Weekend of Cold Weather Dumps Rain, Sleet, Snow on Coke County

There's been some winter weather in Coke County during the past week, with rain, sleet, snow and ice. Driving conditions were hazardous last Saturday due to temperatures in the low 20s which combined with moisture to form a slick glaze over highways and streets.

The cold front came into the area Thursday night of last week with thunder, lightning and rain. Heaviest rainfall reported to the Observer was by Hadley Richards who had 1½ inches at his place in the Valley View area. J.E. Quisenberry measured

.43 inch in Robert Lee.

The weather of the past weekend was almost a repeat of a year ago. On Feb. 5, 1979, four inches of snow fell after some rain and sleet and the mercury tumbled into the low 20s.

Cold weather continued into the middle of the week with cold nights. Temperatures climbed into the high 40s Monday and Tuesday.

Robert Lee Girls Battle Gorman In Bi-District

Robert Lee High School's girls basketball team won the championship of District 21-B last Friday night when they downed Bronte girls 50-42. The Steer boys team was unable to stop the Longhorns, however, and lost the district title to Bronte 59-41.

The win over Bronte gave Coach Clyde Dukes' girls a chance to advance and they will play Gorman in Abilene at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, Feb. 19, at Abilene Cooper Gym.

Scoring points for the girls in the game with Bronte were Lisa Devoll with a big 28; Leigh Ann Runnion 7; Dianna Tinkler 6; Carolyn Simpson 5; Elsa DeLaPenas 4.

Scoring for the Steers were Darren Williams 10; Ricky Ross 9; Kerry Gartman 8; Vic Conners 6; Buck Duncan 2; Joel Percifull 2; Lynn Gulley 2; Scot Long 2.

Robert Lee girls suffered their first defeat of the season Monday

night when they lost a practice game to Borden County 59-48. The game was played at For-san. Making points were Devoll with 16; Runnion 12; Tinkler 11; Simpson 4; DeLaPenas 4; Gray 1.

The girls have another practice game scheduled for 7 p.m. tonight (Friday) when they will meet Matador at Jayton.

CITY ELECTION

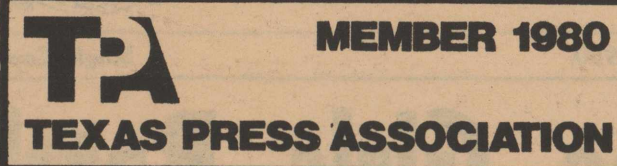

Commissioners Name Library Board

Coke County commissioners appointed the Coke County Library board of directors when they met Monday. The board is responsible to the Commissioners' Court for operation of the county library.

Appointed were: Pauline Vaughan, lay representative, Joan Davis, Mary Herring, T.M. Wylie, Judy Williams, Lynn Doris Smith, Mary Bessent, Gay Sawyer, Jessie Yarbrough and Hank Baker, member at-large.

In other business the commissioners:

* Met with a representative of the Texas Parks & Wildlife Commission to discuss proposed new hunting regulations. The first would be not to issue doe permits to deer hunters, but to issue a permit to allow a hunter to kill three deer of either sex. The second would provide for a spring turkey season. The court deferred action on the matter.

* Okayed the purchase of a manual typewriter for use of officers at the law enforcement office at Bronte. They plan to trade in an electric typewriter now in use for a manual machine, which would require less maintenance.

* Tabled for the second time a request from Justice of the Peace Cecil Kemp of Precinct 2 that he be paid some office rent for the use of his business building for conducting county business. Judge D.W. Sims said the commissioners want more time to study the entire JP setup in Coke County.

* Voted to allow Jim Stewart to remove approximately 80 feet of fence at the county airstrip which adjoins his property. Stewart has expressed an interest in building a private hangar on his land and would need access to the airstrip.

* Set terms of justice and county court the

same as last year and increased pay of jurors to conform to state law. Anyone who is called and reports for jury duty will be paid \$6.00 and those who actually serve on a jury will receive \$12.50 per day instead of \$10.00, which has been paid in the past.

* Passed an order to publish a notice that they will receive bids for a new car for the Sheriff's Department.

* Voted to contact the Cities of Robert Lee and Bronte about amending the county's agreement with the cities to furnish fire protection in rural areas. The change needed would state that the county will furnish \$1000 per year for the service instead of \$500. Judge Sims said he felt the cities would agree to accept the additional funding.

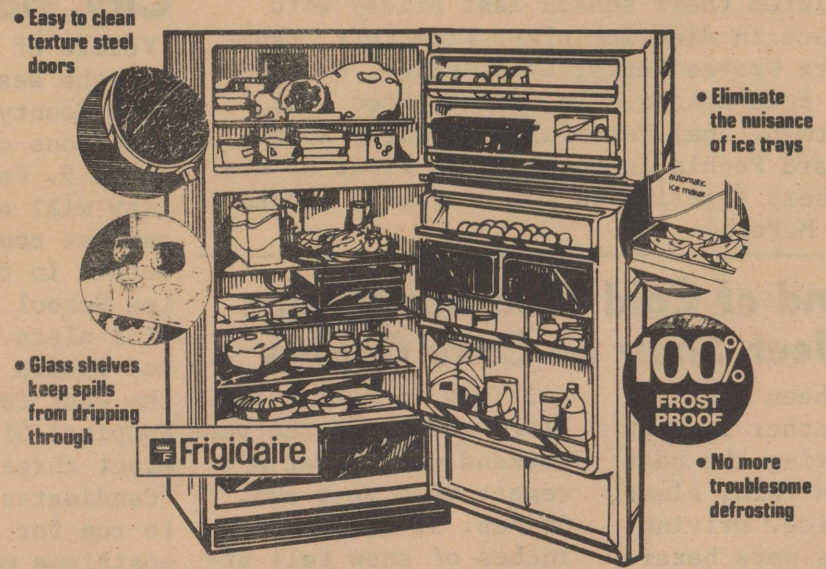

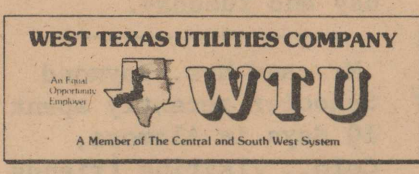

Council Orders Election for April 5

In the regular meeting Feb. 5, the City Council of Robert Lee ordered an election for April 5, for the election of a mayor and two council members. More information is in an election story in this paper.

In other business, the council voted to remove automobiles from the 1980 tax roll. They agreed to pay for one of the Christmas Trees for downtown decoration which have been ordered by the Alpha Kappa Phi sorority, to proceed with the development of a minipark by City Hall, and to extend a three year lease on the 240 acre old lake property with Finis Millican.

The council discussed the rural water agreement with the Coke County Water Supply Corporation and agreed on a probable place for the rural water line to be tied into the city system. They discussed telephone service in

Robert Lee and agreed to look into this matter further.

The council discussed the need for city-county cooperation in the work and the expense of keeping the dump ground up to state regulations. A Proposed Use Hearing on Revenue Sharing Funds was set for Tuesday, Feb. 19, in City Hall.

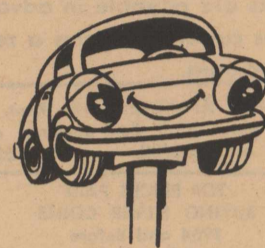

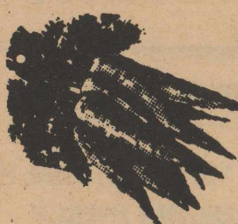

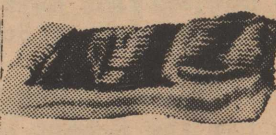
