Jameson said the child was playing in the yard and thought she had been stung by an insect on the ankle. He said that after searching and finding nothing, he thought it must have been a wasp. He stated that antisepic was applied to ease the pain and Tiffany appeared to have no ill effects.

The parents became alarmed early Sunday morning when the girl's foot was swollen and discolored. Jameson looked again and found a small rattler on the porch of the house. They rushed Tiffany to the emergency room at Shannon Hospital in San Angelo where doctors treated her and kept her in the hospital for observation. She was released Monday and was reportedly doing fine Tuesday morning.

Tiffany wants to warn all children (and parents) to be very careful and watch for snakes at all times.

FmHA Approves Water Funds

The Farmers Home Administration has approved funds for the completion of the new water system in the west part of Coke County.

A phone call to this newspaper Wednesday morning from the office of Senator Lloyd Bentsen said a loan and grant were approved to finance the completion of Phase I of the water system program for Coke County.

Health Clinic Set for June 4

Texas Department of Public Health nurses will conduct a health screening clinic June 4 in Robert Lee at the recreation hall in the County park beginning at 10 a.m. until noon. This will cover tests for diabetes, blood pressure, obesity, anemia, vision and hearing. If the tests are questionable all findings will be referred to the person's private physcian.

An immunization clinic will be held in the afternoon between 1 and 3 o'clock at the same place. It was stressed by the Health Department nurse that persons of all ages are urged to come to the free clinics for these tests and to update immunization records.

A loan in the amount of \$187,300 and a grant of \$108,300 were approved by FHA, the spokeswoman in Senator Bentsen's office said. The loan will bear interest at the rate of five per cent.

Don Fields, president of the Coke County Water Supply Corp., said he was very pleased with the decision to provide funds to

complete the project. Phase I of the water system contains approximately 50 miles of water line in the area southwest and west of Robert Lee. It will serve residents in the Lake Spence area and those who live on both sides of Highway 158. The water line will extend west to the vicinity of Pecan Baptisit Church.

Fields said his group is ready to get on with the job and expects to sign construction contracts as soon as possible. He said it is possible that work on the project will begin in June.

Approximately \$500,000 was provided to start the project. Half of the money was a loan and half was a grant.



County Agents could be used for this **News Column**

Last year we received a lot of calls late in the pecan year - Aug. and Sept.-about nuts shedding. The nuts had dark, shiny black spots on the shuck. Then later, the nuts that stayed on the tree, that were diseased, failed to open and in most cases they were not filled out. Some of these stayed on the tree all winter.

This problem is in most cases sticky shuck or stem end blight. In a few cases the problem was pecan scab.

In either case, the disease or diseases can be fairly well controlled by spraying with benomyl. The trees should be sprayed at or during the water stage and sprayed twice at two week intervals. This means spraying with benomyl the middle or last of July and again two weeks later using benomyl. If we get some showery weather during that time, a third application is reccom-

If you have not tried growing tomatoes in cages, this is a system liked by many that you may want to try. caging offers several advantages to the gardener, including less sunburn and usually, higher yields with less work. Also, ground rot and cracking can be reduced by growing tomatoes in cages.

Almost any kind of sturdy fencing or reinforcing wire with openings of 4 inches or more can be used. A roll of old fencing

purpose. The wire should be rolled into cylinders about 18 or 20 inches across. The bottom rung should be cut out so the remaining spikes can be pushed into the ground to the ground to achor the cage. The cages should be made 2.5 to 5 feet tall.

All varieties are adaptable to cages but varieties, such as Bigset, Bonus, Spring giant, Better Boy, Floramerica and Terrific are suggested. The plants should be spaced 2.5 to 3 feet apart for caging with the rows 4 to 5 feet apart.

Place a cage over each plant and anchor the cage. The cage will then support the plant. Normally, no pruning or training is necessary.

The initial expense of a cage may seem high, but the cages can be stored and used year after year. Cages can also be used on cucumbers and pole beans if so desired.



New drug may aid glaucoma victims

COLLEGE STATION -Laboratory tests of a new drug for treating glaucoma, which affects at least a million Americans, have begun at Texas A&M University's College of Medicine.

The drug DMB may be even more effective and have fewer side effects than other drugs currently on the market, explained Dr. George C. Y. Chiou, head of medical pharmacology at Texas A&M.

The new compound, said Chiou, may be a purer form of another glaucoma drug called DMC already being tested on human volunteers.

About 178,000 new cases of glaucoma are reported in the United States each year and the ailment has already blinded at least 56,000 Americans and impaired the vision of 200,000 more.


