Gomez was the Goerge Washington of Cuba. He gave half his life to fighting the battles of his country or working to prepare it for independence. He left home in 1868 to to join the ranks of the insurgents in the revolution of that year. His god-father was Spanish loyalist, who was never converted and went to Spain with part of Gomez,s immediate family rather than live in a rebellious country. Gomez Early in the struggle he was made a captain for ability to handle men and conspicuous bravery. In one year he had been made a lieutenant- colonel and a victory over the notorious and cruel Col. Quiros a little later made Gomez a colonel. After that fight he became known to the Spanish as the 'Cuban terror.' Gomez beat the Spanish in a battle at Las Guasimas where the Americans also fought in the Spanish-American war. Near the close of the first ten-year war Gomez became Cuban commander-in-chief. When the revolt died out and the commanders began to hide in secluded parts of Cuba, the Spanish detailed several parties of troops especially to find Gomez, but he escaped to Jamaica. There he remained most of the time, with secret visits to Cuba until the revolution of 1895 began. Then he went back visions which he had collected in Jamaica for the day when Cuba should need them. He gave a large part of his private fortune to the Cuban cause.

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



Although the way has thus been difficult questions raised by the bill. smoothed for a peace conference the operations in Manchuria appear to be in full march toward a big engagement, the Japanese having pushed as far as Liaoyangchungkeng (Liaoyangwopeng) west of the Liao river, 33 miles north of Fakumen. The Japanese have strong forces here as well as in the rear of Lieut. Gen. Linevitch's advance detachments near Chantufu, and even threaten the flank of the fortified posttions at Lipingai, where Gen. Linevitch intended to offer battle but from which he pushed far to the southward during the months of inactivity on the part of the Japanese army. It is not known here whether Gen. Linevitch will retire slowly on those position or whether, as he intimated recently in an interview with the correspondents of the Associated press he intends to met the Japanese flanking operations to the westward by a counter offensive

movement. Russia and Japan have tentatively decided each to appoint three plenipotentiaries to represent them in the Washington conference. M. Nelidoff, it is understood, has already accepted the chairmanship of the Russian mission and is being consulted about the election of his associates, but Washington has not yet heard whether Marquis Ito's health will permit him to come as the ranking Japanese plentpotentiary. The belief here is that Field Marshal Yamagata will be designated in Ito's place should the marquis be unable to accept. It is expected that the conference will convene here about the middle of August. Pending the official announcement of the plenipotentiaries little progress toward the arrangement of an armistice is being had on either side. Japan will not take the initiative in requesting an armistice. It is probable, however, that she would insist on Russia making the request. It is generally expected that when the missions have been announced the preident will suggest to the belligerents the advisability of a limited truce and that this suggestion will be accepted. Instructions will then go to Linevitch and Oyama to sign the armistice.

The whole question of an armistice

has been informally discussed at the white house and the belief in diplomatic circles is that there will not be a hitch on this score, Japan prefers that the armistice should be signed in the field by Russian and Japanese commanders and there are indications that this will find approval in St. Petersburg.


