Four Inch Snow Makes Coke County a Winter Wonderland

Unpredictable West Texas weather struck again Saturday when snow began to fall about 6:30 p.m. The snowfall continued intermittently through Sunday with 4 to 5 inches reported over the Robert Lee area and most of

Coke County.

Much of the snow melted quickly as the temperature hovered around the 31 degree mark. Streets and highways that carry any appreciable amount of traffic were clear most of the time.

Although it has been a rather mild winter, this is the fourth time a ground-covering snow has fallen.

The ground should be in great shape for winter pastures and small grain crops.

Program Pays Honor to the Confederacy

A brief ceremony was held Monday, Jan. 19, at high noon in the Robert Lee City Hall to commemorate Texas Confederate Heroes Day and honor one of the Confederacy's foremost heroes, Gen. Robert E. Lee. The ceremony coincided with others in more than 200 other counties in the state. The Texas Legislature, for the first time, set aside the day for an official state holiday.

Mayor Robert Vaughan read an account of General Lee's military career, including his six years of military service, from 1856 until 1861, spent in this area. Fort Mason was his last command as a Union officer. Although he was never stationed in Coke County, the famous general made several visits to Fort Chadbourne while serving in Texas.

He was ordered to Washington in February 1861 and offered command of all the Union troops. He declined and wrote a letter resigning his commission to President Abraham Lincoln, then was later named commander of the Confederate forces by Jefferson Davis.

The City of Robert Lee was named for the general and a bronzed bust of him stands in the city hall foyer with information about him.

Other dignitaries present for the ceremony were Mrs. Jessie N. Yarbrough, chairman of the Coke County Historical Commission, and City Commissioner Wilson Bryan.

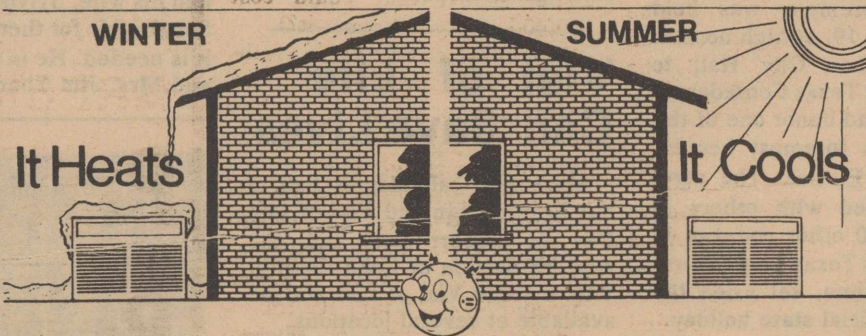

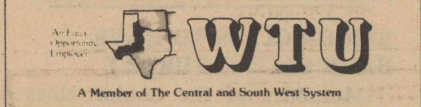

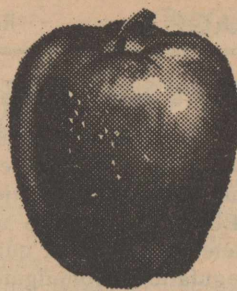

**PUBLIC NOTICE
REQUESTING PUBLIC COMMENT**

Sun Gas Company has requested authority to modify the Jameson Gasoline Plant located near Silver, Coke County, Texas. It has submitted an application to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), pursuant to the requirement for prevention of significant deterioration of air quality in the Clean Air Act, 42 U.S.C. 7470, and regulations promulgated by the EPA on June 19, 1978, and amended August 7, 1980, in the Federal Register. The EPA is proposing to approve this application and is hereby extending the opportunity for comment concerning the following proposed project:

1. Applicant:
Sun Gas Company
Three NorthPark East
Dallas, Texas 75221
PSD-TX-372
2. Project Location:
The proposed modification to the Jameson gasoline plant is on a private road, 1 mile south of Silver, Coke County, Texas. The plant is in a PSD Class II area and emissions are not expected to impact any Class I area.
3. Project Description:
Sun Gas proposes to modify their existing natural gas processing plant by installing two 1,200 horsepower and one 600 horsepower internal combustion compressor engines. The additional engines will be used for gas recompression to sales line pressure in order for Sun Gas to recover more product and to improve plant operating efficiency. The proposed engines will be fired with natural gas. The modification will be significant source of oxides of nitrogen (NOx).
4. Best Available Control Technology:
The use of best available control technology (BACT) is required for this source by the PDS regulations to control the emissions of nitrogen oxides (NOx). Taking into account such factors as cost, energy, and technical feasibility, BACT will be implemented for this project.
BACT for the control of NOx emissions will consist of (1) the use of natural gas as fuel, (2) control of the air/fuel ratio for the compressor engines, and (3) the application of ignition retard on the proposed engines. The emission points and maximum allowable emission rates are as follows:

Emission Point	Maximum Allowable Mass Emission Rate
a. Each 1200 hp I.C. Compressor Engine (2)	Oxides of Nitrogen (NOx) 24.0 lb/hr
b. 600 hp I.C. Compressor Engine (1)	9.1 g/hp-hr 12.0 lb/hr 9.1 g/hp-hr

