St. Petersburg, Jan. 26.—The following proclamation, issued by Gov. Gen. Trepoft and Minister of Finance Kokovtsov, was posted in the streets today: "Workmen should assist the government in its tranquilizing task in behalf of the betterment of their condition.

Washington, Jan. 27.—The interstate commerce commission, in the case of the Lehman-Higginson Grocer company and other wholesale grocers in Wichita, Kan., against the Santa Fe and other railroads, decided that the rate of 47 cents on sugar from New Orleans to Wichita is unreasonable.

Hay Gets No Reply.

Washington, Jan. 27.—The most interesting feature of the correspondence between the state department, the Russian embassy and the Chinese legation relative to the Russian allegation that Chinese neutrality has been violated, is a proposition from Secretary Hay that the Russian complaint should be considered by a conference of the powers, a suggestion which thus far has called forth no response.

RESULT OF WHITE HOUSE DINNER.

Employers at Moscow Offer Strikers "\$10 a Month and Lodgings."

BOLDIERS NOW HAVE UPPER HAND.

Disturbances Are Extending in Reval, Liban, Kioff and Odessa, but There is no General Tie-Up or Disorders.

St. Petersburg, Jan. 27.—Although the strikes in Reval, Liban, Kioff, Odessa and a few smaller places are extending, the situation is nowhere acute. An increasing number of workmen are out in Moscow, but there is no general tie-up or disorder there.

The Russian capital presents almost a normal appearance and the authorities are confident that the backbone of the strike has been broken.
