

Cold Storage Locker Clinic At Stratford

The cold storage locker clinic will be held in the old West Texas Utilities building on main street starting at 1:30 P. M. Thursday, October 24. George Allen's Cold Lock Storage Plant will be available for inspection and use for demonstration purposes.

Roy Snyder, Meat Specialist and authority on cold storage lockers of Texas A. & M. College and Miss Edith Lawrence, Food Preparation Specialist from the Extension Service of Texas will demonstrate the preparation of meats, vegetables and fruits for cold locker storage.

Miss Lawrence will handle the frozen foods from the plant to the table. The proper care of vegetables and fruits from the garden to the locker will be discussed. Miss Lawrence will also demonstrate the proper methods of cooking frozen foods and preparation for table use. The ladies are urged to attend this meeting and present their problems found in preparation, handling and cooking frozen foods to Miss Lawrence for discussion.

Roy Snyder will discuss processing cold storage foods and demonstrate the cutting of pork and beef to secure better quality cuts for table use. Mr. Snyder is an authority on cold locker storage, operates the Plant at Texas A. & M. College and is outstanding in his ability in handling his knife on beef and pork carcass. Farmers are urged to take advantage of this opportunity to present their meat problems in killing, cutting, curing meat and wrapping for cold storage. Snyder will point out some of the causes of bad odor and flavor, tough, and poor quality of frozen meat products.

Miss Edith Lawrence and Roy Snyder are being brought here by the Home Demonstration Agent in response to request by many of our local people and in interest of the heavy demand for cold storage foods in the county.

Not Built On Peter

Christ did not build his church on Peter. The Catholics claim that Christ built the church on Peter. They claim that when Jesus said, "Thou art Peter, and upon this rock I will build my church," he meant that Peter was the rock on which the church was built. This is a mistake. It is argued that Peter in Greek is "Petras" which means "rock", and Jesus said, "Upon this rock I will build my church," therefore the church was built on Peter. They fail to tell us that when Jesus said, "Upon this rock I will build my church," he used a different word for rock. "Petras", the name for Peter, means a loose, movable rock. But "Petra", the word that Jesus used when he said, "This rock means immovable rock." Paul and Peter both say that Jesus Christ is the foundation, the chief cornerstone. See Isaiah 28:16; I. Cor. 3:10; and Peter 2:4-8. To say that Christ built the church on Peter exalts Peter above Christ and separates him from the rest of the apostles, but Paul says, "We are built on the apostles and prophets. Jesus Christ himself being the chief cornerstone." Eph. 2:20. Peter never acted like he was the chief cornerstone, neither did the other apostles ever treat him as though he had any more authority than any of the rest of them. When Peter dissembled with some other Jews at Antioch, Paul rebuked him before them all. When Paul and Barnabas went to Jerusalem to consult the apostles and elders concerning the matter of the Gentiles (Christians) keeping the law of Moses and be circumcised, it appears that James instead of Peter presided over the meeting.

Come to church and bring your children. Children that are taken to church regularly from infancy nearly always enjoy going to church when they are grown up, but children that are not taken to church while they are growing up seldom make good church goers. Don't leave your children at home, neither send them, come and bring them. You will find a hearty welcome at the Church of Christ.—A. C. Huff.

Hammond Endorses Good Roads Amendment

The Texas Farm Bureau Federation announced adoption of a resolution supporting the Good Roads Constitutional Amendment to be voted upon in the November 5th election.

"Our organization is in full accord with the amendment," J. Walter Hammond, president, declared. "Farm to market roads are uppermost in the minds of rural people and the Good Roads Amendment is our assurance of obtaining greatly needed improvements."

Continuing, Hammond said, "We are in dire need of better facilities for all weather roads which will benefit rural mail and school bus routes as well."

