Hallowe'en Merriment Dominates Social Whirl

16 Potential Gas Wells In Process Of Completion

Sherman County is enjoying perhaps the most vigorous drilling program since gas and showings of oil were discovered several years ago. Present drilling and development of the county's gas field is being made possible by pipe line construction which offers a ready market for all gas wells which are completed.

At a glance activities taking place at the 16 announced drilling locations are:

Cities Service No. 1 Shoun, located in the southwest 1-4 of section 348, Block 1-T, water well for drilling completed.

Cities Service No. 2 Wohlford, located in section 368, Block 1-T, drilling with cable tools with approximately 30 million cubic feet of gas escaping from the well.

Cities Service No. 1 Stewart, located in section 383, Block 1-T, has been shut down waiting arrival of cable tools to complete the well for gas.

Shamrock Oil and Gas Corporation No. 2 Bywaters, located in the Northwest 1-4 of section 399, Block 1-T, drilling with rotary tools.

No activity has taken place at the Humble Oil Company No. 1 Baskin, announced drilling location, section 444, Block 1-T.

Humble Oil Corporation No. 1 Maude Seton, located in section 5, Block 2-T, shows no signs of activity.

Shamrock Oil and Gas Corporation No. 1 Morton, located in section 339, Block 1-T, has completed work with rotary tools, and is temporarily abandoned, awaiting arrival of cable tools to complete the well for gas.

Cities Service No. 2 Stewart, announced location in the Northeast 1-4 of section 238, Block 1-T, shows no signs of development.

A nice showing of gas has been found in the Shamrock No. 1 Fisher, located in section 206, Block 1-T, which resumed operations last week with cable tools after abandonment for several weeks after work had been completed with rotary tools.

Phillips No. 1 Freddie, located in section 96, Block 1-C, has changed to cable tools for completion of the well for gas.

Phillips No. 1 Brigg, located in section 7, Block 1-C, is drilling with rotary tools.

Phillips No. 1 Weldon, located in section 69, Block 1-C, is drilling with cable tools for completion of the well for gas.

At the announced location of the Phillips No. 1 Kenson, located in section 52, Block 1-C, the slush pit has been dug and water tank erected for drilling operations.

Phillips No. 1 Wanda, located in section 71, Block 1-C, as been completed with approximately 30 million cubic feet of gas blowing from the well.

Phillips No. 1 Boss, located in section 48, Block 1-C, is drilling with rotary tools.

Drilling operations at the Stanolind No. 1 Harland, located in the northeast quarter of section 23, Block 1, PSL, with rotary tools, has been shut down to change over to cable tools.

General Election Brings Republican Candidates

General elections except for presidential election years have held little interest for the people of Sherman County and in all probability little interest will be shown in the general election to be held Tuesday, November 5, unless the appearance of Republican candidates which are becoming more numerous in district offices will bring out the vote.

Senator Tom Connally is opposed by republican candidate Murray C. Sells.

Beauford H. Jester, democratic nominee for governor, is opposed by Eugene Nolte, Jr., republican.

In the Lieutenant Governor's race, Price Daniel, democrat is opposed by H. L. Ratliff, republican.

For Associate Justice of the Supreme Court, place No. 1: John H. Sharp, democrat, is opposed by Howell Ward, republican.

For Associate Justice of the Supreme Court, Place No. 2: Graham B. Smedley, democrat, is opposed by S. D. Bennett, republican.

For Associate Justice of the Supreme Court, Place No. 3: J. E. Hickman, democrat, is opposed by Andrew Longaker, republican.

For Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals: Tom L. Beauchamp, democrat, is opposed by H. L. McCune, republican.

For Railroad Commissioner: Olin Culberson, democrat, is opposed by Frank A. Blannenbeckler, republican.

For Comptroller of Public Accounts: George H. Sheppard, democrat, is opposed by Tom V. Freeman, republican.

For Commissioner of General Land Office: Bascom Giles, democratic nominee, is opposed by Charles F. Adams, republican.

For State Treasurer: Jesse James, democrat, is opposed by Dr. S. R. Lawrence, republican.

For State Superintendent of Public Instruction: L. A. Woods, democrat, is opposed by Mrs. Margaret Conger, republican.

For Congressman, 18th District: Gene Worley, democrat, is opposed by Frank T. O'Brien, republican.

Other district and county democratic nominees are unopposed.

Three constitutional amendments appear on the general election ballot. Two of the amendments will probably carry with ease while one will in all probability meet with considerable opposition.

The first amendment authorizes the State Legislature to pay for a building constructed at John Tarleton A. & M. College, several years ago.

