 1974, check out on time.

Tuley reminds our readers that although his office will be handling the SSI claims, the money does not come from the trust funds for retirement, survivors, disability, and medicare to which workers and self-employed people have been paying in taxes.

He also repeated previous information that anyone with a social security, railroad retirement, or other state or federal monthly benefit of more than \$150 will not qualify for SSA. Other matters that can affect entitlement or size of payment include ownership of a home valued at over \$25,000, ownership of one or more cars or trucks with a total value of over \$1200, living in the household of another, earnings of more than \$65 per month, etc.

Anyone over 65, or blind, or disabled who dies not already getting an assistance check from Austin, and who cannot get in to a social security office or to a local meeting point to see a representative, may---during

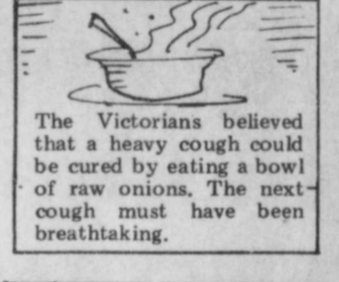

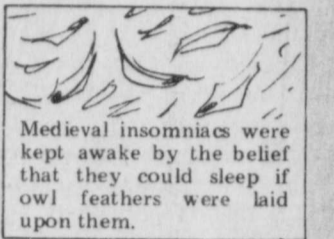
Councilmen discussed some needed repair work to the city dozer and discussed some repair and up-keep on the American Legion Building.

"What are the prospects for next summer? Will we experience a gasoline shortage equal to or greater than the 1973 problem?"

"While it's not inevitable, we probably will be short of gasoline. The conditions that have caused the shortages this summer cannot be radically changed before next summer. All our refineries are running essentially at capacity and we will not solve the problem until we get more refineries built. It will take several years to build enough refineries to overcome the shortage."

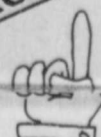