The Texas Farm Bureau Federation is one of thirty state organizations which have already pledged ardent support of the Good Roads Amendment. The amendment, last of three to appear on the November 5 ballot, assures the availability of gasoline taxes and motor vehicle registration fees for road purposes, with the exception that one of every four cents paid in gas taxes will continue to be allocated to the Available Free School Fund.

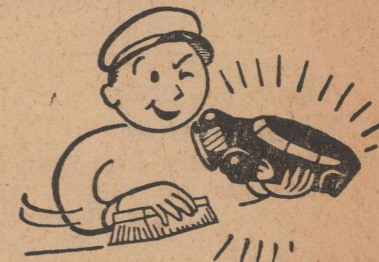

Signs Of Disaster

(By Dr. Alfred P. Haake)
The recent mix-up between President Truman, Secretary of Commerce Wallace and the State Department headed by Secretary Byrnes, illustrates the increasingly serious threat of the Commun-

ists in our country. No one would accuse President Truman of trying to establish Communism in the United States. And we do not believe that Secretary Wallace deliberately seeks to establish "Uncle Joe" Stalin as the real ruler of America.

But, both men are serving Stalin's purpose. It is reasonably apparent that both Harry Truman and Henry Wallace would like to be elected President of the United States in 1948. As demonstrated in recent national elections, neither of the two men can be elected without the aid of the American Labor Party and the CIO-PAC. Both of the latter are Communist controlled or influenced. This indicates that the "Center," meaning the Kremlin in Moscow, actually can exert enough influence to encourage Henry Wallace to make a Communist-appeal speech, such as he made recently in New York; and to persuade President Truman, directly or indirectly, that it was politically smart to back up Secretary Wallace in his bid for Russian-Communist approval.

Only the tremendous outcry that followed, especially from within his own party, in the writer's opinion, could have persuaded Mr. Truman to repudiate his previously unequivocal endorsement of Wallace's speech and switch back to his own Secretary of State's foreign policy.

But the real danger to our own freedom and democratic form of government here at home, comes from a far more insidious source. It is through education of the rising generation that the inseparable ideas of Communism and Atheism are really established in a country.

An example, extreme but enlightening, can be taken from Russian-dominated Yugoslavia, where, it is authoritatively said, more than 80 per cent of the people are opposed to Communism, but are helpless to protect themselves against it. Since the elder generation will not accept Communism, it is found necessary to indoctrinate the children in school.

So, a school teacher in Yugosla-

via addresses her class: "Now, children, you have heard the priests speak of God, who is all-powerful, and who answers prayers." The children nod. They had heard the priests tell them so. "All right," says the teacher, "we will now pray to God to send us something that you like. You all like cookies, so we will pray to God for half an hour to send us cookies."

The class and teacher pray to God to send them cookies, but when the half-hour is up, God still has not appeared with the cookies. The children, not knowing exactly what it is about, are disappointed and perplexed.

"Now," says the teacher, "we will pray to Tito to send us cookies." So the children and their teacher now pray to the Communist dictator Tito to send them cookies. Long before the half hour is up, there is a knock on the door and there stand two of Tito's soldiers, with two baskets of cookies. The disciple of Karl Marx has answered the prayer that God would not hear. Of course, it was by pre-arrangement, but the children do not know that; nor do they know

that the people of the United States furnished 72 per cent of the cookies they received.

God is discredited, Tito is elevated, and "Uncle Joe" Stalin gets the credit for it all as a friend of the common man. God save the mark. And even that could happen here.

SIMPLE PRECAUTIONS

Simple precautions against the possibility of fire save lives and property from destruction, precautions which are so simple they may seem actually unnecessary. But the National Board of Fire Underwriters emphasizes the importance of such measures in its untiring effort to cut down fire loss. It recognizes that the most effective force in fighting fire is a sincere desire on the part of the public to cooperate in eliminating every possible fire hazard.

