The dry farming king says that with the cheap land in Mexico and the cheap labor corn can be raised and imported to the United States much imported to the United States much cheaper than farmers can produce it in Illinois, Iowa or Missouri. Production of corn in Mexico and Texas can be reduced to a minimum.

For the purpose of publishing his book, "The Modern Cultivation of

In speaking of the value of seed se-lection, Senor Dominguez said: "I have satisfactorily proved by ex-tended experiments that the air-drying of seed corn not only holds the germinative power at its maximum strength, but, by reason of its quicker and stronger germination in the field, actually causes an increase of from 10 to 15 per cent in the yield an acre. Deterioration in the germinative pow-er is caused by the heating of the moisture contained in the cob, which bursts the life cell. I have found that proper hanging, so that each row of seed may have a uniform drying, eliminates the possibility of such deteroration."

Uncooked Pickles—At this busy season of the year one likes to make pickling and canning easy and at the same time have it good. I am sending a recipe for uncooked cucumber pickles which I have made for a number of years and have never once lost one. Try k for yourself and be convinced. Take one teacupful of salt, one of sugar, one of ground mustard, and one level teaspoonfull of pulverized alum. Mix thoroughly together, then add slowly, stirring all the time, one gallon good cider vinegar; if strong weaken with water. Have your pickles washed clean, drain in colander a few minutes, put in earthen jar, and pout the vinegar over. I add a teacupful of horseradish root if I can get it. This makes two gallons.

Chicago Hot.—One peck ripe tomatoes, two cups celery, two onions, four red peppers, all chopped; one cup white sugar, one-half cup salt, six cups vinegar, two tablespoons whole