The second amendment authorizes the Legislature to provide a retirement, disability, and death compensation for appointive officers and employees of the state and county.

The third amendment is the good roads amendment which has in all probability the most organized backing of the three amendments.

Special Election Thursday

Due to a clerical error in the Secretary of State's office, a special election will be held Thursday, November 7, for the constitutional amendment establishing a Texas Land Board which would allow approximately 10,000 ex-service men to buy farms or ranches under long-term payment plans.

4-H Club Achievement Program Will Be November 8th

Stratford 4-H club boys and girls and their parents will observe 4-H national achievement week with a program at the school auditorium and high school gymnasium the evening of Friday, November 8th. This achievement program will include members of the 4-H clubs from Spurlock and Lone Star.

The entertainment will be opened in the school auditorium with the showing of a short technicolor film of nature study.

This will be followed with a brief 4-H admission ceremony.

The social hour will be conducted in the high school gymnasium. Various diversions will be carried out for the boys and girls while domino and card games will be offered for the entertainment of the adults attending.

Refreshments will be served by the 4-H club members.

Tentative Program At Texhoma

A similar program is being planned for Texhoma 4-H club members to be held in the Texas and Oklahoma schools at Texhoma for November 9, although arrangements have not been completed.

State Accomplishments

Over 100,000 Texas 4-H Club boys and girls will be recognized for the work they have done during the past year in 4-H clubs during the week of November 2-10.

Club girls have canned over a million and a half quarts of food, served 1,152,000 meals, made more than 150,000 garments and redecorated 7,440 bed rooms, which represents only a part of their accomplishments.

Club boys raised over 40,000 acres of field crops, 750,000 chickens, 50,000 head of livestock, sold 5,260,000 pounds of beef and pork, and collected a million and a half pounds of scrap metal.

Rural youth who are not club members are being urged during the national recognition week to look at the opportunities offered them in 4-H club work and give consideration to becoming an active 4-H club member.

County Frozen Food Clinic Held Thursday

"If quality products are served

on the table, quality products must be used for freezing," stated the extension specialists of Texas A. & M. who conducted the frozen food

clinic held in Stratford Thursday. Roy Snyder, meat specialist, demonstrated cutting of beef emphasizing the separation of thick and thin muscle for better cuts. A beef animal should weigh approximately 500 pounds on foot to be of best size for locker storing. Aging the animal from four to ten days before freezing will improve the flavor. The heavier and fatter the beef the longer it should be aged but not exceed the ten day period.

Beef may be kept as long as a year in a locker and still be a good quality product, but pork should be used within the first six months to be of best flavor and quality. Fat found throughout the beef muscle makes a better flavored and more tender product. Mr. Snyder discussed methods of preparation of the tough and tender cuts of beef.

Proper care of frozen food from garden to locker and locker to the tables is essential in having a desirable product. Foods should be frozen as quickly as possible after being gathered. A good rule to follow is: one hour from garden to locker. The food should be sharp frozen which means that they should be placed in the sharp freeze room in the locker plant. Sharp freezing is done at 20 degrees fahrenheit in still air and at 5 degrees fahrenheit in moving air. Sharp freezing helps in the retention of the nutrients, color, flavor, and texture. Miss Edith Lawrence, specialist in food preparation of Texas A. and M. College demonstrated preparation of frozen meat, green vegetables and frozen fruit. Meat should be thawed in its original wrapping to prevent loss of meat juice and drying and is best if thawed in the refrigerator. All vegetables should be cooked while still frozen except corn on the cob. Frozen vegetables require only 1-2 to 2-3 the cooking time of the corresponding fresh vegetables. It is important not to over cook them as they lose their color, flavor, aroma, texture and some nutrients. Fruits should be thawed just enough to spread. Rapid thawing in the original unopened package is best. "Holding cooked frozen foods warm for serving results in loss of color, texture, and flavor," stated Miss Lawrence.

Due to the crowded schedule of the specialists the inspection tour of the local cold storage locker was not conducted. The discussion of pork and poultry was also limited. The clinic was well attended with 52 persons present during the afternoon.

the urgency of getting out the vote on November 7.

Highlights of the amendment are that it was passed unanimously by the house and senate of the last legislature; that the board will be composed of the governor, attorney general and general land commissioner; that such board is given authority in concurrence with the legislature to issue bonds up to \$25,000,000 for the purchase of additional land from the federal government, individual and other state agencies located in every sector of the state; that bonds bearing three per cent interest will be sold to other state departments carrying heavy surplus funds now un-invested, thus eliminating the necessity of any additional taxes.