Some of the simple precautions that depend on each individual are: Proper insulation around stoves; the use of fuses instead of pennies in the fuse box; closing of doors and windows to shut off possible drafts when leaving a dwelling; safeguarding fires left in

houses against spreading to curtains, furniture and inflammable fixtures; destroying refuse which is a potential producer of instantaneous combustion; placing electric irons on something metallic instead of on the cloth ironing board. These and countless other safety measures depend upon individual action.

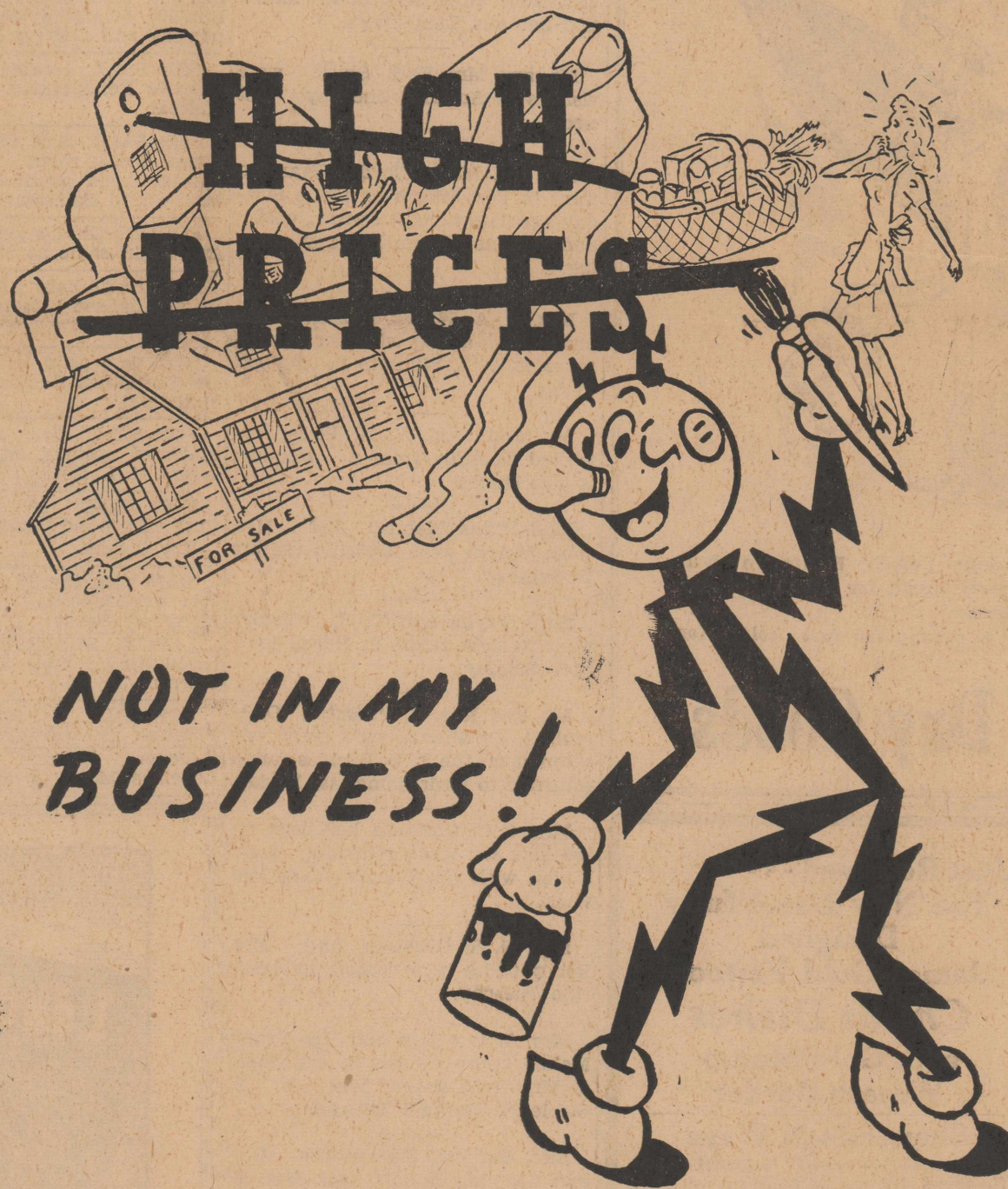

General chairman of the poultry booth exhibit is F. Z. Beamblossom, poultry marketing specialist of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service. Ted Martin, Extension poultry husbandman, is chairman of the distribution committee and T. A. Hensarling, Ste-

