## Snow Blanket Covers Muddy Plains Region

Snow estimated from 16 to 18 inches, with a moisture content of 1.82 inches, stopped falling over the Texas Panhandle Wednesday morning, after many had prepared to stand a several days siege of wintry weather.

Trucks and buses from the south partially resumed normal operations Wednesday, bringing Stratford its first mail service since Sunday.

Snow, one of the first of its kind since 1943, started falling over the North Plains section Saturday night and has continued at intervals, paralyzing at times practically all modes of traffic, leaving many stranded in Stratford, waiting word from farther north to give encouragement that roads were open.

Traffic north over U. S. highway 287 practically came to a standstill at Kerrick Sunday. A Continent bus bound for Denver attempted to pass two cars stalled on the pavement, slid off in the bar pit and remained stalled 7 miles north of Stratford from 3:30 P. M. Sunday until 11:00 A. M. Monday. Wright Davis and F. L. Yates carried food to the 16 passengers, 13 of whom remained on the bus and returned to Amarillo. The bus had plenty of gasoline to keep the engine running, furnishing heat to keep the passengers comfortable.

A Santa Fe bus arriving from Albuquerque at 5:30 Monday evening waited here until midnight for snow plows to clear U. S. highway 54 into Oklahoma.

Rural route mail carriers did not attempt to carry the mail over their routes Monday or Tuesday.

### Cattlemen Worry

Cattlemen depending on an open winter with sufficient wheat pasture to feed their cattle have the most worries.

Using tractors many have been able to get feed to the herds. Other cattlemen Tuesday evening, were still devising methods of securing feed and hauling it to herds which they believed had not eaten for 48 hours.

### Some Cattle Drift

Several hundred head of cattle have been reported to have drifted with the storm. The only mode of transportation over many roads being either by tractor or heavy trucks, places the owners of this stock in a position of a heavy loss through shrinkage of his cattle.

### Have Time To Talk

Strangely odd of the hustle and bustle of the high plains, where business has been transacted on the run, with little time for conversation or details, business houses are taking on the atmosphere of the old west where customers came to make their purchases and spent the remainder of the day talking over the situations of the country as a whole with their friends.

### TRAFFIC ACCIDENTS WEDNESDAY

Traffic accidents, the first since the snow storm, took place in rapid succession at the intersections of U. S. highway 287 and U. S. highway 54 Wednesday morning.

Texas paved roads, patrolled constantly with highway snow plows were all clear Tuesday evening to the Oklahoma lines. Residents of Colorado, mostly living in the region of Springfield to Denver, were still remaining in Stratford where they found lodging, waiting for news of the successful attempts of the Oklahoma highway departments efforts in clearing snow from the roads.

Only a few trucks were able to make their way across the Oklahoma Panhandle Tuesday to find snow bound roads entering Colorado.

Now this I say, that every one of you saith, I am of Paul; and I am of Appollos; and I am of Cephas; and I am of Christ." "And I, brethren, could not speak unto you as unto spirit-

ual, even as unto babes in Christ. (not babes in the flesh). For ye are yet carnal; for whereas there is among you envyings and strife, and divisions, are ye not carnal, and walk as men? For while one saith, I am of Paul; and another, I am of Appollos, are ye not carnal?" "For to be carnally minded