It should be pointed out that under the amendment veterans would not be required to "homestead" or live upon their land. They also would not be prohibited from selling their equity.

It is planned that farms ranging from 50 acres to ranches up to 2,500 acres be purchased by the veterans, thus providing a wide variety of crop and livestock production in various parts of Texas. Each veteran would be limited to a

maximum purchase of \$5,000. His bid and check would be accompanied with a photostatic copy of his discharge. The entire purchase routine is planned to be dressed down to the simplest possible form with a minimum of usual red tape.

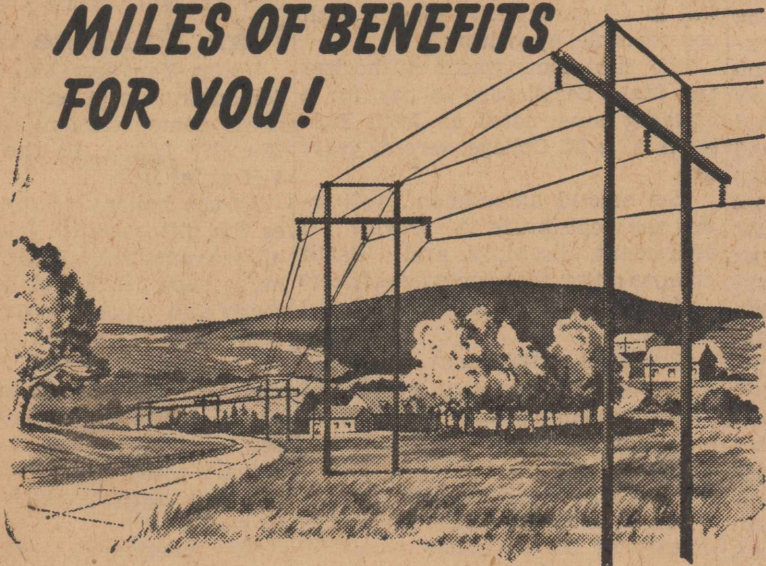

Let's Vote For This Amendment
Texas Legionnaires should all go to the polls Thursday, November 7 and by their votes assure the passage of a proposed constitutional amendment which will create a Veteran's Land Board which is designed to give 10,000 Texas veterans farms and ranches.

This amendment has twice received the backing of the American Legion, at the Fort Worth War Conference in 1945 and at the recent state convention in Galveston. Since the organization is the leading one dedicated to veterans activities, it behooves us all to make a special effort to get out and vote for its passage. And it will require a special effort. It will be voted upon two days following the general election the first Tuesday in November. A clerical slip-up made it necessary to hold a separate election two days later than the general election. Land Commissioner Bascom Giles, who is sponsoring the bill, has asked The Texas Legion to bring before Texas Legionnaires

PAUL CHAMPIONS FREEDOM AND BROTHERHOOD

TEXT—Acts 15:23b-29; Galatians 5:13-18. SELECTION—But we believe that through the grace of the Lord Jesus Christ we shall be saved, even as they.—Acts 15:11.

Fundamental doctrine must be sound and true or the church will go astray. A question had arisen at Antioch which had to be answered authoritatively, and once for all.

The early converts of the church were naturally from among the Jews, and they carried with them into their new-found faith the traditions of their religion. Some of them did not recognize that the salvation they had in Christ was entirely by grace, apart from any works of the law. They not only felt that they must observe the law, but insisted that the Gentile believers must also fulfill the Jewish rite of circumcision. This promptly raised the question whether Christ alone could save, or if men were saved by grace plus works.

To settle this matter, Paul and Barnabas went up to the church at Jerusalem, and there a great council discussed it freely, and came to a decision which was then transmitted by letter and a committee.

That decision established an eternal

I. Principle—Believers Are Free from the Law (Acts 15:23b-29)

The believers at Antioch were to abstain from those things which would hinder their spiritual progress and harm their testimony. That was important and right, but it must not be allowed to confuse them regarding the basis of their salvation. They were not saved by works, not even though they were most commendable.

Salvation is by grace, through faith, "not of works, lest any man should boast" (Eph. 2:8, 9). That principle, which is absolutely foundational in all Christian thinking, was established then, and is valid and blessedly true for all time.

Is it not strange, then, that all through the church's history there has been a determined effort on the part of some in the church to add something to God's redeeming grace as a ground for salvation? Observe the plain rebuke given to teachers of error in verse 24. It is no light matter to trouble and mislead the souls of men by injecting our worldly wisdom or our opinions, when we should be teaching the truth of God's Word.

