Steers Down Loraine For Second Dist. Win

The Steers won their second district game of the season Friday night, while running the Loraine Bulldogs right off the field. The Steers' rushing game was led by Darren Williams, a senior, and Greg Grim, a freshman. They racked up 258 yds. between the two of them. The Steers received more yards against Loraine than they have in any single game all season-- a remarkable 411 total yards compared to Loraine's 95 total yards.

Williams received the opening kickoff and led the drive all the way down the field, where he then scored on an 11 yd. run (the PAT was good). With 2:21 left in the first quarter, Williams strutted 51 yards down the field for his second of three touchdowns of the night and the PAT was no good.

The second quarter started with a 32 yard connection from Hood to Torres, which started another long drive. Two plays later, Hood was intercepted and

the ball went over to Loraine, but when the Bulldogs put the ball in the air, Torres picked it off and continued the Steer drive. With 6:22 left in the second quarter, Torres made a spectacular one-handed, leaping catch inside the 10. After giving the ball up to the Bulldogs, the Steers recovered it again on the 6, where Williams finally ran it in (the PAT was good). The half ended with the Steers ahead: 20-0.

SECOND HALF

With 42 seconds left in the third, Grim broke through the Loraine defense and jotted 70 yds. down the field, where he then ran it in from the 5. The PAT was no good.

Not long after the fourth quarter had begun, Grim scored again from 8 yards out (the PAT was good). Towards the end of the fourth, Hood connected with Long for the last score of the night (the PAT was no good). The final score was Steers 39, Loraine 0.

The Steers now have a 2-0 record in District and a 4-2-1 record for the season.

The first touchdown for the Dogies was scored by Jim Bob Jacobs who carried the ball across the double stripe from 35 yards out. The extra point try failed.

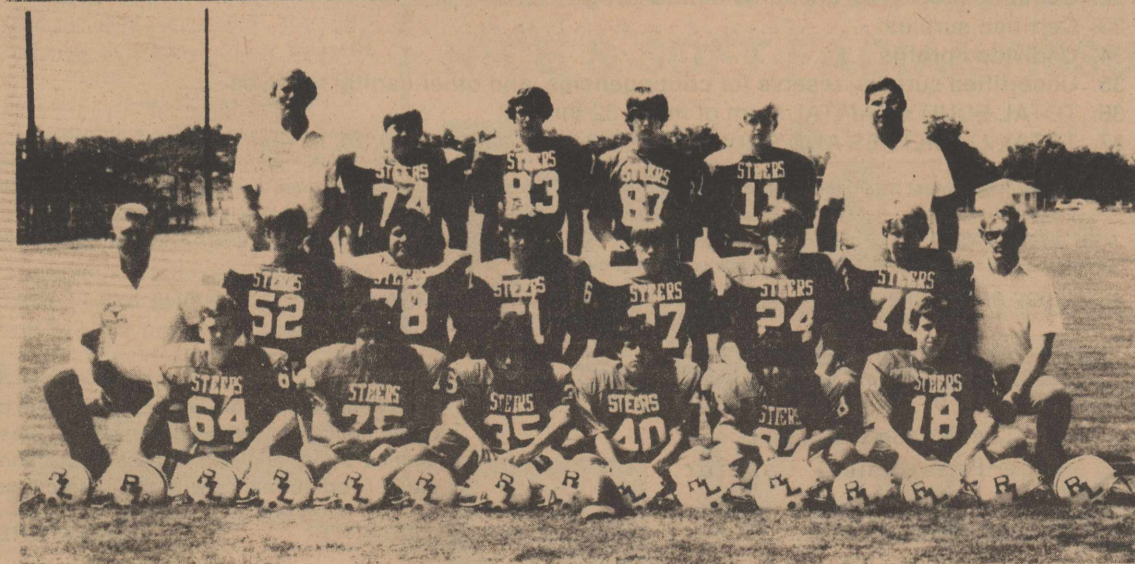
The second counter was carried in by Kevin Johnson on a 20 yard run. He then proceeded to make the extras points on a run from the 3 yard line.

