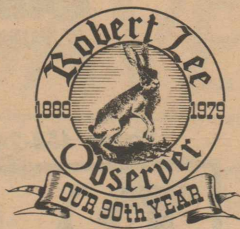

during the night the thermometer went back up above the freezing mark and Wednesday turned out to be a pretty nice day. However, it was cloudy and damp all day.

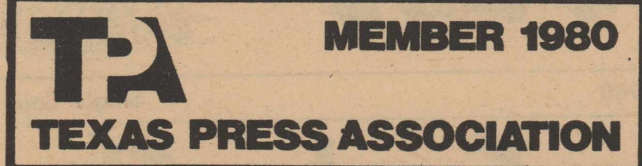
A few miles to the north freezing rain did make driving hazardous and a large number of accidents were reported on I-20 on both sides of Abilene.

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County Agents News Column

Eleven Coke County 4-H Club members participated in the Abilene Stock Show last week with eight animals being placed. Top placing by the 4-H members was made by Doug Roberts, placing sixth with his light weight Duroc pig. Doug Tounget also placed one pig, placing eleventh in the light Hampshire Class.

Tops among the lamb exhibitors was Sheila Lee with a seventh place Southdown lamb and seventh place heavy weight medium wool lamb. Sheila also placed thirtieth with a second lamb

in the heavy medium wool class. Jana Ragsdale was next to Sheila in the Southdown showing, placing eighth with her lamb. Kathy Ensor, also showing a Southdown, placed twelfth. In the finewool lamb show, Pete Ensor was the only local individual placing coming in twentieth with his lightweight finewool lamb.

Coke County is going into the third month with no infected brucellosis herds under quarantine. I received a report this week, dated January 1, showing Coke County to be free of infection. The county first made the no infected herds list on November 1. Hopefully this status can be main-

tained long enough to qualify as a certified brucellosis free county.

Persons that are making preparations for the spring garden may want to put down a pre-plant insecticide for soil insects. Wireworms, cutworms, white grubs, and crickets can cause heavy damage to gardens.

If you are interested, diazionon should be used and be put down two to four weeks before planting. For 1000 square feet of surface area, use 3/4 cup of 25 percent emulsion concentrate or 1/2 cup of 50 percent wettable powder in 2 1/2 to 3 gallons of water. Apply the insecticide to the surface of the soil then mix thoroughly into the soil to a depth of 4-6 inches.

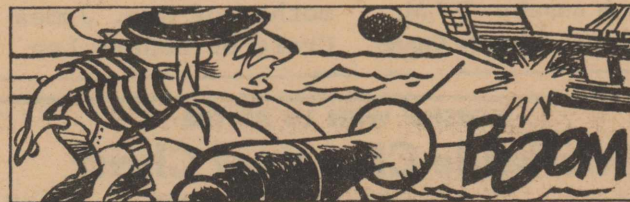

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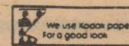

Rhodes scholar to leave Texas A&M for Oxford

COLLEGE STATION — A Texas A&M University electrical engineering major from New Ulm, Texas has been awarded one of the highest prizes in academia, a Rhodes Scholarship to study at Oxford University in England.

Use your favorite icing and decorate the cake as desired for a quick and simple Valentine treat.

If you're history-minded, here are some other tidbits for mulling as you make the cake or share it with someone.

There are many ideas about how the name Valentine came to be connected with the day on which lovers send tokens of affection to one another.

One is based on the belief throughout Europe during the Middle Ages that the birds began to mate on February 14.

In addition to honoring Saint Valentine, February, 1980 takes on an extra-special air

of romantic antiquity -- with the observance of "Lovers Leap Season," or "Leap Year."

This holiday occurs once every four years with the appearance of an extra day in February -- "Leap Day" -- and retains the mysterious belief that women may propose marriage to men with perfect propriety throughout the entire year.

According to an old English saying, ladies may propose during Leap Year, and, if rejected, they may claim a silk gown.

And in many a European town or country, there allegedly have been laws to legalize the custom!

But the mystery remains to be solved: nobody knows just how this tradition got started, and no satisfactory explanation has ever been offered.

In the United States, in New England, there used to be a curious belief that during Leap Year beans grow on the wrong side of the pod.

No matter what the origin or belief of Valentine customs, you can still share the heart-shaped cake with a special person.

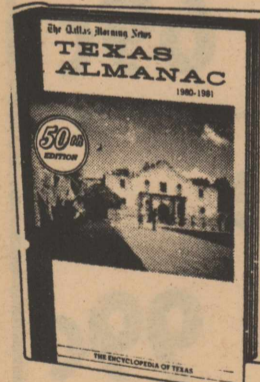

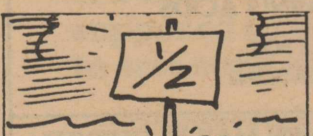
