ruption in medical service at the West Coke County Hospital due to Dr. Shin's leaving.

Larry Anderson, president of the board, said Tuesday night that there are several possibilities for doctors to move into the county. He said, however, that a Dr. Zeon, who is now practicing at Gruver in the Panhandle, seems to be the most likely prospect to take over Dr. Shin's practice. He has agreed, verbally, to come to Coke County, Anderson said.

The hospital district board will meet Monday night at 7 p.m. to make a final decision, Anderson said, but it looks as though Dr. Zeon will be the new doctor.

Anderson said, "I am really pleased with the great interest that has been shown by doctors who are considering the move to Coke County. The interest has been great enough, the board president said, that "we are expecting no interruption in services of the hospital."

Anderson added that the board meeting Monday night, and all board meetings, will be open to the public and "we would like to have people come and express their opinions." He said another matter to be considered would be a communications system between the West Coke County Hospital and hospitals in San Angelo for use by the ambulance service when transferring patients to the larger hospitals.

In a conversation with Dr. Shin Tuesday, he said, "I have enjoyed my practice in Coke County and appreciate the people here." He said he regretted leaving, but felt it was best, since most of his family members are living in the Dallas area.

Dr. Shin said he will leave all of the charts and records of patients, as well as those Dr. Do left when he moved from Robert Lee, so they will be available for the next doctor who comes to Robert Lee.

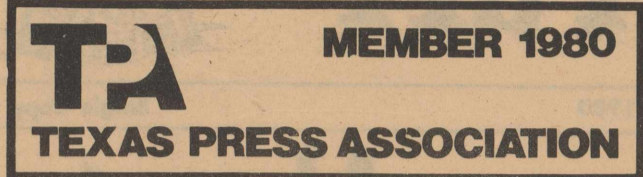

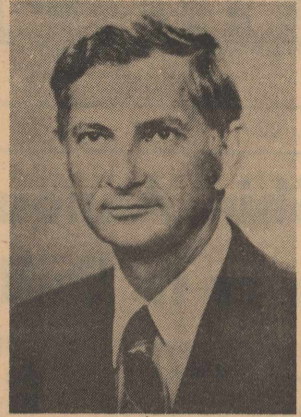

Coke County 4-H Clubs will sponsor a rabies vaccination clinic next week at the Robert Lee County Park. A licensed veterinarian will be at the show barn Wednesday morning from 9:30 to 11:30 to immunize pets against rabies and other diseases.

Mrs. Robbins was born Sept. 2, 1887, in Alabama and moved with her family to Coke County when she was a child. She was married to L.C. "Bus" Robbins Dec. 24, 1903, in Robert Lee. She lived in the Hayrick community all her life except for the early years before the family moved to this county.

Survivors include three sons, Carroll Robbins and Rupert Robbins of Bronte and Portis Robbins of San Angelo; four daughters, Ollie Mae Cowley of Bronte, Annie Lee Williams of Midland and Katherine Patterson and Maxine Allen, both of San Angelo; two sisters, Ollie Kay Hogue of San Antonio and Permelia Reed of San Angelo; 17 grandchildren; 28 great-grandchildren; and eight great-great-grandchildren.

Grandsons served as pallbearers.

The veterinarian will have with him vaccines for distemper, DHL and DHLP in case someone wants their pets protected from these diseases.

"Everyone is encouraged to have their pets immunized," said County Extension Agent Sterling Lindsey. A few cases have shown up in wild animals in this area already, he said, and the best control for rabies is a high percent vaccination of pets.

Also the State of Texas recently passed a new law stating "The owner of each dog or cat shall have the dog or cat vaccinated against rabies by the time the dog or cat is four months of age and at regular intervals thereafter as prescribed by the board," according to officials of the Texas Department of Health.

All pets should be vaccinated annually unless other conditions have been specified by a veterinarian, Lindsey said.