WTU Requests For Wholesale Rate Increase

West Texas Utilities Company has filed for a change in wholesale rates for electric service it supplies to 14 rural electric cooperatives, one municipality and one investor-owned distribution company.

In its filing Friday, Oct. 16, with the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission in Washington, WTU estimated that the new rates will produce about \$4.3 million in additional revenue for the company during the 1982 calendar year. This amounts to an increase of approximately 10 per cent from these wholesale customers.

WTU requested that the new rates become effective on Dec. 15. The present rates have been in effect since June, 1980. WTU also proposes to change to a fuel adjustment clause similar to the one applied to its retail customers. No other major changes were proposed.

WTU officials said the rate change is necessary to bring the Company's earnings on sales to wholesale customers to a level that will help WTU maintain a sound financial condition and attract new capital for growth required to meet future needs of electric customers. The previous wholesale rate increase proved insufficient because of inflation, higher than anticipated interest rates, and the delay in making the rates effective.

Wholesale customers in the area that will be affected by the filing are: Coleman County Electric Cooperative, Inc., Concho Valley Electric Cooperative, Inc., and Taylor Electric Cooperative, Inc.

Time Change Will Provide An Extra Hour

Daylight Saving Time will give way to Central Standard Time this weekend when citizens turn back their clocks one hour. Official hour for the time change is 2 a.m. on the last Sunday in October.

Those who don't want to sit up until the appointed hour can move their clocks back before they retire Saturday night, and the net result on awakening Sunday morning will be the same.

Everyone lost an hour the last Sunday in April when Daylight Saving Time went into effect and this Sunday's change will provide an opportunity to regain the missing 60 minutes.

Fiberglass Tank Burns

A fiberglass storage tank on the N.C. Pentecost Ranch was destroyed by fire about 8 p.m. Tuesday. The tank apparently caught fire from a nearby heater treater, according to Fire Chief J.C. Wallace Jr.

Robert Lee Volunteer Department answered the call and extinguished the blaze. However, the tank was destroyed and the heater treater was possibly damaged. Fire trucks from Robert Lee and Colorado City responded to the fire.

The oil facility is owned by Kettle Oil Co. and the tank was used primarily to store salt water.

The Steers definitely are on the upgrade, with their big win last Friday night over the Loraine Bulldogs. They are hoping that the momentum from last week's game will give them a chance for a victory over the favored Roscoe team.

"We did great last week," Coach Epperson said, "by holding Loraine to less than 100 yards and it would sure be great to carry this winning streak over into this week."

Roscoe has a great quarterback in Denman, Epperson said, and, along with Aljoe, a halfback, they have been averaging more than 100 yards each in this year's games.

Even though the scales may be tipped in Roscoe's favor, all Steer fans are urged to go to the game and provide the cheering section the local lads need to bring home a win. Game time is 7:30 p.m. Be there.

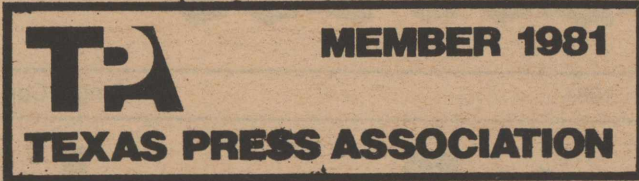

To the editor:
The information you received and printed about Friendship road in Friday's paper was incorrect and misleading. I would appreciate it very much if you will print this letter correcting the facts.

First, the article would indicate that the closing of Friendship Road was between the county commission and myself only. Everyone knows this is not true, 289 people signed a petition objecting to the closing of this road. Many people have come to me since that time wanting to help get it open, so I am sure I represent more than 300 people in this matter.

Second: I did not request a meeting with the commissioners' court, which they stated was declined.

Our attorney, Mr. Tom S. Milam of Lubbock, did write a letter to Mr. Bill J. Helwig, county attorney, explaining that the action taken by the county commission closing the road was not legal and gave him the laws that were violated in this action. He did this in an attempt to save both sides of the question the expense of a lawsuit. This seems to have been a waste of time, so we now have no choice but to file suit.

Anwar El-Sadat 1918-1981

I grieve in the loss of Anwar Sadat, for he was a man I greatly admired, a personal hero, a man of rare vision in a world sadly lacking leaders of selfless courage.