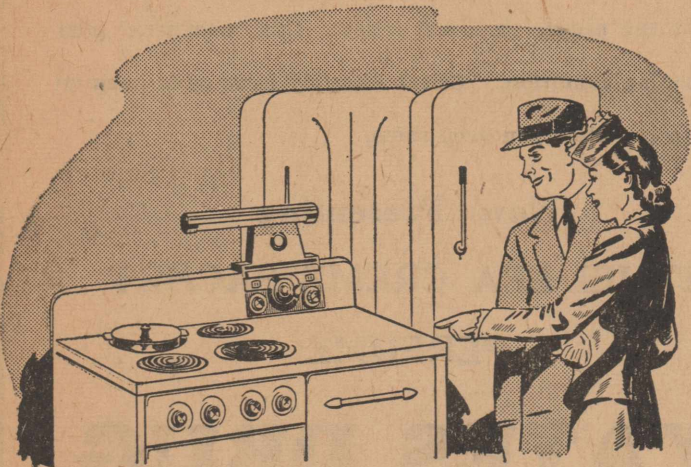

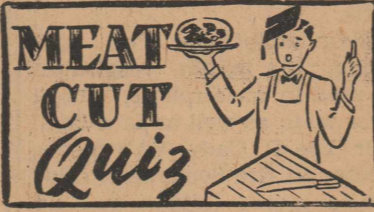

Q. What is the name of this cut of meat?

A. This is the rump half of a leg of veal.

Q. Where does the cut come from, and how is it identified?

A. This is the upper half of the veal leg, as distinguished from the shank or lower half of the leg. It contains the rump bone and a portion of the round (leg) bone. This cut has a high proportion of meat to bone; and, like all cuts of veal, comparatively little fat. If the cut is boned and rolled, it will be easier to carve.

Q. How should this cut be prepared?

A. Any large cut from the leg of veal may be either roasted or braised. This makes a very delicious roast, cooked very slowly in an open pan. A slow oven temperature (300° F.) is important in roasting veal. The roast may be improved by laying slices of bacon or salt pork, or bacon drippings, over the roast while it is cooking. Allow about 25 minutes per pound. The roast is done when a meat thermometer inserted into the largest part registers 170° F.

#### PAUL FOUNDS THE CHURCH AT PHILIPPI

LESSON TEXT — Acts 16:11-15; Philippians 2:5-11.  
MEMORY SELECTION — I can do all things through Christ which strengtheneth me.—Philippians 4:13.

Missionary zeal keeps a Christian in action for God. After a time at the church in Antioch, the urge to preach the gospel sent Paul out on his second missionary journey. This time his partner was Silas, because he and Barnabas had separated over taking Mark along, since he had turned back in the midst of the first missionary journey. Timothy took his place (Acts 16:1-5).

Our lesson is of unusual import because it tells us how the gospel first came to Europe, from whence it later came to America. Paul's efforts to continue his ministry in Asia were hindered by the Holy Spirit (Acts 16:6, 7). It was then that he was given a heaven-sent vision of a man in Macedonia crying for help. At once the party set out to obey the leading of the Holy Spirit (Acts 16:9, 10).

#### I. Paul's Ministry to the Philippians (Acts 16:11-15).

Philippi was an important city, a Roman colony and outpost. Apparently the Jews who had come there to live had not felt any strong desire for religious fellowship, for they had built no synagogue. Certain godly women met on the Sabbath by the riverside for prayer. Here was Paul's opportunity and he took it.

The story of the conversion of Lydia has many elements of special interest. It presents the turning point in the progress of the gospel, which by the grace and leading of God brought it northward to Europe rather than southward into Africa or eastward through Asia. Many of us have heard because of the way Paul was led, and one wonders if Europe and America might not otherwise have been the "dark continents" rather than Africa and India. We are what we are by the grace of God. He sent us the gospel through Paul that day at Philippi.

Then we note that the first convert was a woman. She was not the last woman to give an attentive ear and a believing heart to the gospel message. The church through all its history has been blessed by the readiness of women to bear and heed the gospel.

We like to note that Lydia set a pattern of hospitality and service which her sisters in the church have maintained (see v. 15). She "constrained" the visiting preachers to enjoy the comforts of her home, and thus put forward the work of Christ (see III John 5-8).

It is encouraging to observe how perfectly the leading of the Holy Spirit worked out in the experience of Paul and his brethren. The Lord sent his prepared messenger to the place where there was a prepared heart waiting to receive the Word.

We may confidently go on the errands of our God, knowing that when he leads he goes before and prepares the way. That does not mean that there will be no trials and difficulties. Paul had plenty of them (see II Cor. 11:23-33). But it does mean that we may go with the assurance of blessed results, in his name, and with the grace to bear whatever comes along the way for his glory.

