It is too early as yet to get anything like an intelligent estimate of stock losses as a result of the recent storm that swept over the entire western and southwestern country. But that it has been enormous does not admit of cusstion. Estimates, made by stockmen at the Guthrie meeting held this week, place figures for Oklahoma, western Kansas and the Panhandle of Texas as high as 100,-000 head and by some it is considered that even these enormous figures will not cover the loss. On the farms and smaller ranches, where owners have taken to the modern policy of providing feed for emergencies, the loss will be comparatively smil; but out on the open ranges the fatalities have admittedly been enormous and it will take until spring to get any accurate knowledge of them. Reports will no d ubt begin arriving soon from the remote sections of the range countries bu. Because of the controversy that has arisen as to the rights of the executive to enter into treaty arrangements with any foreign government senate, extraordinary interest has been aroused. The message of the president outlined the policy of the administration in relation to the Monroe doctrine, holding that it demanded this government take charge of the customs of American states when it is manifest that they are unable to maintain their own integrity.

In addition to the president's discussion of the Monroe doctrine in the case of San Domingo, the protocol itself makes a specific declaration of its application and in that respect is unusual in treaty-making. The declaration occurs in the second paragraph, which recites that the government of the United States views "any attempt on the part of governments outside of this hemisphere to oppress the destiny of the Dominican republic as a manifestation of an unfriendly disposition towards the United States.