Salvation by grace and freedom from the law does not bring the believer into a place of license, but of liberty—and a liberty controlled by a new factor in his life. We note that in

II. Practice—Believers Are Bound by Love (Gal. 5:13-15).

The one who turns to Christ by faith is indwelt by the Holy Spirit and finds that, far from failing to keep the high moral principles of God's law, he is given grace to keep them more perfectly. This he does, not in order to be saved, but because he is saved.

He comes out of a bondage to legalism, which he could not bear, into a new bondage to the law of love, which his new nature in Christ delights to bear and in which it finds the fulfillment of its highest and holiest desires.

Note that this shows itself in the church and in the world in loving service to others in the absence of strife; in a word, in the practice of the admonition: "Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself" (v. 14; Lev. 19:18).

No one faces that life responsibility without realizing that he is evidently not able for it. God has provided for that need, for we note next that there is

III. Power—Believers Are Led by the Spirit (Gal. 5:16-18).

Being saved does not set us free from the conflict with sin, for the old nature declares itself at enmity with the Spirit. We find it often to be in our hearts to do right, and in the decisive moment we find the flesh taking control and we cannot do the things we would (v. 17). What is the solution of that problem? An all-out attack on sin and sinful desires? That is commendable, but it somehow doesn't work. We need a superior power to work in and through us.

That's it! There is a power in us and ready to work through us—the matchless, victorious power of the Holy Spirit. He dwells in the heart of every believer (1 Cor. 6:19) and only awaits our yielding to him that he may take control of our lives.

Walking in the Spirit (v. 16) is simply giving him the liberty to direct our lives after the will of God, day by day and moment by moment. This puts us in the way of victory, for as we walk in the Lord's way we may call on him for not only his grace, but also his strength. Saved by grace to a life of liberty and power—such is the inestimable privilege of the Christian. Are we, are you, living up to it?

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Sportlight on GRANTLAND RICE

AFTER watching the scramble for world series seats and hearing of the record demand for every game that teams like Army, Michigan and Notre Dame play, one begins to wonder how many over-eager fans are turned away in the course of a year.



The waste in the matter of spectators runs far into the millions. In fact, it will surpass many hundreds of millions, since on Grantland Rice certain big occasions far more people are turned away than the number of those admitted.

The Red Sox office in Boston told me that, with room enough, the Boston seat sale for the World Series would have passed the 500,000 mark. This means that about 80 per cent of the ticket applicants were turned away.

Army feels confident that it could have played before more than 250,000 at Ann Arbor, if Michigan had a 250,000 stadium, and just as certain it could play before close to a million in the Notre Dame game.

Unfortunately, when earlier stands were built no one saw the possibilities of any such public demand.

Certainly New York didn't, where there is no such bowl as so many other cities have.

Los Angeles can handle 103,000 at her Municipal stadium, with Pasadena only a few miles away, able to put away over 90,000. With Santa Anita and Hollywood set for racing, Los Angeles is well in front so far as accommodations for the human frame are concerned.

Philadelphia and Chicago have 100,000 plants at the Sesquicentennial stadium and Soldier field.

New York's Big Parks

But their ball parks are too meager, along with so many other cities.

The Yankees have the only ball park that can seat 70,000 fans. Polo grounds and Briggs stadium are about on a par at 58,000. Outside of these places, few ball parks can seat more than 35,000 with any comfort. Public interest in sport, almost every variety of sport, has grown far beyond seating or even standing space. They can handle far bigger crowds in England and Scotland because hillsides often are used. In the matter of football or baseball, it is difficult to build stadiums that could handle more than 110,000 or possibly 125,000 spectators.

When crowds reach or pass these marks, too many spectators are too far away from the scene of conflict or contest. But there is vast room for improving conditions, where space too often is much too limited. The Michigan stadium at Ann Arbor leads all strictly college facilities with room for slightly over 86,000 spectators. With over 100,000 applications for the Army-Michigan game, you can see how inadequate this is.

Just what will be done about the situation is a story for the future, with lack of space and also lack of building material. But many an owner or promoter has wasted many a sigh in thinking of all the lost gold from so many millions crowded out.

Too Much Baseball

There was a good deal of talk, during the recent series, about how baseball is extending its playing season deep into football's brief weeks. Then too, there's the matter of traveling.

We were wondering what would happen in the future when Los Angeles or San Francisco had to face Boston or Brooklyn.

A world series that rolls back and forth from ocean to ocean could be much worse than this shift from St. Louis to Boston and back.