phenville, is production committee chairman. Hensarling is executive secretary of the Texas Baby Chicks Association.

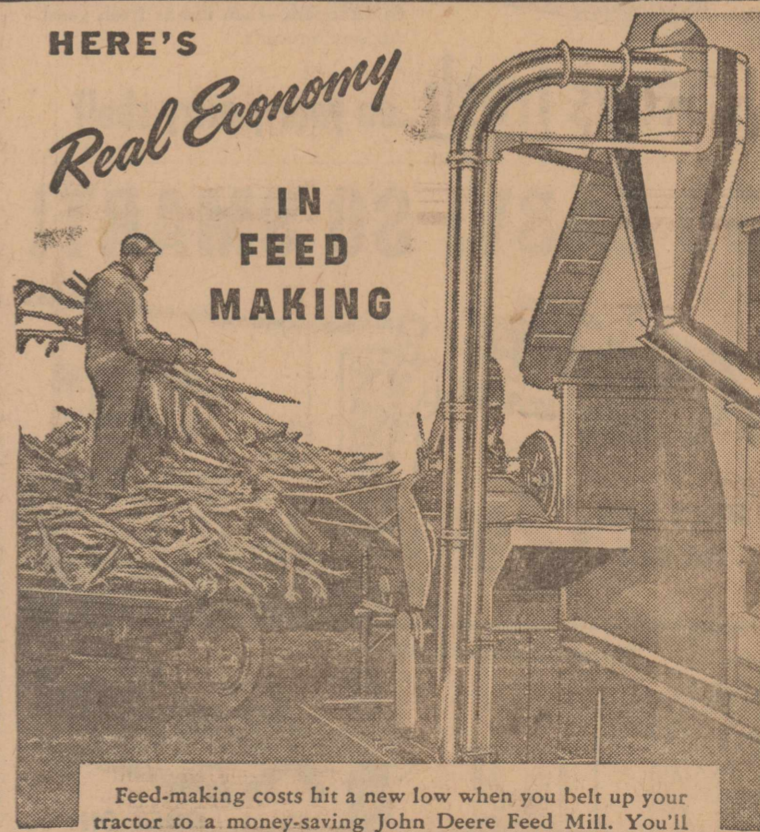

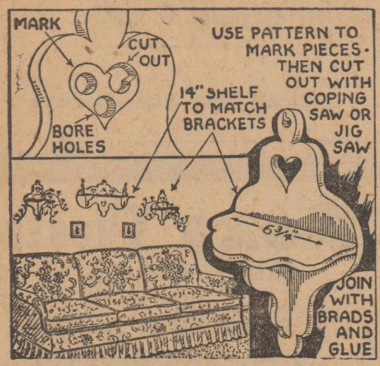

The Washington MERRY-GO-ROUND

FAR EASTERN REPORT—
Here's what members of the house military affairs committee reported to General Eisenhower, following their return from an inspection of our military bases in the Far East.

1. Morale of our Far East occupational troops is being endangered by the army's delay in sending wives and families to officers and enlisted men.
2. The army is doing little to set up facilities for the proper housing of army wives and children who want to join the troops. On Okinawa, for instance, surplus army stoves and plumbing supplies—badly needed in quonset huts where army families will be housed—have been sold to the Chinese.
3. Another demoralizing factor is the shortage of cigarettes, fresh fruit and vegetables.

