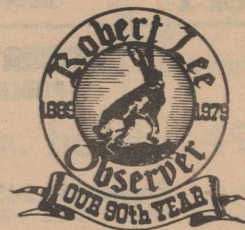

Were you counted in the 1980 Census of Housing and Population?

If you think you or your family might have been missed, fill out the "WERE YOU COUNTED?" form printed in today's newspaper as a public service. Cut it out and return it by mail to U.S. Census Office, 116 4th Street, Pecos, Texas 79772. The form will be checked against the master address list for your area so there is no chance of an individual or household being counted twice.

Rain Is Big Help To Farmers; City Lake Up 2½ Feet

Fine rains skipped over Coke County Saturday night, dropping as much as five inches in some places, but with less than an inch in other areas. Robert Lee had 1.5 inches.

Mountain Creek Lake caught 2½ feet of water giving some insurance of an adequate supply for Robert Lee residents during the rest of the summer.

Heaviest rain reported was across the river southeast of Bronte where a little over five inches fell. Rain gauges in Bronte filled up to 3.2 inches.

A few reports received the following measurements:

Finis Millican, near Edith, .6; Doug Snead, who also ranches in the Edith area, reported 1.5 inches; Silver, 2.6 inches; Sanco, 2 inches James Miller, southeast across the river, 3 inches.

A report from the southwest corner of the county near Water Valley showed 3.5 inches.

Hot weather continued the first of the week with the mercury climbing to 100. Forecasts gave little hope for relief from the heat through this week.

This appeal to the public is made by Janet Faulkner, manager of the Pecos area District Census Office. Faulkner says that the "WERE YOU COUNTED?" campaign is an additional effort to insure that no one is overlooked during the 1980 Census. The Census Bureau hopes that any households missed in previous census operations will respond during the "WERE YOU COUNTED?" campaign.

Faulkner noted that very shortly the Census Bureau will turn over to local officials the population counts for their communities. These preliminary population counts will be subject to a review by local elected officials. The purpose of this Local Review Program is to give city and county officials an opportunity to spot errors while census workers are still in the field. This allows the Census Bureau to recheck any questioned population counts and should contribute significantly to the accuracy and success of the 1980 Census.

Faulkner also pointed out that local officials will see only the population totals for their communities, not the census questionnaires containing personal information, which are kept in complete confidence.

City Council Votes To Increase Taxes By 50%

Members of the Robert Lee City Council met in a special called session Monday night and voted to increase city taxes from \$1.00 per \$100.00 evaluation to \$1.50 per \$100.00 evaluation. City officials said the increase has become necessary because of constantly increasing expenses caused by inflation, which have resulted in a \$27,000 deficit in the 1980-81 budget.

Valuations on the city tax roll are placed at 33 1/3 per cent of market value. City Secretary Edna Havins gave an example of how the increase will work: "If your house is valued at \$9,000.00, it is carried on the tax rolls at \$3,000.00. Your present taxes are \$30.00. Under

the new rate your taxes will be \$45.00."

not been changed since 1954, city officials explained, adding that the new rate will raise less than \$10,000 per year.

Members of the council noted that wages, chemicals, electricity and all material used in city operation have more than doubled in the last four years, and in some cases have more than tripled. This inflationary spiral during the past 27 months has caused the city to show a loss of approximately \$1,500.00 per month in its operation.

The new rate still leaves Robert Lee taxes lower than neighboring towns, it was pointed out.

"The city council pledges to use your money wisely," the members said.

