Washington, Jan. 26 .- The senate resterday took an important step in the impeachment trial of United States Judge Charles Swayne, of the Northern district of Florida. The organiza tion for the trial was affected by the swearing of the senators for that purpose; the managers of the house were received for the purpose of formally presenting the articles of impeachment and a resolution summoning Judge

Swayne to appear was adopted. Mr Platt, of Connecticut, was elected to preside at the trial sessions. Further proceedings were postponed until Fri-

day next, when . dge Swayne is ex pected to appear before the bar of the senate. The ceremony was impressive and was witnessed by a full senate and by well-filled galleries. The trial oath was administered to senators by Chief Justice Fuller.

Estimates as to the length of time that the trial will occupy vary from en days to a month after it is once begun. It is believed that when Judge Swayne appears next Friday he will ask a few days to make answer and when he does answer that a day o
