Factors that are Curtailing Hog Movement Though Country Holdings are Fairly Liberal.

"The hog movement is rather light at present," said a South St. Joseph man, last night, who had just returned from a trip into Nebraska and Iowa. "The arrivals at market will not increase for some time, but it is not because there is any lack of hoge in the country. There are plenty of hogs," said this man, "but there are two reasons why they are not being rushed forward. One factor in reducing supplies at present is the bad roads. I found roads in nearly all the territory through which I travelled, so muddy that farmers could not deliver hoge at shipping stations. This is a condition that you will find prevailing all over the hog territories in Illinois, Iowa, Missouri, Nebraska and Kansas, and, while the United States is a large country, pork chops would certainly be a luxury were it not for the hog production of these states that I have named. On account of muddy feed lots many farmers would market hogs now if they could make deliver-

when they can will depend entirely upon weather conditions. "Another factor that is curta ling the hog movement is bullish sentiment with owners and feeders. There has been a growing feeling in producing sections that hogs would go higher. This is, of course, a natural sentiment with the producing end of the trade and an upward movement in the market is always sure to stimulate owners into holding for further appreciation in prices. The market has had an upward trend now for sometime; farmers and feeders as a rule are not found in a position where they are compelled to sell in order to meet obligations due and you will not find them in a hurry to sell until there is a big break. Then you will see them all trying to get to market at once.

"A result of this bullish sentiment will be libera receipts of heavy hogs at a time when the trade will, on account of weather conditions, be wanting handy and light weights. The country can best protect future markets by cutting loose stock on hand as fast as it gets fat and ready."

Fate of General Linevitch's Force

ants the Pursuers Keep Up with Head Z of Fleeling Muscovites-Russians Loses at Mukden Were 120,000 Men and

St. Petersburg, March 21.-Anxiety

regarding the fate of Gen. Linevitch's force continues, the main danger to them being the Japanese columns which are hurrying northward along the great trade route 20 miles west and parallel with the line of retreat. The leads of these column were officially reported to be passing Fakoman, 30 niles northwest of Tie pass, on Friday. Their appearance surely hastened the Russian retirement which may now have become literally a race northward as once the Russians are headed it would be easy for the Japanese by a short cut to throw themselves across he line of retreat. After leaving Kaiyuan Gen. Linevitch is believed to have divided his army, the main portion keeping to the railroad and the other falling back along the mandarin road which runs to Kirin, it being impossible to leave the latter open to the Japanese lest they then be able to creep up on the left flank. At the same time it is recognized that a separation of forces is always attended with the danger of giving the enemy an opportunity to concentrate and fight the army in detail. Some military men here believe that Linevitch will try to hold the line from Kirin to Changoun, 120 miles north of Tie pass. The first corps composed of steady troops from St. Petersburg and formerly commanded by Gen. Meyendorff is covering the retreat which the war office declares

is proceeding in an orderly fashion. Complete details of the losses at the battle of Mukden are not yet available at the war office, but the reports thus far received indicate that 120,000 men were killed, wounded and taken prisoners and that about 80 field guns were captured. Almost every siege gun, it is affirmed, was removed.

DID GOOD WORK.

Missouri Legislature Did Much. Real Earnest Work in Spite of the Sepatorial Contest.

Jefferson City, Mo., March 21.-The state has reason to be proud of the work of the Forty-third general assembly which adjourned. It did more real and earnest work than any legislature in a decade and white here and there an important measure was either killed or lost in the mass of unfinished business, much of important legislation was added to the state books. Nearly all freak bills were killed.

Among the general bills was the repeal of the alum law; increasing the statute of limitations to five years in bribery cases; the repeal of the breeders' law and making it a felony to sell pools on a horse race; a good road law: the St. Louis home rule police bill; the erection of a new supreme court building; a bill providing for the erection of a new hospital at the state penitentiary; the establishment of a sanitarium for persons in the first stages of pulmonary tuberculosis; a new insurance table, a uniform negotiable instrument bill; a bill to provide for compulsory education.

CHEROKEES WIN SUIT.

Court of Claims Decide Case for Indians-Amount Involved is \$4,500,000.

Washington, March 21 .- The cases of the Cherokee Indians and of individual Cherokees against the United States were decided by the court of claims yesterday they involve a large amount of money and are of an unusual and extraordinary character. The United States bought the Cherokee outlet, agreeing to pay for \$8,300,000 being about \$1 per acre and also agreeing to reopen a long-standing controversy between themselves and the Cherokees. In 1835 a treaty was made under which the Cherokees were to move or be removed from Georgia, Alabama and Tennossee to the Indian territory. The Cherokees contended before they were removed that under the provisions of the treaty they were not to be made to pay the cost of removing from homes which they did not wish to leave to a country to which they did not wish to go. The government held to the contrary. When the Cherokee outlet was sold the Indians attorneys contended that all of their accounts should be reopened and the matter equitably seltled and for that purpose the United States should make out an account and transmit it to the Cherokee nation. 