Coke 4-H Camp At Brownwood

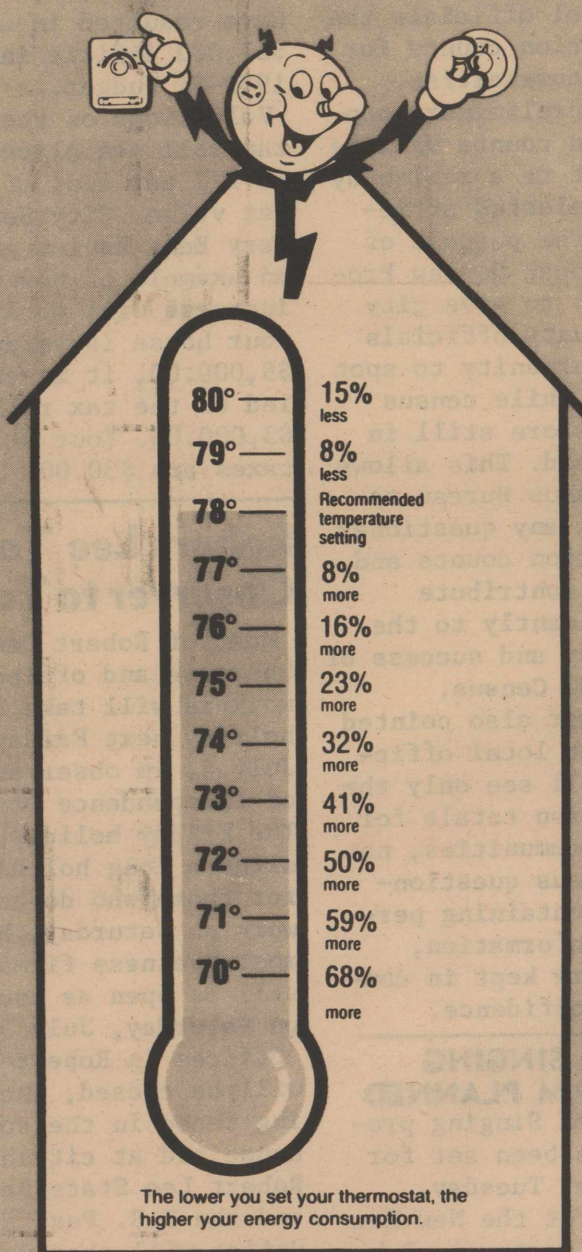

NOTE: This chart is based on average residential usage for cooling in a typical residence.

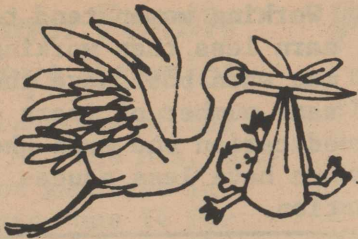

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Who Controls Your Choices of Food?

Do you really control your food choices--or do your habits control you?

If changes are needed, only you can decide to make them--and that depends on four things: a specific goal, learning nutrition basics, "unlearning" misinformation, and changing traditions.

Few of us eat foods because we're told they're "good for us."

On the other hand, most of us will respond to a specific goal--weight reduction or diabetes control, for example.

We see that health relates to any other specific goals, but just "health" alone isn't specific enough to make a majority of us change the way we eat.

Most of us don't think in such long-range terms as eating "right" today to prevent health problems later in life.

So having a specific goal is a "must" for many of us, but it's just the first step.

If we can see health itself as our specific goal, this first step will be a stronger one.

Understanding nutrition basics is the second step. This takes learning.

We need facts to point out the pathways of all our other steps--and to suggest the time and effort they'll inquire.

Most of us are interested in nutrition only if it means something good today.

We seek immediate results, and we're not too realistic about the time and effort needed to reach or obtain our desired goal.

Learning nutrition basics is the key to effectively reaching our goal.

Learning and unlearning is a never-ending process, and nutrition education is not a simple matter.

Changes in types and forms of foods will continue at a pace which staggers the imagination. Choices we face will become even greater.

Realizing that this is a constant process which will go on throughout life is the third step in changing our eating habits.

Developing the ability to actually change is the fourth step.

One key to success is knowing how strongly food habits become entrenched in our daily routines.

Their grip is so strong we often fail to recognize that the laws of nutrition apply to everyone--or we ignore that fact.

How do we know if we need to change?

Start with self-analysis. We can ask ourselves these questions:

1) What factors are most important when I select particular foods?

2) How does my overall dietary pattern affect my lifestyle and health?

3) Or, does my lifestyle determine my eating habits?

4) Do I select foods out of impulse, or am I a rational decision-maker?

5) Do I really understand why I choose the foods I eat?

Remember, too for most people, price of food items doesn't play a central role in consumer decisions--cost limits our purchases, but it doesn't determine our eating habits.

Here's one last question--a "food for thought" question (the one we asked in the first place): Do I really control my food choices--or do my habits control me?

GETTING MORE BEEF PER ACRE--Intensive grazing management can help producers get more beef per acre, says a forage specialist. In a year-round pasture demonstration program on the Walter Krause farm at Olivia in Calhoun County, effective use of both summer and winter annual grasses provided 1,298 pounds of grain per acre. The demonstration involved two one-acre pastures used in a rotation grazing system.

Construction Starts on Water System

Construction has started on the new water distribution system to be laid in the area west and southwest of Robert Lee. The work now underway is known as Phase I of a proposed county-wide rural water system.

In connection with the beginning of the project, a meeting has been called for 7:30 p.m. tonight (Friday) in the Coke County Courthouse. All members of the Coke County Water Supply Corp., as well as other interested citizens, are urged to attend the meeting.

Don Fields, president of the corporation, said it is important for all interested parties to be present at the meeting. He said four directors will be elected at a business session and other matters will be discussed.

Fields also said it is important for all property owners who are going to be on the new water line to be present so they can tell the contractor where to set their meters.

Phase I of the county-wide water system has been in the mill for many months. It was begun with a \$250,000 grant and \$250,000 loan. The project received a shot in the arm in late May when the Farmers Home Ad-

ministration okayed a loan of \$187,300 and a grant of \$103,300 for completion of the project.

Phase I contains approximately 50 miles of water line and will serve residents in the Lake Spence area and those who live on each side of Highway 158. The line will extend west to the vicinity of Pecan Baptist Church
