for the small contingent of strictly good to prime kinds of cows and heifers but for the great bulk of arrivals in the dressed beef cow and heifer line there has been a decline of 15c to 20c and the market is closing quiet on a basis of these declines. Prices for butcher and dressed beef cows and heifers range from about \$3.00 to \$4.50 with bulk going between \$3.25 and \$3.90. Canner and cutter stock sells at \$1.00 to \$2.75 with bulk at \$2.00 to \$2.50 steady at \$2.25 to \$3.75. Calves in very light supply with best veals selling around \$6.00, bulk at \$5.00 to \$5.50.

STOCKERS AND FEEDERS.

There was but little trade in fresh arrivals in this line today. A few small lots were on offer and were readily picked up at around steady prices. While fresh receipts were very light the local dealers are carrying a big accumulation, the outside demand not having been up to expectations of the trade. Prices are a little lower than early in the week and it was noted that a number of prospective buyers were in the yards today, so that there is a prospect of much of the supply on hand being worked out by Saturday night. Quality of cattle on hand is good with wide range in weight. Sales are ranging at about \$3.10 to \$4.50 for cattle weighing 700 pounds and over with bulk going at \$3.75 to \$4.25. Yearlings and heavy calves \$2.00 to \$4.25 with bulk at \$2.50 to \$4.00. Stock heifers about \$2.75 to \$3.50.

A very moderate supply of cattle was reported in sight today. In fact the five leading points totaled out considerably less than 20,000 head which was much below an average for this time in the week. This light supply however did not act as much of a stimulant to the trade. On the local market the estimate of around 2,000 head did not afford much of attractive quality in the way of steers. None were seen as good as the steers that sold at \$5.50 yesterday. The market had rather slow indifferent tone, in wide contrast to the activity displayed yesterday when there was a fair showing of good steers at hand. Prices did not show any quotable change compared with late yesterday but were around a dime lower for kinds here than the market of earlier in the week. The styles of

steers that sold at \$5.50 yesterday and up to \$5.75 on Tuesday were not here but could be quoted steady with one load of 142 lb. average at \$5.50. Sales for the day ranged at \$1.75 to \$2.20 for medium to good handy to strong weights with coarse steers of medium to heavy weight going at \$4.50 to \$4.75, good fat light heaves \$4.40 to \$4.50, common to fair \$4.00 to \$4.40.

Mr. Eddy says that the Standard's position is governed by the law of supply and demand and that as the Kansas daily production of oil has exceeded 26,000 barrels a day and the Standard can refine but 8,000 barrels a day, from the Kansas field that the Standard can not take all the oil offered. He says the building of a refinery by the state will not help matters but that when the fields in Indiana and Ohio are exhausted more oil will be taken from Kansas.

Tacoma, Wash., March 24.—Albert F. Bell, one of the most noted mail-pouch robbers in the United States has made a successful dash for liberty at the United States prison on McNeil's island and escaped into the heavy woods near the prison. Bell covered his tracks so thoroughly that all trace of him was lost soon after entering the timber and a general alarm was turned in at the prison, guards being sent out to scour the woods and guard all avenues of escape from the island. The bloodhounds at the prison were immediately pressed into service.

Mexican Ambassador Ill. Washington, March 24.—Don Manuel de Aspiaz, the Mexican ambassador, is seriously ill with a severe attack of Lagrippe and other complications and his family are greatly concerned over his condition.
