CATTLE

Better Tone Developed This Week on Smaller Supply.

There were only a few cattle loaded here today and no change was noted in market condition. The trade is in much better condition than a week ago. It is believed that a big run next week as the live stock supply will be on at that point. River markets are not looking for heavy supplies.

For the week there has been a very good tone developed in the trade and all prices for beef cattle are on a higher level than at the close of the previous week. It should be noted however, that the improvement has been purely on the lighter supplies being sent in by the country and there is nothing in the situation that calls for liberal shipments during the next few weeks. The total of supplies for the week at the leading markets has been 126,000 and shows a shrinkage of 55,000 compared with last week.

COWS, BULLS AND MIXED.

In the stock trade there has also been some improvement noted and prices are generally quoted 10 to 15 cents higher than a week ago.

STOCKERS AND FEEDERS.

In the stocker and feeder trade the improvement in the beef cattle trade has been reflected in this branch of the market and there is a perceptibly better demand for the cattle to go back to the country.

LOWEST IN MONTHS.

Hogs Struck 87 Mark Yesterday—First Time Since April Last Year.

When live hogs sold down to 87 per hundred pounds on the St. Joseph stock yards market yesterday they touched the lowest point reached since April 3, 1909.

The price yesterday is not a low one by any means and there is gossip around the yards to the effect that the end of the decline is not yet in sight.

Three years ago this month hogs sold as low as \$3.75 per hundred pounds on this market, but that was in panic times.

It is predicted that while prices may go still lower it is not generally believed that they go as low as \$5 for the winter market.

BLACKHEAD IN TURKEYS.

There has been a considerable loss among turkeys in Colorado this fall from black head, or what is scientifically known as Enterohepatitis.

The name black head was given because the grossly enlarged liver resembles when the turkey is attacked by the disease. This we have found not always to be true.

Missouri Shows Low Mortality and Compares Superior to Other States.

DEATH RATE EXTREMELY LOW

Even in Swamp Lands of Southeastern Part of State Mortality is Low.

Jefferson City, Nov. 26.—"Missouri is a healthful state," is the title of a chapter in the 1910 Red Book of the Bureau of Labor Statistics, which is devoted to establishing the fact that this state is one of the most sanitary in the country and that its annual mortality per thousand is as low as the lowest.

The death rate of St. Louis per thousand in 1909 was 15.3, which low percentage makes that city more healthful than any other city in the United States.

Missouri has a lower death rate than any other state in the Union. Even in the swamp and lowlands of southeast Missouri the annual mortality is low.

As for the mortality rate in the Ozark region, no section of the country, be it larger in area, or smaller, enjoys a lower death rate per thousand. It is estimated that the mortality there is 10 to 12 per thousand.

AGED ELEPHANT EXECUTED

Was Adjudged Guilty of Murder and Sentenced to Death.

New York, Nov. 26.—It took five hundred grains of cyanide of potassium, the most deadly poison known, to kill Gypsy Queen, a trick elephant, executed today for the murder of her keeper, Robert Schiel, Oct. 29.

Less than one grain is ordinarily fatal to man and the first convulsive symptoms supervene almost before the victim can set down the glass from which he swallows.

Gypsy Queen swayed backward and forward, flapping her big ears, for ten minutes before she showed the least uneasiness. It was 44 minutes before she was pronounced dead.

The poison was given in three installments in her mash, which had been sprinkled 100 capsules, each of five grains of cyanide.

She had been starved for twenty-four hours and ate greedily. At the end of ten minutes she shivered in her cell.

Her trunk grew rigid, she rolled her eyes, and finally fell. In the next two minutes she got up four times, struggling against the chains that bound her.

At the end of twenty minutes her breathing was imperceptible, but forty-four minutes after her first swallow she uttered a cry when her trainer passed his hand before her eyes. That was the last sign of life.

Queen was born in Africa eighty-seven years ago and was one of the largest elephants in captivity. She stood 8 feet, 7 inches high. Of recent years her temper grew sullen.

Last October she seized an unaccustomed keeper, who had been warned not to go near her, slammed him against the wall of her cell and then trod him into pulp.

A few days ago she grabbed for another keeper but he kept out of reach. Nevertheless, her trainer never lost faith in her. To prove her docility, he took her out today a few minutes before her execution and led her through her paces.

She seemed enough to perform and submitted to be caressed before she was led in to her death.

PLAN TO CORRAL THE DEER. Farmers Around Avoca Anticipating a Big Hunt in December.

Avoca, Ia., Nov. 25.—Arrangements have been made for corraling the deer that are running wild east of Avoca.

An eight foot fence will be placed around one of their favorite feeding grounds, which consists of about ten acres, in which feed and salt will be placed.

All but one side of about three hundred acres will be fenced so as to let them come and go for a few days. On the inside of the inclosure will be built a smaller one, in which they will be driven and kept.

About the middle of December a deer hunt will be made and everybody who can get away will be asked to take part. The object will be to drive all deer from the north end of the Roid's place south to the Peter Howell timber, where the corral is being made.

When once on the inside there will be enough men present to put up the 300 yards of fence in a few minutes, making a complete inclosure. It is expected that from 100 to 200 deer will be caught.

State Game Warden Lincoln and Deputy Warden Groneweg will be here to help and take charge of the drive. This will be a day of sport. No guns will be allowed in the drive.

This will certainly be the most extraordinary hunt ever witnessed in a purely agricultural country as this is.

Great inducements have been held out to farmers and investors to buy lands in Mexico, and there have been thousands who have bought the lands, and other thousands who have been preparing to move to the southern country, or have already moved. They may come out all right in the indefinite future, but for the present, at least, there is an uncertainty staring them in the face.

Right here in the state of Missouri there has been a large amount of exploiting the wonders of Mexico as a land for attractive and profitable investment. There have, as a result, been thousands of dollars spent in the purchase of Mexican lands. What would the same money and energy spent in exploiting the wonders and advantages of Missouri have done for this state? With thousands of acres of undeveloped territory in the state, agricultural, dairy and fruit lands, a splendid climate and close to markets the question is well worth giving some study.

PARAGOULD FEDERAL BUILDING

Paragould, Ark.—Postmaster J. Harry McPherson of this city has received from Washington a request for surveys and city plans showing the grade of the government property in this city. About a year ago the government purchased a valuable piece of property within half a block of the business section of the city for the purpose of erecting thereon a government building. The call for the city grades as to sidewalks is made with a view to making preparations for the erection of the government building, which will be a handsome structure, to cost about \$40,000.

HALF MILLION LAND DEAL.

St. Paul, Minn.—The Western Land Securities Company of St. Paul is said to have purchased the holdings of the Dayton Clark Land Company of Valley City, N. D., west of the Missouri river, in that state. The holdings comprise 75,000 acres, and the consideration is said to have been \$502,250. This is the largest land deal ever consummated west of the river in North Dakota. It is understood that the Western Land Securities Company is planning to colonize the land purchased.
