Coke County Gets Spotted Rains with Electrical Storm

Robert Lee and the western part of Coke County received some good rains Saturday night, with measurements up to 4 inches in some places. However, the amounts were extreme and some places received less than an inch.

Mayor Robert Vaughan said Mountain Creek Lake, where the city gets its water supply, caught about 2½ feet of runoff. The mayor said that the city started mixing water from Lake Spence with water from the city lake about a month ago. However, the practice was stopped about a week ago and the quality of the city's

Cities Receive Sales Tax Checks

Business in Coke County showed increases over last year, if the city sales tax rebate received each month is a good sign of activity Robert Lee's rebate was up a big 55 per cent over this time last year, while Bronte's check was increased only 4 per cent over 1979.

The office of Comptroller Bob Bullock reported Robert Lee would receive \$5,103.86 for the period ending July 31. This amount would bring the year's total up to \$15,520.61, compared to \$9,996.12 for the same time last year. This is an increase of 55 per cent.

Bronte's check for the period ending July 31 was \$1,124.70. Total for the year was \$7,016.77, compared to \$6,701.61 for the same time in 1979, and showing an increase of 4 per cent.

As usual, Houston led the state, followed by Dallas, San Antonio and Fort Worth.

The Saturday rain was accompanied by some violent weather. Fairly strong winds and one of the most spectacular electrical storms ever seen here came with the moisture. Several Robert Lee residents reported electric motors on appliances damaged by lightning.

Official rain measurement at the courthouse was 1.8 inches. However 2½ inches was reported at Skinner's Grocery east of town.

Parts of the Edith area received up to 4 inches. However, Finis Harmon had 1.4. inches and Connie Millican reported 1.6 inches. David Key reported 2½ inches.

The rain was also spotted in the Silver area with 3 inches reported in some places, but the measurement dwindled down to an inch in other spots.

The Palmer Leeper Ranch north of Sanco had 2 inches and the Hadley Richards reported 3½ inches in the Valley View community.

More rain is in the forecast for the latter part of this week.

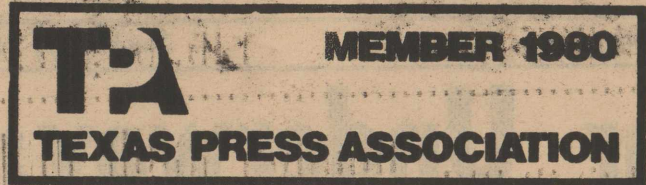

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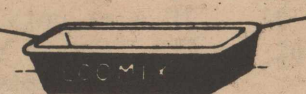
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Blue Cross - Blue Shield Rates Approved

The new Blue Cross/Blue Shield rates have been approved by the Texas Farm Bureau Board of Directors. These new rates, effective October 1, 1980, will be as follows:

Schedule U2V (Low Deductible)

Individual \$159 per quarter (old rate \$123)
Family \$318 per quarter (old rate \$246)

Schedule U3B (High Deductible)

Individual \$108 per quarter (old rate \$84)
Family \$216 per quarter (old rate \$168)

Also effective October 1, 1980, is an increase in two benefits: (1) the life-time maximum will increase to \$500,000 from \$250,000 and (2) the Other Medical Expenses (OME) maternity benefit will increase to \$350 from \$200.

Dianna Tinkler, Kathy Jobe Go To Washington

Dianna Tinkler and Kathy Jobe, County Extension Agent, from Robert Lee returned home today from Washington, D.C., after completing Citizenship-Washington Focus—a week-long experience in citizenship and leadership training at the National 4-H Center.

Dianna was one of 66 4-H members from Texas and 11 other states participating. The program is designed to help young people understand the structure and function of our system of government, the heritage of our country's development and prepare plans for active citizen involvement when they return home. Kathy Jobe was one of four agent chaperones of the tour. Using the nation's capital as a "classroom," the program included a day on Capitol Hill to meet with members of Congress and see government in action. The Texas delegation had an appointment with Senator Benton that afternoon. Field trips to historical and cultural sites as well as to federal agencies and community organizations, were among the most informative and exciting parts of the week, according to Dianna. The Smithsonian Institution, Mount Vernon, and a special presentation by the U.S. Army "Torchlight Tattoo" at the Jefferson Memorial were all a part of the program.

In workshop sessions at the National 4-H Center, young people discussed contemporary

issues and concerns, and ways in which skills and knowledge gained during the week could be applied to the 4-H program here. One of best parts of the experience was being able to share ideas with 4-H members across the country.

