

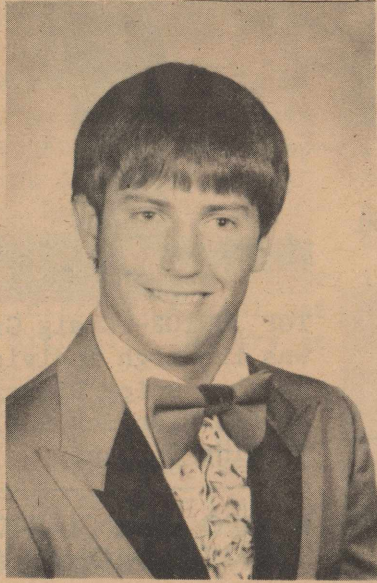

New Faces Winners In Primary Voting Saturday

There will be a few changes in Coke County government next January as a result of last Saturday's primary elections.

Marshall Millican defeated Harry Palmer for sheriff by a vote of 789-212. Millican, now constable of Precinct 1, will replace J. Lee Ensor, who did not seek reelection.

Commissioner races on the west side of the county resulted in one incumbent getting reelected and one losing to his challenger. Commissioner Albert N. (Bob) Fields got 117 votes, while George Newby unseated him by polling 223. Commissioner Finis Millican and his challenger, Finis Harmon, ran a close race, but Millican emerged the victor when the final tally showed him with 197 and Harmon with 131.

Precinct 3 will have a constable for the first time next year. George Weir and Don Bell were running for the position and Weir came out ahead with a count of 247-68.

A district office that stirred up local interest was for 51st district attorney. Incumbent Gerald Fohn received 446, while his challenger, Randy Stout, had 437. Fohn also won over the entire district with last

count showing him with 5,621 votes to Stout's 4,534.

Another multi-county race which created much interest here and in other counties was for Sixty-third District state representative. It was another close race, but this time the challenger, Larry Don Shaw of Big Spring, unseated veteran legislator Mike Ezzell of Snyder. Coke County went for Ezzell, 524-382, but over the entire district, Shaw came out on the long end of the stick, 6,774 to 6,387. Shaw waged a vigorous campaign and apparently it paid off. The district is a weirdly-shaped area that includes Borden, Coke, Dawson, Howard, Scurry and Sterling counties and stretches some 140 miles from northwest of Lamasa to southeast of Bronte.

The Democrats highly favored Joe Sullivan over Marilyn Jones to go up against incumbent Republican Cong. Tom Loeffler in November. Midweek count over the sprawling 21st District gave Sullivan a two-to-three lead over Mrs. Jones. Coke County gave Sullivan 558 votes to Jones' 240.

Tax Assessor-Collector O.B. Jacobs received the highest number of votes of any unopposed

candidate on the ticket, with 920. County Democratic Chairman Martin Lee was not far behind with 835. All his precinct chairmen were elected with no opposition. County Attorney Robert Owen got 649 and Wayne Arrott polled 173 reelection as constable in Precinct 2. Neither was opposed.

Fire Damages RL Building

A building in the downtown business area of Robert Lee was damaged by fire Saturday evening. The building is owned by R.C. "Buz" Sawyer. The front section of the building is occupied by two businesses, Maples Beauty Shop and Whipple T.V. Shop.

The fire alarm was sounded shortly after 7 p.m. when a passerby reported seeing smoke coming from the building. No one was in the building at the time.

The fire is believed to have started from electrical wiring which short circuited at the point where it entered the rear of the building and was probably caused by water from rain which was falling at the time. Firemen arriving at the scene disconnected wiring before entering the building.

The fire was confined to a section of the roof and ceiling at the rear of the building but the dense smoke and accumulated heat hampered efforts to locate and douse the smoldering wood framing and roof.

Sawyer stated Monday that the building was insured but he had not obtained estimates for repairs. He said a part of the roof, ceiling and wiring would have to be replaced.

Sawyer said he wished to thank everyone who helped in putting out the fire and in cleaning up and making temporary repairs and all who have offered assistance since the fire.

Inch of Rain Falls During the Week

Robert Lee has received about an inch of rain since last Saturday. The moisture was welcomed by everyone and hopes are running high that more will follow.

A half inch was measured in Robert Lee after slow drizzle fell most of the day.

Another half inch fell Tuesday night when an electrical storm moved through the area.

Rep. Mike Ezzell of Snyder, who represents this district in the Texas Legislature, will be speaker of the evening.

Also included on the program will be presentations of "Citizen of the Year" and "Lion of the Year" awards. Other persons will be recognized, also.

Everyone in the Robert Lee community is invited to attend the banquet.

Bob Owen Resigns County Attorney Position, Plans to Move in June

Coke County Commissioners' Court accepted the resignation of County Attorney Bob Owen at its meeting Monday morning at the courthouse. The resignation will become effective June 1. Owen said he will move to Austin.

The commissioners also accepted the resignation of Arch Mathers as a member of the county tax appraisal board and appointed Douglas Gartman to replace him. Mathers said he was resigning the position because of health reasons.

A letter from 51st District Judge Earl Smith requested that the commissioners set the salary of the court reporter for his court and the commissioners complied with the request.

A letter from the Texas Parks & Wildlife Commission and suggested changes in hunting and fishing regulations were approved as suggested.

The commissioners approved payment of bills and adjourned after a short session which ended before noon.