Eisenhower promised to look into these facts immediately. Congressmen reported that an estimated 350 Jap soldiers are still at large on the island of Okinawa, living a Robinson Crusoe existence in the hills. American authorities are not seriously troubled. . . . A lone Jap fugitive was picked up a couple of months ago on Saipan, after having been at large for over a year. When asked where he had been getting water on the very dry portion of the island to which he had been confined, the Nip replied that he had gone at night to a large house in an isolated sector, drinking from the tap and filling his canteen. The home was that of the American commander.

The returned congressmen are worried that lower ranking commissioned officers are "taking the Japs to their hearts." Congressmen fear that many occupation officers have forgotten that the Japs were our enemies only a year ago. Japs, the congressmen say, have not forgotten their dead, but some of our men have forgotten the Americans who died battling these same Japs.

One of MacArthur's difficulties is the great shortage of Jap-American interpreters. Result: In Japanese towns without any interpreter reports on conditions, written by Jap authorities, are sent to U. S. headquarters as official reports. Plans to recruit 50,000 Filipinos for our army have fallen through because of lack of money. The present goal is 35,000, with the training now under way. Worst areas in the Pacific for troop morale are Korea and the Aleutians. Korea is the center of political intrigue and, because it is at the end of the supply lines, the food served our troops is hardly better than field rations. In the bare, treeless Aleutians, the big wish of U. S. troops is for a 12-month rotation system. They now are sent on a two-year hitch with scant chance to get back to the comparative gaiety of Alaska.

STALIN'S WAR OF NERVES
Most interesting fact about Stalin's recent widely broadcast and widely-hailed-as-conciliatory statements to a London newsman is the date. The date was September 24. For on exactly the same day Stalin was telling the world that there was no danger of another war, he was sending a note to Turkey which sang another tune.
The note to Turkey was not made public until four days later. Thus Stalin publicly put fears to rest, while simultaneously warning Turkey that she must yield to Russia on the Dardanelles and that she must permit Russian troops on Turkish soil. If not, the implied threat was war.
Thus, despite Stalin's attempt to woo the world, his aims remain exactly the same. Furthermore, they remain exactly the same as those of the czars before him. Finally, they remain today, with his allies, exactly the same as with his old sparring partner, Hitler.
For, in 1940, when Russia and Germany were under a non-aggression pact, the same Molotov now dickered in Paris went to Berlin to dicker with Ribbentrop for terms under which Russia would come into the war against England. The terms Molotov wanted were the Dardanelles, Iran, Iraq, the Balkans and the mouth of the Red sea. Hitler wouldn't give these terms, and Russia finally was forced into the war on the side of the Allies, not against them.
Now that the war is over, Stalin and Molotov are right back where they were in 1940—trying to get the Dardanelles and other long-range Russian objectives.

CAPITAL CHAFF
Undersecretary of State Dean Acheson picked an ideal time for his vacation, the moment of the Wallace-Byrnes feud. He was the happiest man in the administration to have missed the fight. . . . Sighed Mildred Eaton, one of Wallace's secretaries, when informed her boss had resigned, "We haven't got through unpacking from our last move yet." . . . Mrs. Truman refused to use a White House car while vacationing in Missouri, driving her own car in Independence.

Spotlight by GRANTLAND RICE

THE Big Nine, the South, the Southwest and the Far West are not the only sections that have returned to prewar speed and power in football.

In this connection, we'd like to call your attention to the Ivy league, too often underrated by football camp followers around the map.
In the last few years strength in the Ivy circuit has belonged largely to Army and Navy, who may be considered part of this roundup, since there is no such of official organization.

