been selling, and are now quotable, at a year ago at \$4.70@5.00, two years ago Interest Increasing in Need of This Country for Treaties Favoring Our Foreign Meat Trade.

> The desirability, if not inda.d imperative necessity, of such trade treaties with European countries as will broaden the outlet for American meat products is receiving much attention at present. One of the good fruits of the recent Denver convention was the active interest developed on this subject. Need of legislation that will broaden the export demand for American cattle, sheep and hogaproducts is talked in hotel lobbies, at live stock markets and wherever men in live stock production are wont to assemble. Upon this subject a writer in the Live Stock World recently said: "A cablegram from Paris states that in France and Germany dog meat is an article of common use disguised, of course, in the palatable form of sausage. All over northern Europe meat is a luxury. Herse flesh is an article prominent in the daily menu of the populace; in fact, without it thousands would taste animal food but infrequently.

"And yet on this side of the Atlantic are stored millions of pounds of coarse meats for which killers can find no outlet. American taste demands porterhouse and loin cuts. It is a notorious feet that the average housewife will take an inferior loin to a fancy brisket. There is a possibility of educating Americans to the advantages of cheaper priced cuts, but the education process is slow.

"Meanwhile there is urgent need of a foreign outlet for these meats.. Killers are constantly carrying a heavy load of them. At present they have enough on hand to supply the normal demand for two years to come. This stock hangs over the market, a constant brake on the wheel and a menace to growers' profit.

Former United States Senator Harris estimates that France alone would take \$40,000,000 worth of our agricultural products annually in excess of present consumption, which is meager, if reciprocal trade relations were established. Germany would take as much more. The agrarian interests of the United States are entitled to this trade and it can be secured by a little activity at Washington.'

The Russian capital presents almost a normal appearance and the authorities are confident that the backbone of the strike has been broken. Some factories and mills already have resumed and a general resumption of operations is expected on Monday. The authorities expect that the failure of the strike here will have a discouraging effect upon the workmen in other cities which the troubles have been spreading and believe that there is no longer danger of a complete suspension of all the industrial concerns

In the meanwhile the workmen and masters at Moscow are negotiating for a settlement of their differences. Several firms already have offered an advance in wages which would bring up the average earnings of their workmen to \$10 per month and lodgings. One firm has offered to knock off one hour from the legal working day of 11 hours, but this is a burning question on which the majority of the masters are unwilling or unable to agree to


