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General Telephone Co. Requests Substantial Rate Increase in Texas

General Telephone Co. of the Southwest has filed application for a rate increase for its entire system operated in Texas. The request was designed to produce about \$58 million per year for an overall increase of 37 per cent. However, the 37 per cent figure does not necessarily apply to all of General's exchanges. The increase would be determined by the number of phones which can be reached on local exchanges and other factors.

The largest increase proposed for Coke County in rate band number 1, would be for a business phone in Bronte, which would amount to a 16.46 per cent raise.

According of Division Manager Melvin Jennings of San Angelo, the basic monthly service increases for Robert Lee would be as follows: a one-party residential phone would increase from \$8.50 to \$9.21 or 8.35 per cent; a oneparty business phone

would increase from \$19. 00 to \$21.37 or 12.47 per cent.

Raises for Bronte would To Sell Cookies be: one-party residential phone would increase from \$8.15 to \$9.21 or 13 per cent: a oneparty business phone would increase from \$18. 35 to \$21.37 or 16.46 per cent.

Jennings said the company is trying to standardize rates according to the number of local phones a customer can call. He pointed out that Bronte and Robert Lee rates would be the same, as they both fall which is for customers who have access to one to 3200 phones.

This request is the first major increase General Telephone Co. has asked for since 1976 and since the Texas Public Utility Commission was formed. Prior to the formation of the commission, the phone company negotiated with individual city councils for any incre-

ase in the towns served. Jennings said the rate increase would not affect long distance rates.



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

Barnhill Missing For Two Weeks

A former Robert Lee man has been reported missing for almost two weeks. Lloyd James "Jim" Barnhill, 44, of Gatesville, was discovered missing from a house he was renting in Hamilton about 10 a.m. Feb. 15 by his brother, John Barnhill.

Barnhill lived in Robert Lee for several years while he was employed by the Soil Conservation Service. His wife, Mary, was a teacher in Robert Lee Schools and now a teacher at Gatesville.

The sheriff's office in Hamilton told the Observer Wednesday morning that Barnhill had gone from his home in Gatesville to Hamilton to work with his brother in conducting a sale at their department store. Barnhill had been spending quite a bit of time working at Hamilton, and had rented a house where he stayed while there. He also operated a store in Gatesville.

A report said all of Barnhill's clothes except a robe were in the house, along with keys to his vehicle which was parked outside. His billfold and some papers were found in the house, but his credit cards and money were missing.

A spokesman for the Hamilton County Sheriff's Dept. said they were cooperating with city law officers and Texas Rangers in a search for the missing man.