To this pair in 1946 you can add Pennsylvania, Yale, Columbia, Cornell and a greatly improved Harvard squad. Outside of this circuit, Holy Cross is the East's best bowl prospect.
Excluding Army and Navy, Pennsylvania has a Red and Blue squad this fall that should be an even match for any team in the country, not barring the prides of the Big Nine or the pick of the South. Munger has a terrific line, averaging around 212 pounds, loaded with experience. The Penn coach also has at least 8 or 10 high-class backs who can match any set in football today. They have speed, weight, running and passing strength far beyond the average.
Pennsylvania will be something for any team to manhandle this fall, and that includes Army.

Best Yale Squad

But the Red and Blue doesn't stand alone. Howie Odell has the best-looking squad Yale has known in years. The combination of Eli and Levi can be sensational, Levi being Levi Jackson, the dark athlete who gives promise of a big year.
In 220-pound Barzilauskas, Yale has one of the best linemen that ever wore the Blue, looking back to such stars as Pudge Hefelfinger, Eddie Glass, Gordon Brown and a long parade of others from forgotten years.
But Jackson and Barzilauskas are not the only two Yale stars. The alert Odell has one of the biggest and most capable lines that Yale has known in years, plus a well-rounded backfield that might easily give Eli her best team since Bill Mallory's outfit back in 1923.
Yale also would be a match for the prides of the South and the pick of the West.

You can add Lou Little and the Columbia Lion to this group. Little's Lions won eight out of nine games last fall, losing only to Pennsylvania.
This season Columbia has an even better team with Kasprzak added to Rossides and Kusserow in the backfield, a speed back, a power back and one of the best passers that ever chuckled a pigskin. So far as the college game goes, Coach Little doesn't bar either Luckman or Governali in this Kasprzak comparison.
"One more tackle," Lou tells you, "and we might worry somebody." Lou and his Lions worry everybody, even if they drop a game or two.

Cornell Has Power

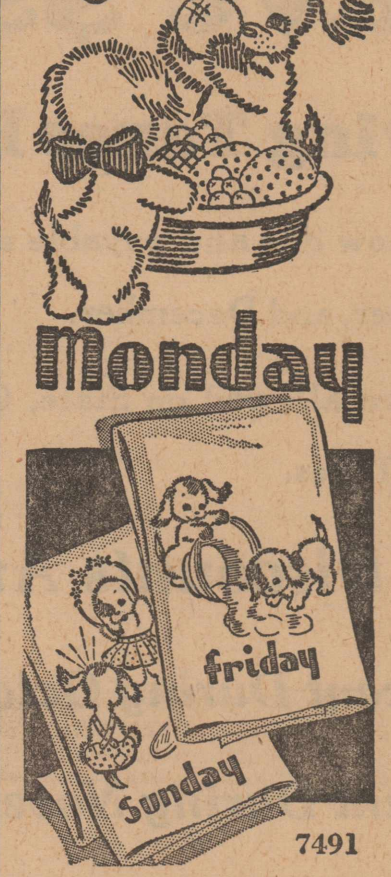
Ed McKeever's Cornell squad is no "shove around" for anybody. The Big Red from Ithaca and Cayuga's Waters has a star tackle in Wydo and a star back in Martin. Columbia just missed getting Wydo, who fills half a line. McKeever, like Little, is another coach who can lose three games and still look good.
Which reminds me of an interview I once had with Bob Zupke at Illinois. "How do things look?" I asked.
"I can lose every game and still look good," Zup answered.
Dick Harlow's Harvard team is the dark horse. Give Harlow any sort of material and he can jolt your teeth out. He has a star full-back in Moravie, a star tackle and a much improved squad. Syracuse can be another dark horse under Clarence Munn.
So far as the East is concerned, we string with Army. As Rip Miller of Navy told me at West Point, "As long as you have Blanchard and Davis, you have a real football team."
I'd like to add Tucker at quarter to this pair. There is a pretty fair chance that he is the best all-around quarterback in college football.
Tom Hamilton's Navy team took the leading losses in material. Navy material may be doubtful, but Hamilton, plus Rip Miller, are not.

