CATTLE. Supplies Fall Off But Demand Slack. Prices Steady to Easier.

There is a sharp falling off in the number of cattle arriving at the leading market centers for this week compared with last, the total for the two days at the five leading points is only 98,000 and is 38,000 less than for the same time last year.

There were no strictly fat corn-fed steers here this morning, the supply being made up of short fed cattle that are showing up rather plentifully at all of the markets and are still having to meet sharp competition in the supplies of western steers that continue to come in liberal numbers.

Dressed Beef and Lipping Steers. There was a fairly large proportion of steers at the market this morning and this branch of the trade was also a little slow in opening with buyers making an effort to put prices on a slightly lower level.

A REASON FOR IT. Why Rural Population is Decreasing in the Older States.

PROTECT TREES FROM RABBITS.

The paper wrapped around the base of fruit trees to a height of two and one-half feet or more has proven as effective and simple an arrangement to keep the rabbits from gnawing on the trees as has the old method. It is also inexpensive. A fruit tree which is also gnawed by rabbits will not live and last winter saw the ruination of many young fruit trees in this section because of the prevalence of rabbits.