In a relatively short time he has done more than most people would have thought possible to bring his people toward the benefits of the twentieth century and, more recently, to bring peace to his part of the world.

It is sadly ironic that Sadat, a worthy Nobel laureate of peace, died in uniform at a parade of the weapons that sustained his dream.

But Sadat, the man, never lost sight of his dream, of his destiny. I well remember the first time that I met President Sadat in one of those formal White House occasions where one can expect, at best, only a fleeting encounter. But I will never forget those moments. Although a slight man, he had about him a commanding physical presence, an aura of confidence, a quiet noble elegance of carriage. Then, there was the voice, at one moment full of strength and defiance; at another, soothing and reflective of inner serenity. One cannot always define greatness, but you can recognize it when you see it. Sadat was.

As we pause and reflect on this fallen world leader I am reminded of Sadat's own words that his life and that of the Egypt he loved and died for was mainly the story of a search for identity. They were one and the same because from his childhood he identified himself with his country, the land and the people.

He saw his life as a journey in search of identity. He was a son of the fertile Egyptian soil and the honor and independence of Egypt were the purpose of his life.

As a soldier, political leader and world figure Sadat was always the consummate nationalist. Until he was struck down by assassins' bullets, he led a life as rich in drama, daring, intrigue and fame as any political leader in modern times.

Sadat showed in his 11 years of ruling Egypt that he had staying power, political skill and an ability that transformed him into a world statesman so vividly manifested when he paid his historic visit to Jerusalem in his search for peace.

Now with his sudden and violent death many questions about the future of Egypt and its role in the world are beginning to be raised in this saddened capital and in many other countries.

Let us hope that the legacy of peace he wanted will be, in time, chisled out of the monument he leaves to his people and his region. Recall for a moment his words at the White House peace treaty signing in 1979 between Israel and Egypt:

"In all the steps I took I was not performing a personal mission. I was merely expressing the will of a nation. I am proud of my people and of belonging to them. Today, a new dawn is emerging out of the darkness of the past.

"Let us work together until the day comes when they beat their swords into plowshares and their spears into pruning hooks."

It was the special genius of Sadat that he made people believe the historian Thomas Carlyle's observation that "the history of the world is but the biography of great men." Mr. Sadat did not just make peace with Israel, he made himself the personification of it.

Just as Sadat in his life gave an impetus to peace and reconciliation, we would hope that the region's remaining leaders will be challenged by his death to undertake new efforts to negotiate and compromise.

In my judgment, he is the greatest world leader I will ever know. But life must go on. His physical being is no longer with us but his spirit, courage, determination and sense of purpose must prevail and become a lasting epitaph.

**ASC Committee
Election Dec. 7**

The ASC County Committee election this year will be held on Dec. 7 and ballots will be mailed to voters about 10 days before the election. The voted ballots must be mailed or returned in person not later than Dec. 7, according to J.E. Quisenberry Jr., county executive director of the Coke-Sterling ASCS Office in Robert Lee.

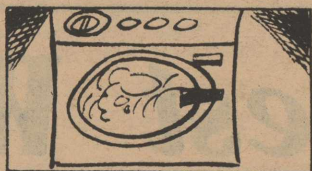
A slate of at least three nominees will be developed for the county. A letter from the ASCS office has a blank petition suitable for nominating candidates on the back, and additional petitions can be obtained at the office.

Petitions for names to go on the ballots must be: 1. Limited to one nominee; 2. Signed by at least three eligible voters in the county; 3. Include a certification that the nominee is willing to serve if elected; and 4. Received at the County ASCS Office not later than Nov. 2.

If three or more eligible candi-

dates are nominated by proper petition, no further nominations will be made. However, if less than three are nominated by petition, the present county committee will add the number of nominees needed to complete the slate.

Persons nominated should be currently engaged in the operation of a farm or ranch and be well qualified for committee work. In general, Quisenberry's letter states, a farmer is eligible to be a county committee member if he/she lives in the county and is eligible to vote.