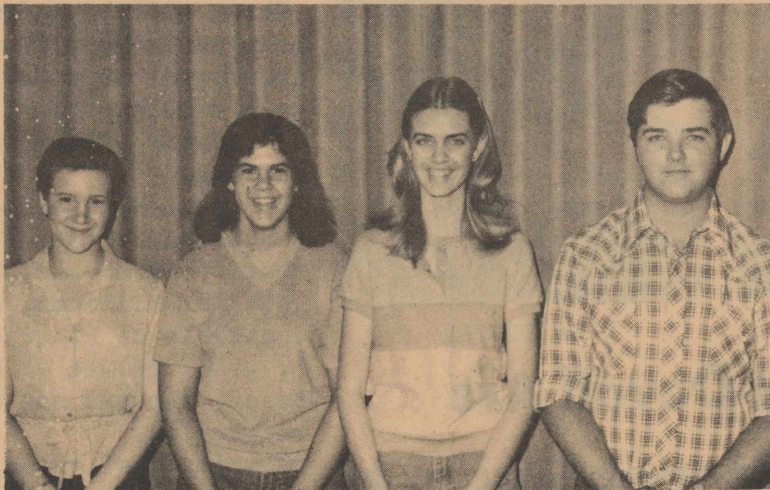

Soil and Water Conservation a Big Problem for U. S. and the World

The conservation of productive soil, water, and related resources on the privately-owned lands of the United States, which was never an easy undertaking, is becoming more critical. In the 45 years since the nationwide conservation program was launched, a great deal has been accomplished. But steady changes in land use and management, the introduction of bigger farm machinery, and the evolution of new attitudes toward the land have now compounded the difficulties of the task.

Soil stewardship, the spirit of responsible man at work on the land, is going to be tested as never before.

The dollar cost of applying conservation measures, as well as maintaining conservation systems of farming are rising. The size of farms is increasing while the number of farmers is shrinking. As one result, the traditional intimacy between the farmer and his land is diminishing in too many places. Increasingly, farmland is being regarded as a commodity to be bought and sold rather than as a very special and vulnerable resource tied to the landscape -- a resource with a productive capability on which all life depends for all generations to come.

During the 10 years prior to 1978, an average of nearly three million acres of rural land were converted each year to urban uses. A third of this was "prime" farmland -- the very best we had.

The demand for maximum yields to offset accelerated production costs and ever-rising land values has led to more intensified farming. This in return has depleted attention to conservation and in some places increased the rates of soil erosion beyond all acceptable levels. On thousands of acres, annual losses of soil from cropland now exceed 25 tons per acre or five times what some experts regard as a "safe" loss.

Such losses are triply damaging. Not only do they reduce productive capacity and add enormously to the pollution of lakes and rivers; they cut seriously into opportunities for on-coming farm families to earn a respectable

livelihood in agriculture.

What is needed is a new land ethic, forged of the twin concerns for the land's proper use and its proper care. Prime farmlands must be treasured -- keep them available for agricultural use, help farmers survive economically and environmentally so they can profitably produce from them, and insist that they be used in such a manner that soil depletion is minimized.

CLUB BEAUTIFIES HOME WITH PLANTS

To those whom are unaware; or have not noticed new plantings have been made at the West Coke County Nursing Home.

The '64 Study Club has a new project---adding to the landscape at the entrance of the nursing home in Robert Lee.

Mrs. Tom Ridgway of Senisa Garden Club in San Angelo, a landscape design expert and master flower show judge, planned the new additions. This plan will be attractive to birds--providing berries for food --as well as having a bird bath outside the lobby picture window for the residents to watch and enjoy birds in all seasons.

So far, five nice sized bud trees have been planted and more flowering plants will be added at the picture window area, along with the bird bath. Also new shrubs need to be planted in the planter box.

The club hopes to finance these plantings with a memorial fund. Several donations have already been received.

Even a better way is a fund honoring someone special--someone that would take pleasure in being remembered in this special way, club women said.

5. Tread wear indicators showing across two or more grooves . . . means tires must be replaced.

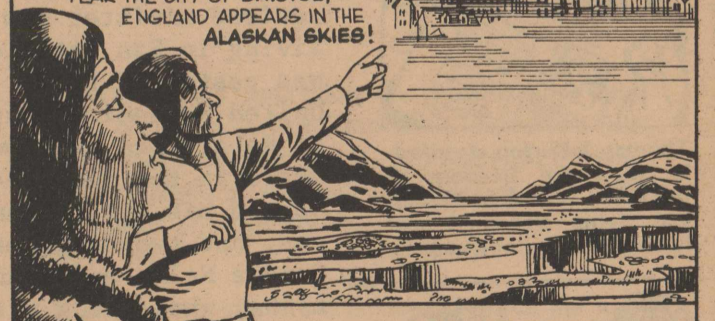

A small group of Coke County ranchers have taken it upon themselves to try a new angle at predator control. They are hiring a helicopter to fly over their ranches and carry a gunman to shoot coyotes, bobcats and other varmints that kill baby lambs and kids.

Raymond McCutchen of Robert Lee was the instigator of the idea and he has been joined by other ranchmen. They assess themselves a per-acre fee to cover the expense of the operation. No tax money is involved in the work.

The predator problem is real to ranchmen who raise sheep. They claim lamb crops which used to average more than 100 per cent have dropped to 60-70 per cent or less. Coke County residents

have been curious about what the helicopter is doing flying around all over the place. That's it, they're looking for those sheep-killing varmints.
