The light receipts of yesterday and today at the large markets is tending to relieve the eastern dressed beef situation which is manifest in the increased buying orders here, and the position of western markets is further strengthened by the strike situation in Chicago, which is curtailing the dressed meat demand at that point. As yet Chicago packers have not been involved in the teamster's strike, but the situation is extremely critical, and Chicago buyers are using it as a bear argument to hold values down. Should the strike situation become aggravated increased buying orders will no doubt be placed at the outside markets, and shippers should bear this in mind when billing their stock. Total hogs in sight at five leading markets was 47,000, a shrinkage of 11,000 compared with one week ago and showing a total decrease of 24,000 for two expired days of the week compared with the same time last week. The market had free volume during early hours of August the day and a big proportion of the supply was out of first hands before 11 o'clock and at the close of business a good clearance had been made. No change was noted in the market for pigs, supply light.

Prices ranged from \$5.121/605.25, with the bulk selling at \$5.15@5.20. The bulk yesterday sold at \$5.121/65.1714, a week ago at \$5.321/265.421/4, a month ago \$5.22%@5.30,a year ago at \$4.57%@4.65,two years ago at \$6.75@6.85, three years ago at \$7.05@7.20 and \$5.65@5.75 for the same day four years ago.
