MORE HOSTILITIES.

The Chicago Teamsters' Strike to Be Continued.

SASH AND DOOR COMPANIES INVOLVED.

At Least 200 Men from Other Unions Expected to Go Out Wednesday.

Chicago, May 31.—There was nothing done on either side of the teamsters' strike Tuesday, but active hostilities are promised for Wednesday.

In addition to the lumber teamsters who are now out there will in all probability be a strike of all the men employed by 35 sash and door factories, as these concerns have announced that Wednesday they will commence making deliveries to boycotted houses.

The number of union men who are expected to strike by noon Wednesday is about 200 and it is expected that the extension of the strike will cause more rioting in that part of the city.

The members of this organization have throughout the strike acted more in favor of the teamsters than they have as allies of the Employers' Association and have for the greater part refused to make deliveries to boycotted houses.

Russia Has No Word Direct From Her Fleet.
POWER OF HER NAVY DESTROYED.

St. Petersburg, May 31.—After waiting vainly all day and evening for direct news from the scattered remnants of Vice Admiral Rojestvensky's destroyed and beaten fleet, the Russian admiralty at midnight no longer attempted to hold out against the overwhelming evidence pouring in from all directions that the fleet on which all their hopes were centered had suffered a greater disaster than did the combined French and Spanish fleets at Trafalgar.