Citizenship-Washington Focus is conducted by National 4-H Council in behalf of the Cooperative Extension Service of the State Land-Grant Universities and the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Conservation Program Extended

In June, a bill extending the Great Plains Conservation Program (GPCP) from December 31, 1981, to September 30, 1991, became law. The new legislation will increase GPCP funding from \$300 million to \$600 million and will raise the yearly cost-share limitation from \$25 million to \$50 million.

"This is a positive step to insure that farmers and ranchers throughout the Great Plains will have added incentive to apply conservation measures on their land," Eph Cummins, district conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service at Robert Lee said.

Under the GPCP, landowners can speed up soil and water conservation work by signing agreements for 3 to 10 years. The contracts guarantee cost-sharing by the government to apply and maintain conservation measures. Contracts have been written for about half on the land eligible in the 10 states.

The Soil Conservation Service has administered GPCP since the program began in 1956. Through the program, working together with conservation districts, SCS has given technical and financial assistance to 55,000 Great Plains farmers and ranchers in treating critically eroded farmland and making appropriate land use changes. "One hundred fifteen landowners have taken advantage of the program in the Coke County Soil and Water Conservation District," Cummins said.

Over the next ten years, SCS and districts hope to help even more Great Plains farmers and ranchers plan for and install the more effective conservation practices on their land. The hazardous climate and easily eroded soil in the 10 Great Plains states require lasting protection of soil and water resources. The drought of the 70's and the summer of 1980, is

a reminder that we must adequately protect the plains from wind and water erosion to reduce the likelihood of another disastrous Dust Bowl.

"Much work remains to be done to combat serious droughts and persistent erosion problems," Cummins concluded.

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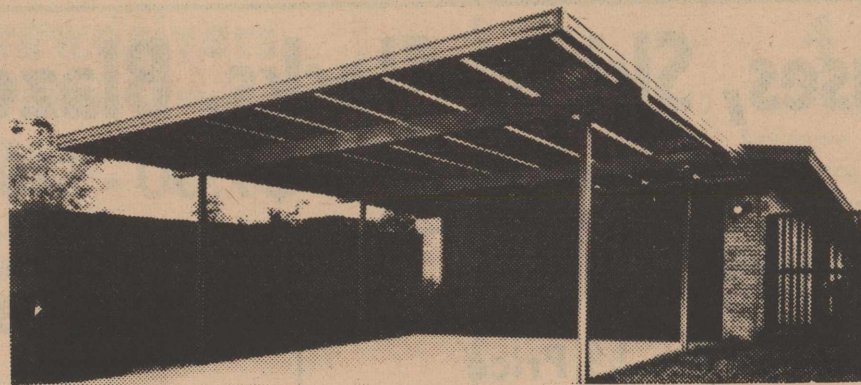
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Man Sentenced for Shooting Scalf

Bret Jones of Kellyville, Okla., pleaded guilty to aggravated robbery last week in San Angelo and was sentenced to 20 years in prison by 119th District Judge Curt Steib. Jones was charged with shooting Robin Van

Scalf of San Angelo, formerly of Robert Lee, during an apparent robbery attempt while Scalf was driving on U.S. Highway 277 about 12 miles north of San Angelo on Feb. 18.

A statement to Tom Green sheriff's deputies was made by Jones and he admitted he intended to rob Scalf but said his shotgun discharged accidentally. Scalf was hit in the upper left arm by the blast. He reportedly still does not have a complete range of movement in the arm.

After being wounded Scalf continued to drive toward San Angelo and stopped at St. John's Hospital where he received emergency treatment. He was then moved to Shannon Hospital where he had surgery on the wounded arm.

Jones was indicted on a capital murder charge but it was reduced to aggravated robbery in exchange for the guilty plea.

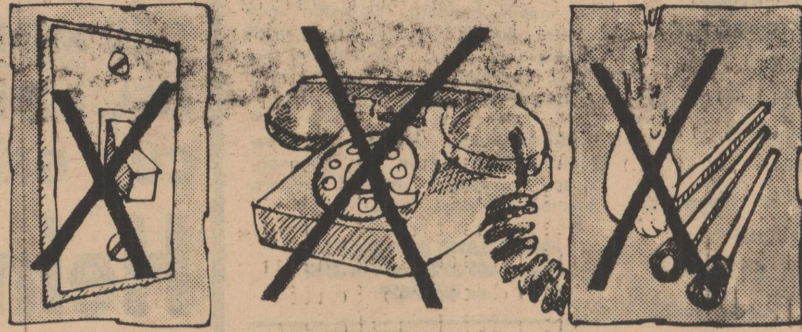