5. Air Quality Impact:
The proposed modification is subject to review of its potential to cause or contribute to a violation of the National Ambient Air Quality Standards (NAAQS) for emissions of nitrogen dioxide (NO2). EPA-approved computer modeling has shown that the proposed unit will not violate the NAAQS for any pollutant emitted from the proposed source modification. Impacts on soils, vegetation, and visibility are expected to be insignificant as a result of this modification. Commercial and residential growth are not expected to be significantly affected by the proposed modification. The closest PSD Class I area, Big Bend National Park in southwestern Texas, is more than 320 kilometers away. Therefore, there will be no significant impact on this or any other Class I area as a result of the proposed modification. Written comments and requests for a public hearing on the proposed project may be submitted to the Air Programs Branch, EPA, at the above address until 30 days after publication of this Public Notice. It is requested that comments and hearing requests specify Permit Number PSD-TX-372 and that such comments be based on the requirements as set out in the Clean Air Act, and in the regulations published June 19, 1978, and amended August 7, 1980. Public comments submitted in writing will be considered by the EPA prior to making the final determination on the proposed project, and will be available for public inspection in the offices of the City Secretary, Edna Havins, and of the Air Programs Branch, EPA, addresses above. The EPA will notify the applicant in writing of its final determination. 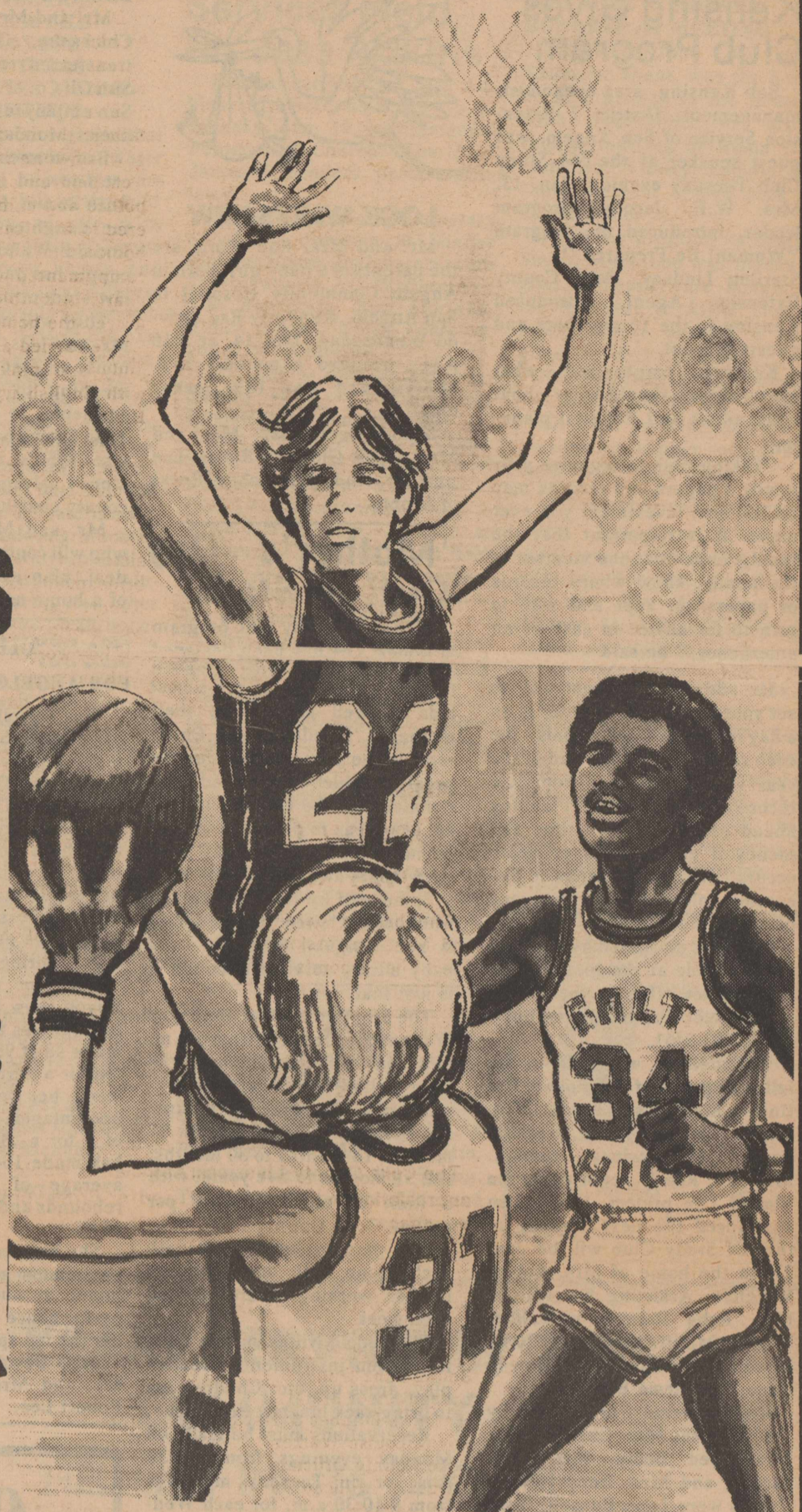
