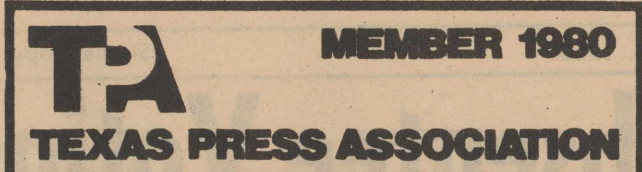

In compliance with Sec. 43(a) of Art. 1446c, V.A.C.S., West Texas Utilities Company hereby publishes NOTICE that it has filed, on September 30, 1980, its statement of intent to make changes in its rates charged for electricity and services sold and rendered inside and outside municipal jurisdictions, such proposed changes to be effective November 4, 1980. Such Statement of Intent includes the proposed revisions of tariffs and schedules and a statement specifying in detail each proposed change, the effect the proposed change is expected to have on the revenues of the Company and the classes and numbers of utility customers affected. Gross revenues are expected to be increased 8.27 per cent by the new rates. Statements of intent were filed with the Public Utility Commission of Texas and with the following municipalities:

## Change Made in Brucellosis Program

An important change in the brucellosis control program was made last week that all producers should be aware of. The dosage to be used in calfhood vaccination was reduced from 5cc to 1cc. According to all authorities, this change removes the possibility of a vaccinated heifer calf later being tested and declared a "banger". Using the 1cc dosage, no titer will show in the blood if for some reason that animal is tested as a cow.

In short, and with the regulations on brucellosis as they are nationally, this should help greatly in Texas. We encourage all producers to participate in the new 1cc calfhood vaccination program.

That first killing frost and the possibility of prussic acid poisoning is not far away.

Although many plants contain the toxic material that causes poisoning, those causing the highest mortality in livestock when grazed after they have been frozen and wilted are Johnson and Sudan grasses and sorghum or hybrids of these.

The most dangerous time as far as the grazing of these plants is concerned is following frost when the plant material begins to wilt. Livestock should not be allowed access to the wilted material until it has dried completely. This usually takes three days to a week of good sunlight. New plant growth usually becomes non-toxic and can be grazed within 10 days to two weeks following a rain.

As far as prussic acid poisoning is concerned, the poison acts rapidly and can kill animals within minutes. In most acute cases, animals become affected within 10-15 minutes after eating toxic material and can die in two to three minutes. Symptoms may include a brief period of stimulation followed by depression and paralysis. Signs of colic may be present. Stupor (loss of sensibility), difficult breathing and frequent convulsions may result. Death is caused by suffocation since oxygen remains in the blood and is not exchanged to the tissues. This also

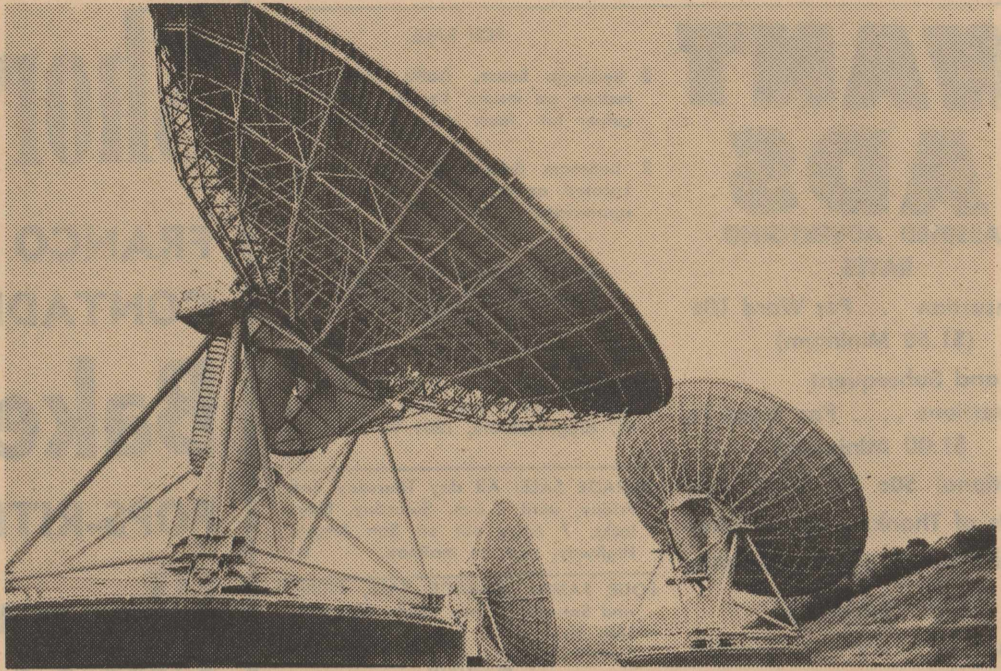
causes the blood to appear bright red.
