In fact the whole market was in a steady tone on a basis of the slightly better trade tone that devel-oped yesterday and the week closes with the market in more encouraging dition than was prevalent at the

start of the week. For the week there has been some falling off in supplies compared with last week but the shrinkage is not large enough to have created any radical change in market conditions. At the five leading market centers there has been a total of 221,000 cattle for the week and the number is 14,000 less than were at the same points last week but 20,000 more than for the corresponding week last year. Locally the supply of 15,000 is 2000 less than for last week and 2500 less less than for last week and 2500 less than a year ago. At the start of the week the trade was in a very sluggish condition and prices for all fat steers, including the heavier and higher priced westerns, sagged fully 15 to 25 cents. But with the middle days of the week and the falling off in supply the market began to show a better turn and most of the decline has been regained. The market at the close of the week is in a much better tone than at the start and prices are not quotably different for the general run of fat steers except for the higher priced natives which are a point or two lower. The westerns are still coming quite freely and there will be

A farm reader asks: "How much saltpeter should be used with 200 pounds of fresh pork when going to pickle, and how is it used?" Saltpeter is an astringent, even more so than salt. Its use alds in retaining the natural color of the flesh. In large quantities it is harmful to the health. Four to 6 ounces per 100 pounds of meat is as much as it is well to use. Too much will also have the effect of toughening the bacon. In dry-curing the following recipe is recommended: Fine dairy salt, 50 pounds; brown sugar, 5 pounds; saltpeter (finely ground), 2 pounds. Mix peter (finely ground), 2 pounds. Mix

well.

Rub in the mixture over the flesh parts and around the bones and joints for the first three or four days. Then spread the mixture freely, daily. The sides should be stacked. Alternate the method of stacking so that the side on the top one day will be at the bottom the following day. It will require about 14 days of this treatment, according to size of side.

GRAIN TRAFFIC ON LAKES Big Factor in Cheapening and Improve

ing Service. Washington, Nov. 4 .- The system of better and cheaper service in the marketing of a large part of the grain crops of the United States. Deepening the lake channels has made it possible to use larger vessels, and with the increased size of the carriers have come lower freight rates. In discussing improvements in lake channels, the report shows that in 1871 the ordinary depth of water at the shallowest points between Buffalo and Lakes Superior and Michigan was about 14 feet, while in 1969 this depth had been increased to 21 feet. During 1871-1875 the average size of the vessels built on the lakes was 193 tons, of 100 cubic feet gross measurement and the average size of those built in 1906-1909 was 1,232 tons. The lake

### THE STATE UNIVERSITY.

Representative Body of Citizens Give Reasons Why Amendment Should Be Adopted.

Columbia, Mo., Nov. 3.—Reagniz-ing the importance of our State Uni-versity in our public school system and the importance of placing its supand the importance of placing its sup-port upon a more permanent and de-pendable basis the undersigned regard-less of differing political opinions join in this appeal to the voters to adopt the proposed Amendment to the Con-stitution providing for the support of the University, the College of Agri-culture and the School of Mines.

The University is practically a free school. It is a poor boy's school. A large majority of the students are from families of moderate means and about 0 per cent are dependent upon their wn work to pay their expenses. The attendance of students has in-

The attendance of students has increased within the past ten years 157 per cent, more than 26 times the rate of increase in population in the state. The present number of students is approximately 3,000 and there is no room for more. The buildings are over crowded and the students are now being turned away We submit now being turned away. We submit that Missouri should make adequate provision for the education of its youth, and Missouri boys and girls should not have to go outside of this state to secure the best education that they may desire rey may desire.
The University is doing great ser-

ice in all its departments. Several epartmetns, however, are deserving f special mention. The Teachers' Colof special mention. The Teachers' Col-lege has trained more than 2,000 teachers during the past six years who are now doing efficient service as teachers in the public schools of the state. The Agricultural College by a sytsem of scientific experimentation has increased the yield of wheat, corn, grasses, vegetables and fruits in many sections of the state. The value of this department in its experimental work cannot be estimated in dollars and cents. In the discovery of serum for the prevention of hog cholera, the college has saved the farmers of the state a half million dollars during the ast year which is more than the Ag-iculture College has cost since it was stablished and more than the Uniuring any one year.

The graduates of the School of Mines have effectively assisted in the development of the mineral resources of the state and although Missouri produces more lead and zinc than all he rest of the states combined and nore than any country in the world, t still has vast stores of mineral realth to be developed under the di-ection of the graduates of this de-artment. The commercial value of the University as an investment can-


not be questioned.

We believe that the present proposed amendment should be adopted because it would provide a certain income for all departments of the University; because it would take the University out of the competition with the normal schools and the eleemosynary institutions, all of which have to be provided for out of the general revenue of the state; because it will mean the abandonment of the col-lateral inheritance tax as the means of support for the University. The Universities of most of the

states have such a permanent basis of support, as for example; Nebraska levies a separate tax of 10 cents on the hundred dollars for the support of their State University, more than three times the amount provided for in Amendment Number 11: and, Colorado levies 6 cents on the hundred dollars, just double the amount provided for in Amendment Number 11.

### WANTS TO LEASE RIVERBEDS

Oklahoma Asks Right to Take Pearl Shells From State's Waters.

Guthrie, Nov. 3 .- R. J. Ginder of Miami wants to lease the riverbeds of he Neosho. Spring and Grand rivers from the state of Oklahoma for the from the state of Oklahoma for the purpose of taking out pearls and mussel shells. Assistant Attorney General E. G. Spilman, to whom the application was made, has advised him that the application should be made to the commissioners of the land office, who have control of all state lands, as it would depend entirely upon them as to whether such a lease should be made, if the state's title were shown.

Attorneys for Ginder have presented a brief containing decisions of the United States supreme court to the effect that the state owns the bed of navigable streams in the absence of any state law granting it to the ri-parian owners; also that the naviga-bility of a stream may be shown by proof and not exclusively by its classification by the government. Ginder presents affidavits to show that these streams are navigated at all seasons of the year by boats of from 12 to 22 inches draft.