The Mississippi isn't nearly as far away from the Atlantic ocean as the Pacific ocean is.

The main fact is that baseball is crowding much too far into the football season.

Naturally, baseball magnates can't see it that way. They have failed to realize that football is now as much of a major sport as baseball ever was, or ever will be.

If a series happens to run into a day or two of rain, those who follow both baseball and football see their first football game around midseason. This doesn't happen to make any sense. Baseball gets its start back in February. It has at least a six months' span. Football only asks for two and a half months.

The majority of football fans agree that Texas university belongs on top, or close to the top of the heap, as far as this season goes.

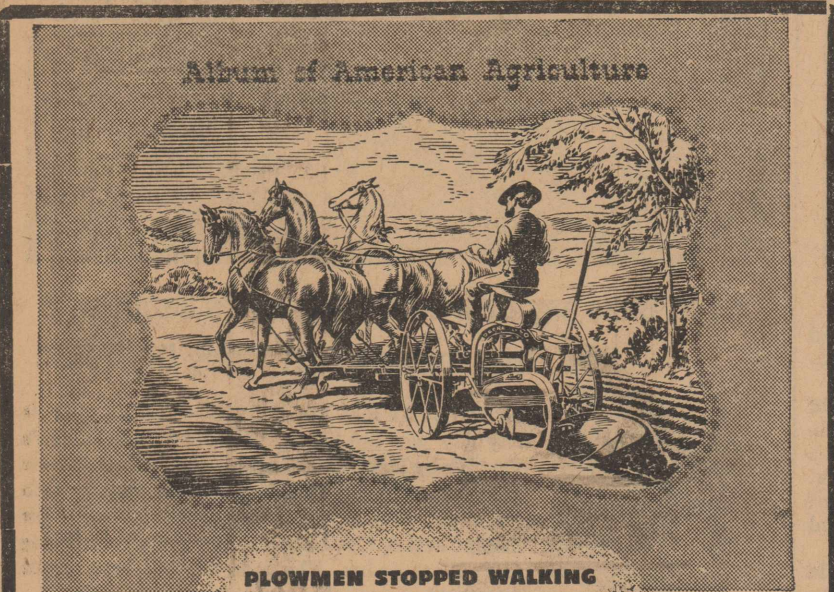

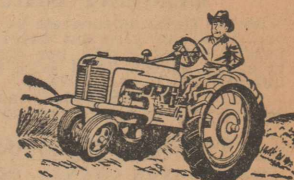
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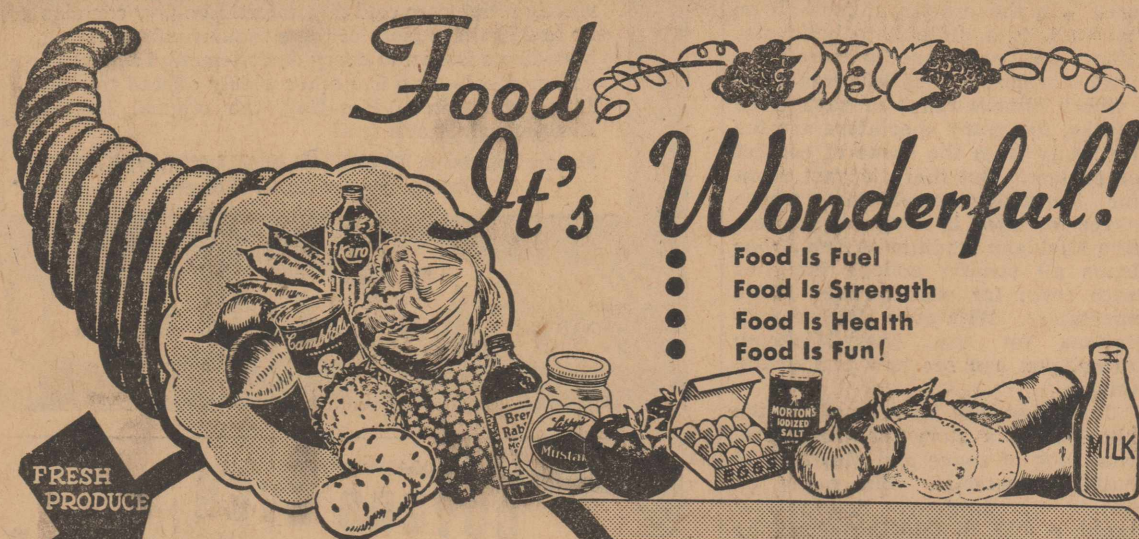