To movie industry insiders, Texas is becoming known as the "third coast." More and more TV commercials, documentaries and full-length feature films are being shot here each year. Last year, two films starring Willie Nelson were filmed in Texas. "Raggedy Man," a movie written by Austinite Bill Wiltf and starring Oscar-winner Sissy Spacek (a Quitman native) was filmed around Austin earlier this year and recently opened to critical acclaim. Most recently, Burt Reynolds and Dolly Parton have been in the Austin area making the movie of West Texas Larry L. King's phenomenally-successful play, "The Best Little Whorehouse in Texas."

Lots of money gets spent in Texas during the filming of each of these movies and, often as not, the beneficiaries are the people of Pflugerville or Hallettsville or, in two cases, Big Spring.

Unfortunately, once the location filming is done, the production company usually packs up and heads back to Hollywood to shoot the interior scenes and to do the film editing. Texas simply does not have the experienced professionals needed to handle a great deal of these functions.

In my opinion, it would be very beneficial to the Texas economy if we commit ourselves to the development of a top flight film industry in this state. That means turning out top quality cameramen, production personnel, directors and film editors. As a result, more movies could be produced start-to-finish right here, and if everything needed to produce a movie were right here, many more films would be shot here where production costs are much lower than on the West Coast.

The University of Texas at Austin has an excellent film department. Unfortunately, the top film students still seem to migrate to UCLA, Southern Cal or NYU because those schools offer their students practical, personal guidance from some of the top people in the industry. While U.T. has an excellent faculty and the best film equipment and facilities in the country, the department needs more fellowships and scholarships to keep our top students here in Texas. And they need more teachers--this year, 180 students involved in actual film production were supervised by only four faculty members; a total department enrollment of 740 students had to share the attention of only 14 faculty members. This situation makes impossible the kind of personalized, individual attention that is critical to turning out the top quality film production personnel that can build a major industry in our state.

I'm convinced we could turn the U.T. film department into one that could compete with any school in the country, and we could do it, in my opinion, for less than \$500,000 in additional yearly

funding

I intend to support such funding. In an era when as much as \$30 million is spent to make a single film, the additional investment in our local film industry should repay itself many times over each year.

Water Group Meets At RL

Wayne Farrell, Tom Green County Health Department, spoke to 68 people on protecting our water supplies at the regular monthly meeting of the Fort Concho Water Utilities Association Thursday night at Coke County Park at Robert Lee.

"Open wells, cess pools and abandoned borings can let pollution enter the aquifer and contaminate all wells in the area with bacteria and nitrates," he said. "Bacteria can be treated with chlorine, but nitrates can't."

"Preventive measures are cheaper than treatment," Farrell stated, and it is necessary to keep wells and septic-tank drain fields at least 100 feet apart."

Vice President Don Hannon, San Angelo Water Department, welcomed James Dutton of Eden as a new member for 1982.

Hannon read the nominating committee report for next year's officers, and asked that any more nominations be turned to Secretary Richard Jackson to be voted on next meeting, Nov. 19.

Those nominated are: Don Hannon, president; Robert Glass, vice president; Richard Jackson, secretary-treasurer; Will Wilde, assistant secretary-treasurer, all of San Angelo Water Department; Benjy Wiese III, program chairman, Carlsbad Fresh Water District No. 1; R.D. Odum, assistant program chairman, San Angelo Center.

Gary Williams of Robert Lee welcomed the group to a fine fish fry, introduced city officials and invited the group back next October.

The group was also invited to the historical drama held in Robert Lee each summer.

The U.S. Department of Labor reports that 59 percent of all women between 18 and 64 now work outside the home.

As women move out of the home and into the office, businesses are changing their selling approaches to fit the woman's expanding role as breadwinner. They are aiming their pitches at selling women cars, insurance, homes and time-saving devices such as microwave ovens and food processors. Working women are considered responsible for the great increase in sales of microwave ovens, up 40 percent from March, 1980 to March, 1981.

According to a Food Marketing Institute survey, working women's shopping habits may cause big changes in grocery stores. Women with jobs outside the home are more inclined to take whatever meat is available rather than asking for different cuts; to skip things on their shopping lists because they're in a rush; to go to convenience stores instead of supermarkets.