The second Scripture portion of our lesson is not related to the first except that it gives a portion of the letter which Paul, by the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, wrote to the church which he had helped to establish at Philippi about 12 years later.

#### II. Paul's Message to the Philippians (Phil. 2:5-11).

Although after Lydia's conversion Paul met opposition and suffered imprisonment (Acts 16:16-40), that was only the beginning of a blessed ministry there.

The church at Philippi though poor and persecuted was loyal and warmhearted. They sent a generous gift to Paul, who was in prison in Rome. He wrote to thank them, and his letter became a real hymn of joy and assurance. It discusses Christian experience, its principle, pattern, purpose and power.

Chapter 2 presents the mind of Christ as the pattern of true Christian living. Nothing is to be done for vain glory (v. 3), but in the spirit of Christ, who willingly gave up his glory with the Father that he might become our Saviour. It has well been said that if he had not done so, we should have been amazed at his glory, but we should never have been saved.

He who might have "grasped" (v. 6, R. V.) his equality with God, laid it aside that as a man he might die for the salvation of lost mankind (v. 8).

Little wonder that God has given him such a high and exalted position (vv. 9-11). One day every tongue shall confess that he is Lord. Hasten the day!

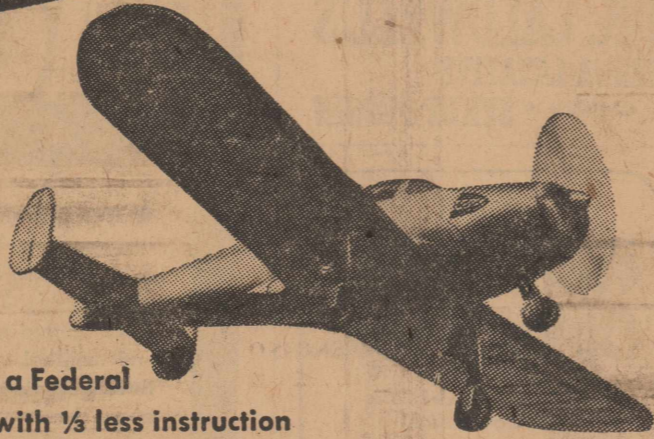

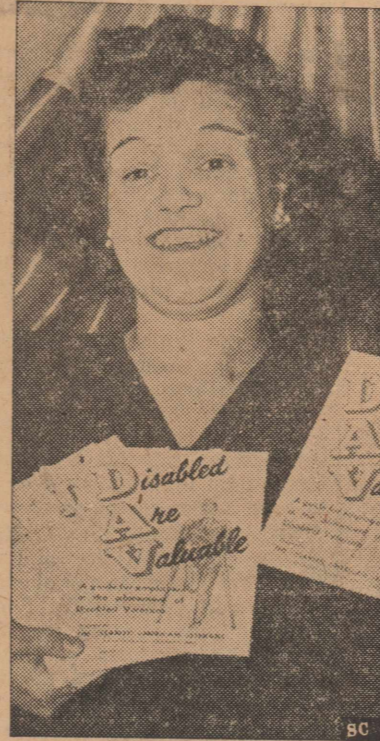

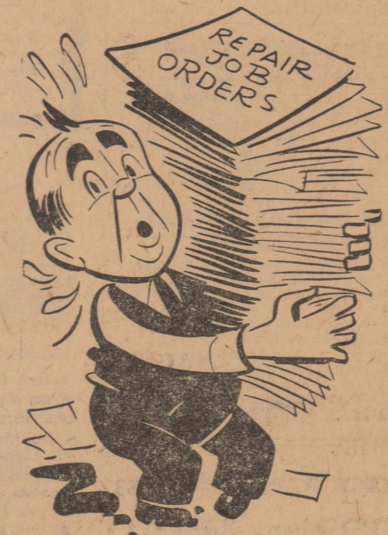