Lesson for October 20

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PAUL TRAINS FOR HIS LIFE WORK

LESSON TEXT—Acts 9:19b-22; 11:25, 26; Galatians 1:17-24
MEMORY SELECTION—And straightway he preached Christ in the synagogues, that he is the Son of God.—Acts 9:20.

The regenerating grace of God had made Paul into a new man, one who now had no greater delight than telling others of the redeeming grace of God.

In preparation for that fuller ministry which was to follow, Paul first gave witness in the place where he had been persecuting the Christians, in fact, in the city to which he was bound when the Lord met him. But now instead of breathing out threats and violence he met these former associates and friends with the new message of the gospel.

He had to meet them sooner or later, and it was well that he met them now. A clean break with his past makes a man ready for future service.

I. Paul Faces His Past (Acts 9:19b-22)

What a surprise it must have been for those persecutors of the Christians at Damascus to find that the one to whom they had looked for leadership was now a Christian. What a testimony that was—right to the point!

"Straightway"—what a good word to apply to the servant of the Lord. Paul did not hesitate to declare his faith in Christ, to proclaim that the One who had redeemed him was able to save others.

It is the normal and proper expression of Christian faith to give testimony to others. That should be true of every believer. With Paul there was the added element of his call to preach, for God had ordained that he should be his chosen vessel for that purpose (Acts 9:15).

Paul's message was Christ. He proved to the Jews that Jesus was the Christ (v. 22), the One of whom their Old Testament Scriptures spoke and for whom they professed to be looking. He declared him to be the Son of God (v. 20).

They were unwilling to accept the message. They were "amazed" at Paul and "confounded" by the truth he proclaimed, but they rejected both it and him, and he had to escape for his life.

Although our lesson only indirectly refers to it (see Gal. 1:17, 18), it should also be noted that Paul went up to Jerusalem before he went to Antioch, as indicated in our next portion of Scripture.

There he faced suspicion on the part of the believers, who knew him as their enemy.

Having faced his past we now see that

II. Paul Faces His Future (Acts 11:25, 26)

He was God's chosen instrument to bear his name to the Gentiles (see Acts 9:15), and at the invitation of Barnabas he came up from his home city of Tarsus to minister at Antioch, the place which now became his real spiritual home, and the center from which his great missionary enterprise was carried out.

It is interesting to note how this came about in the providence of God. Persecution spread the believers abroad (Acts 11:19), and like the scattered brands of a beaten fire they carried the flame of Christianity far and wide. Thus the gospel came to Antioch, the third greatest city in the world of that day. A revival broke out and Barnabas was sent from Jerusalem to be of help.

Good and spiritual man that he was (Acts 19:23, 24), Barnabas did nothing to hinder this work of God, but admonished the people to "cleave unto the Lord"; that is, to follow him closely. Would that all spiritual advisers had such a spirit and such sound judgment.

He was also wise in sensing his need of help. So he went after Paul, the very man to teach these young Christians and to lead them out into a radiant and abundant life for the Lord. Here it was that the beautiful name of "Christian" was first used.

All this was possible because

III. Paul Faces His Lord (Gal. 1:17-24)

Many years after he had been called to Antioch, Paul wrote this letter to the Galatians to warn them against Judaizing teachers and to urge them to hold fast to salvation by faith. He declared this to be a message which he received from God and not from men.

Before Paul went out to preach and teach he went up into Arabia to be alone with the Lord, as he took what we might call his postgraduate course in theology. He learned—alone with God.

His life had been transformed. His attitudes had been completely changed. His thinking about Christ was diametrically opposite to his former beliefs. He needed time alone with God to prepare himself for the stormy but triumphant years ahead.

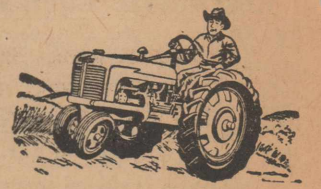
