## CATTLE.

#### Market Holds Steady At Late Declines, Supply Well Cleared Out.

there was not much to the cattle trade of today. The estimated supply was fully all that any demand of the trade called for but there was no disposition shown on the part of the buyers to force prices to any further reduction. The small business of the day was done at a steady basis of pri-ces compared with Thursday and the yards are well cleared of all grades

of beef cattle.

For the week there has been sharp shrinkage in the local market, sharp shrinkag in the number of catbut it has not been sufficient to create better tone to the demand and the week closes with prices on the lowest level of the fall season and, on all grades of beef steers, fully 25 cents lower than at the close of last week and 75 cents to \$1.00 lower than two weeks ago. The total of cattle arrived at the five leading market centers for the week is 212 200 and is the point foots up to 29.000 and is the dictate another 10 cent reduction in prices. For the week the total at this arrived at the five leading market centers for the week is 212,000 and is 25,000 larger than for the same time last week and 37,000 more than the same time last year. On the local yards the total for the week is 2400 less than for last week and about 1000 less than for the same week last year. During the first days of the week the market was in a very bad shape and an outlet could hardly be found for the cattle even at sweeping declines. But with the last half of the week the shrinkage in supply has had the effect of checking the decline and the buyers have been taking the cattle as though they had a place for them at the prices, instead of having to be coaxed to take the stock. The market here has at no time been in worse shape than at other markets during final days of the week. It seems that prices have gone as low as they can for the present, but next week is a holiday week when the consumption of poultry will be large and the demand for beef will be correweek is a holiday week when the consumption of poultry will be large and the demand for beef will be correspondingly lessened. Thanksgiving week is never a week of active markets in the live stock trade and there is nothing to call out liberal receipts. The heaviest decline has of course fallen upon the short fed steers and it is likely that the proportion of these will be large for the next few weeks so they will be apt to be the last of the different grades of cattle to show any improvement when there is a turn for the better.
